Counties such as Crosby, Garza and Floyd have some areas in the county having excellent crops, while the county average is comparatively low, which has resulted in these counties being by-passed. Migratory workers should be encouraged to visit the County Agent's office in the counties they go through and let the County Agent have his field man show the workers where these excellent crops are. The need for pullers is critical, but most critical is the Western section of the Plains. Mitchell and Howard counties, and the Childress and Hall County areas. The price for pulling is steady to an upward trend. Many counties should exploit the opportunity of uncovering new sources of labor, such as the V.F.W. and others.

Grain Sorghum Situation Grain is being piled on the ground in some localities awaiting storage space at elevators or sale to commercial truckers for transport into feed deficient areas. Elevators are full. The rail car situation is becoming acute and, as a result, commercial truckers could help a lot. Our office checked the moisture content of grain sorghums at a number of elevators this week and found that all grain that is coming in now is very satisfactory for storage even if pick-

ed up on the farm. Feed Distribution Program Practically all grain bought from elevators is government inspected, and inspection can be had on all if required by purchaser. Prices being paid to farmers generally range from \$1.30 to \$1.40 at the elevators and from \$1.20 to \$1.30 at the farm. Price structures to purchasers are as follows: when purchased from elevators-price paid farmer, plus loading, cleaning, grading, and handling charges, plus freight to point of destination equals the delivered price. If purchased from farmer and trucked to point of distributionprice paid farmer plus handling fees equals price of delivery. The market has been quite steady this week.
