## Charles Darter candidate for re-election for second term as D.A.

Charles W. Darter of Wellington, Texas, has authorized the Clarendon Press to announce his candidacy for re-election for a second term as District Attorney for the 100th Judicial District which includes the Counties of Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley and Hall, subject to the Democratic Primary in May, 1980.

"It has been a high honor and privilege to have served as District Attorney for the previous 5 1/2 years. After being appointed as District Attorney by Governor Briscoe in June, 1974, I was elected for the remaining two years in November, 1974, and for my first full term in November, 1976. Upon taking office we discovered that there were over 350 pending cases in the District. With the cooperation of the law enforcement personnel in each County, and by forcing the defendants and their attorneys to trial, we have been able to reduce this backlog to 24 defendants awaiting trial as of February 1, 1980, including 0- in Donley County. We will be losing four Sheriffs in the District at the end of 1980, who have decided not to seek election to another term who have over twenty years of experience each, being Sheriffs J.E. Benham of Childress, John Rainey of Collingsworth, Truett Behrens of Donley and Elmer Neal of Hall. Because of this loss of experience, I have decided to seek re-election in the hope that I can be of assistance to the new officers, and to maintain our high level of conviction which is over 95% during my term. We will certainly miss the counsel and wisdom of these officers, and if you have any questions about the operation of the District Attorney's office during my term, I hope that you will contact them as well as your other County officials. My policy has always been to review the cases with the officers and victims prior to making any decisions on a particular case and will continue to do so if re-elected.

The office of District Attorney has an awesome responsibility in that we must be responsible not only to the public, but also to the persons who are accused of a crime, since the duty of the prosecutor is not only to convict the guilty persons but also to protect an innocent person. I do

**March 15 deadline for youth conservation corp.**

The Texas Department of Community Affairs has announced the availability of summer job opportunities in the '80 Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) projects throughout the state of Texas.

Unlike many other federally funded youth programs, YCC is open to young people from all economic sectors. Applicants will have a choice of being considered for nonresidential projects, or work encampments which provide food and lodging facilities, as well as around the clock supervision. Minimum wage (\$3.10 per hour) will be paid for thirty (30) hours work per week; the other ten (10) hours will be devoted to environmental education. All projects proposed for 1980 are to be coeducational and will average eight (8) weeks duration.

YCC, similar to the Civilian Conservation Corps of the 1930's, is jointly sponsored by the U.S. Departments of Interior and Agriculture-Forest Service.

The program objectives are to accomplish needed conservation work on public lands, and to provide outdoor summer employment for 15 to 18 year old male and female youth, and to develop an appreciation of our nation's natural resources among participants.

As Texas' recruitment coordination office, the Children and Youth Services Division of the

Department of Community Affairs is distributing blank application forms throughout the state until early March, 1980. Interested young people should contact their local school administrators for program concept information and application forms, and a list of nonresidential projects and encampments away from home.

Deadline for application submission is March 15, 1980. Selection will be made by random technique.

"This year, we are directing community attention to the acute national problem of adolescent pregnancy," she says. "The high incidence of children having children has long-term repercussions for all of society. Babies born to mothers under 17 have a higher than average risk of mental retardation, physical malformations, and early death. The very young mother places

her own health in danger. The young parents often face an uncertain educational and economic future."

Members of the Phi Beta Lambda, business fraternity at Clarendon College and the Youth Group of the First Baptist Church will be volunteering their time to ask for opinions on the severity of the problem locally. No one will be identified by name in the survey. The Golden Spread Chapter March of Dimes will tabulate the results of the survey which is being used not only locally, but nationally as well. The results of the survey will help the March of Dimes plan new, community-based educational and health services to prevent newborn damage and death.

**Industrial production in Texas up**

Industrial production in Texas rose in November at an estimated 13.3 percent annual rate, seasonally adjusted, to a level 0.5 percent above a year earlier. The strong gain reflected increased output in both manufacturing and mining.

