A FATAL CLOUDBURST

Local Surgeon F. W. & D. R'y. It Is Known That Fifteen Lives Were Lost in Coleman.

Physician and Surgeon, Ten Bodies Have Been Recovered and Search Is Still Going on-Two Rescuers Lose Their Lives Saving the Children.

> A little after 8 o'clock yesterday morndown Hoards creek. Before any one could realize the impending disaster the whole valley was filled with water and the creek was nearly a mile wide.

A number of residences and camps were washed away and many lives were lost. It is known that 15 people were drowned, among them John Euleisstine an i J. O. Spath. Spath and Euleisstine were engaged in rescuing four little girls, each having two on his horse when all were washed away.

Mr. Spath was one of the leading citizens of this place. Ten bodies have been recovered and

search is being made for others. It is not known how many lives have been lost along the course of the creek, and the worst is feared.

The damage to crops has been great, but the loss of life overshadows everything else.




