## Temperature Establishes All-Time Heat Record of 113 Degrees Here Tuesday

The Panhandle of Texas experienced a new brand of weather Tuesday in the form of a drouthy heat-driven sandstorm, the wind reaching a forty mile record. Never before in the memory of old settlers has a hot sandstorm at this time of the year visited the Panhandle.

Again, Vulcan got on the job and attempted to vulcanize this section by hanging up an all-time heat record of 113 degrees, the highest record since the local weather observing bureau was established here, according to official observer Joe Goldston, over a period of 16 years.

The effect of the heat Tuesday was quite noticeable as people sought the shade, chickens and dumb brutes not too dumb, sought shelter from the driving rays of a sun that were accompanied by a driving dust storm. The city water supply was more than ample to take care of all needs with many sprinklers and much irrigation of flower beds and yards being done later in the evening.

## R. S. Thompson Dies On Ranch Near McLean

No death will occasion more genuine regret upon the part of the general public than that of R. S. (Uncle Bud) Thompson who passed away Sunday at his ranch home ten miles south of McLean.

Uncle Bud, as he was affectionately termed by his legion of friends, was a pioneer rancher in that section. His was an honored name and his advice was frequently sought on public questions. His sincere life and Christian attitude endeared him to even the casual acquaintance.

A son of the old west, he knew only one course—do right under all circumstances. Honest, faithful to those principles that bring lasting pleasure to one who feels that he has lived a life of usefulness to serve humanity. No distress that came into his life caused him for a moment to swerve from that course that he believed pleased his Lord.

## RETURNS SHOW COMMISSIONERS RACE IS CLOSE

### Armstrong And Hawkins In Lead in Hedley Precinct; Other Races Close

In precinct No. 1, John Hermes-meyer leads with 120 votes and will be matched with W. A. Poovey who received 90 votes, in the run-off. G. R. Grant and J. R. Dale each received a fair vote in the same precinct.

Precinct No. 2 brought surprises to many in the final returns. Garland G. Reeves is high man to be matched with Roy Beverly, present incumbent, in the run-off. The following vote was polled in the Clarendon precinct: Reeves 548; Beverly 275; W. A. Massie 203; Lon Rundell 139.

Precinct No. 3 with six candidates in the race settled down to Armstrong and Hawkins in the final race the 25th. The vote at Hedley was as follows: G. L. Armstrong 357; J. Less Hawkins 307; L. J. Crawford 224; Ray Doherty 206; J. W. DeBord 49; T. N. Messer 7. In the final count over the entire precinct, it is said that Armstrong is leading Hawkins by 8 votes. A complete vote of the precinct could not be had until the official canvass late this (Thursday) evening.

Over in Precinct No. 4 Will Chamberlain takes the lead with 79 votes. He is followed closely by G. W. Beck, present incumbent by 71. Dewey L. Wood, other man in the race, received 31 votes. Chamberlain and Beck are matched for the run-off the 25th.

## McClung Revival to Begin Here This Week

Plans have been completed for the revival to begin at the local Church of Christ Friday night, according to R. I. (Bob) McGowan, a leading member of that denomination in charge of arrangements.

## Donley County Eligible For Feed and Seed Loans

The Farm Credit Administration Monday approved Donley county as one of a group of west Texas counties to be eligible for emergency crop and feed loans.

Loans made under this department may be used to purchase live stock feed, for general purposes, for summer fallowing or for purchase of seed such as winter wheat, rye or barley.

The loans are to be secured by liens on crops and live stock. Blanks for obtaining the loans may be had of county agent T. R. Broun.

## REQUESTS BEING MADE TO SECURE DROUTH RELIEF

### Protests That Secondary Drouth Rating Does Not Mean Anything

Mr. Joe Goldston, president of the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce, received the following letter from Mr. R. C. McChord, acting director of the Drouth Relief Service in Washington, in reply to a day letter sent by Mr. Goldston to Henry A. Wallace, Secretary of Agriculture, asking that Donley County be designated as a drouth county:

"Dear Mr. Goldston: Your day letter of July 18th has been received and immediately referred to the Area Designation Committee.

