## Cotton harvest is in full swing

Cotton growers and ginners are hard at it harvesting the cotton crop which was late maturing, but which also had a late fall to help some.

Earl Shields, of the Paymaster Gin in Lelia Lake reported that he was sending cotton from his gin to the Paymaster at Brice and Memphis to avoid a bottleneck and help his customers.

When he reported earlier in the week they had ginned 2700 bales there and had 800 on the yard. Help is on the way from the south plains, he said in the way of a module builder. It will

be operated by David Bray of Idalou. Two growers plan to use the module builder in Donley County, Truett Hall, of Clarendon and Andy Brown at Jericho. Unusually damp weather with lower than normal summer temperatures made yields unpredictable. Early estimates were not good but with the warm fall we had the outlook for a better than average crop improved. In fact the cotton in the field looked so good at that point the yield was over estimated.

With ginning results to go by it now appears the yield is about 1/4 bale per acre less than

estimated. The crop is still above average in yield but the low mike is resulting in a \$40 to \$45 per bale loss to the grower. This is the margin of profit for some growers.

With the cotton harvest in full swing and fair, dry weather staying on the trailers are going to the gins at a steady pace. It is the wish of every cotton farmer to get the cotton out before rain or snow stops the pulling and delays the finish of the 1979 crop.

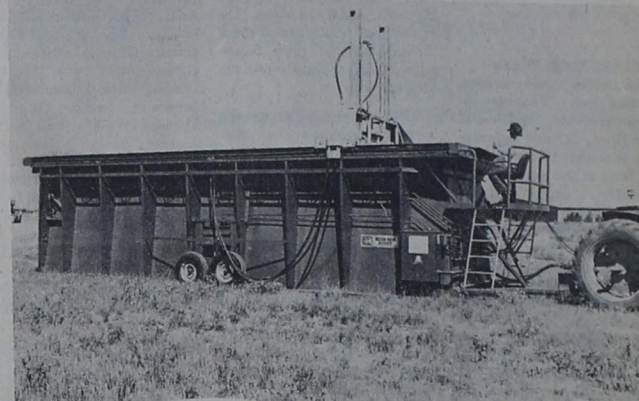
## Energy conference slated

The farmer's increasing concern over the nation's energy supply will be approached from two directions—as a liability and as a potential asset—during the Energy for Agriculture Conference to be held here Tuesday, December 11.

Legislators from two states will discuss energy legislation and opportunities. Kansas State Rep. Dean Shelar, of Minneola, will explore gasohol from the standpoint of fuel and as a cash crop. Texas State Sen. Bob Price of Pampa will report on energy legislation in the Lone Star State.

After lunch, directors of the Northwest Texas Grain Producers Cooperative in Dallam will discuss plans for alcohol production. Crops which can be used for biomass energy production will be discussed by Dr. Frank Petr (cq), Extension area agronomist at Amarillo.

Prospects for marketing crops for use in producing biomass energy will be explored by Dr. William E. Black, Extension agricultural economist in marketing and policy at Texas A&M, College Station. Gross said persons attending the conference will have opportunities to question the speakers. County Extension Agents Vernon Cook of Roberts County and Kenneth Holloway of Moore County will chair the morning and afternoon sessions, respectively. The program will adjourn at 4 p.m.

## Ginners get temporary reprieve

The National Cotton Council has received a letter from officials of the U.S. Labor Department stating that cotton ginners temporarily will not be cited under provisions of the Farm Labor Contractor Registration Act.

The Council earlier had objected to Labor Department enforcement of the new law, because farmers, ginners, and certain other employers are exempt.

Herbert J. Cohen, assistant administrator of the Labor Department's wage and hour division, said in the letter that

certain sections of the law were under review. "Based on this review, it has been decided to restudy the department's position and to issue a clear opinion on these sections of the act."

He added, "Until such time as the department issues the opinion, enforcement action under the act will be suspended in the cotton gin industry."

