# Bronchos slaughter Rattlers 53 - 14

The scene: Bronco Stadium, Clarendon, Texas, Sept. 27, 1979. Following the opening kickoff, quarterback Lynn Thompson pitches to tailback Bobby Weatherton on an out-

side veer 67 yards, and 7 seconds later, Weatherton holds the ball aloft and is mobbed by his teammates in the endzone. Stinnett's fate had been determined. The massacre had begun.

Those who attended the Broncos' 53-14 slaughter of the Rattlers were treated to an offensive show unparalleled over the course of several years. All told, the Broncos rolled up 641 yards in total offense. They allowed Stinnett but 64 all night. In the category of first downs, the Broncos had 26, the Rattlers were held to 6. Why were the Broncos so dominant against a team such as Stinnett? Was it because they played with a second string quarterback? "No, I don't think so," said Coach Ted Allen; "They didn't play this bad last week even if they lost (to Canadian). They were messing around before the game. I don't think they came to play football."

But if it was obvious that the Broncos had come to play. Following Weatherton's touchdown, the Broncos recovered an onside kick, but it was nullified by an offside penalty. The Rattlers took the second kick deep in their own territory and promptly fumbled the center snap the first play. Tim Brown made the recovery on the Rattler 30. From there, Thompson marched the maroon and white to the twenty and fired a touchdown pass to Brown on fourth down.

Brown ended up with four receptions for 89 yards and two touchdowns. Dean Hawkins hauled in two more for 40 yards and a t.d. The broncos rolled up 129 yards through the air, however Allen is not yet totally pleased with the passing game. "Our passing game is still quite away off," conceded the head coach, "Our quarterbacks are not getting the ball to the receivers. They are improving, though, and should be better as the season goes on."

For a while, Stinnett actually matched touchdowns with the Broncos. After a Stinnett punt, "Alpo" Gaines fumbled and the Rattlers began a march to paydirt. Runs by the fleet footed halfbacks Willie Dodd and Chuck Beagle drove to the Bronco five where Dodd swept left end for the score. He also kicked the extra point.

But back came the Broncos, pounding out yardage to the Rattler 25. Again, Thompson took to the air, this time hitting Dean "Speedy" Hawkins for a 30 yard touchdown. Thompson's extra point made the score 20-7.

After the touchdown, Dodd took Bobby Weatherton's kick-off at his own 18 and turned on his 97 100 yard dash speed toward the Bronco goal line. His 82 yard touchdown run with his extra point made the score 20-14. Dodd accounted for all the Rattler points.

Coming back strong, Clarendon struck again with Brown again snatching a Lynn Thompson aerial. This time for 25 yards and a 27-14 Bronco lead. As was the case the rest of the

night, Stinnett could do nothing right. They punted away, but the Broncos gave it back on a fumble. Then the "Maroon Madmen" held the Rattlers. Clarendon got ready to score again. Fullback Mark Jack swept right end for three, and a 15 yard facr mask penalty against Stinnett's Billy Hickman moved the ball to midfield. On came Lance Thornberry to lead the Bronco offense. He pitched to Reese for 10, kept for eight and hit Hawkins with a good pass to the five. From that point, Jack scored on an end sweep. The Bronco led 34-14 at halftime.

From that juncture in the game on, Clarendon pushed Stinnett around like blocking dummies. The Rattlers netted a grand sum of five yards total offense in the second half. The Broncos rolled up 248. Time and time again, Clarendon drove the ball at the Rattlers with an awesome running game. Hosea Hearn scored from three yards out, Lance Thornberry tallied on a keeper from eight yards out, and Alvin Reese capped off an explosive night with a 5 yard touchdown run in the fourth stanza. He also recovered the ensuing kickoff before it went out of bounds. The Broncos owned the football for the rest of the game.

