Donley County ASCS report

Low yields wheat. If your wheat acreage was affected by drought or hail, you might be eligible for a low yield payment. An application for a low yield payment must be filed within 15 days after harvest.

Cotton and grain sorghum. If cotton or grain sorghum is destroyed or affected by a natural disaster, you must report your acreage and request an appraisal before other use is made of the acreage. If you are going to harvest the affected acreage, the appraisal is not necessary.

Spot harvesting wheat. If you only spot harvest wheat, you will need to report the acreage harvested and we will have to appraise the acreage not harvested prior to making other use of the land.

Low yield payment - wheat. The low yield payment on wheat is figured on 60 percent of your wheat yield times acres planted for harvest minus appraised or harvested production times \$1.70 per bu.

Example: Wheat Yield 20 bu. X 60 percent = 12 Bu. X 100 ac. planted = 1200 Bu. less 200 Bu. production = 1000 Bu. X \$1.70 = \$1700.00 low yield payment.

To be eligible for this low yield payment, you must file an application within 15 days after harvest.

Acreage reports - crop acreage must be reported. August 1 is the final date to report cotton, corn, grain sorghum, set-aside and other NCA crops. Again crops are to be reported on a field by field basis, irrigated crops

separated from dry, solid acres separate from skip-row. It will save all of us some time if you have already measured your crops and set-aside. So, please have your measurements ready when you certify.

This year's acreage report is very important. There are heavy penalties for not

reporting correctly. Therefore, please measure your crops carefully before reporting the acreage.

Wheat loan - 1978 basic wheat loan rate is \$2.35 Bu.

State Tax representative here

State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced he is sending a representative from his Amarillo Field Office to Clarendon on Wednesday, July 19, 1978 to assist local taxpayers and answer questions about State Taxes.

Bullock said Enforcement Officer John Hodges will meet with local taxpayers at the County Judge's Office in the Donley County Courthouse from 2:00 P.M. until 4:00 P.M.

"If Donley County - area merchants, or any one else for that matter, have any questions about State Taxes or need help in preparing tax

forms Mr. Hodges will be there to assist them," Bullock said.

"We're trying to cut the red tape in this office and we believe these face-to-face sessions with taxpayers help do just that," Bullock added.

Bullock reminded those taxpayers who are unable to meet with his representative on July 19, 1978 that they can still get their question answered quickly by calling his toll-free tax information number in Austin. That number is 1-800-252-5555.

The Amarillo Field Office, headed by Claudia Stravato, serves the twenty-six counties of the Texas Panhandle.

Clarendon Library receives membership

Roadside signs may cost you a fine

An illegal roadside advertising sign has cost its owner a \$1,000 fine and drawn court orders to get the sign down by August 1.

The penalty in the Smith County case is the stiffest since the Texas Highway Beautification Act went into effect in June 1972. Other cases have been prosecuted but fines have been on the lower side of the \$25 to \$200 range of possible fines.

The beautification act prohibits outdoor advertising signs altogether along state-maintained roadways in some areas. In any event, no such signs may be erected unless the owner has a license and, also, a permit authorizing each sign. To get a license the sign owner files an application and bond form and \$25 fee with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation right of way division in Austin. A \$2,500 bond is required in each county to a maximum of \$10,000 for the entire state. After receiving the license, the owner must get a permit for each sign from the department district office where the sign is to be erected.

In the Smith County case, the owner did not have a license nor did the sign have a permit. Neither would have done the owner any good, however, since the sign was in an area where roadside advertising signs are prohibited.

The department filed separate complaints against the owner, who had not responded to letters or phone calls. Under the law, each day an illegal sign remains is a separate complaint. After Justice of the Peace

H.M. Shelton issued a warrant for the arrest of the owner, the owner appeared. He entered guilty pleas to five of the complaints.

Judge Shelton assessed the maximum fine -- \$200 -- on each of the five complaints plus \$17.50 in court costs and ordered the

owner to have the sign removed by August 1.

The department administers the highway beautification law which covers both advertising signs and junkyards. The state laws were enacted six years ago to bring Texas into compliance with federal highway beautification programs.