Cohen's letter also said advice and assistance from ginners will be sought by the department during the course of the study. He indicated that the Labor Department plans to meet with ginners "to facilitate achieving maximum voluntary compliance with the act."

After numerous ginners were cited for failing to register, the Council urged the Senate to intervene and 52 Senators signed a letter to Labor Secretary Ray Marshall expressing their concern over enforcement activities against exempt employers.

The Council said it will continue to monitor developments and will work with Labor Department officials to seek permanent relief for ginners and other agricultural employers.

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### Virginia Clifford Sr. Snacks and Beverages

This recipe could be served in a holiday buffet. It could be served along with assorted cracker or carrot and celery sticks. The Pineapple nut ball is very nutritious. The main nutrients it contains are vitamin A and calcium which are found in cream cheese. Vitamin A keeps the body healthy and protects against night blindness. Calcium is necessary to help build and repair bones and teeth, to help blood to clot and to help the muscles and nerves react normally. Vitamin A is also provided by the pecans and pineapple as well as iron and potassium.

### Pineapple-Nut Ball

2-8 oz. packages cream cheese, softened  
2 cups pecans  
1-8 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained  
1/4 cup chopped green pepper  
1 tbsp. (or more), grated onion  
1 tsp salt  
1 tsp. celery salt (opt.)  
Combine cream cheese, 1 cup pecans, pineapple, green pepper, onion, and celery salt, mix well. Refrigerate for 1 hour. Divide in half, shape into balls. Roll in remaining pecans. Chill. Remove from refrigerator 30 minutes before serving. Serve with assorted crackers.

### Angela Klinnert Sr. Main Dish

This recipe could be served for any occasion especially for winter suppers. Since this recipe is a one-dish meal, green salad is all that's needed for a balanced meal. It is very nutritious since it has a high content of protein, calcium and vitamin A. Besides the protein the chicken is high in phosphorus and niacin. Protein builds and repairs muscles, blood and all other tissues, helps fight infection and surplus food energy. The calcium, found in the creamed soups and cheese, help build and repair bones and teeth. Vitamin A, found in the soups and tomatoes, helps keep the skin and mucous membranes healthy and resistant to infection.

**Spanish Chicken Casserole**  
Boil chicken until done and then pick off bone.  
Use 1 cup broth from cooking

chicken  
1 can creme mushroom soup  
1 can creme of chicken soup  
1/2 onion  
1 can Rotel tomatoes  
1 lb Longhorn cheese, grated  
1 small package of doritos  
mix everything up with doritos and put cheese on top

### Melody Moreman Senior Side Dish

My dish is an attractive and nutritious side dish to go with any entree. It's high in vitamin A, phosphorus, iron, calcium, and protein. The vitamin A helps protect against night blindness and keeps skin healthy. Phosphorus helps in the development of bones and teeth. Iron combines with protein to make hemoglobin. Calcium helps build strong bones and teeth, and clot blood. Protein builds and repairs all body tissues.

### Bean Casserole

2 cans French style green beans  
1 bottle mushrooms  
1 can water chestnuts  
1 can bean sprouts  
1 small onion sliced  
1 can mushroom soup  
1/2 can water  
2 cans French onion rings  
Drain green beans, mushrooms, water chestnuts, and bean sprouts. Mix all ingredients together and bake in a casserole dish at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

### Peppermint Pound Cake

1 cup shortening  
2 cups sugar  
6 eggs  
1 tsp Peppermint extract  
1 tsp butter flavoring  
1/2 tsp red food color  
1/2 tsp salt  
3 cups flour, sifted  
3/4 cup buttermilk  
1 tsp soda  
1 Tbl vinegar  
1/4 cup peppermint candy, crushed

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs, one at a time. Mix well. Add peppermint extract, butter flavoring, red food color (\*) and salt. Sift flour again, add alternately with buttermilk. Mix soda and vinegar in small bowl, then add to the above mixture. Blend well. Fold in crushed peppermint candy. Pour into 9 or 10 inch stem pan that has been greased and dusted with flour. Bake at 325 degrees for about one hour and 10 minutes, or until toothpick inserted into center comes out clean. Do not overbake. (\*Red food color may be added last. By pulling a spoon through the batter a few times, the cake will have the look of peppermint candy.