The advance in total factory output was paced by increased production in nondurable goods manufacturing. All industries in that sector, except petroleum refining, posted substantial gains.

Production in durable goods manufacturing also rose significantly. The only industries registering declines were furniture and fabricated metal products.

Mining output rose on the strength of increased drilling activity and production of metal, stone, and earth products. Production of crude oil, however, continued its downward trend.

Reflecting the gain in factory output, the manufacturing capacity utilization index rose in November to 103.0 percent of the 1972 base.

## What's burning in Maurine's Kitchen

This is Valentine's week. The week that fellows finally get the nerve to deliver a Valentine to their secret sweetheart. The week that the gals decide to pursue that fellow so that they will receive that Valentine. Ah, love! It's a strange thing. It can change a 6'4"-240 pound man into a jelly-fish whenever their beloved passes. It puts a glow in the cheeks of a young girl whenever she thinks of her true love. It can be a destructive force or a benevolent one. It is a spell that allows two people to communicate without words; to know the thoughts of each other without speaking. It is sad that so precious an emotion, a so prized feeling is distorted when twisted things are done in the name of love. Be it love of God, country, king or home, we sometimes destroy someone's love in the quest for our own.

I'm going to deviate this week from cooking, in that spring fever has hit me, hard! Are you in the mood to change a room? If

after you've moved the furniture around and you are still not satisfied with that change, try painting or wallpapering. You can do it yourself, because I can, and I have trouble with walking and talking at the same time. After painting the wall the base color, try painting a graphic in contrasting hues. It's easy, using a few tools. In drawing the graphic, be sure to use a level so that the lines are straight. After making the lines with a pencil, use masking tape to outline them. While painting, the colors may bleed onto an unmarked part of the wall. Use an artist brush to touch up any bleeding. Use a graphic on only one wall and if planned well, carry the design on into the master bath. Here is a design I once used.

In wallpapering, one must first have patience. After gathering this, prepare the working area. This area will be used to measure, cut and apply adhesive. I suggest an old door on two sawhorses for a good,

long working area. Cut the paper in lengths of the wall plus 2 inches. Apply the adhesive. Fold the paper, pasted sides together, so that the top and bottom edge meet at the center line. This will allow easy handling while moving to the ladder. Once there, pull back the top edge and apply to wall allowing one inch to lap onto the ceiling. Using your hands, smooth out the wrinkles. Now pull back the bottom edge and apply to wall in the same fashion as above. If the baseboards are loosened or pulled away, slip the bottom edgedown between them and the wall. Using a wide putty knife and a razor, cut the ceiling inch by placing the putty knife into the ceiling-wall joint and pulling the razor across the knife. Once completed, use the putty knife to smooth out water, paste or air bubbles by starting at the center of the paper and working to both edges. Be careful not to tear the paper with the edges of the paper. For