You may be assured that the information contained in your communication, with other data which is being developed by an extensive check of the field in that area, is receiving consideration."

Mr. Odos Caraway, director of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and Judge S. W. Lowe also made similar requests to the Secretary of Agriculture. And as a result of their efforts, Donley County was placed in the Secondary Drouth Area. Messrs. Fred Chamberlain, W. H. Patrick, W. J. Lewis and Judge S. W. Lowe conferred with Congressman Marvin Jones in Amarillo Monday of this week on the possibility of Donley County's now being placed in the Emergency Drouth Area.

Out of 21 surrounding counties, Donley, Collingworth and Wheeler are the only three that have not been designated as emergency drouth counties. And if the present weather conditions continue, it is going to be necessary that Donley County be placed in the Emergency Area. At this time, Secondary counties are receiving no additional aid. But Emergency Drouth counties are receiving both state and federal aid.

## Lakeview Pioneer is Buried There Wednesday

While on a visit with relatives at Dalhart, M. O. Thompson died there Tuesday. His body was shipped back to Memphis and a funeral service was held at Lakeview Wednesday.

Mr. Thompson was an uncle of Joe Bownds of this city. He had resided on a farm near Lakeview for some thirty years, and for a number of years conducted a shoe shop there.

## PANHANDLE MAY RECEIVE HIGHWAY GAP FUNDS SOON

### Contract For Drainage And Grade Is Let on Highway 66 Already

Representatives from 26 Panhandle counties met with the State Highway Commission in Austin the first of the week for the purpose of urging prompt highway relief work in the drouth belt.

It was pointed out by the Panhandle men that this section has approximately 40 percent of the unfinished portion of federal highways in the state. It was also emphasized that these federal unpaved highways became impassable from mud when it rained, tourists and others becoming stranded.

John Wood, chairman of the Commission stated that there was no mud due to the drouth, and that no tourists were visiting the Panhandle.

W. R. Ely, former chairman of the Commission and at present a member of that body, stated that it was their intention to close the gaps in Donley county on No. 370, (formerly Highway 5), and the same highway in Panhandle counties farther up the Denver in Hartley and Dallam counties.

Contracts for the grade and drainage of Federal highway 66 have been let for grade and drainage, but no topping or paving. To stop at this status, 66 would be in the same condition as 370 from Clarendon west to the county line.

The Commission expects to have projects under the federal emergency grant selected within a few days. Efforts will be made to close gaps over the state on main or cardinal highways in preparation for the Centennial in 1936. Twenty five such highways exist in the state.

## Infant Son is Buried Here Sunday Evening

Funeral services were conducted at the home of R. C. Weatherly here Sunday evening for the infant of Mr. and Mrs. Robt. Weatherly junior, which was born the same day.

The infant was given the name of Jerry Cap Weatherly. The services were conducted by Revs. Allen and King of Lelia-Lake, and burial made in the local cemetery.

Mr. Weatherly is a teacher in the Jericho schools, and formerly taught at Lelia Lake. The Leader joins with the many friends in expressing deepest sympathy for this estimable young couple in the loss of their first born.

## ALLRED HOLDING LEAD OF 50,116 OVER TOM HUNTER

### Donley County Gives Allred Plurality Over His Four Opponents

Plurality votes received by Guy Pierce for reelection to the office of sheriff, and Joe Bownds for the office of assessor-collector, interest in the county elections were largely brought to a close Saturday, except for the local interest in the precinct candidates.

Turning to state candidates, supporters of Jimmie Allred are pleased at the consideration shown him in the plurality vote received over his four opponents.

Late returns show the following vote in the gubernatorial race: Allred 269,470; Hunter 219,354; McDonald 189,001; Small 111,510; Witt 56,598; Hugher 51,248.

Lon Smith, chairman of the Railroad Commission and an office holder for nearly forty years, is leading John Pundt of Dallas by 34,419 votes.

