## New tax laws aid Senior Citizens

New tax law changes mean good news for older Americans. One of the concerns of everyone is whether or not he or she is required to file a return. Single people 65 and over do not have to file a tax return unless their gross income for 1979, excluding Social Security and Railroad Retirement payments and public assistance, was \$4,300 or more. That figure goes up to \$6,400 for a couple with one spouse 65 and over and \$7,400 for a couple with both spouses 65 and over. Of course, even if you are not required to file, if you had tax withheld, you should file to get any refund you may have coming.

In addition to the higher filing requirement, the "Tax Credit for the Elderly" provides another tax benefit for some older taxpayers with some taxable income and a tax liability. There are limitations, however; persons who receive the maximum Social Security payments, for example, would not be eligible.

A further benefit is the once-in-a-lifetime \$100,000 exclusion of the gain on the sale of a personal residence. Taxpayers who are at least 55 before they sell their residence which they owned and lived in at least 3 of the 5 years prior to the sale can exclude \$100,000 of the gain realized.

There are several free publications available which detail tax benefits for older Americans. Use the order form in your tax package, or contact IRS and ask for Publication 527.

## Clarendon strangest town

After several non-productive telephone calls on Thursday evening, December 27, a caller from Uvalde did contact the owner of the Clarendon Press, Helen Woody, sometime after nine o'clock. His first comment after finding out he had reached the person he wanted was to declare his opinion that Clarendon was the strangest town he knew about.

This view was the result of his inability to make contact with any law enforcement officials after calling the City of Clarendon police, the Donley County sheriff's office and the Texas Highway Patrol.

He finally asked the telephone operator if she could help him locate anyone connected with the Clarendon newspaper. She suggested he call the Fire Department who, she assured him, would have someone to take calls.

He was of the opinion that Clarendon must be a town without any criminal activity whatsoever, and that being the case there was no law enforcement locally because it was not needed.

His call was answered by the Fire Department and the person who answered assured the Uvalde resident that if he called before 5 p.m. he could have reached someone at the city hall, the court house and contact could have been made with the Texas Highway Patrol.

As it happened his call was not of an emergency nature, he was trying to trace members of his family who had lived in Clarendon and stated his intention to send his questions in a letter to the Clarendon Press.

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## Compute your own income tax

Computing your own income tax return can be easy. And, if you're eligible, doing the work yourself can also mean an early refund from Uncle Sam.

You can learn to quickly and accurately complete your tax return by attending the Taxpayer Education course offered Jan. 29 and 31, 7:00-9:30 p.m.

Taxpayer Education is a public service program jointly-sponsored by the Panhandle Chapter of the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Certified public accountants volunteer their time to assist taxpayers in filling out the revised 1040 and 1040A tax forms.

In addition to receiving instruction, participants will have an opportunity to ask questions regarding specific circumstances. The two-night course is available to the public at a charge of \$2 per person to cover administrative costs.

Each registrant will also receive the IRS publication, "Your Federal Income Tax," a 200-page booklet which details many tax deductions, forms and filing requirements.


If you've already gathered your financial records for reporting purposes, you've got the job half done. And, if you're not itemizing deductions, you've really got a head start. So, why not join millions of individuals who will compute their own tax return this year?

An added advantage to attending the Taxpayer Education program is that you'll promptly receive any refunds due you. According to the IRS, returns mailed early are processed in four to five weeks. Those mailed in April are not processed for ten weeks or longer.

To register for the Taxpayer Education program, simply fill out the registration form found next to this article. Registration form and fee must be mailed by Jan. 16.





## Farmers to poll

Texas farmers will have a unique opportunity to be heard on grain transportation issues through a poll announced Jan. 2 by Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc.

James W. Lindsey, president of Pioneer's southwestern Division, today outlined details of the "Pioneer Poll on Grain Transportation" to be conducted in 16 major agricultural

states to gather farmers' opinions on the current crisis in grain transportation.

"The purpose," Lindsey said, "is to find out exactly how serious our current transportation problems are, how they affect farmers in various regions and what farmers think should be done."

According to Lindsey, poll results will be publicized and

shown to key decision-makers to give them a better understanding of farmers' views.

"Pioneer dealers are responsible for distribution and gathering of completed questionnaires," Lindsey said. "Each dealer is encouraged to work for maximum distribution and return in his area by reaching all concerned grain producers."

Estimates are that this poll, available to all farmers, will yield as many as 75,000 completed questionnaires, possibly more.

"Polling this extensive is unusual," Lindsey said, "but so are the growing problems of grain transport facing farmers in many areas."

Prepared by Jefferson Davis Associates, a Cedar Rapids, Iowa research firm and Yankelevich, Skelly and White, Inc., New York, the questionnaire asks farmers to respond to more than 50 statements on grain transportation issues.

Subject areas include rural roads and bridges, railroads, barge lines as well as rates and regulations affecting grain carriers.

Every questionnaire will be electronically scanned to provide the total result. Findings of this poll should provide the most complete picture yet of the current relationship of transportation and the American farmer, according to Lindsey.

"This is one of the most effective ways I can think of for farmers to reach those who can help solve transportation problems—shippers, carriers, lawmakers, government agencies," Lindsey added.

The best way to make farmer opinions count is to make them heard. With the growing importance of crop exports to Texas farmers, we all have a big



stake in an efficient system of grain transport," Lindsey said. In addition to polling Texas farmers, Pioneer will be distributing questionnaires in the following states: Colorado, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, New Mexico, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Dakota and Wisconsin.

Higher gasoline prices took a bigger chunk out of the Texas auto visitor's travel dollar during the first six months of 1979.

