## Rescuers save two Amarillo painters

Two Amarillo contractors are lacky to be alive after succumbing County location last week Sheriff Butch Blackburn

Jerry Wayne Lavato, were working at Melvin Edes place east of Clarendon last Tuesday, March 30, and did not return home when they were expected. Worried rela-
tives called the sheriff's office, tives called the sheriff's office,
and Deputy Vincent Morasco was and Deputy Vincent Morasco
dispatched to the worksite. Upon arrival, Morasco
found the two men unconscious in the basement where they had been spraying lacquer - a highly flammable substance that emits toxic fumes. The deputy immediately called for EMS and for the

ment's Rescue Squad and also ment's Rescue Squad and also
instructed the dispatcher to launch instucted the dispacther to launch
two helicopters.

Obama takes private lenders out of education

Last Tuesday, President Obama signed legislation that takes private lenders out of the business of making federal student loans. Instead, starting July 1 , egislation was attached to the final piece of health are legislation that passed last week.
Unfortunately, higher education students, the very people who the government claimed they were helping
in jamming this law through Congress, will lose under in jamming this law through Congress, will lose under
this ill-designed program. Why? Because they will be forced to rely exclusively on the federal government for student loans. The current delivery channel was working efficiently, and students benefited from the competition. Now, they will be forced to rely on four federal call centers instead of more than 2,000 community and nonprofit lenders nationwide. Plus,
the federal government's track record in delivering the federal government's track record in delivering
products (the postal service, Social Security, etc.) isn that good.
This legislation comes after recent regulatory requirements that will make the paperwork involved in the loan process so time-consuming that many banks vill decide to move away from offering private higher education loans altogether.
gap between school or government financial aid As the availability and amount of government financia aid continues to shrink, these loans have been instrumental in helping students realize the dream of a college education.
The new re
The new regulatory requirements - approved
by the Federal Reserve Board and effective Feb by the Federal Reserve Board and effective Feb.
14 - were enacted in the spirit of stronger consumer 14 - were enacted in the spirit of stronger consumer Regulation Z disclosure requirements for private education loans, they implement provisions of the Higher Education Opportunity Act enacted in August 2008 The requirements apply to any closed-end, non-home secured loan extended expressly, in whole or in part, to be used for post-secondary educational expenses,
such as tuition and fees, books, supplies, and room and board. They do not apply to home equity lines of credit.

Bankers are committed to fair and flexible educ nance solutions for students and families. We fully support transparency in the application proces and welcome competition in the marketplace. However, these new rules, while obviously well-inten-
tioned, definitely miss the mark. For example, the n disclosures rules require three distinct and complicated disclosures rules require three disunct and compicated
disclosures at three distinct instances: with the applicaon or solicitation; before the loan is closed; and at consummation. In order for a lender to provide these hree required disclosures they must print and mail hem at each interval and then patiently wait for the tudent's response. This will waste time, money and valuable resources and can delay the approval and dis-
bursement process. Il credit terms for 30 calendar days after the loan ha been approved to provide the applicant time to decide whether or not he or she wants to go through with he transaction. To help the applicant shop around for ther loans, we are also required to disclose informa tion about federal student loan programs that may
Ther costly alternatives
sclosures must be provided. The student now has the right to rescind or cancel the loan within three business days. During this period, a bank must delay disbursement of the proceeds until the rescission perio Since many of the students applying for these loans need emergency funding, I don't see how they
would benefit by having to wait an additional three days for money they may desperately need as soon possible. For example, a borrower requesting a $\$ 200$ loan for books will now have to go through the same ime-consuming process required by the new regulations, including the three required disclosures, as
