

Infulenza vaccine for the current year recommendations have been received from the center for disease control. These virus infections occure every year in the United States, but vary greatly in incidence and distribution. The symptoms range from mild cold-like infections to pneumonia or death. They have the ability to cause periodic wide spread outbreaks and epidemics in both adults and children. These influenza epidemics are frequently the cause of

deaths in excess of the number normally expected. Efforts to control influenza in the United States have been aimed at protecting those persons at greatest risk of serious illness. These influenza related deaths occure primarily in the chronically ill adults and children and in older persons especially those over 65.

### **PUBLIC NOTICE** BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1980**

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with antitrust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment. The proposed amendment will appear on the

ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

The meeting was adjourned. Refreshments of Lemon ade and cookies were served to over 50 members, leaders and parents.





### **Bronchos game against Quanah Friday night**

**By SPENCER HAYES** The Clarendon Broncos were plagued by a severe case of fumblitis, which helped boost the Quanah Indians to a 35-8 victory Friday night in Quanah. The Broncs fumbled 7

times in all, losing 5. But the real damage was done when Clarendon lost the ball three times inside their own 20 yard line. A strong Indian football team was able to convert these three mistakes into three touchdowns. This appeared to be the big difference in the game.

Take nothing away from Quanah, however. This was one tough team that Clarendon faced. Quanah barely lost to powerhouse Childress the week before, and was ranked 5th in the state in class AA. Keep in mind, though, that while the Indians dominated the scoreboard, they did not crush Clarendon in statistics. Take first downs, for instance; Quanah barely edged the Broncs out, 12-11. Also, for having outscored Clarendon so badly, Quanah did not outgain them badly in total offense. The Indians gained a respectable 394 total yards including a 144 yard rushing performance by running back David McGary and two touchdown bombs of 38 and 71 yards by quarterback Zack Choat. Clarendon compiled only 123 yards on the ground but rode Lance Thornberrys strong passing arm to an additional 148 yards for a 271 yard total. Thornberry was true on 15 of 26 passes for the night with only one interception. Bobby Weatherton was Clarendon's leading ground gainer, rushing for 71 yards, including a 60 yard scamper on a well set draw play. Weatherton cartied only seven times in the game. Hosea Hearn added 53 yards on eleven carries. The only Bronco score

came in the final period. It started as the Bronco defense, still fighting hard, held Quanah for two downs before Barry Hastey stripped the ball from an Indian back around mid-field. Then Thornberry guided the Bronco to the Quanah goal line. The drive was climaxed by a 19 yard touchdown pass to Randy White on forth down. The extra point came on a pass to Hosea Hearn, who

also had four other catches for 34 yards. White led Clarendon receivers with five catches and 55 yards.

This week, the Broncs will face the Stinnett Rattlers. They are 0-2 on the year, losing to the Broncos district 2-AA foes Canadian and Wheeler. The Broncs will try to come back against a fast Rattler squad tomorrow at Stinnett. Game time is set for 8:00.

### **Boll Weevil** making a comeback

Despite unfavorable weather conditions, the boll weevil is making a comeback the Cotton Belt, according to a report at the National Cotton Council Board of Directors meeting here, September 12, 1980.

J. Ritchie Smith, Council technical service director, reported that estimated weevil costs this year were nearly \$55 per acre in the Rio Grande Valley of Texa.

"Expert consensus is that the weevil situation would have been far worse except for the summer's severe drought and high temperatures," Smith said.

"This weevil comeback under unfavorable weather, coupled with mounting pesticide constraints and uncertainties, is a grim reminder of how important is to keep after a lasting solution to the problem," he stated.



"An applicant must show reasonable assurance of repayment ability," continued Berry, "and loan terms will be based on repayment ability. If an applicant farms on a cropshare basis, they may file for their share of the crop only but if they farm on a cash-rent basis, they may file for the entire loss. In the same respect, landlord's are eligible for their share of the crop only if they rent on a crop-share basis but not if they rent on a cash-rent basis."

50% of the eligible loan amount may be used to pay outstanding current obligations. At least 50% of the loan must be held for planting and operating expenses in the new crop year. The District Director said,

> "Loans are made for specific and designated purposes. Therefore, it is recommended the applicant keep receipts and good records of all loan expenditures."






