Farm Ownership Program Helped

Recent Congressional changes in the insured mortgage program of the Farmers Home Administration will broaden opportunities of farmers to obtain real estate credit. L. J. Cappelman, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration of Dallas, announced today.

An assured market for insured mortgages and an increase of

half of one percent in the interest rate are provided in amendments to the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act, approved June 19, to encourage greater participation of private capital in the farm ownership program.

Lenders who extend credit to eligible farmers for the purchase, enlargement or development of farms under the insured farm mortgage program may assign the mortgage to the Government and receive payment in full at the end of a specified period established by the Government.

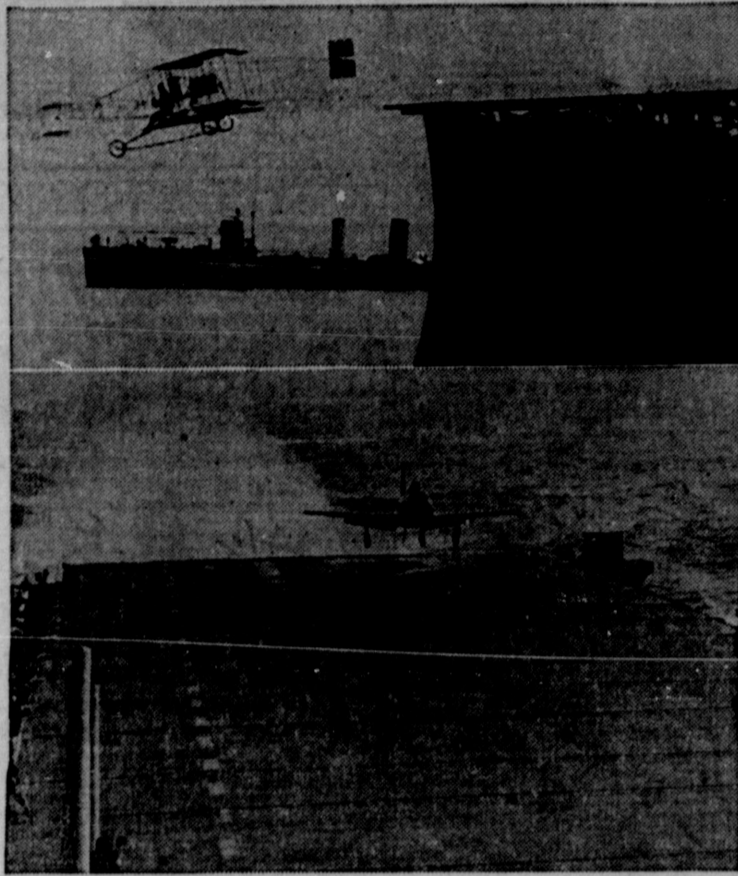

THERE HAD TO BE A FIRST TIME



Advances in American naval ships and equipment have been marked throughout the century and a half of the Navy Department's history by important milestones of progress. One of these was the first flight from the deck of a ship, made in 1910 by Lt. Eugene Ely, when he took off from a miniature flight deck on the foredeck of the USS Birmingham (upper). Three years later naval aviation had its actual start when Admiral George Dewey signed the report of the General Board, which recommended the establishment of a Naval air arm. Today aviation is one of the elements in the three-pronged American Navy. Flowering of "Navy Air" can be symbolized in such scenes as the lower photo in which an F-11 "Fury" jet-propelled Navy fighter, makes a landing aboard the USS Boxer while the ship cruises off the California coast. The loans will carry an interest rate of 3 percent and 1 percent insured mortgage charge.

The credit is extended only to farmers who cannot obtain adequate financing from private or

cooperative sources. Repayment of the loans is fully guaranteed by the Government. The loans are limited to 90 percent of the borrowers total investment in the farm and are repayable over a

40 year period.

Since the first insured loan was made last October, 333 loans averaging approximately \$7,000 have been closed or approved. In addition, 9,200 applicants for insured loans have been approved and their applications are being held pending the location of suitable farms or lenders willing to finance the loans with government insurance. Up to \$100,000,000 worth of loans may be insured in any one year.

