Not many Southerners know that Decoration Day originated in the South, and that the national holiday with its sombre loftiness was first made a national order by General Logan, Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, in 1868. According to history, Mrs. Logan had been to Richmond on a visit and while there viewed the desolation of the nearby country, with its thousands of Confederate graves, and was deeply moved by the fresh and faded decorations of flowers—a tribute from the survivors of the great civil war and its attendant ravages. Mrs. Logan vividly detailed these scenes of mute eloquence with the result that General Logan issued an order calling on the communities throughout the jurisdiction of the G. A. R., to set aside May 30th, 1868, for the purpose of Visiting the cemeteries of the land and laying a tribute of flowers to those who had passed to the Great Beyond. Since that time May 30th has been annually proclaimed Decoration Day in the United States. It is a beautiful custom and is complimentary of the civilization of this nation.





POULTRY SUCCESS STORIES By F. W. Kazmeier, Bryan, Texas.

There is no question, but that a very bright future is ahead for the poultry raisers. Feed is discouragingly high now, but soon another crop will change that. This coming Fall and Winter we will again see very high prices for eggs. Eggs are this year going into storage at a price of about 5 cents per dozen, over that last year. These eggs are coming out In Iowa, farmers have found, he little hen their best friend. The he little hen their best friend. The Iowa State College made a canvas of 318 flocks. Of these 103 had a net profit above feed cost of \$1000..00 or over, 24 had profits exceeding \$2000.00 while five had profits in excess of \$4000.00. Cleve Erhardt, owner of the largest flock reported, also had acquired the largest net returns. Mr. Erhardt had a gross return from Erhardt had a gross return from all sources of \$7750.00, while the feed bill was \$1486.00 leaving more than \$6000.00 above feed cost. There were but 712 Single Comb White Leghorns in Mr. Erhardt's flock making a profit above feed cost of approximately \$8.50

per hen.
