MODIFICATION HELD AS ENTERING WEDGE TO BREAKING DOWN OF PROHIBITION

When national prohibition became a part of the constitution there were those who predicted that the American hotel would suffer seriously from the loss of its bar-room. But the reverse has been true and today the hotel business is one of the best revenue producers in the nation and whereas ladies unattended, dreaded to go to a hotel, now they are as safe as they ever are without escort and have no feeling of dread in that connection. The hotel business has been lifted to a high level and the attitude of the men who direct its efficiency is worthy of study. Over at Atlanta, Ga., there is published the "Southern Hotel Reporter" which says editorially in a recent issue:

"Prohibition and its effect upon the American hotel industry has long been a topic of much importance among hotel men, especially those who got their start in the 'good old days'. Elimination of the saloon has tended to elevate the business of running a hotel. Prohibition has injected a better atmosphere, a more efficient system of operation than could ever have prevailed with barrooms as an adjunct. Many of the proprietors and managers of the 'good old days' made better bartenders than hotelkeepers in the modern sense of the term. An ability to out-drink the guest was frequently considered a greater personal asset than a knowledge of cost accounting or business ethics. There are many hotel men aware of the benefits conferred by the elimination of the saloon. It is extremely doubtful if the controling influences behind the American hotel industry would vote for a return of the barroom-It may be that an enlightened people will see fit to modify a law that does seriously infringe upon the popular doctrine of personal liberty. The 'drouth' may be leavened by the sale of light wines and beer, but it is inconceivable that the saloon will ever disgrace the community again. More optimistic proponents of light wines and beer believe modification soon would lead to a complete breaking down of the prohibition law. If that were the case it would be far better, to increase the effectiveness of the statute and dispell all hope of even the slightest change or alteration."

Thousands of miles of rural roads in North and South Carolina, Virginia and Georgia were entirely useless during the recent rain and flood siege, a wide-spread investigation reveals.

In times of six-inch rainfalls in 24-hour periods, when swollen streams, threaten both human life and livestock, when food supplies

and livestock, when food supplies and medical attention are needed, then the full value of well paved roads is emphatically pictured, and the lack of them intensifies the

trouble ten-fold.

The wear and tear on the automobile and the many extra costs of car operation on poor roads when they become useable once again are big items.

A Georgia editor in writing of the situation in his state utters a truism that is applicable to any community:

"There can never be any progress in completing durable sur-facing so long as the millions of dollars poured annually into the road fund must be used to reroad fund must be used to re-build shoddy paving, and to main-tain thousands of miles of sand clay and unpaved roads that blow away in dry weather, and wash away in wet seasons, and are nev-er perfect at any time."