Principal activity has been in eight states. Minnesota has closed or approved 31 loans, Kansas 30, Wisconsin and Michigan 27 loans each, Missouri 24, Alabama 23, Georgia 22 and Texas 11. Of the lenders, 84 percent have been banks serving rural areas. Other loans have been made by life insurance companies, individuals, state retirement funds, and subsidiaries of farm organizations.

The insured mortgage program is based on experience gained in the making of direct government farm purchase loans to approximately 60,000 farmers, including

8,000 veterans during the past 10 years. Approximately 9,000 of these loans have been paid in full from farm income 30 or more years ahead of schedule.

Congress has appropriated \$15,000,000 for direct farm ownership loans during the coming fiscal year.

In most respects the direct and insured loans are similar. A farm purchased, enlarged or improved with either direct or insured loans cannot have a value greater than the average value of all efficient family-type farms in the county in which it is located. No loan can be made if the total investment of the borrower will be more than the reasonable value of the farm based on its long time earning capacity. All loans are accompanied by supervision in im-

proved farming methods.

A borrower cannot qualify for a direct loan, however, if he is able to make a 10 percent or more down payment on the farm and can obtain an insured loan from other credit sources.

Approximately 70,000 applications are on hand for direct and insured loans, of which 38,000 are from veterans.

Veterans receive preference for both direct and insured loans.

Weekly SURPLUS NEWS WAA

Failure of universal military training measures to win Congressional approval has resulted in return of at least two southwestern army camps to the War Assets Administration for disposal as surplus. Camp Maxey, near Paris, Texas, and Camp Gruber, near Muskogee, Oklahoma, both have been re-scheduled for sale after having been "frozen" at request of the armed forces. However, WAA's regional real prop-

erty office declared that re-appraisals and classification of remaining property at these installations will now be necessary before sale of buildings and facilities can actually be put under way. The public is asked to refrain from submitting applications until sales programs at these sites have been completed. Full announcement will then be given to all disposal plans.

Release of additional materials by federal agencies and national defense authorities will bring to nearly one million dollars the total inventory of war surplus to be marketed in Houston July 9. Houston sites to be cleared simultaneously in this big roundup of

stored materials are WAA warehouse 6, Reed Roller Bit Plant, Hughes Strut Plant, Good Year Rubber Company, Converted Rice Milling Company, and the former Houston Customer Service Center. Among choice items to be included in the several hundred competitive bid lots offered will be automobiles, hand tools, fountain pens, cafe equipment, aviator's equipment, scrap metal, bar steel and machine tools.

A publicity campaign to acquaint the people of Texas and the southwest with the development possibilities inherent in this region's surplus war plants will be launched in late July. One object of the campaign will be to correct a widely held impression that surplus industrial plants are being held by the government for defense purposes. Actually, all except a designated few may be bought by anyone agreeing to provisions of the national security clause.

Seven hundred Amarillo Army Air Field buildings to be sold July 7 and 8 will be the last opportunity for West Texans to buy surplus buildings from the War Assets Administration in that area. Public sales of camp structures at Dalhart, Pampa, Childress, Lubbock and other Panhandle sites have cleaned out WAA's remaining building inventory. Aside from a few buildings which may be offered at scattered locations by sealed bid disposals, the WAA anticipates no further sales of buildings in West Texas. Therefore ranchers, businessmen and builders of the area are urged to take advantage of the Amarillo public high bid sale. Inspection of the property will continue through July 6.

Bargain seekers in industrial equipment and related supplies will want to attend a War Assets

sale to be held in New Orleans July 9. A stock of various materials which originally cost the government \$300,000 will be offered to veterans and other high bidders. The goods are on inspection at the Higgins Aircraft plant, Michoud, Louisiana, and the New Orleans Consolidated Vultee plant. Awards from floor bidding will be made at the New Orleans plant. In the lots will be industrial supplies, metal working machines, welding equipment and other general products.

Telephone and electric distribution systems of the Big Spring Army Air Field are on sale to both priority buyers and the general public for removal from the grounds. Proposals for purchase of these utility facilities will be considered from priority claimants until July 6 and from the general public until July 19. Awards will be made by the War Assets Administration's regional office of real property disposal.