The Broncos played excellent football against a surprisingly weak Stinnett team. The Rattlers were sloppy, generally sluggish. A much less formidable opponent than the Bronco had planned on, and Clarendon rewarded their complacency by methodically blowing them off the field. This is not the Stinnett team which had been picked at the top of 1-A in pre-season polls. They lack an igniting spark. If they continue in this type of play, they will be given more brutal treatment by teams such as Clarendon, as their season progresses.

The Broncos, on the other hand, rest out a week before visiting the Childress Bobcats next week. Are the Broncos at a good emotional and physical level to beat Childress? Coach Allen explains, "We'll probably give them as tough a game as

"Cystic Fibrosis is the number one genetic killer of children, and approximately 40% of persons suffering from C/F are not yet diagnosed."

According to Mrs. Bryant, contributions to the Kiss A Baby Campaign will help support a national network of over 100 Cystic Fibrosis Centers, research projects around the world and various educational programs.

ment is made and grazing animal numbers can be increased over the 2, 3 or 4 pasture deferred-rotation grazing.

For any system to work, balance the proper kinds of animals and their numbers with forage production, the agent advises. Also graze pastures at the proper season.

"The system must be tailored to the individual ranch and fitted to the goals of the rancher."

### Keeping stocking rates down now will pay off later

Just because range forage has increased substantially due to spring an summer rains doesn't mean you can automatically adjust stocking rates upward, warns Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent.

Keeping stocking rates low now will pay off later, believes Gooch. "This will allow range conditions to improve since animals repeatedly graze plants needing to improve in vigor and ground cover after droughts. Also, improved range conditions will provide partial insurance against the next drought."

The Extension agent pointed out that late summer and fall is a good time to shape up herds and flocks due to the continued good livestock, wool and mohair prices. Additionally, with good management, more pounds of product can be marketed from fewer animals.

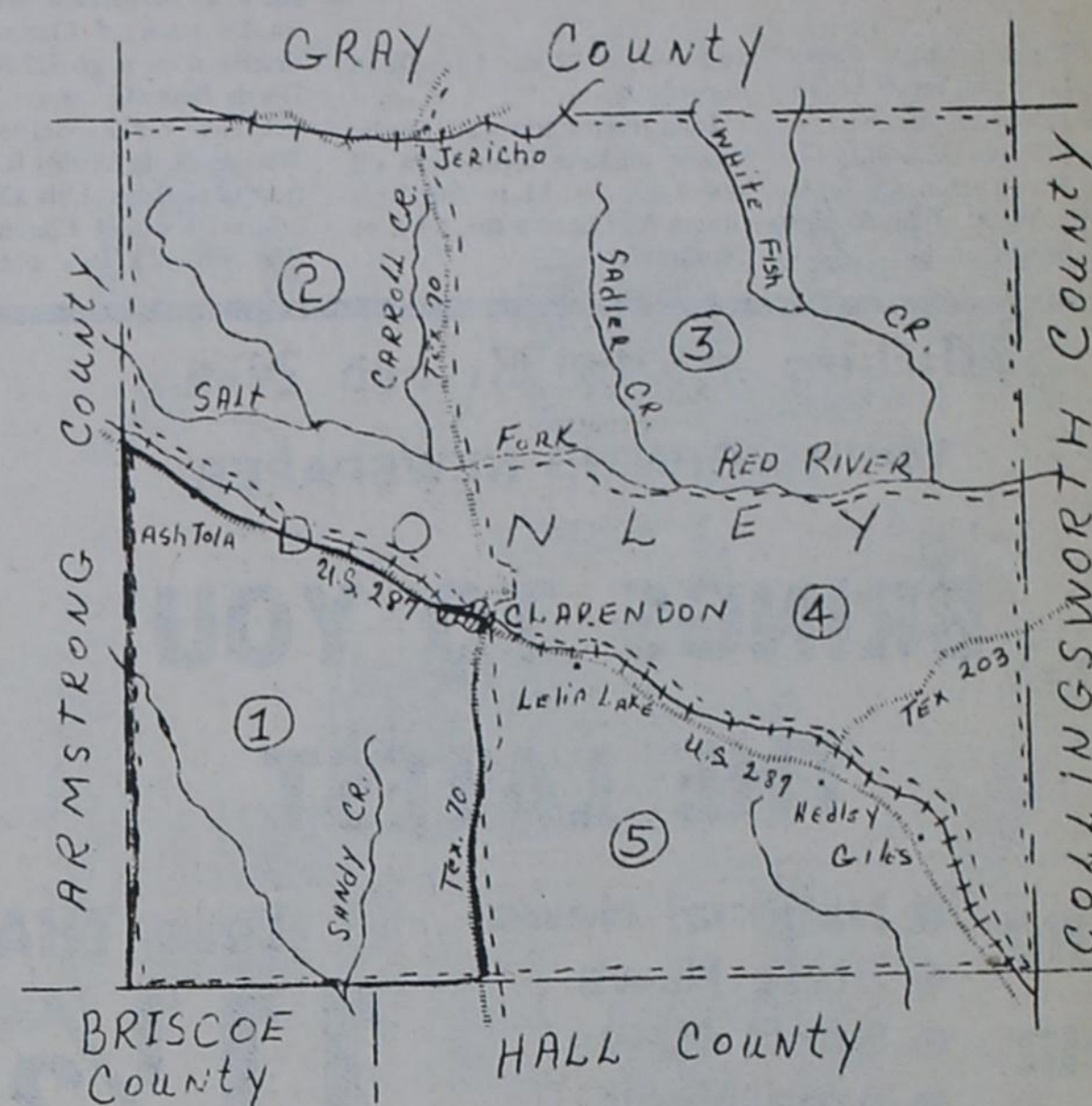
"Consider deferred rotation grazing to insure continued range condition improvement and future increased livestock production. As range condition improves, desirable forage plants return through natural succession."

