Our Weekly CHURCH CHAT

W. E. FERRELL
Minister First Christian Church

"The Good Confession."
Acts. 8:37.

I. THE ORIGIN.
When Jesus began to preach, men formed various opinions of Him. Some said that He was a prophet; others called Him an impostor; while a few believed Him

to be the Messiah. Naturally a line was closely drawn between His friends and His enemies. The Jews used the confession of Christ as a challenge (John 9:22). Christ accepted this test and placed His approval on it (Matt. 10:32,33). Thus the confession naturally served to distinguish the followers of Christ from His enemies. In the conversation at Caesarea-Philippi (Matt. 16:13-20), the Master puts the question directly to His disciples. Peter immediately answered, "Thou art the Christ the Son of the living God." The entire system of Christianity is embraced in this statement.

II. THE SIGNIFICANCE.

It is a brief statement of the system of Christianity. It is all embracing—the only thing a man needs to believe to be saved. Every thing from the dawn of creation pointed forward to the Christ; Everything since His coming points back to Him. He is the center of Christianity, as the sun is the center of the solar system.

III. HOW THE CONFESSION IS MADE.

"With the mouth, confession is made unto salvation," Rom. 10:9, 10. It is not made with a nod of the head, nor by visiting the sick, nor by feeding the poor, but with the mouth, confession is made unto salvation, Matt. 16:15; Acts. 7:37. It is to be made before witnesses. I. Tim. 6:12,13. Those who make the good confession before men will be confessed by Christ, (Matt. 10:32,33).

IV. THE PLACE OF CONFESSION.

Confession was always made before baptism. It was the test of the fitness of the candidate for baptism. It is the oath of allegiance that must be made before a person can enter the army of Jesus Christ. The New Testament shows that making the good confession is very important, (Acts. 7:37; Matt. 10:32,33; Rom. 10:9,10. This confession will be universal, (Phil. 2:9-11) and will mean salvation or condemnation to mankind. We should all be willing to make this confession, for our own good, for the influence upon others, and for the good of the Master. Will you please God by accepting His Son as your personal Saviour and confessing and serving Him faithfully?
