### GTE granted \$31 million increase in annual revenues

The Public Utility Commission, August 5, granted General Telephone Company of the Southwest a \$31 million increase in annual revenues, including a \$4 million penalty for poor service, and ordered the Commission staff to initiate on February 1, 1981, an investigation to determine the Company's effectiveness in meeting the Commission service objectives and standards.

The new rates will become effective October 1, 1980.

General Telephone filed on February 25, a request for a \$58.3 million increase in annual revenues and during hearings which concluded in June staunchly defended its overall level of service attributing some service problems in 1979 on severe ice storms, Hurricane Claudette and extensive flooding during late summer and fall in GTSW service areas near Houston.

Company witnesses during the hearings also supported the need for the full amount stating that it was necessary to keep pace with the exceedingly rapid growth in GTSW's service areas, rapidly changing technology, the need to improve and expand service and services and an unprecedented high level of inflation.

F. E. Hightower, vice president-revenue requirements, described the penalty - the first of its kind imposed by the PUC - as "unusually harsh", especially the additional provisions imposed by the Commissioners above those recommended by Hearing Examiner Phillip Ricketts.

"We are extremely disappointed," Hightower said, adding "the Company probably will not determine its next step until the final order is received in the near future

### Continental Singers

The "Continental Singers and Orchestra," currently on their yearly 75 day summer tour, will present a live 90-minute concert of contemporary Christian music on August 14 at 8:00 at the First Baptist Church in Clarendon.

Their performance includes contemporary gospel music, spirituals, anthems, and hymn arrangements. This year's program, entitled "...And There Was Light" will feature selections from a new youth musical by Cam Floria and Jeff Kennedy by the same title. Also included will be medleys of favorite praise songs as well as contemporary gospel songs like "Jehoshaphat's Song" by Don Francisco and Dallas Holm's "Rise Again" and great standards such as "How Great Thou Art."

The 16 vocalists and 6 instrumentalists are highly trained and talented musicians selected by audition from thousands of high school- and college-age young people from across the nation and in foreign countries. Auditions are held after each local concert for singers, instrumentalists and technical staff. The program has proven so popular among young performers wanting to join the tours that they have grown from one group in 1967 to twelve groups this year.

Since Cam Floria organized the first group, various editions of the "Continental Singers and Orchestra" have made more than 5,000 live domestic appearances and over 1,400 foreign appearances before more than 3.5 million people. The philosophy of Floria is that "regardless of the country or religion, music is the common language."

Traveling from 100 to 500 miles seven days a week by bus, boat and plane, they will perform nightly during the summer tour. Concerts are held in churches, auditoriums, outdoor pavilions, military bases and hospitals. They are completely self-contained with their own sound and light equipment.

In addition to performing in all fifty states, they have

toured Canada, Great Britain and Ireland, eastern and western Europe, plus Russia, Poland, Yugoslavia, the Middle East, South America, Australia, New Zealand, the South Pacific, the Far East, and the Caribbean Islands.

This year the "Continental Singers and Orchestra" will perform throughout the entire United States and Canada, England, Ireland, Wales, Scotland, Holland, France, West Germany, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Japan, Hong Kong, Taiwan, the Philippines, Kwajalein, the Marshall Islands, Argentina, Ecuador, Peru, Brazil, Barbados, South Africa, Spain, Hungary, Greece, Switzerland, and Austria.

Floria, president of Continental Ministries headquartered in Thousand Oaks, California, has perfected techniques to turn 260 singers and 175 instrumentalists into 12 professional-sounding performing groups in a short 10-day training period. Sound and lighting technicians and bus drivers also receive specialized training. While each member of the group has been rehearsing independently at home prior to coming together, the summer begins with an intensive rehearsal camp in the Los Angeles area, where they meet as a group for the first time.

Financing for this non-profit group is unique. Each member raises part of his or her expenses on his own, with the remainder being supplied by local churches and organizations.

They have recorded 12 record albums on the Word and Light labels, plus three albums on New Life Records, entitled "Come Bless the Lord," "Sing It With Love," and "Come Praise and Bless the Lord." Their newest album also on the New Life label is a musical called "...And There Was Light."

### Historian finds cultural trends in western movies

COLLEGE STATION — Old shoot-'em-up westerns — and perhaps those of this decade — are rich historical documents that reflect America's attitudes on social issues at the time they were made, says a Texas A&M University historian.

"You can never prove conclusively that any single western is an exact replica of an entire society's thoughts and beliefs," said Dr. John Lenihan, "but the change in westerns towards racial problems and international issues pretty much reflect changing trends."

Lenihan, who has written a book on the western film, pointed out that during the Vietnam-Watergate years cowboy movies even questioned traditional heroism.