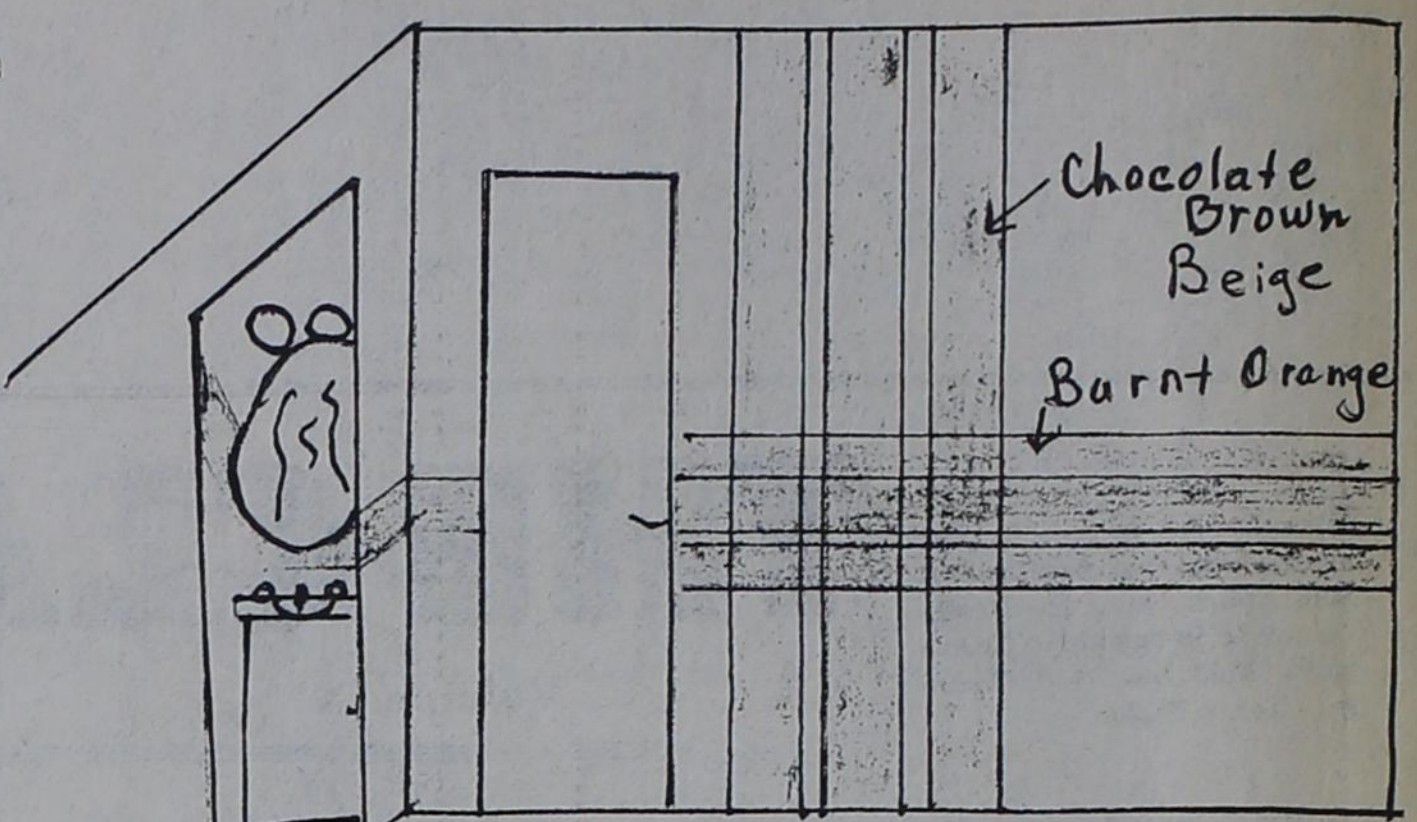

## A Moment for Meditation

"When the South Wind Blew Softly" Acts 27:13

The directional winds that blow have various descriptive terms to identify them. For example, a north wind reminds us of ice, an east wind possible rain, a west wind probable dust storms and a south wind balmy spring. But these winds are true to their seasons as a general rule. Such was the south wind off the coast of Crete during Paul's trip to Rome in the first century.

The wind blew softly and deceived the sailors who took the ship out to sea only to be shipwrecked some days later. Surely seasoned men of the sea should have known better. Actually they did know better but they wanted to believe the south wind. The wished to winter in a harbor town further around the coast because it was a swinging center of entertainment. So they ignored their better judgment and were lulled by the siren call of the south wind.

