VOTE TO ACCEPT HIGHWAY PLANS

May Purchase Right-of-Way With Road And Bridge Funds—Car Tax

The highway problem of Donley county took on new angles Monday when the majority of the County Commissioners voted to adopt two plans of action.

The first plan calls for the purchase of right-of-way across the county. This to be accomplished by using money from the road and bridge fund, car license tax and the loan of \$15,000 from the State Highway department. Warrants are to be issued to make up the required amount should more funds be necessary.

The second plan is to create a road district leaving the east side of the county out of the reckoning. During the deliberations, G. W. Beck was bitterly opposed to a bond or warrant issue affecting

his precinct, that of No. 4. J. Les Hawkins, representing Precinct No. 3, opposed any issue that was objectionable to the majority of his constituents.


