After recovery from of Lelia Lake and Mr. and Mrs. Mr. and Mrs. Richmond Bowlin. the first shock of this all-important message The News summoned its staff and crew and worked feverishly on the issuance of a Special Edition-one of the few and the most important published by this newspaper in its long and concientious history of service to this community.

Emblazoned across the first page in stalwart letters was the simple statement, "The War is Over." This was followed by brief details of the signing of the Armistice on the special train of the allied command on that lonely siding in Northern France. This issue was eagerly bought by the cheering citizens and a hundred copies were sold to the news agent on the west-bound Fort Worth & Denver train which had left the Metropolitan centers too early for their special editions of the great dailies'.

Cheering in ecastic abandon 2500 men, women, and children marched and surged the length of Kearney Street and overflowed into the by streets. In the early afternoon a huge parade headed by the American Flag traversed the streets and a funeral pyre to burn the Kaiser in effigy was lit in the middle of Kearney Street at the bank corners. These proceedings and a thousand personal recollections crowd the memory of that November day. And much the same spectacle was enacted in every city, town, and village

Mention should not be necessary of the great difference in public sentiment and personal spirit as we approach the celebration of Armistice Day in 1932. There jubilation and hope reigned, in many instances dark dis-

pair and inaction now reign. This difference should not exist. The American people are the most fortunate in the whole wide world and despite financial reverses the government is sound and will emerge unimpaired if this people will give its loyal support and sincere attention to its problems.

Let us draw a new vision from the memories of 1918 and the train of good things we have enjoyed before and since. Let us face the morning of November 11, 1932 in a better attitude than we have hitherto displayed and with a courage and hope that will not be denied.