With this system, emphasized the agent, only one pasture of the 2, 3 or 4 in the system is deferred from grazing but the deferment period is scheduled so a pasture is vacant at a different season each time it is deferred.

"In addition to improved forage, livestock numbers increase, wildlife habitat improves, soil erosion decreases and rainfall use is more efficient."

Another approach is the one herd/multiple pasture system. Graze a pasture intensively for 7-14 days, then defer it for a long period depending on the number of pastures and length of grazing period.

More rapid range improve-

## EMS purchased heart monitor machine

The Clarendon EMS has recently acquired a most sophisticated piece of equipment to add to our local ambulance, making it one of the 18 best equipped ambulances in the Texas Panhandle.

The Burdick Medi-1 heart monitor/defibrillator was purchased jointly by the City of Clarendon, Donley County, and the Donley County Hospital District. Although the unit is valued at over \$5500.00 it was purchased for \$4040.00 from Melton-Clark Inc. of Amarillo.

The unit is portable, is completely self contained and runs off of its own rechargeable power supply. Use of the monitor allows Paramedics and other highly trained medical personnel to view the activity of the patient's heart at the scene and the entire threatening arrhythmias (irregular heart beats), and to correct these arrhythmias and others that can become life threatening before

they do threaten life. Although our local Paramedics are thoroughly trained to read and interpret an EKG (electrocardiogram), addition of a telemetry unit in the next few weeks will allow them to transmit the EKG by mobile radio into the Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center to be read and interpreted by a Doctor. This allows the Doctor to know exactly what is going on with the patient's heart so he can order treatment for the patient in the form of drugs or whatever other treatment is needed whether the patient be only a few blocks away or 100 miles away from a hospital. Of course, heart patients are routinely monitored but careful monitoring is also necessary for any patient who has sustained a sudden illness or a traumatic injury, as these patients have the potential of developing arrhythmias.

The general public is probably most familiar with these

portable cardiac units from television shows where a patient's heartbeat is shown on a monitor and when the patient is given an electroshock with the defibrillator paddles.

