Three new books which we appreciate are "Fifty Years Below Zero—A Lifetime of Adventure in the Far North" by Charles D. Brower, sent us by Sgt. Russell Barton who has spent two years in the Far North, Alaska, and who sent it to us because he used to read everything we had in the

library when he was a Clarendon lad, and still has a warm place for us in his heart; "Brave Men" by Ernie Pyle; and some one gave us an extra copy of "A Tree Grows in Brooklyn."

The recipients of the Houghton Mifflin Literary Fellowship Awards for this year are Ann Petry for fiction and Beatrice Griffith for non-fiction, \$2,400 each. Ann Petry is from Saybrook, Conn. originally, is executive secretary of Negro Woman, Inc., and lives

in Harlem, which is to be her subject. She means to write a novel to be called "The Street." Beatrice Griffith is a Californian and will write about Mexicans in the United States.



**Schools of State Need \$33,364,000 For Construction**

**Heavy Wartime Birth Rate To Place Added Strain On Education System**

Texas will need to spend an estimated \$33,364,000 in immediate postwar years for new school buildings and for repairs to present structures to adapt its school system to anticipated heavier enrollments and to educational changes, according to a survey just released by the American Association of School Administrators. This is a conservative figure, the survey reveals, as many communities have not yet ascertained future school requirements.

The report bears out U. S. Bureau of Census figures, which show that wartime births in Texas are running 31 per cent above peace years.

Larger enrollments, as well as wartime developments, will greatly influence future school design, it is predicted by Reginald E. Marsh, nationally known school architect and member of the postwar planning committee of the American Institute of Architects, New York chapter.

"Such facilities as cafeterias and lunchrooms will be designed for general educational purposes and installed in many more schools," Marsh says. "Floors and wainscoting of tile will make them attractive and easily clean-

ed for use before and after lunch as study halls, music rooms and club meeting places."

Marsh also foresees increased accent on physical education and vocational training as a result of Selective Service findings. Athletic facilities, he believes, will be increased and where joint community and school needs can be served tile swimming pools may be installed.

Nursery schools will probably be made part of the school system, according to Marsh. "Set up near war plants, they have relieved mothers for work and at the same time proved of educational benefit to children," he says.

Census figures highlight coming school problems of Texas. They show 444,700 births in the 1941-43 period, 31 per cent more than in 1933-35, when 339,274 infants were born. Population shifts, easing pressure on some schools, will intensify it for others in 1947, as children of 1933-35 start leaving elementary grades and the bumper 1941-43 crop begins knocking at school doors for admission.

**Car Crash Insurance Rates Upped**

AUSTIN, April 12 — Reduced insurance rates on automobiles for liability, fire and theft and higher rates for collision insurance effective May 1st were announced this week by J. P. Gibbs, casualty commissioner.

Private passenger automobile rates are reduced 20 per cent on bodily injury and property damage for an A gasoline card holder; 15 per cent for a B card holder; with 10 per cent reduction on bodily injury only if a C holder. Medical payments rates were reduced up to 37 per cent. All fire and theft rates on private cars were cut 19 per cent. Fire rates on local hauling commercial cars fell 25 per cent. Comprehensive rates for private passenger cars remain unchanged except the minimum premium was raised from \$6 to \$7.50.

Substantial rate increases were granted for collision coverage on private and commercial cars. Private passenger-car collision rates were increased as much as 38 per cent. A and B gasoline card holders will still receive a 20 per cent and 19 per cent discount respectively.

Commercial class 3 and class 4 rates are reduced 15 per cent on bodily injury in the Houston territory, but in all other territories the bodily injury rates were increased 5 per cent. Property damage rates on commercial cars were increased from 12 to 20 per cent. Commercial car collision rates were increased for hauls up to 50 miles by 15 per cent; up to 150 miles increased 25 per cent, and long hauls raised 75 per cent.

**NEW LETTUCE IS CALLED SLOBOLT**

A new summer leaf lettuce called slobolt has been announced by the Department of agriculture, and is already being increased by seed growers to make it available to gardeners. It will be listed in the 1946 seed catalogs. This new lettuce withstands midsummer temperatures without quickly shooting or "bolting" to seed. If plants are set 10 to 12 inches apart and only the basal leaves are used as they reach a desirable size, lettuce may be harvested from the same plants over a period of several weeks, making it a very desirable home-garden variety. Slobolt has frilled light-green leaves that have the very wrinkled effect described as savoyed. The plants are of moderate size and the seeds are black.



**RED CROSS VOLUNTEER SERVICE HOME SERVICE**

A recent announcement from Red Cross Headquarters clarifies the question of the eligibility of a divorced wife for Emergency Maternity Infant care. If the divorce occurred not more than 10 months prior to the birth and the man was an enlisted man in the designated pay grades, then the divorced wife is eligible for this help. Practically the same ruling applies in cases of wives of men who are reported dead or missing or who are A.W.O.L.

While every effort is made to deliver parcels sent to members of our armed forces overseas, this is not always possible due to loss or obliteration of addresses, return of the addressee to the U.S. or for other reasons. In the event it becomes impossible to effect delivery, it is the policy of the War Department to turn over to the Special Services Officer, or of the Navy to turn over to the Welfare Officer designated, all undeliverable articles for distribution instead of having them returned, especially when such parcel is marked "Abandon if Undeliverable."

The telegraph service for homeward bound personnel returning from overseas or receiving discharges has been extended to all servicemen in any branch of the service—a fixed text which may be sent anywhere in the continental U. S. for 25.

The POW Bulletin contains a question asking how long after a serviceman is reported missing may his family expect to learn

that he is a prisoner and how long before they may hope for a permanent camp address. The answer was that usually they were notified within three months, but that there is being more and more delay in German reporting service and in many cases the first word has come from the man himself from a prison camp. In such cases, the relatives should notify the Office of the Provost Marshall General, War Department, Washington.

Over and over in the POW Bulletin come expressions of thanks to the Red Cross from individuals and from groups; insistent praise for the many kinds of help given.

**SCREW-WORMS THREATEN SOUTH TEXAS**

High temperatures threaten a severe infestation of screwworms among cattle in south Texas in early April. The greatest hazard temporarily is in the areas where the pest passes the winter, especially if warm weather prevails. Screwworms breed from eggs laid by a species of fly in the open wounds of warm blooded animals.

According to a recent survey, screwworm flies are emerging three or four weeks earlier than usual. The season is considerably in advance of the average for the past thirty years, because temperatures were four to ten degrees above normal in the area in February and March. Ranchmen have reported mild cases of infestation in south Texas areas where docking, sheering and minor surgery are in progress. The early appearance of the flies indicates that screwworm migration probably will be earlier than normal and heavier to north Texas this year if warm weather continues.

To guard against screwworm infestation, Paul Gregg, entomologist for the A&M College Extension Service, recommends that stockmen watch all livestock for injuries. When screwworm flies are to be present in an area, apply Smear 62 to all open wounds on animals every day or two until they are healed. Prompt

treatment, he explains, will prevent animals deaths from attacks by the pest. For wounds already infested, Smear 62 is best applied with a one-inch paint brush. The material simply is swabbed into the wound. Care must be taken to push it into all of the pockets made by the worms and painted around the wound. For protecting wounds not infested, such as shear cuts, dehorning, docking and minor surgical cuts, it is sufficient to cover the raw tissues and the surrounding area thoroughly with a coating of the smear. Smear 62 is the remedy recommended by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Inferior ingredients will not protect against screwworm, Gregg says.
