Bond election called to fund jail

Donley County Commissioners Court met in a called session at 8 p.m. Monday July 28, 1980 and were joined by Bob Davis, of Amarillo, representative of the Bonding company of Fred Baker & Associates, Inc., an Amarillo firm.

At this time the court moved to call a bond election to be held Tuesday, August 26, 1980.

This bond election is being called to have on hand funds in the amount of the cost of construction of the new jail building for Donley County residents a requirement for letting the bids. The amount of the bonds is \$180,000. Other funds to be used for the construction cost are Revenue Sharing monies

which have been on a certificate of deposit drawing interest for this purpose, in the amount of \$160,000. Bonds will be issued for 10 years.

Questions have been asked about repaying the bonds with revenue sharing funds. As far as is possible this will be done. However the law which provides revenue sharing funds to the various entities city, state, and county will expire at the end of September. It is not certain that congress will re-enact the provision. If it is acted on the amount may be less than in the past. No one knows exactly what the outcome will be.

The commissioners and the county judge cannot commit money which may

not be forthcoming nor are they able to commit another commissioners court to pay revenue sharing monies to this project if the majority of the court is changed. They feel the public is entitled to know this truth.

At present the court feels, that if Revenue Sharing is refunded it will be used to repay the bonds.

The increase in taxes to pay the bonded indebtedness payments each year will be very little more than the cost of time, transportation, maintaining prisoners in other county jails, according to county judge, W.R. Christal.

Anyone who wishes to get dollar amounts, view plans or see records on expenditures or the budget, is welcomed to come to the office of the

county judge who will be happy to co-operate.

The report of the jail commission has been received on plans and specifications and some 8 or 10 minor items are to be corrected before bids are put out. The architect has assured they will be quickly corrected there will be no delay.

Letter to the Editor

Were you aware that a recent survey showed that 59% of the people in this country don't want their children to pray in school? How can our courts or our Congress restore prayer in our schools when over 59% of the public is against it? Unless we speak out with our true opinions on the whole issue of prayer in our schools, the anti-prayer groups will continue to use this argument against us.

The American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) has successfully won court battles across the nation prohibiting

solid Christian principles. According to the NEW YORK TIMES children in Massachusetts schools had been voluntarily reciting prayers for the quick release of the American hostages in Iran. These children weren't taking drugs. They weren't causing trouble. They were praying and the court put a stop to that because of the actions of the ACLU. If they succeed in winning any more court cases on school prayer or other so-called First Amendment legal issues it will jeopardize attempts to restore prayer in our schools.

Unless you and I and our fellow Americans fight back, the ACLU will keep prayer, God and even Christmas Carols out of our schools and out of our public lives. In Souix Falls, SD, ACLU lawyers sued the Board of Education to stop children

from singing Silent Night in school! Last Christmas ACLU lawyers sued the city of Denver to get a nativity scene of Jesus in a manger taken out of a city office building.

While the ACLU lawyers are opposed to school prayer, pornography is a different question. Recently ACLU lawyers won a court case in New York State where a school principal may have to pay damages to pornographers. The ACLU said the school principal violated the pornographers "rights" when he tried to stop school-age smut-peddlers from distributing hard core sex magazines to other school children! Thanks to the ACLU "victory" school principals over the nation will think twice before they punish any young person for pornography and other morality charges.

It doesn't matter if you the taxpayer must pay teachers salaries and pay for the operation of schools. It doesn't matter if you as a parent don't want your children exposed to homosexuality, lesbianism, and pornography without the choice of praying in school. Your right as a taxpayer and your duty as a parent don't mean a thing to ACLU.

Dr. John McNeil, Beef Cattle Specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, presented a slide presentation on improved management techniques.

Miss Lisa McAnear, National Shorthorn Lassie queen, from Clarendon, Texas reported on the World Shorthorn Congress during the picnic lunch. The Con-

gress was held in Calgary, Alberta, Canada, July 3-10 with approximately 400 in attendance. She was a guest of the Canadian Shorthorn Association. She said there were eleven member nations, including the American Shorthorn Association and the Canadian Association, and that several associations required their members to have a certain number of registered stock and to have a show string. She noted the Canadian Association accepts Lincoln Red cattle in their herd book, while the American group does not. Miss McAnear observed that the Canadian Shorthorns are a heavier body type than most U.S. show winners this past year, and they lack the height and scale of her cattle. She concluded by saying that the American Shorthorn Association will host the next Congress, scheduled for summer 1983, with possible site of Louisville, Kentucky.