Health Notes

AUSTIN—"Few, if any, people have escaped the inconvenience and the annoyance of athlete's foot. It is said to be the third most common skin disease of the summer, and, contrary to popular opinion, the fifth most prevalent disorder in the winter."

So says Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, in a recent press release. Dr. Cox explains that athlete's foot is due to a small, mold-like growth or fungus which thrives on moist, warm parts of the body as the feet.

"The infection of athlete's foot is usually gotten directly or indirectly from someone else," Dr. Cox says, cautioning that the most likely places to contract the infection are around bath houses, locker rooms, and other public places where people go barefoot.

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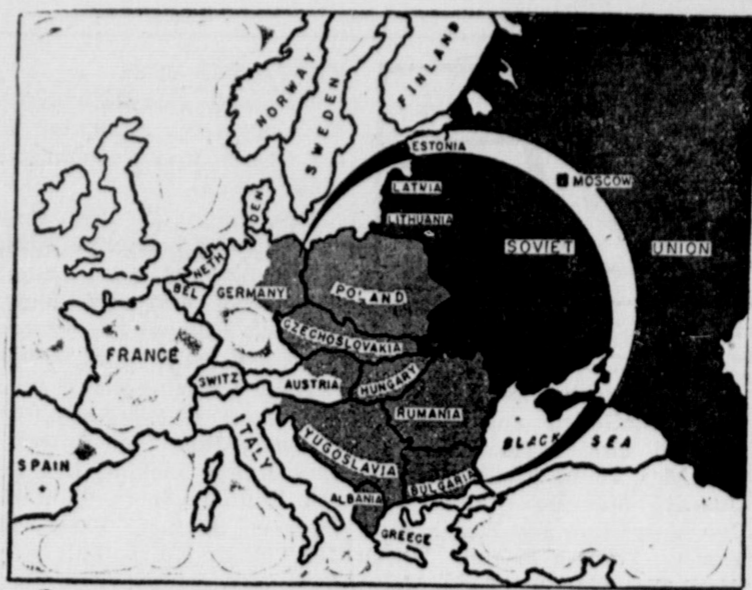

Veterans' News

Veterans who lose subsistence, compensation or pension checks should notify immediately the appropriate Veterans Administration Regional Office.

VA said a veteran losing such a check should write a letter giving his full name and address, his claim number and the date and amount of the check. He should also state what the check was for and the circumstances

surrounding its loss. On being notified of the check's loss, VA determines first if it may have been found and returned to the U. S. Treasury. If so, the check will be re-mailed to the veteran. If not, VA will request the Treasury to stop payment and take necessary steps to reimburse the veteran.

A veteran who finds his check after reporting its loss should notify VA and hold the check until he has been advised by the Treasury that action to stop payment has been withdrawn.

1948 Premium List Texas State Fair Mailed Recently

First copies of the official premium list of the 1948 State Fair of Texas, to be held October 9-24, were mailed out recently to farmers, ranchers, and pure-bred livestock breeders in all parts of the nation in response to the greatest early season interest ever experienced by the Fair, it has been announced by State Fair officials.