The Medi-1 has many advanced features on it and due to the large amount of electricity stored in the unit, it has many safety features to prevent accidental electrical discharge which can be very dangerous or fatal to the operator.

Only 18 communities in the Panhandle have Advanced Life Support equipment and Clarendon is most fortunate to be among these. Although IV fluids and certain drugs have been carried in the ambulance for the past several months, addition of the cardiac monitor/defibrillator makes the ambulance fully ALS equipped. The monitor/defibrillator is probably the most important piece of equipment ever purchased for the medical needs of this

community. We are very fortunate that we have City, County, and Hospital officials who have been far sighted enough to purchase such equipment. This is especially crucial in ours and other communities where 24 hour emergency treatment is not available except through the local Emergency Medical Services.

In the past, the patient only had access to ALS in a hospital. Now it is possible for them to have access to the same equipment in an ambulance, making the difference between life and death for the critically ill or injured patient. People, training, and equipment, all combine to make EMS "A System To Save A Life."

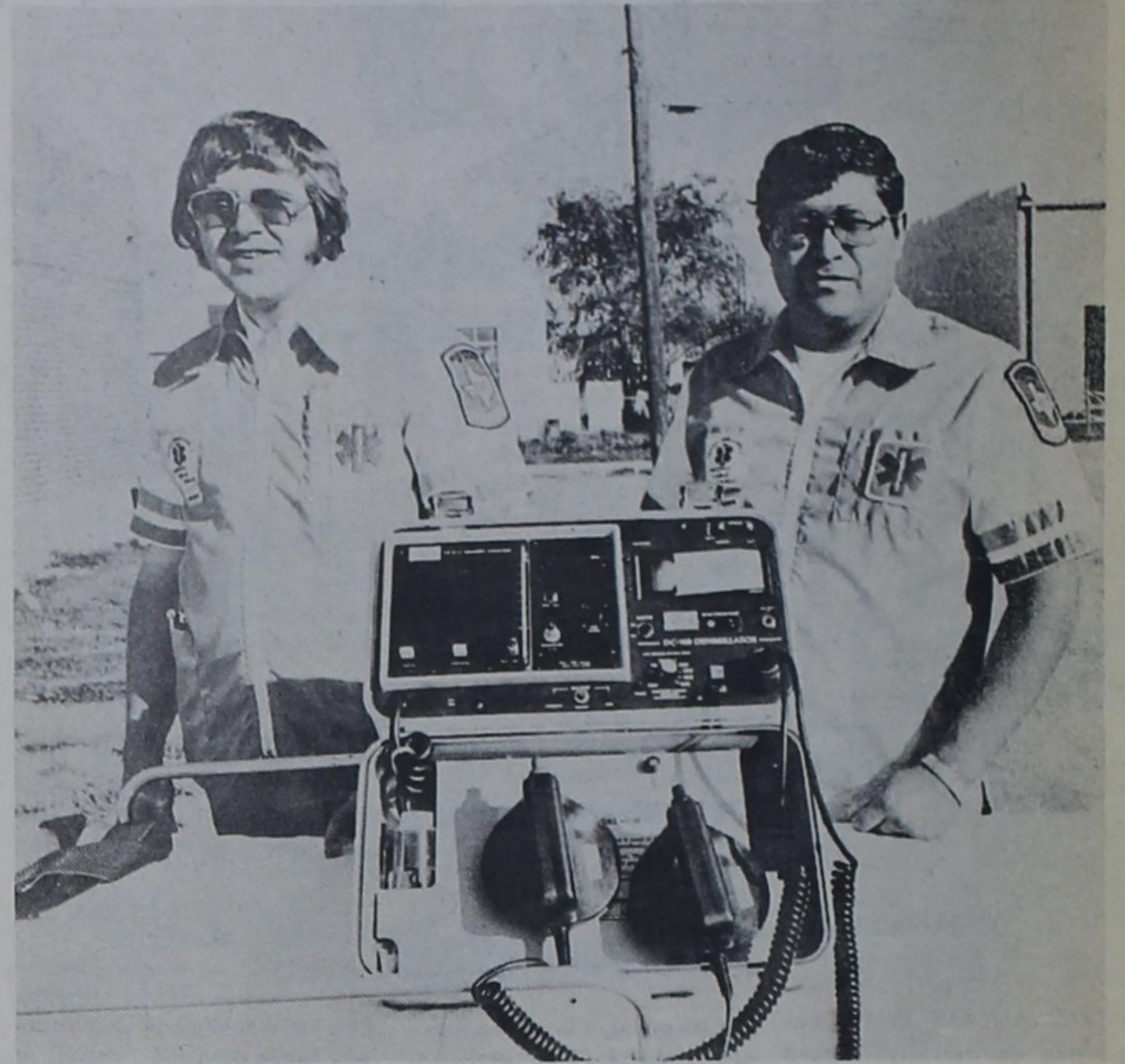
In Clarendon, the average patient can expect to have access to over \$35,000.00 worth of lifesaving equipment, to be treated and transported by personnel with over 1200 combined hours of training and many hundred hours of experience, and to receive the best possible medical care each time he or she becomes the target of a serious illness or injury. This is something not available in most communities the size of Clarendon.