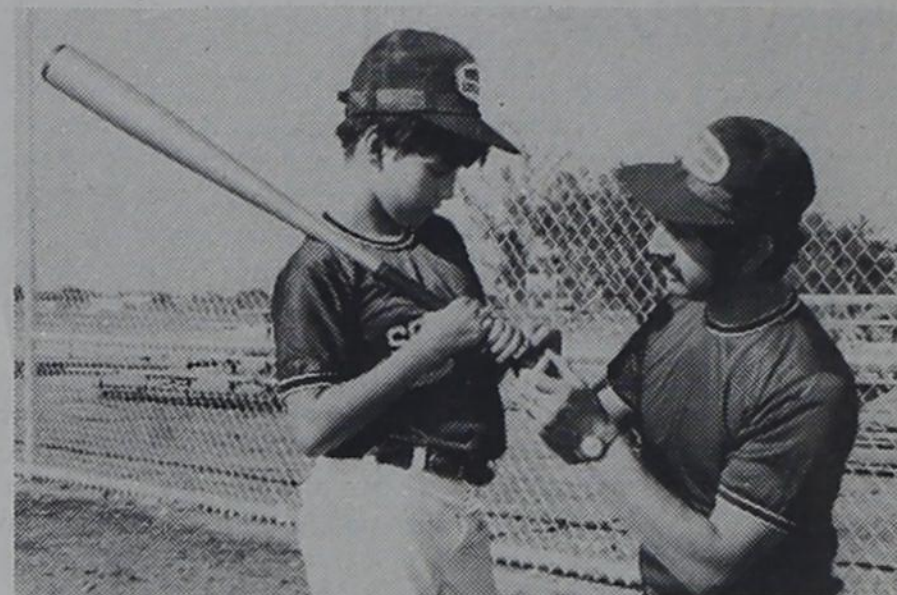

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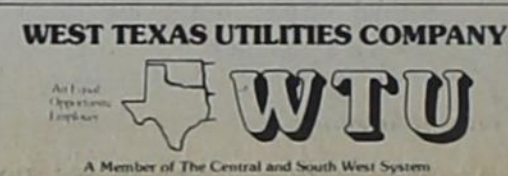

Roadside signs may cost you a fine

An illegal roadside advertising sign has cost its owner a \$1,000 fine and drawn court orders to get the sign down by August 1.

The penalty in the Smith County case is the stiffest since the Texas Highway Beautification Act went into effect in June 1972. Other cases have been prosecuted but fines have been on the lower side of the \$25 to \$200 range of possible fines.

The beautification act prohibits outdoor advertising signs altogether along state-maintained roadways in some areas. In any event, no such signs may be erected unless the owner has a license and, also, a permit authorizing each sign. To get a license the sign owner files an application and bond form and \$25 fee with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation right way division in Austin. A \$2,500 bond is required in each county to a maximum of \$10,000 for the entire state.

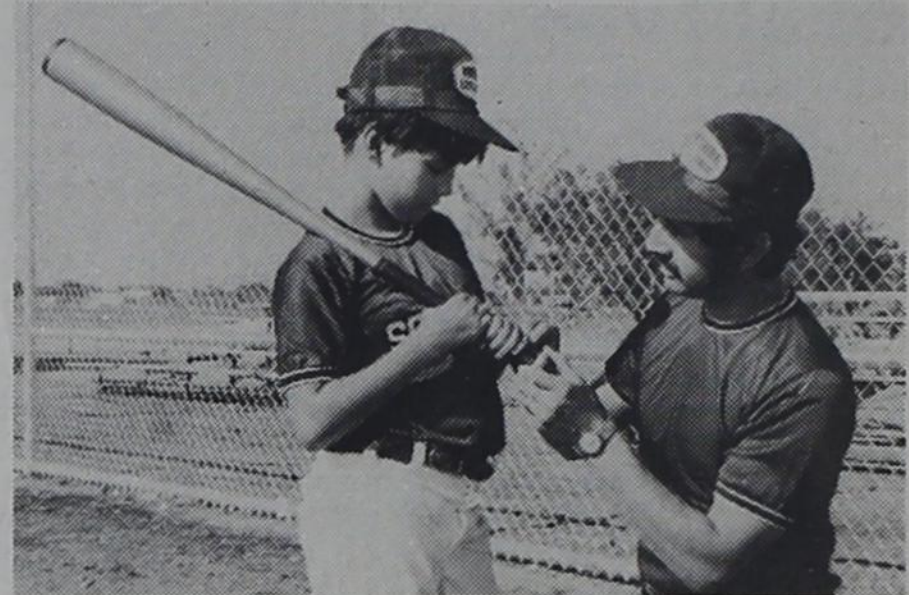

Boat owners in Texas should keep in mind that boats situated or operated on the fresh waters in the state which have permanent sleeping quarters must be equipped with an approved marine sanitation device, a spokesman for the Texas Department of Water Resources said Thursday.

Carry-on portable units are acceptable on boats of less than 26 feet in length, while boats 26 feet long or longer and all houseboats regardless of length are required to be equipped with permanently installed devices.

Game wardens with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department who have authority to inspect boats for compliance with TDWR regulations are now checking boats on Texas lakes to see that they are conforming with the requirements.