Life also is made up of various directional winds and they all blow upon us at one time or another. But we need to read their symbols. The cold wind of sorrow touches us all and we brace for it accordingly knowing its icy blast will pass and the sun will shine again. The dusty west wind tries our mettle as problems arise for which we can

find no answers immediately, but eventually the east wind brings refreshing showers to settle the dust. We begin again with hope. Then perhaps without warning the wind blows softly from the south. It feels like spring, but the calendar says winter. This is a very seductive wind. Two or three days of it brings fruit tree blooms prematurely. Likewise in life it makes peer pressure to lower our standards seem all right. It suggests that luxuries are our due even though half the world is hungry. The wind blows softly to soothe our consciences over our lack of concern for others in our community. But its deception has a price today just as it had for the sailors of the first century. Its price may be a life of hypocrisy. It may be a shipwreck of morals in the family. It may even be too long a delay in one's personal preparation for death.

The south wind blows softly and is a blessing in its own season, but of season it should alert to caution. A careful check of circumstances as they really are instead of what we wish them to be is in order. The sooner we learn to face life as it is, the sooner we will be able to cope with it. Take care when the south wind blows softly.

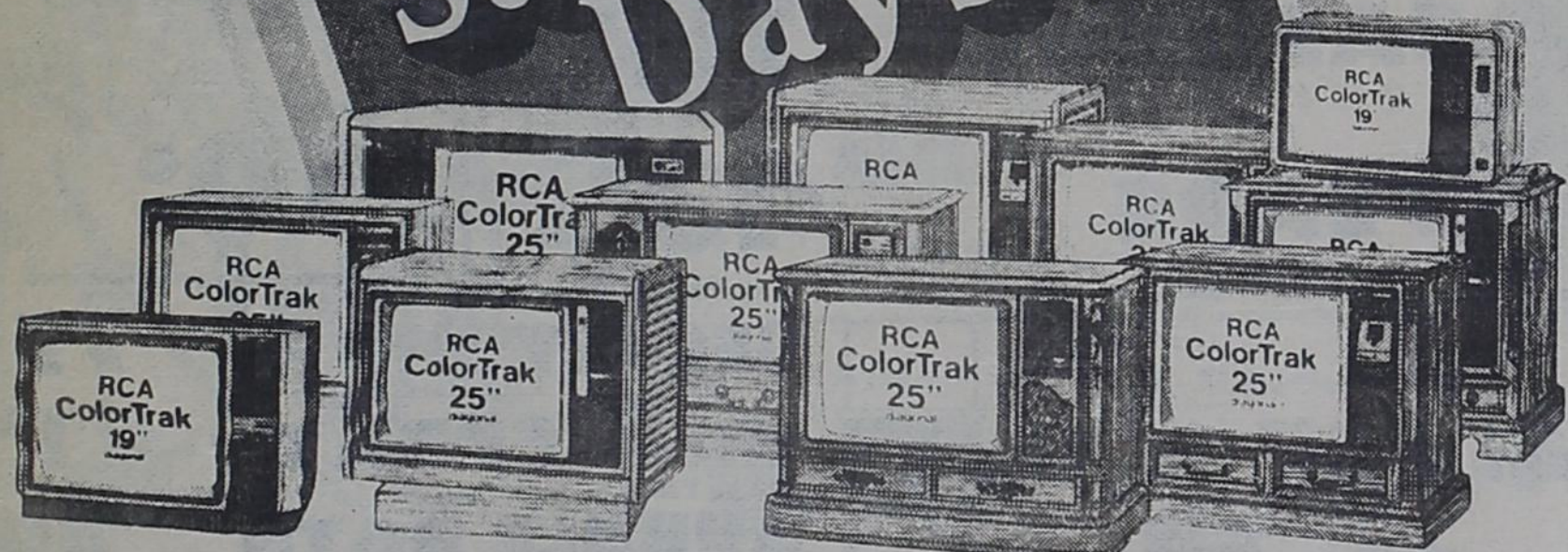

## VA Q and A

Q-- I intend to purchase a home in the near future using my Veterans Administration home loan guaranty eligibility. What is the current interest rate?

A-- The current interest rate is 11.5 percent. However, you should contact the nearest VA regional office prior to actual purchase of a home since interest rates are subject to change.