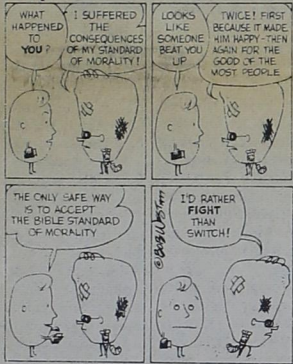
### INTRODUCING: THEOPHILUS!

### Agriculture Incomereport

State Representative Foster Whaley compiled some most interesting figures from a very current publication just released by Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service and from the Texas Department of Agriculture. The publication is entitled 1978 Texas County Statistics.

The agricultural income from the ten county 66th Legislative District was \$309 million dollars in 1977 and exceeded \$305 million dollars in 1978.

Floyd County had over \$81 million dollars agricultural income in 1978. Gray County followed in second place with a \$40 million dollar agricultural income.

Other counties and their 1978 agricultural income are as follows: Armstrong, \$19.3 million; Briscoe, \$24.1 million; Childress, \$17.0 million; Collingsworth, \$23.0 million; Donley, \$23.4 million; Hall, \$22.7 million; Motley, \$15.6 million; and Wheeler, \$38.5 million.

Brad Thompson had 8 points, Tim Brown and Doug Foster 5 each, and Hosea Hearn and Ken Jones 4 points apiece to round out Clarendon scoring.

Use of the press in the Championship clash aided the Bronchos on their way to a 100-53 win over Mobeetie. Excellent defensive play and

### "Smoke Out" report

An estimated 18,200,000 Americans, including 1,050,000 Texans tried to quit smoking on November 15th, the date of the 3rd Annual Great American Smokeout. The results were compiled through a nationwide survey of 2224 households. 4907 adults lived in those households and 1641 (33.4%) were cigarette smokers. Of those, 575, or 35%, were reported "trying to quit" on the morning of the 15th. 445 volunteers, including 26 Texans, made the survey calls and reported the results to the National ACA Headquarters before Noon on Wednesday. 137 households in thirteen cities (Amarillo, Austin, Bryan, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Ft. Worth, Houston, Lubbock, Lufkin, McAllen, San Antonio, and Waco) were surveyed in Texas. The Texas figures actually indicated that 40% of the smokers or 1,200,000 were trying to quit but the sample was too small for an accurate projection.

### Moment for Meditation

Seek ye out of the Book of the Lord and read." Isa. 34:16

There was a time when the Bible was a part of a child's instruction in the home and in the school. That is not true in the schools anymore and in many of the homes of today. The family has become submerged in other activities to the point there is little or no time for Bible reading. This is likely to be true because it is true in America which is called a christian nation. We suffer spiritual malnutrition when we do not partake of the nourishment found in the Bible.

Most of us have several copies of the Bible in our homes, but often they are neglected. We must open the Book of the Lord and read if we are to live full, useful lives. Then too, our children deserve to have the very best guidance in this violent age. This is possible only if they have a knowledge of God and His requirements. These requirements are found in the Bible. Someone counted every verse in the Bible and found that Psa. 118:8 is the very middle of the Bible. Whether by coincidence or Divine design it says, "It is better to trust in the Lord than to put confidence in man."

### Dec. 17 date for some estimated taxes

Corporations having expected tax liabilities of at least \$40 for 1979 and operating on a calendar year tax basis must make a payment of 1979 estimated tax by Monday, December 17, 1979, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The amount of the payment can be computed on Form 1120-W, a worksheet for computing corporation estimated tax. This form should not be filed with the IRS but be retained with the corporation's records.