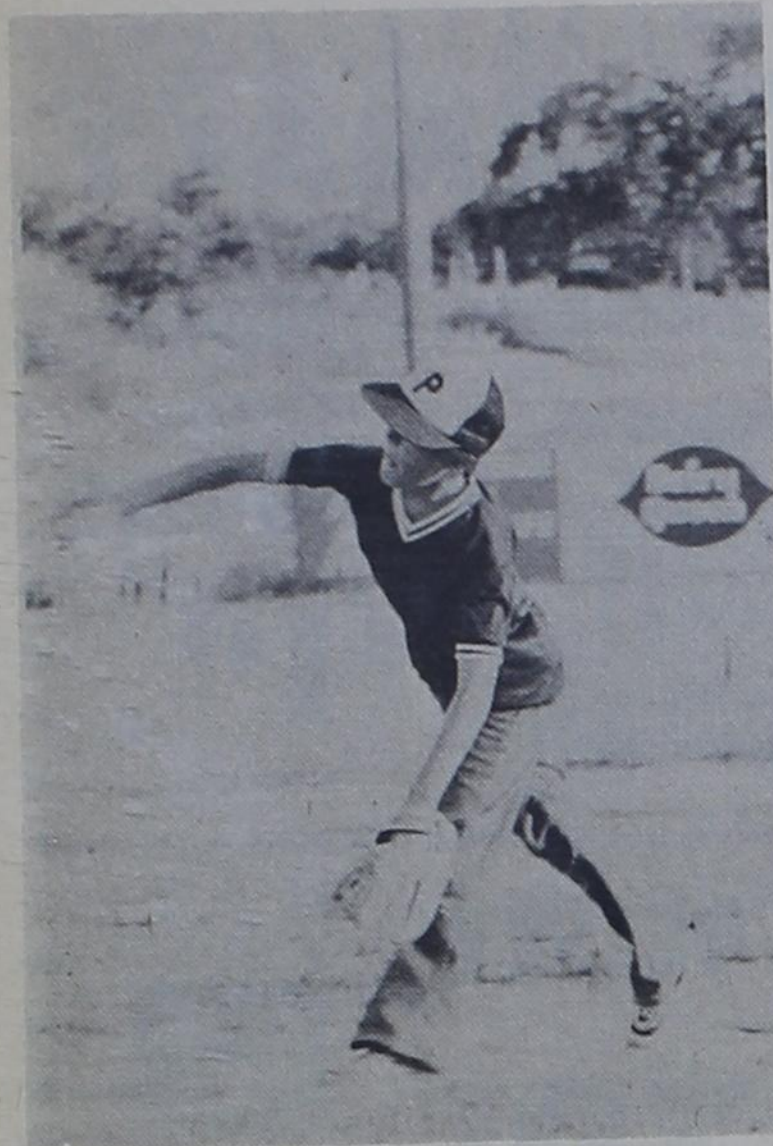

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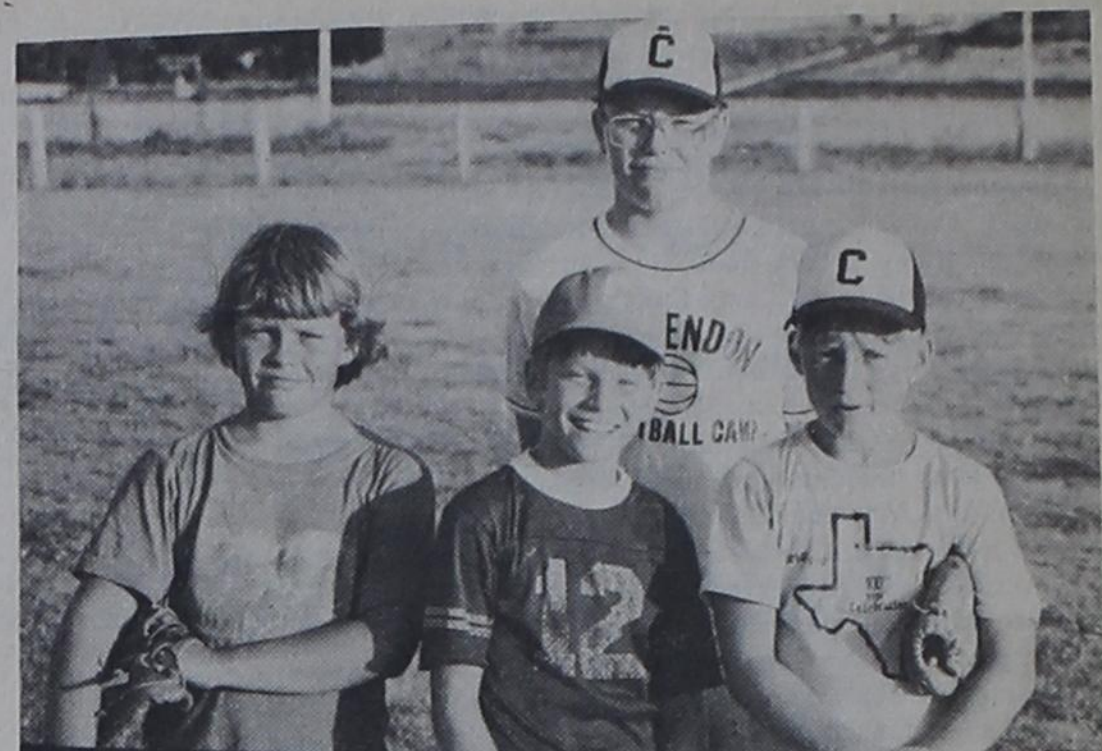
