THE LATHER OF ADVERTISING

I hastened into a barber shop the other day and asked if I could be shaved in five minutes. "Yep!" was the reply. The barber quickly applied the soap. He began lathering and lathering and kept on lathering until I felt sure I would miss my train. Still he kept on plying his soap brush. I was saying to myself, "Why doesn't he quit this process and get busy with his razor?" That would have been my way of shaving myself in a hurry. When he did finally take up his razor, the job was over in a jiffy. And I caught my train.

The incident, for some reason or other, begot this thought in my mind. Lathering is to shaving very much the same thing as advertising is to selling. If you do enough preliminary work and do it properly, so that groundwork has been thoroughly prepared, then the resistance is very greatly reduced, and it is possible either to shave with less trouble.

A good many business men are as foolish as I would have been in trying to shave myself in a hurry. They don't use enough advertising before starting to try to get results. They don't apply enough advertising lather.

THE HOME MERCHANT WINS

Mail order houses have a peculiar attraction. It is especially so during times like these. Good men in Wilbarger county, just like our brothers all over America are sending their hard earned dollars for merchandise sold by the Mail Order, and are kidding themselves into the belief that they buy bargains.

Many will remember that more than a year ago when Chicago dispatches announced that two of the largest Mail Order houses had cut the price of sugar to 16c. Vernon merchants were advertising sugar half a cent cheaper. A similar comparison was made in spices.

The Quannah Tribune-Chief printed Friday prices on an invoice received by citizens there from the Mail Order house compared with the prices on the some articles by Quannah grocers. Nearly a dozen articles were included, and the footing showed a saving of \$14.16 by trading with the local merchant.

The Mail Order invoice footed up grocer totaled \$36.85. This, of course, ignores the fact that the same merchant helps to pave the streets and highways, supports the school, and is a friend whenever you are in need.—Vernon non Record.

INCOME TAX IN NUTSHELL

WHO? Single persons who had net income of \$1,000 or more, or gross income of \$5,000 or more. Married couples who had net income of \$2,000 or more, or gross income of \$5,000 or more.

WHEN? March 15, 1922, is final date for filing returns and making first payments.

WHERE? Collector of internal revenue for the district in which the person lives, or has his principal place of business.

HOW? Full directions on Form 1040A and Form 1040; also the law and regulations.

WHAT? Four per cent normal tax on taxable income up to \$4,000 in excess of exemption. Eight per cent normal tax on balance of taxable income. Surtax from 1 per cent to 65 per cent on net incomes over \$5,000 for the year 1921.

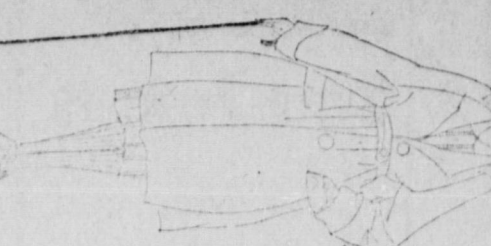

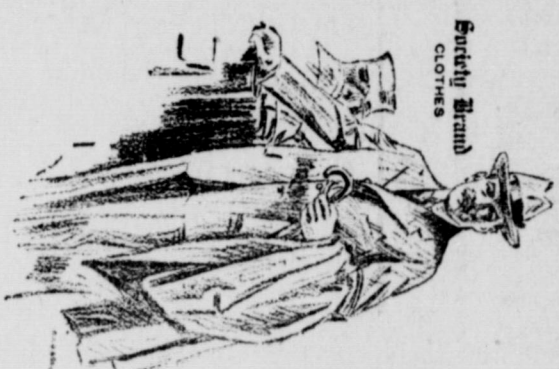

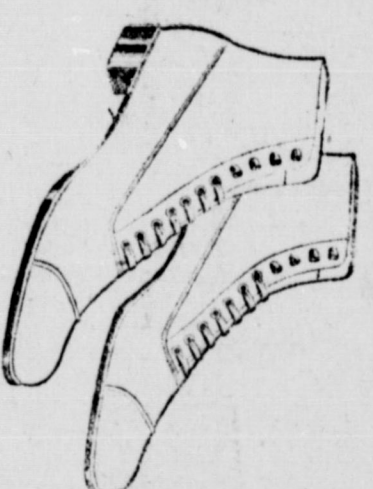

Throughout the course of our history in this country teachers and statesmen have been inclined to ask, when confronted by some difficult question: "What did Washington say about this?" And it is seldom that they have not found some satisfactory answer to their query.

