## Scouting For Big Bass

Talking about fishing with licensed quide RON SMYER of Amarillo is like telling an insurance agent that you might need another policy. Ron's enthusiasm will convince you that now is the time to take action. It is easy to see why both the High Country Chevy Dealers Association and talking about fishing and he is eager to share his wealth of fishing knowledge.

Right now, Ron recommends a scouting trip to Lake Baylor. While the bass fishing is very slow because of the 39 degree water temperature, the frigid waters are extremely clear and offer anglers an opportunity to see underwater structure that will be obscured by plankton when the water warms later this spring.

According to Ron, the floods of 1995 not only filled Lake Baylor up to the spillway but also washed hundreds of trees into submerged log jams that will provide perfect homes for trophy largemouth bass.
Historically, Baylor is famous for big bass. Each year dozens of black bass over ten pounds are caught and released. In fact, just to get your picture included on the "bragging board" at the bait shop takes a bass over five

Thanks to the introduction of the Florida strain of black bass, most anglers wait for a ten pounder, and then they frequently opt for a fiber glass replica mount. bass and these new replicas. For bass and these new replicas. For examples of both kinds of fish mounts, visit Gerald Sitton at the Sporsman's Taxidermy Shop in Amarillo. One great trophy is still at the lake, getting bigger, and producing offspring with the right genetics.