Tom Connally won a decisive victory over Joe Bailey for the senate job.

Tom Blanton, fiery congressman from Abilene, is said to have a clear majority over his opponent.

Walter Woodul of Houston leads for lieutenant governor. Walter Woodward has quite a lead over Bill McCraw in the attorney general race.

Senator Small carried all but three counties in his senatorial district, some of them by a narrow margin, and in others he almost made a clean sweep. The three counties lost by Small went to Allred and are Donley, Childress and Swisher. This senatorial district gave Small 22,286; McDonald 6,044; Hunter 7,694; Allred 12,223.

## SUPPORTERS SAY PURYEAR GIGGED BY PHILIP WOLFE

### Claim that Wolfe was Put Out Merely to Lambast Puryear To Fool The Voters

There was a mixture of chagrin and disgust in the Puryear camp in Donley county the first of the week when it became known that Wolfe, one of the men in the three-cornered representative race, had never filed an expense account with the Secretary of State as required by law.

Wolfe's failure to file this expense account is taken to mean that he had no idea of seriously making the race, and it is alleged that he was in the field for no other purpose than to lambast Puryear.

Those of Hedley who heard Wolfe's talk state that he allegedly denounced Puryear for having voted for a "law that would permit infidels to teach in the public schools," or words to that effect.

Puryear and his friends deny that such is true, and that Wolfe greatly magnified a law that merely "prohibits a school board from forcing a teacher to disclose his denominational choice." The law does not permit an instructor to teach unless such teacher believes in a supreme power, according to those who have read the law.

It is further alleged by friends of long standing that Puryear is a church member, a christian gentleman and is against repeal, whereas his opponent is favoring repeal of the Dean liquor law and will vote that way if elected a member of the Legislature.

## Clifford Davis Appointed Relief Administrator

R. A. Baker, for seven months administrator of the Donley county Relief Board, left last Saturday morning for Hereford where he will be employed on the engineering staff of the state park work now being done in that county.

A. W. Elrod, Field Representative of the Texas Relief Commission, was in Clarendon Tuesday of this week and in a meeting with the County Relief Board appointed Clifford Davis Administrator. The present office personnel will be retained, and Mrs. Willie Jo Keen will be employed as case supervisor. Mrs. Keen was formerly connected with the Potte County Relief Board and has a great deal of experience in this particular phase of Relief Work.

## REEVES TAKES LEAD IN RACE OF COMMISSIONERS

### Pierce And Bownds Have Plurality of Votes In First Primary

Of the four candidates for the office of county commissioner in the Clarendon precinct, Garland G. Reeves lacked 69 votes of having a plurality over his three opponents. The vote: Lon Rundell 139; W. A. Massie 203; Roy Beverly 275; G. G. Reeves 548.

Guy Pierce asking for third term as sheriff, and Joe Bownds asking for the office of assessor-collector, each have a plurality over their opponents and will not enter the second primary.

The vote for justice of the peace in Clarendon resulted as follows: W. A. Davis 154; O. H. Tidwell 61; L. O. Lewis 27; A. N. Wood 26. It was necessary to write the name of the J. P. choice on the ballot which accounts for the low vote received in each case. No effort was made by either to speak of and some of the men receiving votes were not candidates.

Candidates for constable of the Clarendon precinct resulted in Guy Wright receiving 669 votes and T. M. Pyle 217.

**FEELING THE LOSS GREATLY.**

With the passing of the first primary, many a publisher will feel keenly the loss of copy paper sent him in the form of free space dope. At least one side of the sheet was clean regardless of what was mimeographed on the other.

**YEH, THEEN WHAT?**

A down state publisher of a country weekly having heard many times the saying that "those who ask the most favors and take up most of the editor's time, never advertise, buy a subscription or in any way boost the business of the publisher," is making a list of his visitors this week to determine the truthfulness of the old adage.

**LO! THE POOR CANDIDATE.**

The greatest mistake a candidate ever made is to become all-fired certain that God put him or her on earth to relieve the cares of the suffering multitudes, and that they are all merely waiting confidently for the inspired humanity to go to the polls.