When the payments are deposited in authorized commercial banks or Federal Reserve Banks, they must be accompanied by Federal Tax Deposit Form 503, the IRS said. Supplies of Form 1120-W and a helpful pamphlet, IRS Publication 542, "Corporations and the Federal Income Tax," are available free from local IRS offices.

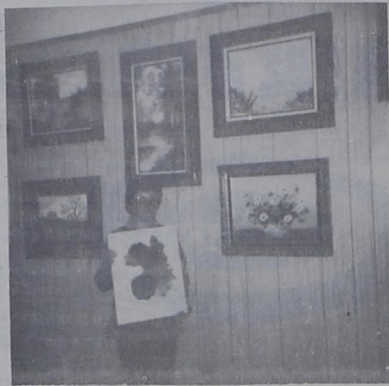

Each part of a door needs a different kind of seal. The sides and top use plastic strips that self-adhere to the jamb. The bottom requires a door sweep that screws easily onto the door. A pile dust plug is used to seal the bottom corners.

For pet openings, attic doors and other special spots a variety of foam shapes are available.

## 4-H'ers have Lubbock trip

Three Senior 4-H food show winners, Karen Alderson, Virginia Clifford and Angela Klinert went to Lubbock last Friday and Saturday to tour several businesses and Texas Tech University.

Upon arrival in Lubbock they toured the Pre-Fab houses of Lubbock and were surprised to find the excellent quality and designs of the homes for the price. The next stop was Harrigan's a charming restaurant decorated in antiques and warm, bold prints. The people there were as interesting as the decor.

After lunch the group went to Texas Tech and toured the entire Home Economics Building. They started at the basement and the portable pre-fab equipment used by the interior design majors and moved to the first floor where they viewed the child development lab. Tech is now offering day care in the afternoons for gifted children in this particular lab. There is an observation booth to one side of the lab where students may view the children without being seen. The booth is disguised by a mirror of the room which is translucent from the observation booth.

The tour then proceeded to the Deans Office, El Centro, and the New Foods and Nutrition building. The group went down to the research laboratory to view the rats and testing equipment. Cancer and nutrition research is currently underway.

The tour then moved to Quality Check Dairy where the sales manager told of the dairy industry and its future. He said milk sales as a whole were down due to the rising cost of groceries and the use of milk substitutes by families.

such as squid and octopus. The girls then went to the Chinese Kitchen to sample egg rolls, beef Pepper steak, and honey-chicken. They decided to swing back to tradition, though and had pizza for dinner. A tour of the new 1980 cars followed along with a cost comparison of small, economy cars. The next stop was Hemphill Wells to tour the china and crystal selections.

The following morning the group attended the Make-It-With-Wool Contest held on the Tech campus. Cynthia Edwards of Silverton won the event.

Before leaving Lubbock the 4-H'ers compared the cost of generic, storebrand and national brand foods. The results were shocking with as much as \$1.00 difference in the price of some items. They presented this information to junior food show winners Tuesday, November 27.

The trip was very educational teaching 4-H members to be aware of current conditions.

- 4 eggs (room temperature)
  - 1 1/2 cups sugar

  - 1 t vanilla
  - 1/4 cup sugar
- Mix ingredients and spread on top. Return to oven for 10 minutes.

### Tish Robinson Broccoli-Cauliflower soup

- 1 8 oz pkg frozen cauliflower
- 1 10 1/2 oz can condensed chicken broth
- 1 10 oz pkg frozen chopped broccoli
- 1/2 tsp mustard seed
- 1/2 tsp dried dillweed
- 1/2 tsp ground mac-
- 1/4 cup finely chopped onion
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 2 T all purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp salt
- Dash of pepper
- 3 1/2 cups milk
- 1 cup shredded process Swiss cheese

In a 3 quart sauce pan cook cauliflower, covered in half the chicken broth for 5-8 or till just tender. In a medium sauce pan combine remaining chicken broth, broccoli, mustard seed, and dillweed, cook, covered for 5-8 minutes or till broccoli is just tender. Set aside a few broccoli head for garnish, if desired. Remove from heat; cover and keep warm. Place cauliflower mixture and mace in blender; cover and blend till smooth. In the 3 quart sauce pan cook onion

in butter till almost tender. Stir in flour, salt, and pepper. Add milk all at once; cook and stir till thickened and bubbly. Stir sauce, cauliflower, and cheese into broccoli mixture; cook and stir till heated through and cheese is melted. Garnish with reserved broccoli, if desired. Yield 4-6 servings.

