PROTECTION FOR **BALED COTTON**

Properly Constructed. Efficiently Operated Warehouses Found to Afford Best Protection.

A series of experiments to determine the extent to which, under various conditions, baled cotton is destroyed by weather was recently conducted by the Bureau of Mar-kets, United States Department of Agriculture, at Jefferson, Georgia. The results are striking. In one instance, a bale of cotton placed out in the open, flat on the ground with no covering, was damaged to the extent of 370 pounds at the end of eight months. Another bale, placed on edge, with no further attention, lost 167 pounds. A bale on edge and turned over once a week, lost 110 pounds. A bale placed on end and not turned lost 78 pounds. A bale placed on timbers off the ground and turned once a week lost 4 9pounds, and a bale placed on timbers and covered with tarpaulin lost but 14 A warehouse bale of cotton during the same period lost only 1 pound. The editor of the News is in receipt of a letter this week from our old friend W. O. Woody. who is now making his home in California. The letter is brim full of peppy information and we are pub-lishing it in full that his many friends may also enjoy it along with the News force. The letter is as

Dear Mr. Editor: "I have not been out here long enough yet to know very much about the country, in a general but I thought nterest to you to hear of some of the things I have seen and heard. 




