NURSING SELFISHNESS

Recently in the public prints there appeared a story of a man who has been on the strike for thirty-four years. He was an engineer for the Burlington road and walked out Look Young! Bring Back Its with the Brotherhood of Locomotive Natural Color, Gloss and with the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. The strike failed, but he kept striking, and under the protection of Brotherhood's organization, has in that time drawn \$17,000 from its funds. This was drawn out at the rate of \$50 per month until 1912, at which time it was

reduced to \$25 per month. Some may say that this man was actuated by a principle in this matter, and as a matter of fact he was moved to extreme selfishness. No real good has ever come from this sort of thing. The man who has been on a strike for thirty-four years is now eighty-seven years of age. 
