# **Donley County Farmers** Eligible For Disaster Assistance

US Sen. Phil Gramm has announced the farmers in Hall County are eligible to apply for low-interest emergency loans to help recover from crop losses caused by flooding, hail and high winds which occurred between May 25, 1995 and June 5, 1995. In addition, Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman designated Donley County as a primary disaster area due to the losses caused by a tornado which occurred on June 8, 1995.

For those who cannot obtain credit through normal channels, the US Department of Agriculture will make loans available at below-market interest rates to family farmers.

In addition, six other Texas counties have been named as contiguous counties and therefore are eligible for assistance. The counties affected by the flooding, hail, and high winds are Collingsworth, Cottle, Donley, and

The counties that were named as contiguous disaster counties due to the tornado were Armstrong, Carson, Gray, Briscoe, Collingsworth, Hall, and

The Consolidated Farm Service Agency (CFSA), which will supervise the loan program, is charged with providing aid to the farmers and ranchers in order to assist their economic recovery from natural disasters.

Local CFSA county offices can provide affected farmers with further information and assist them in completing applications for assistance.

# Clarendon **Has Local Internet Site**

Clarendon moved into the fast lane of the information superhighway recently with the opening of Clarendon Cybernet.

The new business offers Clarendon computer users the opportunity to access the Internet without incurring long distance charges.

The Internet originated about 20 years ago when a branch of the Pentagon linked the computers of several of its researchers. These computers were located in universities and research centers all over the world. This network of linked computers allowed researchers to communicate with one another easily and to share informa-

Today the Internet is no longer strictly for military use. It is widely used by schools, universities, businesses, and private citizens. The 1995 edition of the Business Almanac and Sourcebook estimates that some 5 million people are currently Internet

The Internet and its companion network the World Wide Web can be used to access information on virtually any subject imaginable. Users can find the latest scientific papers, medical data, news, or current political information just to name a few subjects. Internet users can also communicate with each other by posting to electronic bulletin boards or by sending each other electronic mail (E-

To be able to access the Internet, a person needs a computer, a modem (a device which allows computers to "talk" to each other over phone lines). and the appropriate computer soft-

The Clarendon Independent School District equipped its classrooms with computers and linked them to the Internet last year through the Texas Educational Network (TE-NET). However, if other Clarendon citizens wanted to use the Internet, they had to incur long distance phone charges when their computers dialed access numbers in Amarillo or in towns even further away.

But that is no longer the case. Now, for a low monthly fee, computer users in Clarendon can get on the Internet by dialing a local number provided by Clarendon Cybernet.

Officials with Clarendon Cybernet believe that Clarendon is now the smallest community anywhere to have local access to the

# Program To Be Presented On Texas A Tomorrow Fund

"Tomorrow's Education at Today's Prices" is the slogan for a new program out of the State Comptroller's Office. By paying into the program, known as the Texas Tomorrow Fund, parents, or other interested parties, may lock in the price of tuition for one, two, three, or four years of credit hours at any state supported college in the state. Some of the major points of the program are:

It allows Texas families to lock in the cost of tomorrow's college tuition and required fees at today's

It covers tuition and fees at state universities and can give a big boost toward covering the tuition

and fees at a private school. It allows a variety of programs, plans, and payment options.

The enrollment program for 1996 runs from January 2 until March

While it pays tuition and fees, it does not pay for room and board, books, transportation, or optional



Happy Independence Day!

Saturday marks the 160th anniversary of Texas Inrendence from Mexico. It was on March 2, 1836. hat delegates, meeting at Washington-on-the-Brazos. drafted the Texas Declaration of Independence, breaking their ties with Mexico and forming the Republic of Texas.



This past weekend, The History Channel aired a documentary on the Alamo which was a very good portrayal for the most part. Two things about that show need addressing though.

First, after one commercial break, Roger Mudd leads back into the show with this line: "We now return to America's war for independence in the American buttle at the Alamo..." Excuse me. Mr. Modd. but that was very much a distinctly Texas buttle for Texas independence.

It is true that most of the volunteers inside the Alamo were Anglo-Americans who had migrated to Texas, but we should never forget the many Tejanos that took up arms against their own Mexican countrymen to fight for Texas. I think that great men like Juan Seguin and Lorenzo de Zavala would balk at the idea they were fighting for America.

The second element that needs some clarity is the show's portrayal of Gen. Sam Houston. He was depicted as being indifferent to the plight of the men at the Alamo, as turning his back on them, and as refusing to send reinforcements.

What they failed to mention is that Houston had told them not to go to Bexar (San Antonio) in the first place. But the Texas Army was one that tended to be run by consensus of the soldiers rather than by following the orders of officers. As a result the small band of volunteers headed off for San Antonio and took the town.

Hearing of this, Houston told them not to try to take the Alamo. They took the Alamo. Houston told them to blow it up and get out because it was a death trap. The decided to stay and face Santa Anna.

Houston did not abandon those men; they were there of their own free will.

With historical retrospect, the Alamo heroes bought valuable time for the delegates at Washington-on-the-Brazos. Time that was used to draft a Declaration of Independence. Time that was used to carve out a new republic. Time Gen. Houston used to prepare his army for the major battle to come. Time that was paid for with the blood of those brave men inside the Alamo.

Vhile the testing period begins in March, it does not end until May. Carson County The schedule is as follows: (Clarendon High School, sophomores and non-mastery juniors and seniors) March 5, writing; March 6, Mathematics; March 7, Reading; (Clarendon Junior High and Elementary) March 5, Writing (Grades 4 and 8 only); April 30, Mathematics (grades 3 through 8); May 1, Reading (grades 3 through 8); May 2, Social Studies (grade 8 only); May 3, Science (grade 8 only).

