#### WAS ALIVE JULY 18.

He Said He Was at the British Legation, Continuously Shelled and Unless Relieved Soon All Would Be Massacred.

Washington, July 21 .-- The Chinese minister yesterday morning received a toward Pekin. a cipher cable dispatch from United States Minister Conger. It was transmitted through the tsun li yamen and offers his professional service: the Shanghia taotai. It contains about to the people of Clarendon fifty words and is signed in English

with the name "Conger." The minister immediately took it to the state department. Secretary Hay called in the assistant secretaries and work was begun in translating cipher.

No doubt is expressed by the state department officials as to the authenticity of the message. After being translated it read as follows:

On July 11, the state department communicated a brief message asking tidings of Minister Conger in the state department code. Minister Wu undertook to get this into Minister Conger's hands, if he were alive. He has succeeded in doing this.

The state department also received a telegram from Consul General Goodnow at Shanghai saving:

"The governor of Shanghai informs me he has received a cipher message from Conger of the 18th."

A few minutes later Minister Wu appeared at the state department with a telegram from Taotai Sheng, dated July 20 which had been received by him at 8:30 yesterday morning, reading as follows:

"Your telegram was forwarded and as requested I send reply from the tsung li yamen as follows: 'Your telegram of the 15th date of this month (July 11) re- by the president and a cable notice of ceived. 