### What is a leader?

4-H leaders are adults with added minds and a soft spot in their hearts for kids—all kinds of kids; their own kids, other people's kids, tall kids, short kids, thin kids, not-so-thin kids, regular kids, square kids, responsive kids, and ungrateful kids from ten-agers to teen-agers. At their own time and expense and neglecting their own personal interests, they serve without pay and often with a minimum of parent cooperation, knowing that they are necessities that the Agricultural Extension Service and the 4-H membership could not do without. Seldom are there enough of them and that is the reason they become leaders—so their own offspring can join the 4-H organization.

Leaders are usually to be found in the midst of a more or less attentive group of kids, numbering anywhere from 3 to 15, teaching projects such as cooking, dressmaking, electricity, gardening, chicken raising, horsemanship, canning, tractor operation, home improvement, forestry, camping, etc. They generously and regularly open their homes to scuffing feet, vocal enthusiasm, extemporaneous wrestling

matches, and unauthorized pillow fights. And somehow, in spite of alien influence, skills and knowledge are miraculously transferred from leader to child in varying degrees.

A leader explains to, shows how, does for, phones up, pleads with, bosses around, and reminds for the tenth time; and when the result is negative, patiently swallows an urge to throttle them and once again explains to, shows how, does for, phones up, pleads with, bosses around, and reminds for the eleventh time. 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

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**The Speaker Reports**



by Bill Clayton

AUSTIN—The Census Bureau is currently acquiring the data to be used by the states in their redistricting efforts. January of this year marked the opening of over 400 district census offices throughout the country.

Census maps were provided to local governments for review early this year. These maps contain identifiable tract, enumeration district, block group, and block boundaries. Enumeration districts and block groups are combined to form census tracts which are intended to be small areas for statistical purposes; the average population of a tract is about 4,000. The enumeration district is the smallest census unit for non-metropolitan areas and contains about 1,000 people. Block groups also have 1,000 people, but are combinations of about ten contiguous blocks in urban areas. A block is the smallest unit for collecting census data. It usually con-

forms to city blocks and contains about 100 people. There are several problems in the census taking process. One of those is undercounting. A major criticism of the 1970 census was the failure to count many persons, particularly, poor and alien persons in metropolitan areas. This is a very important matter because it could lead to a misrepresentation of the actual population of legislative districts. It could also affect federal monetary assistance to local governments.

Another problem is the enumeration of race. The census requires individuals to designate their race. Problems occurred in prior years with the Spanish-surnamed identification because some people do not have Spanish surnames, but are of Spanish heritage. In the 1980 census, the designations are more general in nature and the category for Spanish-surnamed has been changed to "Persons of Spanish Origin". It remains to be determined whether the race designations will be more accurate than in the past.

Other problems include the accuracy of the mapping and how to count residents living out-of-state. Proper counting of the migrant and alien population is also a concern. All of these factors will greatly influence the validity of the census.

It is believed that most of the problems will be resolved in the course of this year and that the data will be reliable. The population numbers, as well as the

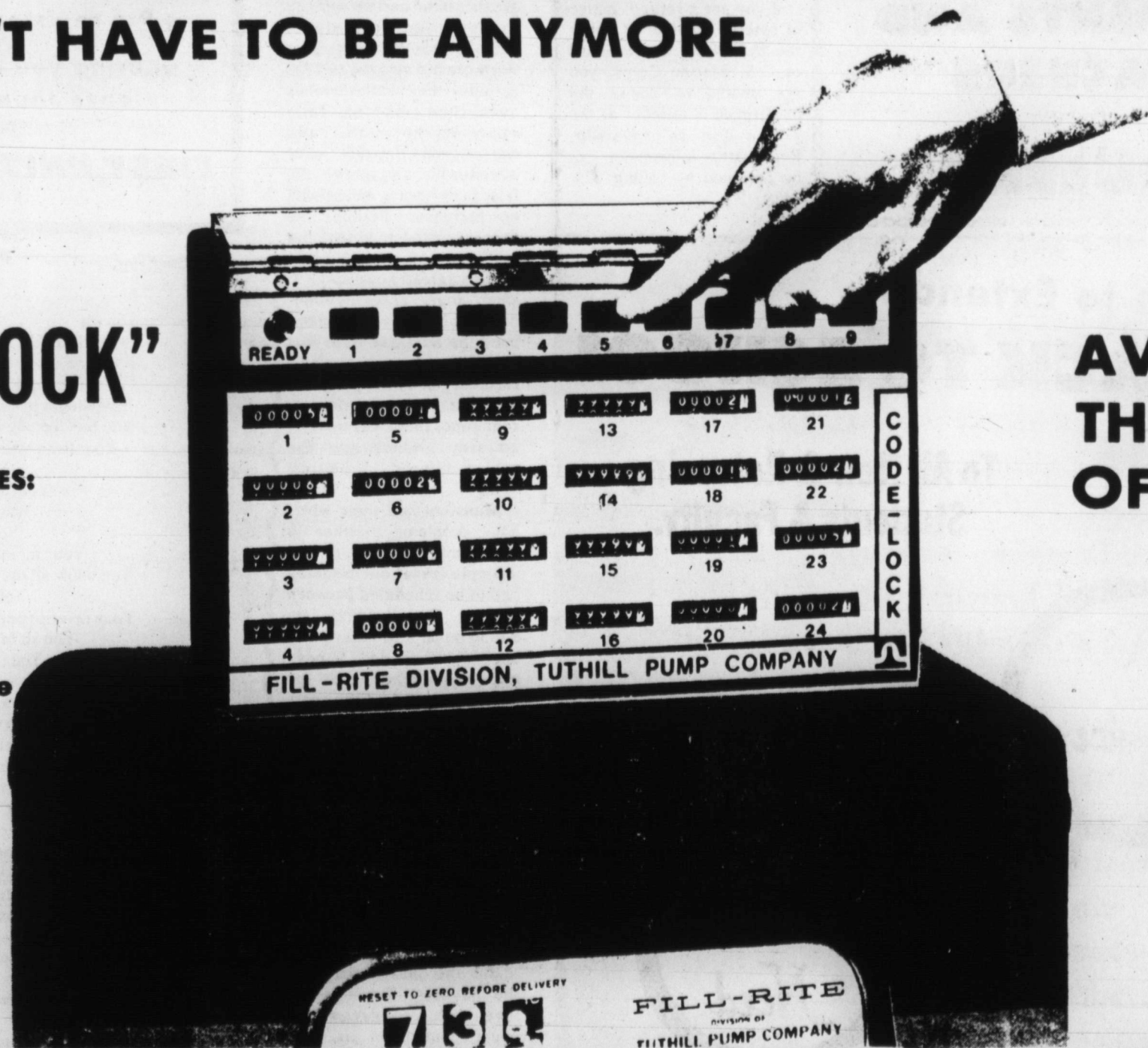
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## God made the first move