The greater percentage of candidates are really sincere in their desire to be of service, and make the race because it is a privilege. Defeated candidates should not regard as enemies those who did not vote for them. There are many reasons other than mere ill will. Lack of acquaintance; lack of confidence in real ability; stronger friendship for the opposing candidate are a few of the many reasons. Very few good men and women lose their standing in the estimation of the public merely because of defeat at the polls. Being a good loser is one of life's greatest personal assets.

Ours is a peculiar people because of the fact that we are composed of many races and because of the liberty we enjoy, have many personal ideas and methods and privileges of expression. We have no nobility. Therefore we become the greatest nation of hero worshippers on the globe. This has been true since, and even before, America gained her independence from England.

We have the privilege of grabbing off an individual, lauding him to the skies, and making of him a state-wide or national hero as the case may be. We just as suddenly let that individual drop into obscurity and grab another with which to repeat the performance.

Sometimes a candidate for more than one term is let down gently with a good showing of votes, though defeated. In many other instances, the former hero is left hanging in mid-air pretty much as the victim of a lynching party. We often change our minds on the slightest pretext, and some times without a cause. Following the leader, and voting for the alleged winner in a campaign is the greatest weakness in the American voting system. Voters, as a rule, select the party presumed to be in the lead rather than vote their own sentiments. That is the reason professional politicians have such a hold on our nation.

Be a good sport as a loser and remember that Abraham Lincoln was defeated for 'dinky' offices seven times before he became a successful candidate for the presidency of the United States. You may have another day yet. It depends largely on you, circumstances, and luck.

**Government to Assist Worthy Students For Schooling**

Ninety-one Texas College boys and girls will receive aid of the United States government in attending school at the West Texas State Teachers College of Canyon during the 1934-35 session, according to instructions received by the college this week. The proportion of boys and girls helped under this plan must be determined on the basis of the college enrollment October 15, 1933.

No student whose family can possibly finance his education will be given aid under the F. E. R. A. No more than \$20 per month can go to one student and the average for the 91 students must be not more than \$15 per month. The instructions further state that only young men and women of character and ability to do excellent college work can be considered and no more than 50% of those to be helped can be chosen from the ranks of students who were in college anywhere in January 1934. It is the purpose of the Federal Government to help able and de-

serving students who have entered college or who have completed high school and have not yet had a chance to begin their college work.

"So far as the West Texas State Teachers College is concerned," said Dr. Hill, "every young man and woman who receives this aid will be chosen from among the many deserving, needy students who have done work of a B grade or have maintained an average of 85% during their last 2 years in high school or while in college. They will be young people of fine character and high ambitions. We consider it our purpose to help the Federal Government build citizenship and provide leadership thru education.

"Professor C. A. Murray, head of the Mathematics Department of the college will receive applications from young people who can attend college only through this aid and are otherwise qualified for this aid. Those interested should make application at once as the West Texas State Teachers College quota of 91 students will soon be filled."

The collection includes hatchets, spear heads, knives, arrow heads, and scraps of polished stone. The Indians of the Panhandle Plains, according to Dr. Debo, did not make polished implements.

Mr. Evans' collection will be on exhibit for a short time only.