Auto visitors to Texas who averaged a week's stay had to squeeze two more cents out of each travel dollar to pay for higher fuel. Tom H. Taylor, director of the Travel and Information Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, said an average 28.8 cents from the out-of-stater's travel dollar went for auto expenses during the first half of 1979. In the January through June 1978 period, auto expenses took 26.6 cents of the short-term visitor's travel dollar.

"Food and lodging each took an average of about a penny more in the first six months of 1979. But the auto visitors spent about half a cent extra from each dollar on entertainment, too, all the increases were at the expense of the miscellaneous "other" category. These statistics are detailed in a report recently released by the department. The mid-year survey results can be obtained by writing VIR Survey, DHT, Do 5064, Austin, Texas 78763. Taylor said the report is an interim tabulation of data collected year-round by the department. There is no tabulation of total visitors, but the survey contains breakdowns profiling short- and long-term U.S. and foreign visitors who drove to Texas. The report does not include visitors from Mexico since partial year figures on Mexican tourists are unavailable.

Visitor totals for 1979 will be included in the department's authoritative Visitor Industry Report, due out next spring. San Antonio was the city visited by the majority of out-of-state tourists during the first half of both 1978 and 1979, while Houston ranked number two. Oklahoma beat out California during January through June 1979 as the state providing Texas with the most auto visitors. Foreign visitors, excluding Mexicans, came primarily from Canada and Great Britain in the first half of 1979. Canada and West Germany ranked first and second during the same period of 1978.

## Understanding Your Child

The thermometer says "zero." Snow's been forecast for the fourth straight day. Everyone's wearing a wardrobe of sweaters to make the heat last a little longer and there's nothing but reruns on TV. What can you do for the winter doldrums?

Take a tip from the past. Spend an evening telling stories with your whole family around the fireplace. Those dancing flames and deep shadows provide a natural setting to let your fancy soar.

If you've never thought of yourself as Mother Goose or the Brothers Grimm, don't worry. One firelog manufacturer, Duraflame, has come up with the following suggestions for would-be tale spinners.

Most libraries also have a "story hour" once a week, so if you want some tips on how to tell that book story, stick around. But don't be bound by the written word. Feel free to adapt. Part of the fun of story telling is adjusting the tale to fit your very own family.

Don't make story telling a one-way street. Encourage your children to tell stories of their own. Ask them to tell you the plot of their favorite TV program or movie. Let everyone in the family share something that happened to him or her during the day.

And remember, whenever there are children and fire, follow a few simple safety precautions. Never leave children alone by the fire. Don't let them poke, prod or play with fire. Always use a fireplace screen.

## Bookworm

We must tell you about two other groups involved in the operation of the Library. The first one is "The Friends". It is a congenial group which is a friend of the Library just as the name implies. They act as fund raisers and are supportive of libraries in general and the G.B. Burton Library in particular. Possibly some of you reading this column are members of "The Friends". If you are not a member and would like to join this organization see one of the following persons: Chairman, Mrs. Charles E. Deyhle; Co-Chairman, Mrs. Lee Palmer; Secretary-Treasurer, Patty Craft. I believe their dues are \$1.00 per year.

A Book Selection Committee assists the Librarians in making selections for purchasing and leasing materials. The Chairman of this Committee is Anton Riggs. Those who work with her are Jean Stavenhagen, Betty Boston, Patty Craft, Nancy Shelton, Shirley Clifford, Betty Williams, and Claudine Todd.

Did you know that you can walk into any one of eighteen public libraries in the Panhandle and borrow books free of charge?

Did you know that users of the G.B. Burton Memorial Library have borrowed 70 books free of charge from other Panhandle libraries since last September? In order for a person to borrow materials from a public library other than his own, he usually has to pay what is called a non-resident fee. But in the top 25 counties of Texas, a special program sponsored by the Texas Panhandle Library System—headquartered at the Amarillo Public Library—makes it possible for library users to borrow books free of charge from seventeen other libraries. This program, which has been in operation since 1973, is called Reciprocal Borrowing.

Governing bodies of the eighteen participating libraries have signed formal agreements to loan books to one another's patrons. Those libraries which loan more than an average number of books during a year are reimbursed for the use of their collections by persons

other than local taxpayers. Borrowers are expected to return the books to the library from which they were borrowed. They are also expected to abide by the rules of the lending library.

The libraries which participate in the Reciprocal Borrowing program are: Amarillo Public Library, Canyon Public Library, Carson County Public Library (Panhandle, White

Deer, Groom and Skellytown), Deaf Smith County Library (Hereford), Friona Public Library, Gabie Betts Burton Memorial Library (Clarendon) serving Donley County, Hansford County Library (Spearman), Hemphill County Library (Canadian), Hutchinson County Library (Borger, Stinnett, Fritch), Killgore Memorial Library (Dumas and Sunray) serving Moore County, Lovett Memorial Library (McLean), Lovett Memorial Library (Pampa), Perry Memorial Library (Perryton) serving Ochiltree County, Rhoads Memorial Library (Dimmitt) serving Castro County, Shamrock Public Library, Sherman County Library (Stratford), Swisher County Library (Tulia) and Wheeler Public Library.

To find out if you are eligible for this service, to the G.B. Burton Memorial Library and ask about Reciprocal Borrowing.

## FIGHTING INFLATION

## FANCY THAT!

In 1972 the University of Stuttgart, West Germany, reported that a student there, Veronica Seider, possessed eyesight 20 times better than average. She could identify people at a distance of more than a mile.



At Bonn University, the Institute for Experimental Ophthalmology has helped create a test display apparatus that aids those visually handicapped persons who have retained vestigial vision of more than one percent, even though they are legally blind. This electronic text converter enlarges light-sensitive printed or written matter up to seven inches. The text is then projected one line at a time onto a normal TV screen where the near-blind can read it.