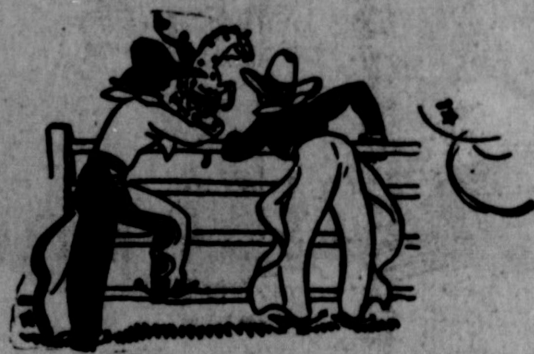

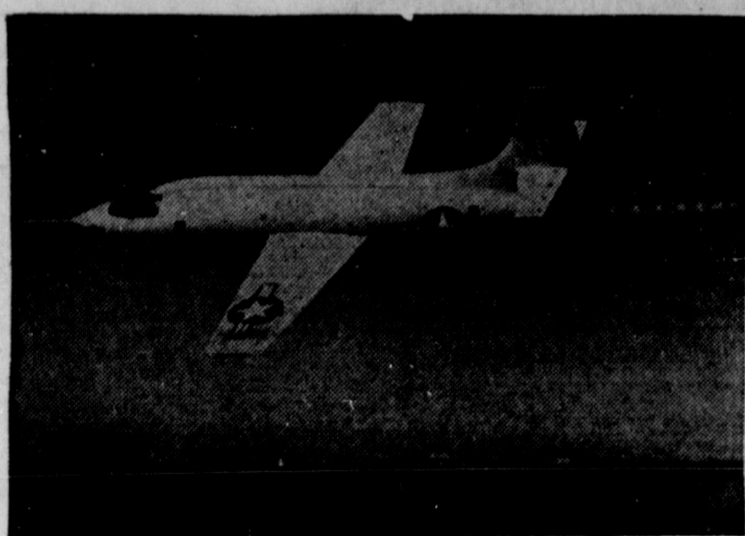

Many people do not know that the State of Texas gives free educational training, furnishes trade tools and supplies, finds jobs, and buys hearing aids or artificial limbs for handicapped civilians to help them prepare for good, steady jobs.

Anyone 16 years old or older who has a permanent physical handicap is eligible for services of the State Rehabilitation Division. The State program is not just for veterans; it is for any deserving handicapped citizen.

The State Rehabilitation Division can:

1. Pay fees and tuition to college or business, trade, beauty, barber, or technical schools to

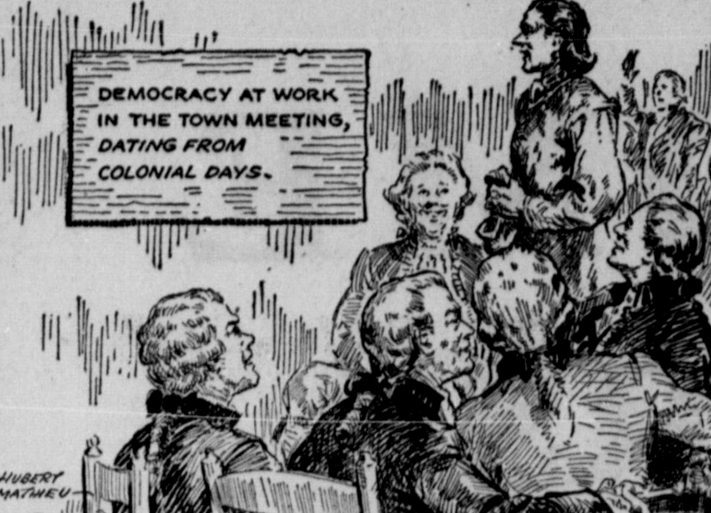

2. Furnish hearing aids, artificial limbs, or occupational tools and equipment.
3. Pay for hospitalization and surgery to correct an employment handicap (such as a rupture) if the person can not pay for the operation.
4. Pay board and room during a short vocational course.
5. Arrange and pay for on-the-job or employment training.
6. Help a handicapped person find a permanent job or career.