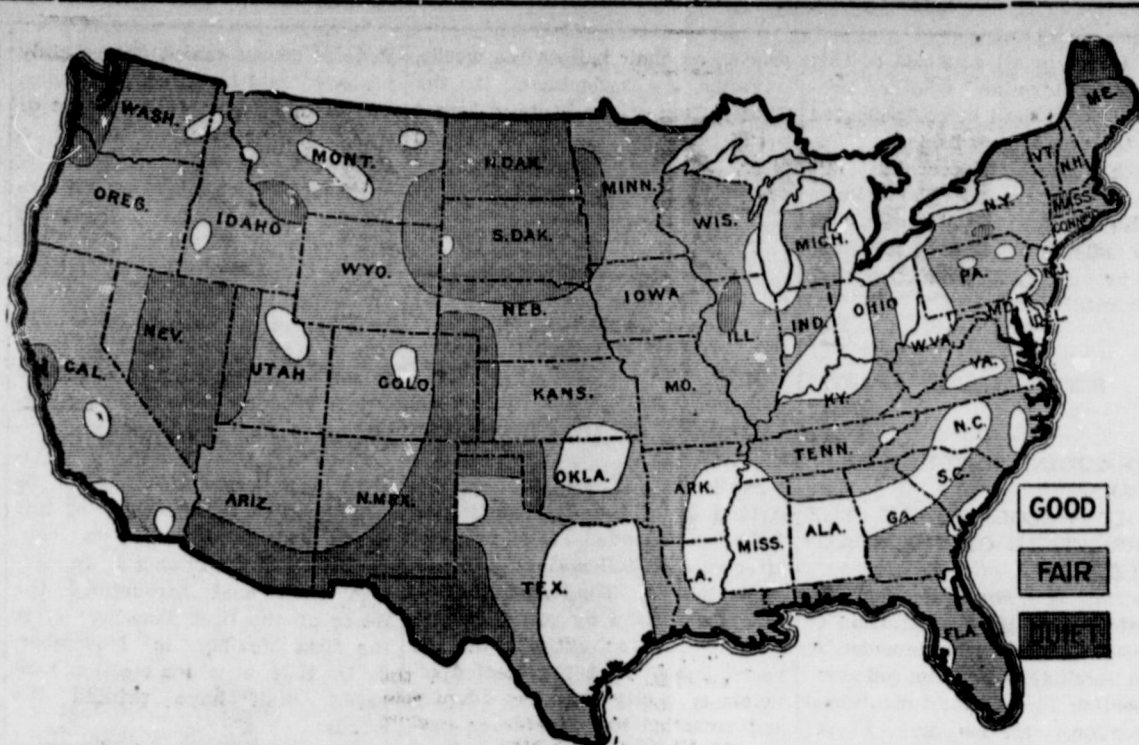

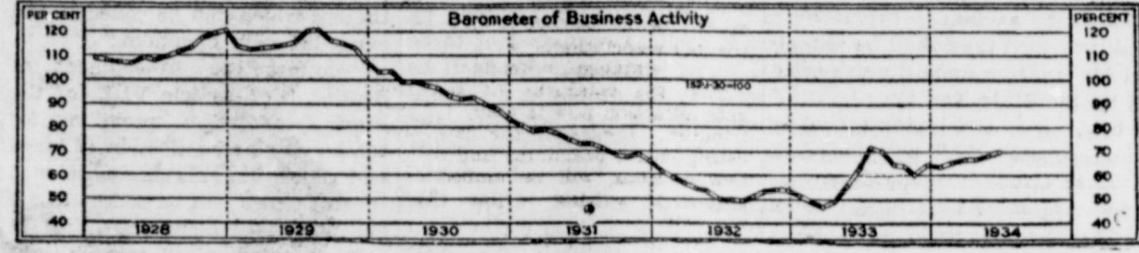

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That there be added to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas a new section to be numbered Section 2-A and to have five (5) lettered subdivisions and which section shall read as follows:

"Section 2-A.  
 (a) General management and control of the affairs of the County shall hereafter be vested in the Commissioners Court, provided that in the exercise of powers not specifically granted to the Commissioners Court by the Constitution and Amendments thereto, the Court shall be subject to the authority of the Legislature of the State, and the Court shall also be subject to all general laws of the State now in force not in conflict with the provisions of this Amendment until such laws are modified or repealed.