It takes no real effort for a Christian to become so agreeable until, to all who observe there is a question mark about his or her Christian experience.

A thermostat is an automatic apparatus for controlling the amount of heat or cold that a heater or cooler will give off into a designated area. It is a very obstinate little instrument that says it doesn't matter what the surrounding temperature is I am going to raise or lower it to my setting. How the world needs Christians like this

who will say and practice changing the spiritual temperature of our surroundings. Were we to hunt for one who practiced this we would find it in Daniel 1:8 "But Daniel purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself with the portion of the king's meat, NOR WITH THE WINE which he drank: therefore he requested of the prince of the eunuchs that he might not defile himself." We would not have to look far back until we found the experience of Joseph who God gave a victory to in a pagan Egypt.

Being like a thermostat did not guarantee that life would be easy, but it did guarantee that God would see us through to victory like he did Joseph and Daniel. What are you as you evaluate your Christianity: Are you like a thermometer or a thermostat?

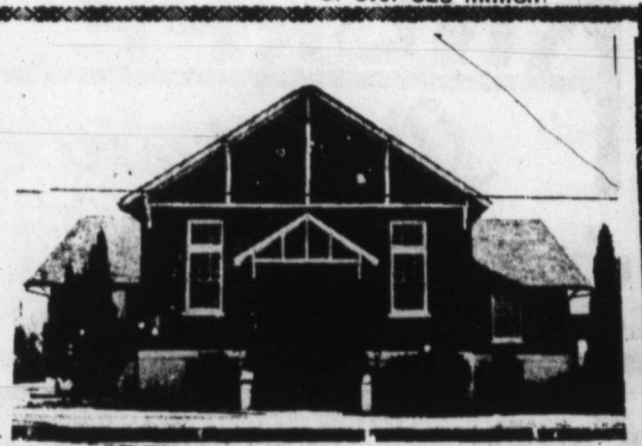

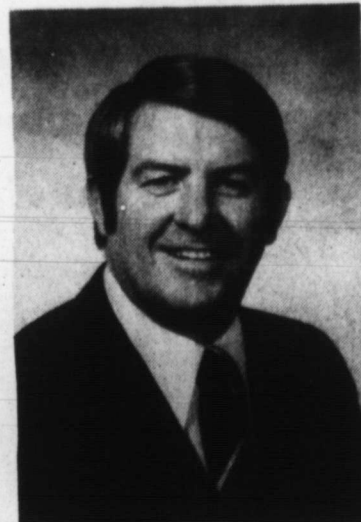

20,000 windbreak trees sold

More than 20,000 trees were sold for windbreaks in the Panhandle this year by the Texas Forest Service.

These one-year old trees, produced at the West Texas Nursery, were sold to landowners to establish natural windbarriers around their homesteads and to improve wildlife habitat. The Texas Forest Service does not sell trees for landscaping or ornamental plantings.

The state-operated West Texas Nursery includes a 5-acre field nursery at Halfway and a greenhouse facility near Lubbock. It was established to provide landowners with tree species that will survive the harsh climate of West Texas.

More than 13,000 conifers (Austrian pine, proderosa pine, Arizona cypress and redcedar) and 6,700 hardwood trees (mulberry, native plum, Russian olive, honeylocust and sawtooth oak) were sold this year.

According to Bob Fewin,

windbreak silviculturist, Lubbock County residents purchased the most trees -- some 4,290. Midland, Dawson and Hale counties each purchased more than 1,000 trees.

Due to the limited production of this new nursery, sales were restricted to 60 counties in the Texas Panhandle -- south to the Big Spring area.

Although the growing conditions this summer have not been ideal, the Texas Forest Service hopes to triple the number of trees available for the 1980-81 planting season. Based on the June 30 inventory, about 30 to 40,000 containerized conifers and 80,000 hardwood seedlings should be available next year.