People with employment handicaps because of any crippling condition, T. B., diabetes, heart trouble, loss of vision in one eye, hard of hearing, speech defects, etc. are usually eligible for help from the State Rehabilitation Division. 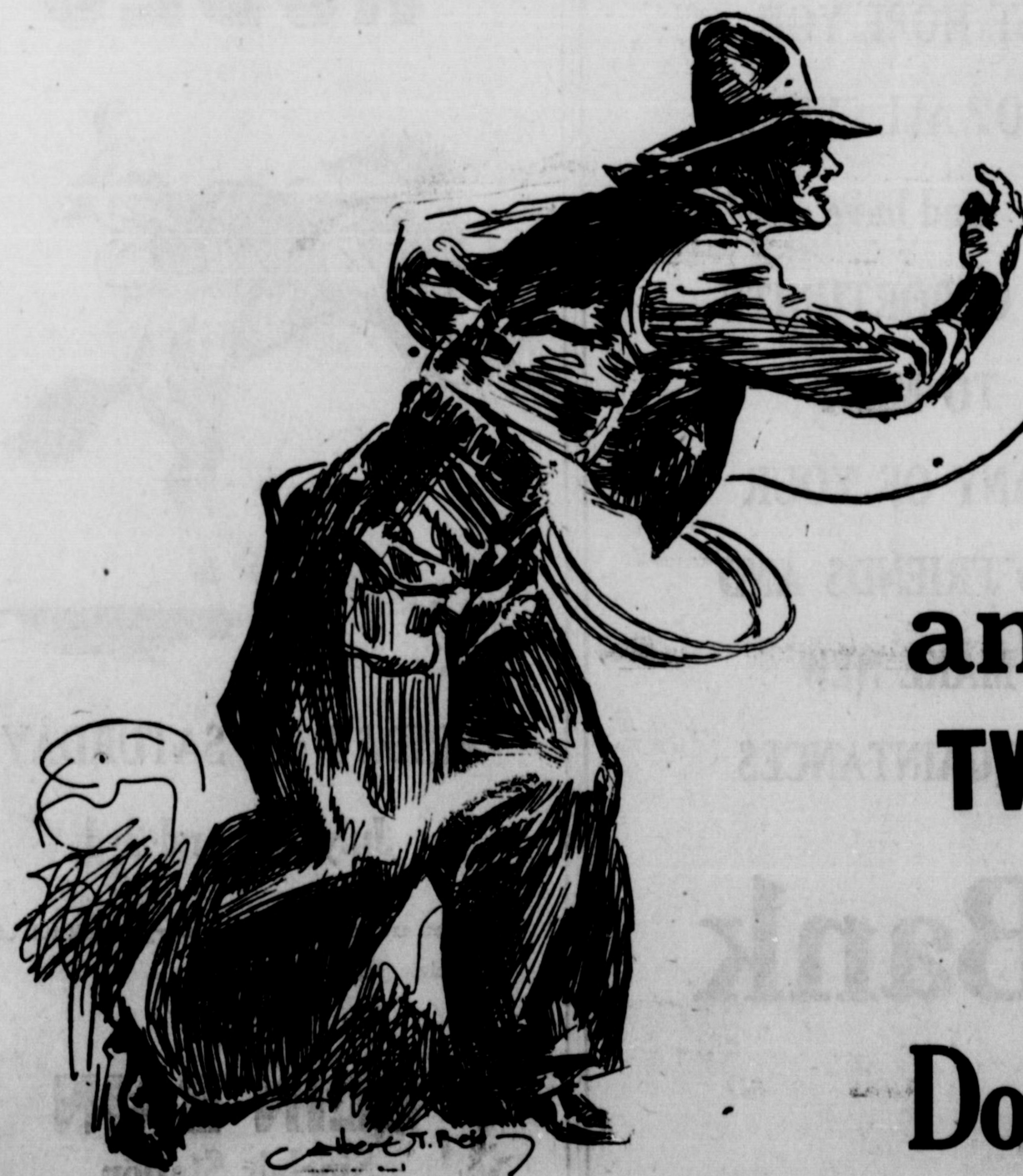

Weekly SURPLUS NEWS WAA

More than \$40,000 worth of industrial equipment and general products in surplus inventory will go on sale June 24 at the Bluebonnet Ordnance Plant near McGregor. Offered in bid lots will be semi-trailers, tires, concrete mixers, paper bags, wax, DTE oil, watchman's boxes, fire extinguishers and cardex files. The property will be available for inspection any day through June 23, excepting Saturdays and Sundays. Bidding will commence at 9 a. m. June 24, with veterans, other priorities and commercial buyers accorded standard preference in the buying.

Wheat ranchers and others in the Texas Panhandle area will soon be able to reap a harvest of surplus camp buildings from the Amarillo Army Air Field. No priorities will be needed to buy any of these buildings, which include many suitable for conversion to grain storage and other agricultural usage. Public inspection of this property is scheduled to open June 28 and continue through

July 6th. The government is so concerned with keeping an accurate record of what happens to every part of its war surplus that sales slips, descriptions of materials, and many other documents are required to be kept in permanent storage. This poses a big problem for War Assets employees charged with filing away thousands of documents resulting from disposals. One employee in WAA's Grand Prairie office, Verna M. Landry of Dallas, arrived at a time-saving solution through the construction of a simple rack for holding record boxes. Her design, submitted in a War Assets Administration employees' suggestion campaign, won an award of \$100 and is being adopted nationally.