These tests are called Exit-Level because each student must show mastery on them in order to graduate. Also, if a student scored high enough on TAAS, he will be exempted for TASP another standardized test (administered by the Texas Higher Education Board) all students entering a Texas college or university must pass before they gain more than nine hours on their college transcript.



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

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# Check It Out!

Why go to the library, other than to check out a book? One good reason is to view the rare articles that are encased by the south wall in Burton Memorial Library. If you have not yet discovered these treasures, you are truly in for a delightful treat.

The glass case in which these articles are displayed, and which is very much appreciated, is on loan to the library by Mac and Bill Stavenhagen in memory of Ira Stavenhagen.

One of the first things one might notice are possessions of Pioneer Doctor Jerome D. Stocking, which date back to 1885. Birth forceps, a brass tongue depressor, and eye cup are three of the interesting items included in Dr. Stocking's collection.

A picture of Clarendon jeweler, Dr. Spiller, and druggist, Dr. Addison M. King, may also be viewed. The New England Primer; Great Gavelston Disaster, and Oliver Wendell Holmes' Autocrat of a Breakfast Table are books which have been donated to the rare collection.

For you who really like to take trips down memory lane, a copy of a 1915 Clarendon College annual, The Wester, awaits you. A few of the many names that Clarendon citizens will recognize are Burkhead, Moore, Chism, Burton, Slover who served on the faculty during that year; Baker, Simpson, and Powell who were three of the Staff members; and Carpenter, Slay, Baird, and Xedrick who were members of the Honor Council.

Current college students might find it interesting to compare their 1996 organizations to the 1915 Debater's Club, Ministerial Association, Lawyer's Club, Literary Society, and others. There as even a Big Mouth Club whose motto was, "When I open my mouth, let no dog bark", which can be found on page 107 in The Wester.

Various articles such as "Cost of War" by Hubert L. Stone, which gives facts concerning the United States and other countries, are also in this annual. Readers might be interested in the type of jokes that were "going around" in 1915. These can be found, beginning on page 126.

Baseball, Tennis, and Football are three sports that were prominent at Clarendon College during this period of time. I feel this brief review of the College Wester would not be complete without a quick "run-down" of their football schedule. Clarendon won most of their games that year. The opening game on September 14, 1914, with Shamrock YMCA resulted in Clarendon's victory of 15-0. The team went on to play Goodnight, Seth Ward, and NMMI. They won their sixth game against Amarillo Military Institute 30-0. When Seth Ward, Clarendon's opposing team in the seventh game, was interviewed concerning their thoughts about Clarendon College, they were quoted as commenting, "They are a big fat-bunch of babies, and every one is as yellow as they make 'em". According to page 83 in The Wester, Seth Ward went as far as to present CC with a nice fresh bottle of milk. Needless to say, this gesture made Clarendon more determined than ever, and they triumphed over Seth Ward 13-0 that evening.

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
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# **Bulldogs Defeat NMMI, Lose Final** Game To Redlands In Overtime

# New Mexico "Gut-Shoots" Texas Hunters

In a stunning display of greed, selfishness, and New Mexican Jingoism, Cornell, Commissioner Pct. #3 Ronny Hill, the Legislature in Santa Fe has passed a bill that will do irreparable harm to the future of big game hunting in the state of New Mexico. Disguised as a measure which will allow additional hunting preference to the natives of New Mexico, Senate Bill #193 (if signed into law by Gov. Gary Johnson) will limit the number of non-resident hunters to seventeen per cent, AND force all non-resident big game hunters to hire a licensed outfitter or guide when hunting on public lands.

The idea sounds simple, and it is very appealing to New Mexican politicos anxious to curry favor with the locals by a public gouging of out-of-state hunters. According to an AP wire story, "Most of us feel that because we live here year-round and support the state through taxes...we ought to have a little better shot at an elk hunt in the quality areas," said Larry Caudill of Albuquerque a hunter who helped develop the legislation. "We're tired of being out-competed on our own home ground."

Mr. Caudill doesn't mention that the land under discussion is National Forest land that is owned by all the people of America and not just by those

citizens who live in New Mexico. Caudill also fails to point out that effective April 1996 residents of New Mexico receive a bargain basement price on big game hunting, while out-ofstate hunters must pay an outrageous penalty for the same privilege of hunting of federal property

A New Mexican pays only \$25 for a general hunting license, and can legally hunt antelope at \$30, quality deer at \$23, either-sex elk for only \$75, and big horn sheep for a miserly \$90.

Total cost to locals for hunting on public land is \$220.

For this same hunting opportunity an out-of-state hunter pays \$300 for quality deer, \$465 for either-sex elk, \$400 for antelope, and \$3,000 for big horn sheep. Total cost to non-residents of New Mexico who want to hunt on public land is a staggering \$4,665!!! So much for equality under New Mexico

These discriminatory hunting fees are already law for the 1996 season. It is the proposed law for 1997 in Senate Bill \$293 that will force very nonresident to hire a guide. This will increase the cost of hunting another \$1,500 per hunter per animal (drunks, wanabe's, and "sorry excuses for guides" may charge less.)

Hunters hoping to influence Gov. Johnson to veto this latest penalty on non-New Mexicans can call (505) 827-3063, or write Honorable Governor Gary Johnson, State Capitol, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87503. Time is critical and now is our only opportunity.

If New Mexico can do this to hunters, it is just a matter of time until they petrate a similar outrage on non-resident anglers.

Think about it, and do something, NOW.





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
