

The first county convention of the new Teacher-Trustee association was held in the District Court room here Saturday. A number of districts had representation in the central organization at this meeting, and the attendance in general would indicate a growing interest in school affairs, if one may judge from the reports of these district meetings.

School legislation and standardization of rural schools were the subjects uppermost in the minds of those present. Talks were made by a number of men whose enthusiasm was further spurred on by the energetic action of the President who is making quite a reputation for himself as a friend of Donley county school interests.

Judge W. T. Link discussed school management and the necessity for economy in school management. Fred Story complimented the teachers and trustees for the progress made and added his personal encouragement to further success.

R. G. Dillard of the Windy Valley school spoke on pending bills affecting the schools, and bills that have already been passed by the Legislature.

Fruit Grower Discusses Cold Very few were killed if any, some Damage of Past Winter

Mr. J. J. Cockrell of Mills county says that apples are more profitable than any other fruit that can be planted on the land. Mr. Cockrell raises many kinds of fruit, it takes more care to raise apples than any other fruit. The trees must be sprayed several times a year. This is one reason he thinks, there will never be an over production of good apples. He has Delicious, King David, Ruby Red and Yellow Delicious. The Delicious gets ripe and ready to eat on the trees. The others have to be ripened off the trees. A Delicious apple that is not over ripe is one of the best eating of all fruits.

If a man has apple land he can raise this fruit and sell it for what the northern people pay in feight getting it to us and make money. Many people are sleeping on a gold mine by not planting their land in apples and then taking care of the trees. A few apple trees out in a peach orchard seldom make anything. They must be planted in a block and the trees looked after.

Many people are now wondering if the English walnut can be grown in Texas. The English walnut is now growing fine here at Stephenville. There are some large trees of the Wilson Wonder and many trees of the Mayette and Franquette coming into bearing. The Wilson Wonder is an extremely large nut but the kernel has a dark skin over it so that it would never do for market. However the Mayette and Franquette are extra quality nuts and are growing and bearing well. Again Texas can score one over another state. The land is cheap and we do not have the swarms of insects they have in California. At no distant day Texas will be growing thousands of bushels of English walnuts and will also grow the improved black

This winter has certainly tested the hardiness of all our fruits. After a long hot spell the temperature suddenly dropped to seven below zero. 



This business, the survey point out, does not include "natural" trade from local cars or those of adjoining counties, which obviously would increase with improved roads.

State checkers, from four day's actual count, found the average daily traffic to be: 800 motor vehicles on Highway 5; 150 on Highway 66; and 300 on Highway 88.

Motor traffic in Texas is divided the experts have found, in two almost equal classes. Roughly, half are local cars or from adjoining counties. The other half are from beyond the state, or from Texas points at least two counties distant. The latter are genuine tour-

"On this basis, some 600 outside cars cross Donley county each day," the Association's survey said, "scattering their good American dollars among the restaurants, hotels, tourist camps, hot dog stands, garages, filling stations and stores along the important

"If they spend as little as \$1 per vehicle within the borders of the county, then Donley county's trunk roads mean \$18,000 in added business per month, or \$216,000 a year, exclusive of their convenience and saving to her own 10,000 people, who operate some 1,500 cars

The survey, conducted by the Association for every county in Texas, was designed to show importance of roads to each com munity, and thus arouse public opinion against any further diversion of gas tax money, which would cripple the highway pro




