





Place for the Incubator. Under most circumstances a sma

building out of doors is the best place in which to locate the incubator dur-ing the time it is to be in operation. This place is necessary as a safeguard against fire. There might be times when it would be more advan-tageously located in the house were it not for the danger from fire. The objection to an outer building, however, lies in the fact that the temperature is very changeable unless the building is exceptionally well built. Where a good many chicks are to be raised or where several incubators are to be kept in service for som months at a time a building constructed partly below ground is best. We have seen such houses that had been constructed at a moderate cost. The lower walls went five or six feet bebut a well built rail fence three and a low the surface of the ground, and consisted of concrete to the thickness of a foot or more. In such cases the floor was of concrete and the second floor of boards was only a short distance above the ground. The upper portion of such building can be used for the storage of food and the like. The lower part, in which are

placed the incubators, can be kept at a very even temperature. The cellar of the residence is hardly the place for incubators, on account of the dampness of the cellars as ordinarily constructed, and the danger of fires above mentioned.
