LATERAL ROADS ON WPA PROJECTS

One Hundred Ninety-Eight Projects to Employ 14,733 Workers

San Antonio, Texas—Jobs for 14,733 workers have been made available by the authorization of 198 new WPA projects during the past month, it has been announced by Texas Works Progress Administrator H. P. Drought.

"We intend that these projects will absorb workers who are released from completed WPA projects and those who are returning to our rolls as seasonal agricultural work ends in various parts of the state," Drought explained.

Federal allocations of \$2,543,210 and sponsors' funds amounting to \$1,103,510 will make possible the operation of the newly-authorized projects. More projects are being approved in the state WPA office as the need for them becomes apparent in various parts of Texas.

Farm-to-market roads led newly approved projects with \$1,167,830 allocated by federal officials to be used in the prosecution of 71 such jobs. Extending into 61 counties, the new lateral road program encompasses improvements to 943 miles of roadway and will employ 6,487 workers.

Brice School Will Make Improvements

WPA Labor and Materials Will Cut Expense To Minimum

Having secured the approval of the recent owners of the original \$12,000 bonds issued by the Brice school district, the remaining \$10,500 is to be refinanced to cut the interest rate and effect a saving. The present rate is 6%, and the state proposes to take up the bonds at 4%.

The money thus saved on the bonds will be used in repairing the building. The WPA will furnish all the labor and a part of the materials. A new roof is included in the new plan of improvement.

Work was begun again on this same project Sunday. R. O. Reynolds of Goldston, foreman of a crew began work near Silverton. Later his son will take charge of this crew and Mr. Reynolds will have charge of a crew at the Grant pit near Goldston.

Only four WPA men were available here due to the road work now in progress near Salt Fork.

GREEN BELT POULTRY SHOW OPENS HERE DECEMBER 3rd FOR 3-DAY SESSION

Rules and regulations governing exhibits and prizes is given below.

1. This show is open to the world. It will be held according to the rules of the American Poultry Association.
2. There will be an entry fee of 10c for each bird entered in the show.
3. Entries will be received all day Thursday, December 3, up to 4:00 p. m. All birds must be in the show room by this time.
4. All birds should be banded with numbered leg bands before they are entered.
5. Judging will be done on Friday, December 4.
6. All birds must be left in the show until after 4:00 p. m. Saturday, December 5.
7. Feed, water, and coops will be furnished by the management.
8. Names, addresses, advertising may be placed on coops only after the judging has been completed.
9. Any breed or variety recognized by the American Poultry Association will be allowed to compete for premiums.
10. Chickens only will be shown; there will be no facilities for handling turkeys, ducks, or geese. (See GREEN BELT Page 8)

Wounded Man Seeks Sympathy; Is Jailed

Alleged Victim of Hold-Up Identified As Escaped Convict From State's Prison Where He Was Serving Life Sentence For Murdering Traveling Salesman at Waco

Hall county officers turned over to Donley county's sheriff Monday of last week a wounded man claiming to be Royce Connor of Washington state, and who alleged that he had been wounded in the leg by a hold-up man on a freight train near Giles.

Sheriff Pierce took the wounded man to Adair hospital where a 32-20 bullet was located lodged in the flesh. Sheriff Pierce became suspicious of the man and jailed him on a vag charge.

It was while serving out his vagrancy sentence that Pierce sent the stranger's finger prints to the Identification Bureau at Austin. The Bureau wired Pierce as follows Monday of this week: "Your Royce Connor fingerprints identical with Roy Curry Texas prison number 78716 escaped July 10, 1936. Advise if still in custody."

After receiving this message Sheriff Pierce visited the man in his cell calling him by his right name. The prisoner responded with a laugh

DEATH RIDES HIGHWAYS AT NIGHT.

On our highways at night are wagons minus reflectors on the back end in violation of our state law. Cars with one light are operated at top speed. Trucks are stopped on the paving and all lights extinguished. All in violation of our state highway laws.