"(b) All duties heretofore performed by the Clerk of the District Court and the County Clerk shall hereafter be performed by an officer to be known as Record Clerk; all duties heretofore performed by the County Tax Assessor and the County Tax Collector shall hereafter be performed by one officer known as Tax Clerk; and in the counties where the sheriff performs the duties of the Tax Collector he may hereafter perform the duties of the Tax Clerk. The Record Clerk and the Tax Clerk shall be elected to hold office for a term of two (2) years and until their successors shall be elected and qualified. The Commissioners Court shall have authority to combine the office of County Treasurer and the office of County Surveyor, or to combine either, or both, of said offices with any county office. Within the maximum and minimum limits prescribed by the Legislature the Commissioners Court shall have authority to fix the compensation of all county and precinct officers except County Auditor, County Judge and County Commissioners. The Legislature shall fix the compensation of District Judges, District Attorneys, County Judges and the County Commissioners and may provide for a County Auditor and prescribe his duties and fix his compensation and the number and compensation of his assistants. The Commissioners Court shall fix the compensation of deputy assistants and clerical personnel of all precinct officers and county officers except the county auditor.

"(c) City and county officers and employees may, in addition to their duties as such city and county officers or employees, be required to perform such other similar duties for cities, towns and districts within the county, or for the county, as may be mutually agreed upon and contracted for between the Commissioners Court of said county and the governing board, or boards, of such cities, towns and districts; and the cost of such service shall be provided for in said contracts and paid by such county, cities, towns or districts into the Treasury of the county or city, town or district, as provided for in said contract. All such contracts shall be approved by the Attorney General of this State and such contracts shall not cover a period longer than two (2) years.

"(d) The Legislature shall have authority, by general law, to provide for complete forms of county government and organizations different from that provided for in this Constitution to become effective in any county when submitted in such manner as may be prescribed by the Legislature to the qualified voters of such county in an election held for such purpose and approved by a majority of the qualified voters vote in said election. Provided, however, that no such law shall impair the of the Commissioners Court to determine the compensation of county and precinct officers other than the County Auditor, to fix the number of assistants, deputies, and clerical personnel which said officers may employ; nor shall such general law change the present constitutional limitations as to particular and total tax levies for any or all county purposes; nor shall such general law change the present constitutional limitations on counties to incur public debts.

"(e) In any and all cases where provisions of the Constitution of this State are in conflict with the provisions of this Amendment (Section 2-A, Article IX) shall control; provided, however, should any county adopt a Home Rule Charter under authority of any provisions of the State Constitution or

Amendment thereto, this Amendment shall not be applicable to such county."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State, qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1934, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"For the Amendment of Article IX of the State Constitution by adding Section 2-A thereto, giving the Commissioners Court general management and control of county affairs, and authorizing the Legislature to provide more economical forms of county government and different than as now provided by law."

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16, be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 61, which shall read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000), or more, according to the then last preceding Federal census, shall hereafter be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties of this State the Commissioners' Court shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000) according to the then last preceding Federal census, the Commissioners' Court shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis. All fees earned by district, county or precinct officers shall be paid into the County Treasury where earned, for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid to the County Treasury, when collected, and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis, such fees may be retained by such officer, or paid into the Treasury of the county as the Commissioners' Court may direct. All Notaries Public, County Surveyors and Public Weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas adding Section 61 to Article XVI, abolishing the fee system of compensating all district officers and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court to determine whether County officers in counties containing less than twenty thousand (20,000) population shall be compensated on a fee basis or a salary basis; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court to determine whether county officers in counties containing less than twenty thousand (20,000) population shall be compensated on a fee basis or a salary basis; and authorizing the Commission-

ers' Court in all counties of this State to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee or a salary basis."

All land mentioned in Sections 11, 12 and 15 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, now belonging to the University of Texas shall be subject to the taxation for county and school district purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned; provided they shall be rendered for taxation upon the values fixed by the State Tax Board and that the values fixed for school district purposes shall not exceed the values fixed for county purposes on the same land; and provided that the University of Texas from the University Available Fund, shall remit annually to each of the counties and school districts in which said lands are located an amount equal to the tax imposed upon said land for county and school district purposes."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school district purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located, and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words 'Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school district purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located.'"