Applications for ordering these windbreak trees will be available in September from the West Texas Nursery, Route 3, Box 216, Lubbock, TX 79401.

Twin catfish are hard to find, and it seemed their bad luck that they each landed a fish identical to each others.

The total live weight of all of the catfish caught during this prestigious affair came to 65 pounds. The contestants and their families enjoyed a big, plentiful, all they could consume and keep down cat fish fry Monday to conclude the contest. If a total of those fish that got away but would have weighed 12 pounds were made, Clarendon and the area could have eaten fish for a month. Luckily, we didn't have to clean that many fish.

DRUGS DURING PREGNANCY

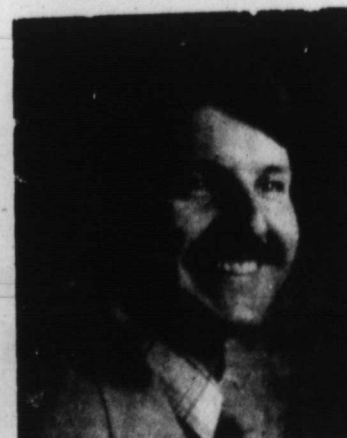

Are medicines taken by the expectant mother harmful to her child? This has been the subject of much research...especially since the thalidomide tragedy almost 20 years ago. During a two year period, approximately 10,000 birth defects were attributed to this drug.

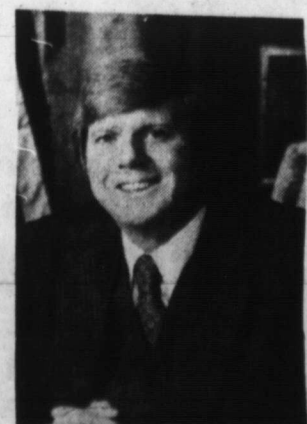
It is now believed that only two to three percent of all birth defects are caused by today's medicines. Another two to three percent are caused by infection. The great majority of problems...over 90 percent...are due to unknown causes.

Medicine use by pregnant women is widespread. In one study, 97% of women took at least one prescription medicine and 65% took non-prescription medicines. The common use of medicines and the low incidence of birth defects points to the relative safety of medicines today.

Mothers protect their unborn by following a few simple rules. First, do not take street drugs. Their content and purity can not be known. Second, avoid non-prescription medicines...especially during the early months of pregnancy. Third, take only the prescription medicines prescribed by a physician...and always let any physician visited know of the pregnancy.

Alien students will not bankrupt state

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday said a federal judge's ruling that Texas public schools must educate the children of illegal aliens won't bankrupt the state.

Bullock said the state pays local school districts about \$2.8 billion annually to supplement the cost of education.

The extra \$40 million it has

been estimated to cover the cost of education for illegal aliens is only 1.4 percent of the state's education budget.

There are about 2.6 million children attending Texas public schools and while nobody knows the exact number of school-aged illegal aliens it's probably not more than 20,000 to 50,000. That's somewhere between 1 to 2 percent, he said.

"Illegal aliens have been paying sales tax, motor vehicle tax and gasoline tax just like Texas residents. Some may treat them as second-class citizens, but they are first-class taxpayers," Bullock said.

"Frankly, it's time we quit worrying about where some kid was born and start worrying about what kind of education all our kids are getting," Bullock said.

Deciding on appropriate shows starts with the consumer. Also, "comparing notes" with others can help. Consumers can study ratings of such groups as the National Parent-Teacher Association. Taking Action
What can consumers do if "changing channels" or "turning of the set" isn't quite enough? They have several opportunities to voice their feelings to people who influence programming. First, you can let advertisers know if you think they're sponsoring a program of dubious merit. You can also tell them when you like programs they sponsor. Likewise, if you object to their particular advertising style -- or approve of it -- let them know that, too. Also, you certainly can write your concerns -- and compliments -- about television to the networks.

Formal Complaints
Consumers also could consider filing a formal complaint with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), if they feel specific programming is not "in the public interest." When the FCC was created in 1934, it said that programming must be "in the public interest." Radio and television stations must renew their broadcasting licenses every three years. As members of a community served by a station, consumers have a legal right to participate in the license-renewal process.