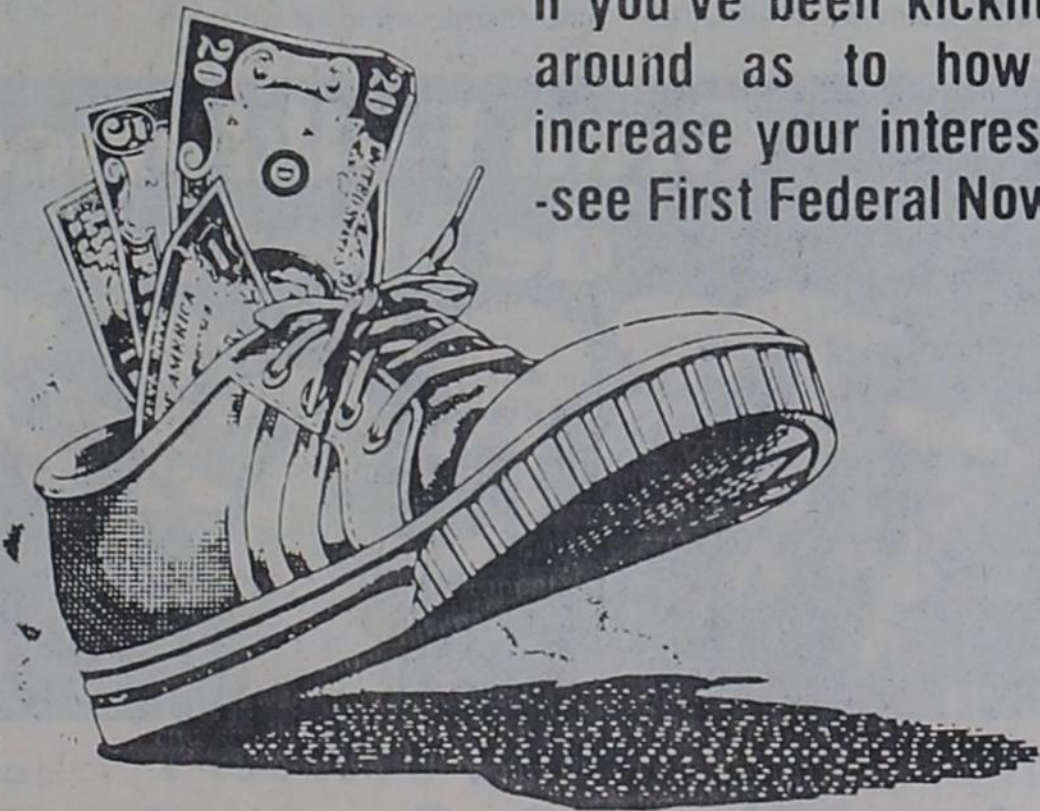

## Tillie Anglin - one of the local artists whose work will be displayed this week at The Gallery

Although she drew and sketched during her school days, Tillie Anglin had raised her family before she gave her artistic talent any time or much thought to develop.