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 41**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5, of Article XI, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 5. Cities having more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance passed under said charter shall contain any provision inconsistent with the Constitution of the State, or of the general laws enacted by the Legislature of this State; said cities may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year, which shall exceed two and one-half per cent (2½%) of the taxable property of such city, and no debt shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund for at least two per cent (2%) thereon; provided further, that no city charter shall be altered, amended or repealed oftener than every twelve (12) months."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election, to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934; at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months;" and those opposed shall write or have

printed on their ballots the words, "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months."

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 42**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 30, Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 30. The duration of all offices not fixed by this Constitution shall never exceed two (2) years, except that the elected officials of a city that has adopted and amended its Charter as provided in Section 5, Article XI of the Constitution of Texas may, by amendment to such city's charter, hold office not to exceed four (4) years; provided, that when a Railroad Commission is created by law it shall be composed of three (3) Commissioners who shall be elected by the people at a general election for State officers, and their term of office shall be six (6) years; provided, Railroad Commissioners first elected after this Amendment goes into effect shall hold office as follows: One shall serve two (2) years, and one four (4) years and one six (6) years; their terms to be decided by lot immediately after they shall have qualified. And one Railroad Commissioner shall be elected every two (2) years thereafter. In case of vacancy in said office the Governor of the State shall fill said vacancy by appointment until the next General Election."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next General election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to so amend their charters that the elected officials of such cities may hold office not to exceed four (4) years," and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to so amend their charters that the elected officials of such cities may hold office not to exceed four (4) years."

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 3. Taxes shall be levied and collected by general laws and for public purposes only; and the total amount of revenue which the State shall be authorized to collect during such biennium from taxes, licenses, permits and fees, (except fees paid by students to state educational institutions, and except rentals, bonuses and royalties obtained from public lands and other public property) shall not exceed a sum reasonably estimated to equal the product obtained by multiplying the number of the inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50-100 (\$22.50) Dollars; provided, however, the total amount of such revenue which may be so collected, shall be reduced by the amount of any surplus funds or unexpended appropriations remaining at the close of the preceding biennium. The expenditures of the State government of funds derived from the sources above referred to shall never exceed during any biennium, a sum equal to the product obtained by multiplying the number of inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50-100 (\$22.50) Dollars, provided however, that the population of the State (in determining the amount of revenue which may be collected from taxes, licenses, permits and fees expended from the revenue thus obtained) shall be determined by the then last preceding Federal census, to which population shall be added or deducted, as the case may be, for each year that has elapsed since the last preceding Federal census, the average yearly increase or decrease of the population as shown by said Federal census when compared with the

Federal census which immediately preceded said last Federal census. Provided, further, that in case of war, riots, or insurrection, or a statewide calamity caused by earthquake, fire, flood or an epidemic which seriously threatens the health of the citizens of this State, the Legislature shall have authority, by a two-thirds vote of both Houses, to suspend for a definite period this constitutional limitation as to the amount of money which may be collected and expended during the biennium."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1934, at which election each ballot shall have printed the words:

"For the Amendment of Section 3 of Article VIII of the State Constitution providing for the levying and collection of taxes and fixing the maximum amount thereof which can be collected and expended each biennium."

"Against the Amendment of Section 3 of Article VIII of the State Constitution providing for the levying and collection of taxes and fixing the maximum amount thereof which can be collected and expended each biennium."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against, so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed amendment.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

Section 1. TAXATION TO BE EQUAL AND UNIFORM AS TO REAL ESTATE AND TO ALL REASONABLE CLASSIFICATIONS OF PROPERTY; AND OCCUPATION AND INCOME TAXES; EXEMPTIONS; LIMITATIONS UPON COUNTIES, CITIES, ETC.

"Taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform. All property in this State, whether owned by natural persons or corporations, other than municipal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, which shall be ascertained as may be provided by law. The Legislature may by general laws make reasonable classifications of all property other than real property for the purpose of taxation, and may impose different rates thereon; provided that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform. The Legislature may impose a poll tax. It may also impose occupation taxes, both upon natural persons and upon corporations, other than municipal, doing business in this State. It may also tax incomes of both natural persons and corporations other than municipal, except that persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits shall never be required to pay an occupation tax; provided that Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture, belonging to each family in the State, shall be exempt from taxation, and provided further that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town for any year on persons or corporations pursuing any profession or business, shall not exceed one-half of the tax levied by the State for the same period of such profession or business."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934. At this election, all voters favoring said amendment shall write, or have printed, on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform; and that all property in this State, other than that owned by municipal corporations, shall be taxed in proportion to its value as ascertained as may be provided by law; and providing that the Legislature may make reasonable classifications of all property, other than real property, for the purpose of taxation, and that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform; and providing further that the Legis-

lature may impose poll tax and occupation tax and income tax and exempting from occupation tax persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits; and exempting from taxation Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture, belonging to each family; and providing that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town shall not exceed one-half that levied by the State for the same period."

Within the territory of any county or counties now existing, the Legislature may by a two-thirds vote of both Houses, create new counties, combine existing counties and parts of counties and abolish existing counties and change county boundaries at will, provided that no new county shall be created with an area of less than nine hundred square miles nor shall any existing county be reduced in area so as to contain less than nine hundred square miles, unless such new county or such remaining county, and both shall have a population of not less than fifty thousand according to the last United States census prior to the date of the creation or change of such county. When any part of a county is stricken off and attached to, or created into another county, the part stricken off shall be held for and obliged to pay its proportion of all liabilities then existing, of the county from which it was taken, in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

Third. No part of any existing county shall be detached from it and attached to another existing county until the proposition for such change shall have been submitted in such a manner as may be provided by law, to a vote of the electors of both counties and shall have received a majority of those voting on the question in each."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934. At this election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed in that ballot the words:

"For the amendment to Section 1 of Article 9 of the Constitution of Texas, providing that the Legislature may by a two-thirds vote of both Houses create new counties and change the boundaries of existing counties."

Those voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write, or have printed on their ballot the words:

"Against the amendment to Section 1 of Article 9 of the Constitution of Texas, providing that the Legislature may by a two-thirds vote of both Houses create new counties and change the boundaries of existing counties."

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 9 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature shall have the power to create counties for the convenience of the people subject to the following provisions: First. In the territory of the State exterior to all counties now existing, no new counties shall be created with a less area than nine hundred square miles, in a square form, unless prevented by the pre-existing boundary lines. Should the state lines render this impracticable in border counties, the area may be less. The territory referred to may, at any time, in whole or in part, be divided into counties in advance of population and attached, for judicial and land surveying purposes, to the most convenient organized county or counties."

**CROPS' STATUS RAPIDLY NEARS CRITICAL STAGE**

**Hot Winds From Drouthy Sections Sap Donley Crops Past Week**

Half-parched row crops suffered a telling blow from the dust-laden blistering wind of Tuesday that swept over the southwest at 40 miles an hour.

Early feed crops are maturing prematurely because of the dry weather. Maize planted in April has in most instances developed good heads and bids fair to yield a good crop.

Sudan pastures are rapidly drying up affecting the cream market. Some farmers have 'dusted in' fall pasturage to take advantage of any rain that might fall.

Early cotton is showing some effects of the dry weather, and more especially on hard land. Late cotton is holding its own in a surprising manner, the growth continuing right on despite the fact that no rain in any quantity has fallen since June 16th.

Cool nights has helped no little in keeping drouth affected crops alive. Some farmers are of the opinion that rain within the next two weeks will insure a fair crop of feed stuff, and an average cotton crop.

Cotton growers on the sand state that a third of a bale to the acre is expected even though no rain falls before September. This is a very optimistic view, but is backed by experience. Just what the present hot winds will do to that view, remains to be seen.

After all is said and done, as the saying is, there yet remains an older saying that "this country can promise more and do less, and promise less and do more, than any part of the globe." We have seen it do just that many, many times. That is one reason why this section is expected to produce more than can be gathered by local people this season.