This dish has all four food groups represented in it and has all the key nutrients in it. It is attractive and tastes good. Can be served with tossed salad and light dessert with tea to drink.

- Chicken Enchilada Casserole
- 1 3 lb chicken, baked and boned
- 1 can cream of chicken soup

## Lice on cattle

Lice cost U.S. cattlemen about \$67 million last year, so it's important to control them, says Ronald Gooch, Donley County agent.

Lice begin to reproduce rapidly with the onset of cool weather, so peak populations on cattle occur in late winter and early spring. Uncontrolled lice can soon infest a whole herd because with cold weather, cattle tend to bunch up more so that the pests can move easily from one animal to another. Heavy hair coats on animals during cold weather also afford protection for the parasites and allow for increased reproduction.

Both types of lice—bloodsucking and biting—infest cattle. Sucking lice pierce the animal's skin and suck blood while biting lice feed on particles of hair, scale, scab and skin exudation, explains Gooch.

Lice infestations irritate animals, causing itching, scratching and rubbing on fences or anything else available. This produces denuded areas, bruises and lacerations on the affected animal. Heavily infested animals will have an unthrifty appearance and will suffer weight reduction, decreased milk production, anemia or even death. Lice infested animals may also be more

subject to infectious diseases. Heavy lice infestations often stunt calves.

Spraying or dipping infested animals with the proper insecticide is the most effective means of controlling lice, says Gooch.

However, properly placed and maintained dust bags offer effective control and save both time and labor. Position dust bags prior to lice buildup so that cattle can become accustomed to using the bags. A dust bag station should serve about 30 head. Depending on cattle size, place the bags so that they hang 18-24 inches above the ground.

Forced-use of dust bags, where they are placed so that cattle must pass under them to get or water, begin to control lice sooner than those used free-choice. By allowing a two-to-three week adjustment period, free-choice bags can be about as effective as forced-use types.

In a spraying or dipping program an animal must receive a thorough soaking in each of two applications 14-18 days apart to effectively control lice, contends Gooch. The second spray or dip will kill any lice hatching from eggs that were laid prior to the first spraying. When spraying, use a high pressure (250 pounds per square inch) and thoroughly wet animals to the skin.

For a list of effective insecticides for controlling lice, Gooch suggests that cattlemen obtain a copy of "Suggestions for Controlling External Parasites on Livestock and Poultry" at the county Extension office.

Check the label on the insecticide container and pay particular attention to warnings, restrictions and waiting periods, especially if some of the cattle are being prepared for slaughter, cautions Gooch.

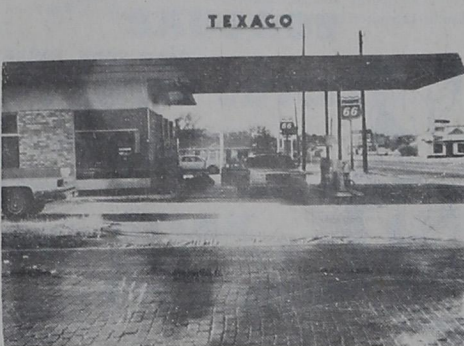

**New type of farm appears**

A new kind of farm may appear on the Texas High Plains by the mid-1980's, farms that have giant egg beaters producing electrical power from the wind.