When her youngest daughter married and left home, she bought a book, some paints and canvas boards and began to paint. Her first oil painting was a snow scene copied from a postcard.

Friends and family encouraged her to continue her work and it was easy to heed their advice since she enjoyed painting so much.

Mrs. Anglin's subjects are varied and landscapes, flowers and western historical themes are some of her choices. She has a particular fondness for old buildings and western subjects and detail work is a trademark of hers.

Her first formal lessons were under the well known Canadian artist, Don Ray, and she considers his help invaluable. Other classes she attended were under Ollis Ayers, of Memphis, Kenneth Porter, at Clarendon College and James Ivey Edwards, head of the art department at Clarendon College.

She paints with other artists as a group or singly and within the group they exchange ideas and techniques—a profitable experience for all.

Mary Mitchell, of Amarillo, founder of Artist Studio Club for the panhandle, helped Tillie organize the Artist's Studio Club here in Clarendon.

Tillie felt it would work to stimulate and encourage the talent displayed by persons in Clarendon and the area. The organization began with 9 members in the early 1970's. Today there are 25 members who attend and work actively with the club. Members do not paint at their meetings but conduct business pertaining to their work such as shows, sales and other promotions.

Her first studio was in the garage of their home, and was fixed up for her by her husband Everett Anglin. Artists Studio meetings were held there in the studio. Their beginning meetings met in the motel which the Anglins own.

Anglin is one artist who really needs a studio for she is a prolific painter who is most reluctant to sell her work. Her early paintings sold for \$12 for a small one to \$35 for a 12x14 to out of town buyers who stopped

and were charmed by her work. Today the price tag is much larger and ranges from \$75 to several \$100.

The foremost reason for painting as far as Anglin is concerned is self-satisfaction and therapy. Whenever possible she likes to paint with someone else for interest is contagious and acts as a stimulus between artistic persons.

As a beginning artist Tillie spent a lot of time completing each picture, after about nine years she paints at a speedy pace, sometimes completing a picture at one sitting, depending on the subject and type of technique. Her palette is as varied as her subject and she does not limit herself to colors. She does like to use different techniques.

## City Council meeting

Members of the Board of Alderman of the City of Clarendon met in regular session on Sept. 11, 1979 in the board room of the city hall at 7:30 p.m.

Minutes of Aug. 21 and Sept. 10, 1979 minutes were read and approved. Bills for the month of August were presented and allowed.

The audit report for the years ending Sept. 30, 1977 and 1978 were explained to the Board of Aldermen by CPA, Gordon Maddox.

Motion was made by alderman Bob Kidd, seconded by alderman Lloyd McCord to approve the audit for 1977 and 1978 and pay CPA Gordon Maddox the sum of \$3,500.00. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Shirley Clifford seconded by James Kuhn to have CPA Gordon Maddox audit the city books each year for the sum of \$2,500. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Bob Kidd, seconded by James Kuhn to purchase a Burroughs adding machine #EA 2300 for the sum of \$1,203.00.

Motion was made by James Kuhn, seconded by Shirley Clifford to change the water rates to the following: \$8.00 for the first 5,000 gals.; 80c per 1,000 for the next 5,000 gals.; and 70c per 1,000 gals. for all other water used. Motion carried.

Motion was made by James Kuhn, seconded by Bob Kidd to charge \$4.00 for each residential garbage charge per month, and to have a report on the charge for business garbage charges to be reviewed next meeting. Motion carried.

Motion was made by James Kuhn, seconded by Shirley Clifford to set the tax rate at \$1.45 per \$100.00. Motion carried.