Unusual activity of top priority federal agencies including the military has resulted in withdrawal of more than half the inventory of surplus property originally planned for a South Texas War Assets offering on June 25. About 100 lots of assorted consumer goods, with a valuation cost of \$125,000, still remain for buyers, however. Inspection is invited at various sites where the property is stored, including Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio Warehouse Number One, Crystal City Internment Camp, the Port Aransas Naval Installation, Chase Field (near Beeville) and the Hondo Army Air Field. All bidding and awarding will take

place at the San Antonio warehouse. Cities, counties and other eligible priority claimants, will get a chance to acquire another fine piece of airport property now up for disposal in WAA inventory. The property is the Sommerville Auxiliary Field number one which originally served Bryan Air Field and is located 16 miles south of Bryan, Texas. Applications must be directed to the Grand Prairie regional office of real property at Box 6030, Dallas.

Surplus airfield buildings at Aloe Airport, Victoria, and Jefferson County Airport, Beaumont, are currently up for disposal at the Sheffield Steel plant on June 30 and July 1. The following sites in Houston will be cleared in another War Assets bid sale July 9: Reed Roller Bit plant, WAA Warehouse 6, Hughes Tool Strut Plant, Goodyear Rubber Co., Converted Rice Factory, and the former War Assets Customer Service Center. Hand tools, portable phonographs, aviator bags, furniture and marine equipment originally costing nearly half a million dollars are being assembled for this big clearance.

CITY-COUNTY LIBRARY NOTES
By May L. Prewitt

A Library is similar to a home, as it requires physical labor, money, and a vast amount of scheming to secure successful operation. Our City Library is gradually arranging the material so as to give best results to the patrons. There has been no recent

acquisitions. The information bulletin from the Library of Congress this week discusses a recent acquisition there. The Earliest European newspaper to mention George Washington—this is "Leipziger Zeitungen" of Oct. 1, 1754—which contains a dispatch from London dated Sept. 17, in which the name of George Washington appears. It was a brief report of the French troops leaving Canada, and the strongest of three operating, hav-

ing attacked Gen. Washington. The first Horatio Alger book was recently shown in the Library of Congress. This was in observance of its appearance in book form in 1868. It was entitled "Ragged Dick," and sympathetic picture of a youngster's life in the city have commended it to critics as one of Alger's better works. Alger wrote 135 books for boys, and a recent conservative estimate of sales of his books is between 16 and 17 million copies.

The most extensively advertised and discussed non-fiction edition now is Dale Carnegie's "How to Stop Worrying and Start Living." The advertisement in the New York Times Book Review states sixteen ways this book will help you. The Library has not purchased a copy, but desires to do so soon.

The Lincoln Papers are another wished for possession, but these two volumes are expensive. They are the first wholly new treasure-chest of Lincoln material to be uncovered in years, and are probably the last major contribution to an understanding of the Lincoln era.

In the last H. R. Hunting catalogue, I noticed that George W. Stocking and Myron W. Watkins had a book published May 31—"Cartels or Competition"—The book examines the historical development of the whole Cartel movement with especial emphasis upon the situation as it exists today. It will be used as a reference or text book in colleges and universities. Dr. Stocking has written several books previous to this.

notify VA as soon as a veteran breaks off or completes his program.

A veteran student in training under the GI Bill is not entitled to subsistence allowances after the date he interrupts or completes his training. In some cases, veterans stop their training and receive additional payments before VA is notified of their change in status. All such overpayments must be refunded to the government.

Advance notice is preferable whenever a decision is made to discontinue training. However, prompt notice immediately after such a break in training will prevent most overpayments.

About 49,000 schools and col-

leges have been approved to train World War II veterans under the GI Bill and Public Law 16. Over 700,000 training establishments have been approved to give job-training under the same laws.

Student veterans entitled to increased monetary benefits because they have more than one dependent are reminded by VA of two important deadline dates to be observed if they are to receive increased allowances retroactive to April 1.

One deadline affects veterans taking full-time educational courses. The other affects veterans taking part-time courses, a combination school-job training course or entitled to increased

benefits due to new subsistence-earned income ceilings.