## Fish tails

stocker distributor to bait shop. At this point, the minnows freshness is up to the fisherman.

People that purchase their bait, unload their boat and gear, ride around the lake looking for that ideal spot and then reach into the metal minnow bucket which has been sitting on the bottom of the boat in the hot sun, are surprised and disgusted to find their "fresh minnows" floating, belly side up! The heat and length of time in the little bucket have dissipated the oxygen from the water and the minnows have suffocated.

In the spring and the fall, wild minnows caught locally, work quite well, but the temperature is cool enough that they will live longer. They don't survive long when it gets hotter, so purchased minnows are better. However, you must exercise common sense in keeping your bait alive. Get your minnows and use them as soon as you can. Give them lots of shade and refresh their water frequently to help keep the water supplied with oxygen.

A good minnow is excellent bait, but the minnow is only as good as the fisherman using it.

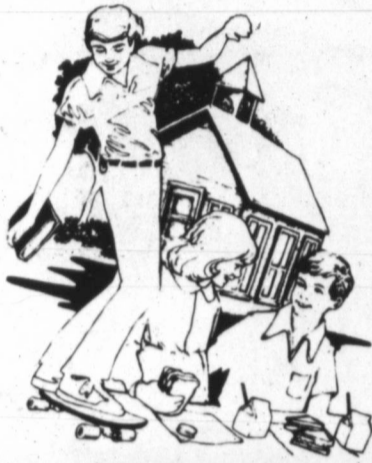

- 2 oz. red food color

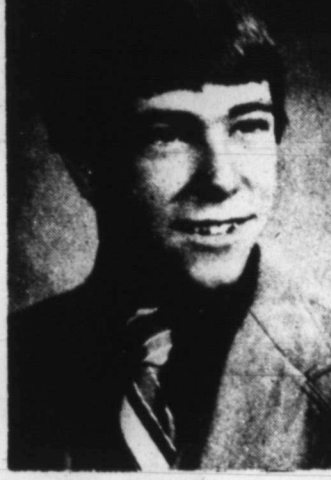
sift together

### Veterinarians say to thank the skunks for rabies increase

COLLEGE STATION — Skunks, which already account for three-fourths of all rabies cases in Texas, seem to be spreading the disease at an alarming rate to horses and cattle as well as pets, says a Texas A&M University researcher.

For the first five months of 1980, rabies cases in the state are 10 to 15 percent ahead of the same time last year, previously the worst on record.

Despite widespread appeals for people to vaccinate pets and avoid contact with skunks, rabies has continued to be one of the largest health problems overall because of the skunk population and its ability to tolerate mankind's encroachment, said Dr. Leon Russell, professor of veterinary public health.

"They are ornery little beasts. They can live in culverts, under a porch or in a storage shed," said Russell. And although skunks can adapt to city life, some of their natural enemies — coyotes, bobcats, and foxes — have a harder time doing so.