Shirley Clifford introduced a resolution and ordered it moved for adoption. The motion was seconded by Cecil McAfee, the motion carrying with it the adoption for the resolution as presented by a vote of 6-0 in favor of the resolution.

Resolution on record in the minutes book, as follows: The City of Clarendon grants permission for the State or its Agent to preform the work herein described as may be necessary to provide a minimum passive warning system at those public Streets, road grade

crossings or railroads within its jurisdiction as defined and

designated by the state. That concluded the business.

### CC has record fall enrollment

Clarendon College has announced final enrollment figures for the Fall, 1979 Semester. The total head count enrollment was 847 students, the largest enrollment in the history of the college. The enrollment figures are divided among four instructional areas; academic, vocational-technical, adult-vocational, and community service. The instructional area and enrollment figures are listed below: Academic 464, Vocational Technical 99, Adult-Vocational 159,

and Community Service 125. The figures reflect total enrollments for the classes offered at the Clarendon College campus, the Pampa Center, and off-campus classes in Childress, Wellington, Shamrock, and Wheeler. Dr. Bob E. Riley, Dean of Instruction at Clarendon College stated: "We are very pleased with the enrollment this fall, we feel that the increase is the direct result of Clarendon College attempting to be responsive to the educational needs in our service area."

### College loan programs

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said he intends to widen the scope of college loan programs included in his efforts for repayment of delinquent student loans.

Bullock, who has cleared up more than a million dollars in debts on overdue loans from the state's Hinson-hazlewood program by holding up state paychecks and payments to defaulters, said he will help Texas colleges collect on defaulted, joint state-federal loans.

"The National Defense Student Loan program and its successor the National Direct Student Loan program include 10 percent state funding and I've told Texas colleges and universities that at their request I'd hold checks to any individual identified on our system as a defaulter," Bullock said.

State law prohibits anyone owing the state a debt from receiving state payments.

"The federal government may have shrugged off collecting these loans, but that's not going to keep me from seeing these public debts are paid," Bullock said.

Bullock said he will continue to make computer cross-checks on requests for state salaries and other payments against anyone who has not settled up their education debts.

The exact amount of money owed by former Texas students to the NDSL program won't be known until the 37 colleges and universities contacted by Bullock provide a complete listing on loan defaults.

Nationally, federally-backed education loans classified as delinquent may exceed \$2 billion, according to Bullock.

In August, the Texas College and Coordinating Board held

loan defaults worth more than \$39.9 million under the Hinson-Hazlewood program from loans to 24,685 former students.

Bullock said he will continue to hold checks to anyone due state money until the college debts are resolved.

He said he decided to assist Texas schools recoup federal students loans after learning that the U. S. Senate defeated a proposal to allow the Internal Revenue Service deduct loan debts from tax refunds.

"These defaulters are short-changing the education of the next generation by avoiding their obligations. We've got the means to make them take these debts seriously and I intend to use it," Bullock said.

