(By Clarence B. Kelland.) Paris, Aug. 6 .- "The finest carload of supplies that ever came up to me-and I had to abandon it," said Karl Cate, Y. M. C. A. Secretary when he arrived in Paris the other day, dusty, worn, staggering from exertions and lack of sleep.

"Our station was close to the front, and we were directly in the path of the German advance. I just got my car unloaded when word came that we had to beat That car was loaded with American cookies and chocolate and cigarettes and writing paper and chewing gum and cigars. I had a camion and started to load with the idea of getting on board as many supplies as possible and saving them. I piled on just one box, and then it struck me that the Y. M. C.