At the present time, we are confronted with many problems which are summoned up in the words True Americanism, and here again we are inclined to turn to the writings and sayings of Washington to see if we cannot get from him some suggestive solutions for our problem. In this we are not disappointed, for in his day, as in our own, the people of the United States were confronted with the condition of having within the borders of their country members of various European races whom fate had thrown together on these shores, but who were, as Washington termed them, in his Farewell Address: "Citizens by birth, or by choice of a common country."

In speaking further to all of his people he said: "The country has a right to your affections." To those who were born here, as well as to those who came here of their own volition, he said: "The name of American, which belongs to you in your national capacity, must always exalt the just pride of Patriotism, more than any appellation derived from local discriminations."



INCOME TAX FACTS

In making out his income tax return for 1921, the average taxpayer will find a considerable saving in comparison with the amount of tax paid on the same income for 1920.

The exemption provided by the revenue act of 1921 are \$1,000 for single persons (the term including widows, widowers, divorcees, and persons separated from husband and wife by mutual agreement), \$2,500 for married persons whose net income was \$5,000 or less, and \$2,000 for married persons whose net income was \$5,000 or more. Under the revenue act of 1918 the personal exemption allowed a married person was \$2,000, regardless of the amount of net income. The personal exemption allowed a married person applies also to the head of a family, man or woman who supports in one household one or more relatives by blood marriage, or adoption.

The exemption for dependents—a person who receives his chief support from the taxpayers and who is under 18 years of age or incapable of self-support because mentally or physically defective—is increased from \$200 to \$400.

The act requires that a return be filed by every single person whose net income for 1921 was \$1,000 or more, every married person whose net income was \$2,000 or more, and by every person—single or married—whose gross income was \$5,000 or more.

The requirement to file a return of gross income of \$5,000 or more regardless of net income is a new provision. Net income is gross income less certain specified deductions for business expenses, losses, bad debts, etc., which are fully explained on the forms.

Returns must be filed by married couples whose combined net income for 1921, including that of dependent minor children, equaled or exceeded \$2,000, or if the combined gross income equaled or exceeded \$5,000.

The period for filing returns is from January 1 to March 15, 1922. Heavy penalties are provided for failure or "willful refusal" to file a return on time.

Forms 1040A for incomes of \$5,000 and less and 1040 for incomes in excess of \$5,000 may be obtained from the offices of collectors of internal revenue and branch offices. The tax may be paid in full at the time of filing the return, or in four equal installments, due on or before March 15, June 15, September 15, and December 15.

In this column we will print a series of articles from various sources dealing with several phases of the so-called "Modernist" movement in all churches in America and on their foreign fields. Following is an excerpt from a paper by Rev. Hugh W. White of China:

"The China Bible Union"

"This great movement has gotten through its second summer cut its teeth and is growing. The membership felt most deeply the worldwide misunderstanding of their aims and motives. All through the summer season the Union were much in prayer for guidance lest mistakes be made. Two specified days of prayer were observed. And truly God led us.

"A number of advance steps have been taken, by the Union. The most important had reference to the National Christian Conference called to meet May 5 to 14 1922. This movement is pan-Christian in its conception. And the objective is a permanent organization, the National Christian Council.

"What concerns the Bible Union is the fact that among the leading promoters of this conference are men of Modernist views. HENCE, while the great majority of China missionaries are true to the fundamentals of Christianity, this conference cannot stand for them. Of the five Commissions to report, Commission III is to report on "The Message of the Church." As to the contents of this message, there was a strong four hour discussion as to whether it should include the work of Christ as our Redeemer. Being unable to decide, they left it to the chairman of this commission III, Dr. Cheng Ching Ye, to frame his own message.

"Think of it! Men who claim to represent the Christian Church in her message to China, cannot say that we are here to preach salvation by the death of Christ, and unless one Chinese Christian dares to put Him in, the Redeemer is left out and our message to China is

merely 'Social righteousness.'

"This fact shows the reason for the Bible Union.

"The interdenominational institutions are in the same condition. Men strong on the fundamentals are not wanted in such institutions. They might 'provoke discussion' by preaching that the whole Bible is true! A certain mission was asked to send a man to the seminary in which they co-operate. But they were given to understand that the only man who would be acceptable was a certain young man, just learning to preach in Chinese."

Nevertheless, God will go marching on followed by those who are faithful, although they might appear simple to the wise of this world.

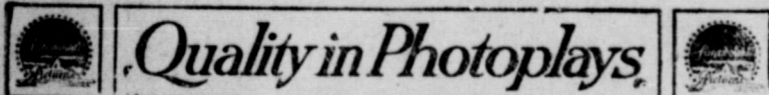
