### A TIME FOR ENTERPRISE

They are some people who are always complaining about hard times. 3. No overstock of goods. The country is consuming faster than it is producing, and there must soon be a big movement of production to fill depleted stock.

A great many concerns did a bigger business in 1921 than ever before, as the result of a more generous policy towards advertising. They found that if they let people know what they had and told their story with printers' ink, they got all the business they could handle. It is a hopeful time for business enterprise for all who will push their goods with energy and determination.—Ex.

### \$1,000 TO BE GIVEN BEST BAND AT W. T. C. OF C. CONVENTION

The cash prizes for the best bands at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention May 22 and 23, have been raised to \$1,000 by the local directing committee on plans and entertainment for the delegates. The committee at first announced a prize purse of \$500 for the best bands, then when Porter Whaley, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce heard of this action he promptly wired that the Chamber of Commerce would increase this amount to \$750. The decision was rendered at a meeting a few days ago to increase this prize purse to \$1,000.

A recent development in the plans for the convention is the formation of a gigantic parade on one day of the convention and to head this parade by all the bands together, all of them playing the same march. It is now conservatively estimated that twenty bands will be here to take part in the band contest, and by combining these bands, it will be possible to form one with several hundred pieces.

The competing bands are to be divided into two classes. Class A bands are those which had been organized more than one year on January 1, 1922. Class B bands are those which had been organized less than a year on January 1st, 1922.

For Class A bands the prizes are: First, \$500; second, \$150; third, \$50, fourth, certificate of merit signed by officials of West Texas Chamber of Commerce. For Class B bands: First, \$250; second, \$100; third, \$50, fourth, certificate of merit. The winning bands of each class are to be designated Senior and Junior Official West Texas Chamber of Commerce bands for the ensuing year. A. G. Hinn is in charge of the band contests.—Plainview Herald.

### CONDEMNNS MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP

Striking figures relative to the use of tax payers' money for the operation of municipally-owned utilities, in contradiction to this capital being provided by the vast army of thrifty investors of the country, are included in a report made by H. H. Hargett of Tifton, Georgia, relative to a survey made by him of the operation of electric lighting plants in 29 municipalities in southwest Georgia.

In his report, Mr. Hargett points out that municipal ownership usually results from a heated political fight, that exaggerated promises of impossible rates are made, that municipal plants do not pay taxes and therefore their rightful share is passed on to the public, and that not being subjected to rigid regulation and supervision as are the publicly owned utilities, taxpayers are constantly deluded as to their actual financial situation. Mr. Hargett says:

"It is unfortunately true that practically every municipally-owned plant suffers from a lack of adequate accounting. The books of nearly all of them are kept on the simple basis of receipts and disbursements, the difference between the two being called the profit or loss for the year.

"No record is kept of accounts receivable at the beginning or end of the year. Very few cities were able to distinguish the cost of extensions and betterments from the cost of operation. Only 13 of 29 could separate water income from the electric income, and only 17 of the 29 could state how much was paid for fuel during the year. Practically no inventories were taken.

"The result is that in many cases the city officials have not known in former years whether the plants were making or losing money or 'breaking even.' The officials of all such towns knew that they lost money in 1920, but they do not know and will never know the full extent of their losses."

### A LEGAL AND MORAL DEBT OF THIS NATION

In the past few weeks in the public presses of our Nation it has come to the attention of the ex-service men that there has been an intensive campaign of venomous slander directed at them, on account of the bonus proposition that has been put before the law makers of our country, they are taking the attitude that the once soldiers are using their voting strength to club them into passing the bonus bill.

This campaign is not only taking the form of misleading and in many cases insulting, special articles and editorials but it is also using cartoons, such as one that recently appeared in several Texas papers, picturing the ex-service man as holding up Uncle Sam with a revolver, marked the ballot and commanding him to COME ACROSS, while Germany is giving us the horse laugh. Such cartoons are nothing short of an insult to every man who wore the uniform in defense of his country, and it is a disgrace to the American people.

In the first place there has never been any threats made against any member of Congress.