The wind turbine farms, as they are called, could produce up to 10 percent of the power that goes into a utility grid, according to a Texas Tech University mechanical engineer, Dr. James H. Strickland.

Strickland and his graduate students have been researching various aspects of producing electrical power from Darrieus turbines, shaped like egg beaters.

Funds for his research were provided by the university's Center for Energy Research and Sandia Laboratories, Albuquerque.

"Development of technology for wind energy will taper off during the next five years as most of the knowledge is now available and emphasis will shift to the commercial aspects of producing electrical power from turbine farms," Strickland said.

Basic questions about power output, aerodynamics, vibration and stress have been solved through the research efforts of university and government experts. Current research is focusing on aesthetics, spacing between turbines and other issues, Strickland explained.

Wind energy, he said, is not expected to produce more than 10 percent of the power that goes into a utility grid, "and to that extent it will not solve the

energy crisis, but it will make a significant contribution."

The ten percent figure could go up if a technological breakthrough is achieved in storing electrical energy. The need to store energy is essential because wind produces fluctuating amounts of power, depending on wind speed, and if the energy can be stored then higher uniform amounts can be used.

At present wind power can produce electrical energy at about 12¢ per kilowatt hour (kwh). Conventional sources produce the same amount of power for about three to four cents, "but efficient production from wind can be achieved to reduce the price to a competitive figure."

Five egg beater turbines,

each about 150-feet tall, can produce about one megawatt of electrical power at peak production. Each unit would cost around \$200,000. One megawatt of electrical power would be more than 25 percent of Crosbyton's needs, or other towns with population up to 2,500, but only when the egg beater was producing at peak capacity.

The life span of a wind turbine would be around 25 years, Strickland said.

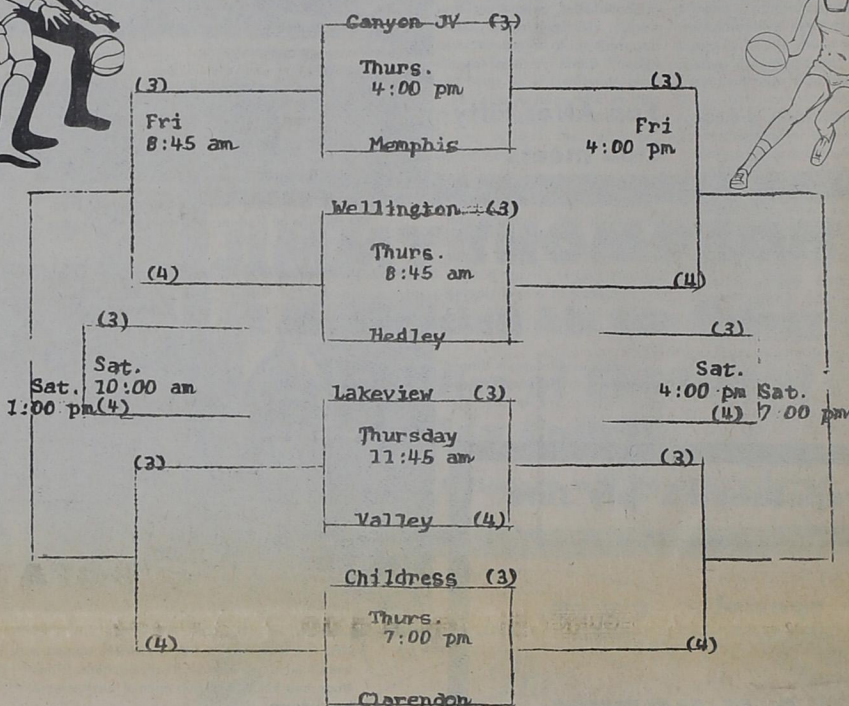
Snow or rain, unless it is in excessive amounts, is not expected to damage the blades of the turbine. The blades will create a small amount of noise like that of a helicopter.

Besides wind turbines, Strickland and his graduate students are also working on other projects such as effects of wind on solar collectors and solar towers.