Veterans in full-time educational courses who are entitled to \$120 monthly subsistence because they have more than one dependent must submit evidence of additional dependency before July 1st in order to have the higher payments retroactive to April 1.

Veterans with more than one dependent and taking part-time school training, combination courses or who are affected by the increased income ceiling must submit proof of additional dependency by September 1. In most cases, veterans in this group may submit this evidence on a form which they will receive from VA.

Eligible veterans who want to take courses under the GI Bill that cost more than \$500 for the normal school year may do so by trading training time for the extra cost, the Veterans Administration reports.

The additional charge in training time will be at the rate of one day for each \$2.10 of the excess charge above the \$500 maximum allowed by law.

Veterans desiring to enroll in excess cost courses must authorize VA to pay the full charges by filling in forms provided for that purpose.

To prevent overpayments of subsistence allowances, the Veterans Administration urges ex-GI students and their schools to

Health Notes

AUSTIN—There is little doubt that summer is here. If you don't think so, take a quick look at your thermometer or feel your shirt or blouse—chances are that

it will be wet and salty with sweat.

Excessive sweating means the loss of body salt, and Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises the use of salt in drinking water as a means of avoiding

heat cramps. "Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat," says Dr. Cox. "On days when the thermometer goes to 90 degrees or above, as it has recently, the body may lose as much as fifty grams of salt.

Laborers, farmers, and even white-collar workers should be especially watchful of heat cramps.

Heat cramps are characterized by pains in the stomach, headaches, and sometimes nausea and vomiting. The danger comes because the loss of the salt may occur without the knowledge of the individual until the deficiency causes cramps or heat fag.

Salt tablets may be purchased commercially. If they are not available, a pinch of table salt will serve the same purpose.

"Drinking milk is an excellent method of replacing body salt lost through perspiration," Dr. Cox says, "but alcoholic drinks should be avoided."

NEW A-C TRACTOR MOUNTS ENGINE IN REAR, IMPLEMENTS IN FRONT FOR BETTER VISION



A new light weight farm tractor with implements mounted in front of the operator has just been announced by the Allis-Chalmers Tractor Division. Designed similar to rear-mounted engine road graders for highway construction, the new unit has its power plant behind the driver.

MILWAUKEE, Wis.—A new farm tractor in the low priced field featuring a rear-mounted engine design was recently placed in production at the Allis-Chalmers Mfg. Company's Gadsden, Alabama, plant.

A noteworthy feature of the new light weight Model G tractor is the unusually wide range of operator-visibility permitted by the rear-mounted engine design. By shifting the engine to the rear, A-C engineers report they have succeeded in mounting farm implements in full view of the operator.

A complete line of front-mounted, quick hitch, companion implements designed especially for use with the new tractor is also being produced by the company's tractor division.

The new Model G tractor is equipped with a 4-cylinder, L-head engine—2 1/4" bore; 3 1/2" stroke; 62 cu. in. piston displacement—and is capable of handling one 12-inch moldboard plow in average soils at customary plowing depths. It has 4 forward speeds, including a super-low gear for operations requiring extremely slow speeds. Fuel consumption is

low, running from 2 to 3 quarts per hour under medium to heavy loads. Tractor wheel tracks can be adjusted to fit any row-crop spacing. Any of the "G" implements can be attached to the tractor or removed from it in 5 minutes or less. The plow, like the planters and cultivators, is mounted ahead of the operator—a radical departure from conventional practice.

In a prepared statement, W. A. Roberts, Allis-Chalmers Executive Vice President, said: "In the new Model G tractor and the implements designed for it, we believe we have contributed a farm tool that will further advance the mechanization of agriculture, lower farm production costs, and place the advantages of mechanization within reach of thousands of farmers, who are still using animals and other unprofitable forms of farm power."

"We believe that this tractor will find a useful place on family farms of all types and sizes, because of its adaptability to all field operations, particularly those requiring great accuracy and precision."

for which he says he will work if elected, include: A veterans bonus, increased pay for teachers; better and broader educational facilities on all levels; an expanded State Health Department and a new research branch "in order that we may control the diseases and epidemics that assail us;" facilities for the care of the indigent aged "who are now classed as insane and quartered in asylums, shaming and disgracing the whole state of Tex-

as." Evans declares he is basing his appeal to "the plain, every-day citizens of Texas," and asserts that he "is making no elaborate promises to accomplish the impossible; I'll just give the best service I can give, and operate the Governor's office on the basis of my wide knowledge of State affairs and the realization that the taxpayer is entitled to a break, which he has not had for many years."