Where are the highway patrolmen? you may ask. They do not look after the highway traffic at night, it is said. This is not one of the requirements, it is further stated. Yet 62 percent of the traffic accidents and deliberate murders with a gas driven machine are committed between 8 p. m. and 4 a. m. according to insurance statistics.

Vigilante committees are being used in some places. These men are picked from the responsible citizenship. It is their duty to report violations of the law, and to stop it when they see the law being violated. They each have a commission as a deputy sheriff. Louisiana takes the lead with Colorado following. Shall Texas be driven to this course of procedure in order to protect its citizenship?

AMERICA AND THE SPANISH WAR.

Except for the fact that the human carnage in Spain is greater than our auto atrocities on our highways, the war means little to the average American as an attraction. As a matter of fact, England alone has more at stake in the war than America. Though apparently a civil war, it is really a war between communists and fascists. France and Russia are aiding the communists. Germany and Italy are backing the fascists. If the communists win, Germany and Italy will be in a bad plight all-round. If the fascists win,

England and America will be shut out of the Mediterranean trade and the entire European trade map altered. Neither communism or fascism have any use for democracies. America's opportunity lies on this side of the Atlantic. That is why President Roosevelt is conferring with South American nations at the present time. America must have a market, and must have moral support from the western hemisphere.

CONGRESS AND WINDOW LARCENY.

What is termed "window larceny" will have an inning when the next congress meets, according to James J. Wilson, who proposes a bill to stop various forms of merchant sales. He says:

"Many advertising agencies and merchants were not aware that to misrepresent advertised matter was a misdemeanor punishable by a penitentiary sentence up to three years.

He charged that even "many of our reputable merchants are confusing the public," committing "window larceny" by selling goods that are represented in windows by articles of higher quality. This has been especially prevalent, he said, in selling rayon for natural silk and cotton for linen.

It has been particularly bad, he said, where merchants take space and sell by misrepresentative window advertising in localities to which thousands of consumers are attracted by neighboring reputable retailers who spend millions in ethical advertising.

"This fraudulent advertising is a cancer on the social body," he said. "It is not romantic, and it receives no public notice, but it is commercial crime right out in the open. It can be stopped much easier than law enforcement will ever stop gambling, prostitution and illegal liquor drinking."

In stores having endless closing-out sales, he said it had often been found that the goods were priced higher and were of lower quality than in ordinary shops. He pointed out that many States limit the time of closing-out sales and that some do not permit a merchant to replenish his stock when he has announced such a sale."

Cow, Sow and Hen Again.

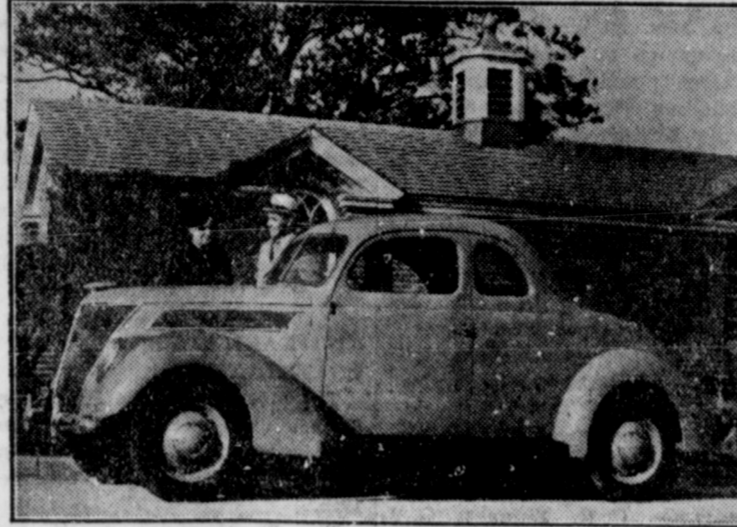