Q-- May a veteran in college under the GI Bill and needing less than 12 credit hours to graduate take 12 or more hours in his final term in order to receive full-time educational benefits?

A-- Yes, provided the veteran or eligible person has sufficient

remaining entitlement.

Q-- I have a participating Veterans Administration insurance policy which will earn a dividend this year. When may I expect to receive this dividend?

A-- Unless otherwise specified, the dividends for each eligible policy are payable on the day before the policy anniversary date unless the policy is terminated sooner by death or surrendered for cash.

Q-- Must I take my Veterans Administration insurance dividend in cash or do I have other options?

A-- There are several dividend options available to policy holders other than cash. For full information contact your nearest VA regional office.

Q-- I am a student participating in the Veterans Administration work-study program. What is the earliest effective date of my work-study contract?

A-- The beginning of the certified enrollment period at the college you are attending.

Q-- May a veteran obtain a VA guaranteed loan on a home which appraises lower than the sales price?

A-- Yes, provided the veteran pays the difference in cash from his own resources without borrowing. VA will not guarantee a loan in excess of the appraised value of the property.

### A Savior or a system

The people who judged the strongest the qualifications of others for the Kingdom of heaven were rebuked by Jesus in Matthew 5:20 as not having qualified themselves. "For I say unto you, that except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the Scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter into the kingdom of heaven." These men were writers and interpreters of the law, but Jesus said again "...observe and do what they bid you; but not after their works: for they say and do not." Matt. 23:3. "The Pharisees eventually came to stress religious observance for its educational worth, believing that it had great benefit in impressing upon the mind the truth behind the observance. Doubtless, this

often resulted in genuine and profound piety; on the other hand, it also produced a legalistic spirit which could justifiably be charged with formalism and hypocrisy." "The Layman's Bible Encyclopedia". Was it because of the formalism and hypocrisy that Jesus continually rebuked them?

If we are to have a Savior instead of a system then we ought to observe what the Savior has to say about the system which he rebuked the most. In the 23rd chapter of Matthew, Jesus used the quotation, "Woe unto you Scribes and Pharisees, Hypocrites" in verses 14-15-23-25-27 and 29. He used the phrase, "Woe unto you blind guides" verse 16 and 14, and "ye fools and blind" in 17 and 19. We have not covered

why he called them these things, but it seems that their system did not include the Savior or the Savior would not have used such harsh words to rebuke them. His concluding verse in Matthew 23 should leave little doubt about Jesus attitude toward their system, "ye serpents, ye generation of vipers, how can ye escape the damnation of Hell?" Matthew 23:33 The word "Woe" is an interjection meaning sorrow so in each case the Loving Savior was pronouncing sorrow upon the Scribes and Pharisees.

Jesus raised the question "How can ye escape the damnation of hell?" Mt. 23:33. The Scribes and Pharisees could have found escape if they had of come to the Savior. Parallel terraces are making it easier for farmers to farm land with big equipment. Terraces are a necessity on some land if we are to protect it for future generations.

Parallel terraces cannot be constructed just anywhere however. If you would like to know if they could be applied on your land, contact the Soil Conservation Service.

Parallel terraces are a big conservation item in the Panhandle of Texas. Soil Conservation Service engineers worked out ways to build terraces on gently sloping land parallel to each other. This makes it possible to build terraces an even number of rows apart, which makes them easier to farm with today's modern equipment.

In essence, what we are doing with parallel terraces is to do enough leveling where-as each row will handle all the water that falls on it. The terrace ridges only serve to catch water from higher frequency rains.

With the moisture distribution built into parallel terraces, we should take out some of the crop failures and also protect the land from washing. Good crops depend on plenty of moisture and if moisture is not available the crops suffer. Mother Nature will generally give you enough moisture if you are able to conserve it.

Parallel terraces are making it easier for farmers to farm land with big equipment. Terraces are a necessity on some land if we are to protect it for future generations.