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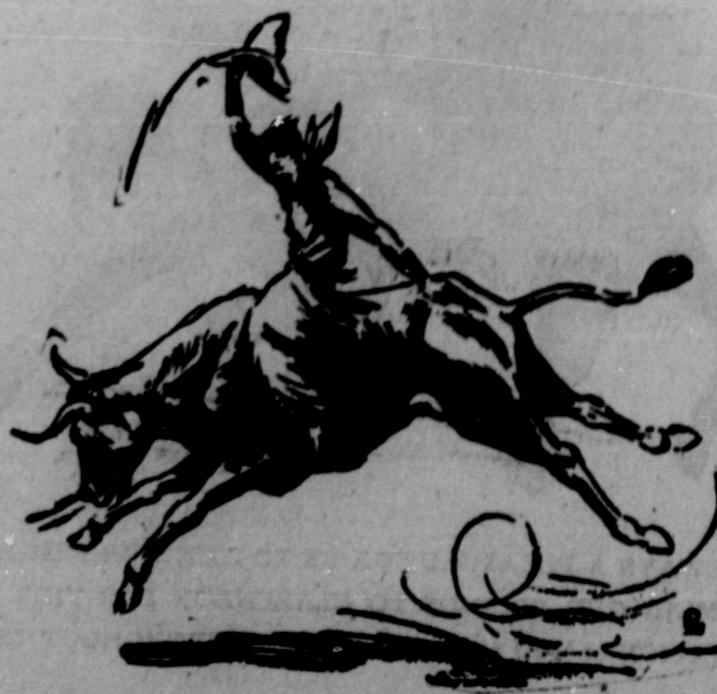

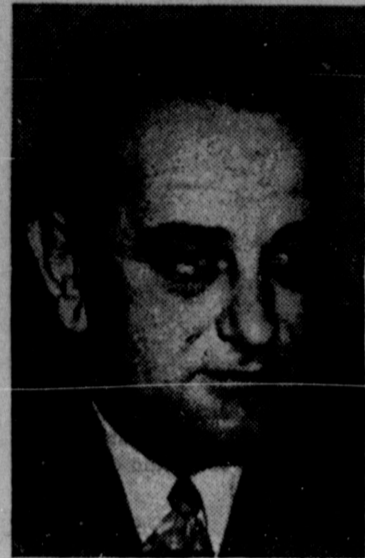

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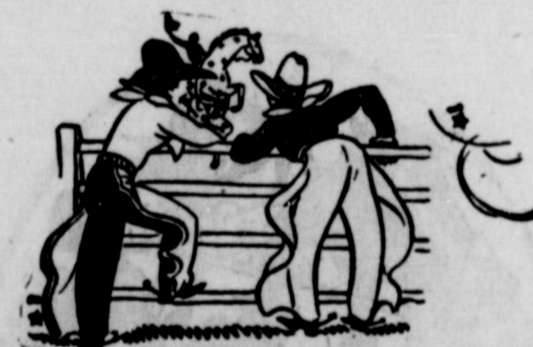

SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

Newspaper clippings are often the keys that unlock the door to social security payments for young widows and their children, according to J. R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Administration.

Few days pass during which the Amarillo office fails to receive one or more letters enclosing

a newspaper clipping. In other instances the widow brings the clipping to the office. What she wants to know is, "Does this mean me? Can I get benefits?" In a large number of cases the social security office is able to tell her, "It does mean you. You can get benefits for yourself and your children."

Sanderson said his office had long recommended that every worker tell his family about the survivors benefits in the Social

Security Act, and that the family get in touch with the nearest office in case of the worker's death. There are still, however, some widows and other survivors who do not realize their rights until a newspaper item calls social security to their attention.

"Social Security," Sanderson concluded, "can do the greatest

good for the greatest number of people, when everyone has a full understanding of his rights and duties under the law. The newspapers of this area are playing a very important part in making this general public understanding possible."
