MONEY MAD PATRIOTS.

In speaking to the ladies of the W. C. T. U. in session in Atlantic City Sunday, Senator Gerald P. Nye of North Dakota called attention to a greater menace to young manhood than liquor. He said:

"We would do much for ourselves and for generations to come if we would stamp out the part which chance for profit plays in bringing war upon mankind.

"During the past ten years the Federal Government has been making blue prints of future "national defense", but the plans provide for transportation of 3,000,000 American youths to battles on foreign soil.

The Senator referred to the Dupont interests as "400 percent patriots." The Duponts are alleged to have made that much profit off the human flesh fed into the carnage of the World War.

The American Legion is in favor of taking the profits out of war. The average citizen is in favor of taking the profits out of war. The fact that a majority of the national lawmakers are not in favor of taking the profits out of wars as a means of preventing wars, would indicate that they get their profits in between wars.

INDIVIDUALS OF DISTINCTION.

The Southwest is made up of a type of people better known as "Plainsmen." They are individual, distinct and apart from the tribes farther east. Most of them come from the pioneers who braved danger and hardships to establish a home in a section yet to become the homes of outstanding citizens of hospitality and culture of the nation.

Pioneers met new conditions. The soil that he ranged, the water that he drank, the game that he hunted and the crops that he grew were far different to anything to which he had been accustomed back east. The crafts that served him back east gave way to ones more exacting out here. Actual plainscraft is not a matter of finespun theory, never was and never will be. It is a matter of short grass and long drouths. Of climbing for water and digging for wood Of coping with soil and conditions that begrudge him everything-seemingly. A land that promises more and gives less, or promises less and gives more, than any other section of the world.

Despite his hardships, the pioneer found beauty on the plains, interest in the canyons with Indian legends and the mystery of the buried treasure of Spanish explorers. There is a lure in the great agricultural regions of diversified farming; the great wheat farms of the plains which constitute what is nationally known as the "bread basket of America."

Complex problems of that age of "making something out of nothing" have given way to modern homes and modern conveniences operated by means of natural gas and electricity. There is romance on paved highways that span the plains like ribbons, and her parks of today that once were hiding places from savages. The opulence of the land through the many years of development has given the people time and incentive to cultivate the art of living. The graciousness and sincerity of their every act makes a deep and lasting impression. Their dignity and cheerfulness and refinement found opportunities of expression last week in entertaining the ex-Confederates in national reunion at Amarillo.

A city of approximately forty thousand inhabitants. alone and single-handed, entertained the thousands of visitors of the Confederate Reunion. Amarillo, the metropolis of the Panhandle, was the only town in the nation to offer her services in entertaining the fast diminishing lines of the soldiers of the gray-but they did. No city, state or national contributions were asked.

The contributions made to civilization by the pioneers and plainsmen of the Southwest has never been surpassed, for while the rest of the world talked about life, our folks in the Great Southwest lived it.

HASTILY PASSED MAY JAIL COOK

New Bill Subjects Housewife To \$1,000 Fine and Year In Hoosgow

After December 1st, if the housewife should buy potatoes outside a package bearing a government stamp, she may be arrested and fined not to exceed \$1,000.00 or one year in jail.

Should one forget and buy loose spuds from a farmer, he likewise shall abide by the same penalty as the housewife, for Uncle Sam shows few special favors.

All spuds must be parked in containers bearing a revenue begin at 10:50 with the pastor stamp after December 1st. This is the law written into the AAA amendments and passed by the last session of congress.

Since congressman-men of both parties-hastened to agree to any form of plans for the AAA in order to get home and build political fences, they are now confronted by an irate public.

Potato peelings on the back door step may prove to be a clue to a snooping 'revenuer' who may follow the trail into the kitchen and drag friend wife off to jail that she may be forced to prove her innocence.

Potato peelings may become as blood spots in a cruel murder. West Texas may again resort to burying peelings of the lowly potato pretty much as the pioneers builed brands cut from cowhides.

The new law will impose a mandatory crop control requiring the Secretary of Agriculture to fix a maximum crop. There is no excess now, but the lawmakers evidently anticipated most anything since rains are again visiting the dust storm region.

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