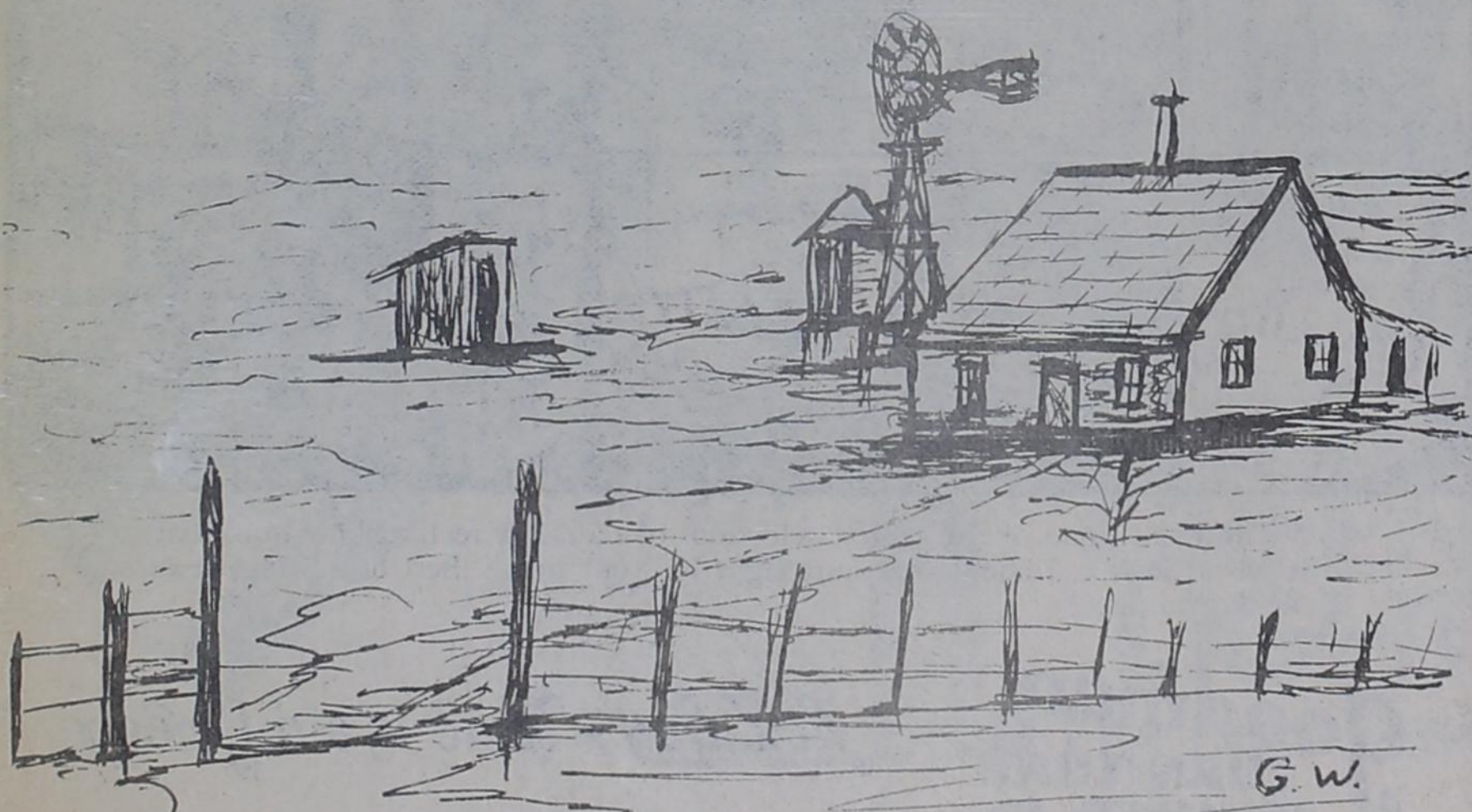

## 2.7 billion dollars in loans to Texas farmers

Texas banks maintained their leadership in agricultural credit services, with 2.7 Billion outstanding in loans to Texas farmers on January 1, 1979, reports the president of the Texas Bankers Association, R. M. Duffey, Jr.

Duffey, who is also president of the Pan American Bank in Brownsville, said that Texas banks provided \$2.2 Billion in non-real estate loans—a 15 percent increase over 1978, and \$500 Million in farm real estate loans, an 11 percent increase over the previous year.

By comparison, Production Credit Associations provided \$756 Million and the Farmers Home Administration \$397 Million in non-real estate farm loans to Texas farmers on January 1, 1979.

In real estate farm loans to Texas farmers, Federal Land Banks provided \$1.4 Billion; life insurance companies \$842 Million; and the Farmers Home Administration \$192 Million.

Nationally, banks held \$28.3 Billion in non-real estate farm loans, a ten percent increase over last year, and \$8.6 Billion in real estate loans, a ten percent increase. Total farm debt held by all major lenders as of January 1, 1979 was approximately \$97 Billion, with individ-