The American Legion in particular has confined its campaign strictly to educating the American people as to just what the bonus is, and refuting the half truths, and straight out lies that have been published with the express intention of concealing the real issue, and diverting the people's attention from the simple fact that in paying the bonus the Government is not only fulfilling their promise to the men, but is defraying a legal and moral debt. A DEBT OF HONOR.

After the Revolutionary War, George Washington fought for adjusted compensation for his veterans, and that at a time when shipbuilders and munition workers did not get from \$10.00 to \$15.00 per day.

He was also confronted with the same arguments against such compensation that confront the present Congress viz that it was "Putting a price on patriotism."

In reply Washington said, "I MAY BE ALLOWED TO SAY IT WAS THE PRICE OF THEIR BLOOD AND YOUR INDEPENDENCE, IT IS THEREFORE MORE THAN A COMMON DEBT IT IS A DEBT OF HONOR, IT CAN NEVER BE CONSIDERED AS A PENSION GRATUITY, NOR CAN IT BE CANCELLED UNTIL IT IS FAIRLY DISCHARGED."

And yet the big business interests which form the bulk of the opposition to the adjusted compensation act now under consideration, continue to cry, "A price on patriotism," totally disregarding the fact that during the war the men that made the bullets drew from \$10.00 upwards, while the poor CHUMP that STOPPED the bullets was getting \$1.00 per day and "DEEP SEA SOUP" or "SLUM," three times a day, if he was lucky enough to be fed three times a day.

What could be more instrumental in relieving the present unemployed situation than the proposed compensation act, (commonly termed as the "Bonus bill"), especially the home and farm aid feature, which provides the Government assistance to ex-service men who are building homes or buying farms; or the proposed opening of more Government lands for farming purposes? Under the proposed certificate plan, the "Tremendous" outlay of cash (feared by Sec. Mellon) will not be necessary; nor will it be necessary to increase the burden of taxation to any noticeable extent.

The Government has never found any difficulty in defraying their other obligations, such as those to the railroads, manufacturers of munitions, and a thousand and one other claims, they also seem able to allow Europe to support huge armies on money that should be used for paying at least interest on their debt of the billions of dollars that they owe us, and are even advocating in some quarters that we extend to Germany a few billion dollars credit, not to mention the fact that some of them are wanting to donate the debts of the allies to them.

Take a tip from one who was there that WE OWE THE ALLIES NOTHING. WE PAID THEM IN FULL WITH INTEREST WHILE WE WERE OVER THERE.

WHEN WAR ARRIVED THE NATION WAS PERFECTLY WILLING AND ANXIOUS TO TRUST HER FATE TO HER YOUNG MEN: ASSIGNING THEM THE TASK OF DEFENDING HER LIBERTY AND INTEGRITY AS A WORLD POWER. BOTH AT HOME AND ABROAD, AND YET NOW, WHEN ALL OF THOSE WHO MADE THE SUPREME SACRIFICE ARE NOT YET

BROUGHT HOME AND DECENTLY BURIED, THE VERY INTERESTS THAT WOULD HAVE SUFFERED MOST ARE NOT WILLING TO TRUST A MINUTE PROPORTION OF THE NATIONS WEALTH TO THESE SAME MEN, and this condition exists regardless of the fact that 700,000 of them are out of work, after being turned out of the army penniless, and are strictly "Up against it."

The very worst the poor devils could do with whatever they are allotted is to put it back into circulation, which procedure could have no effect on the country except to relieve the general depression so much complained of in business circles nowadays; and giving employment to thousands of men.

So much has been said in the press and elsewhere about what the Government has done for its disabled soldiers which is no more or less than all insurance companies are doing for their casualties.

The Government collected from its soldier personnel from \$6.00 to \$7.00 per month to take care of its disabled and regardless of the fact that this has cost millions of dollars they still have many dollars that came out of the soldiers \$30.00.

At the present rate they still have more than enough in this fund to care for the disabled for a year and a half, without drawing on the treasury department.

Col. R. P. Smyth, "daddy of Plainview," tells it.

Repeated attempts to decide on a location for the square went awry. None knew where it should be. In fact no one foresaw the future great Plainview. So after considerable quibbling and strife over the matter, so the tale goes, a drunken cowboy came to town and butted in the "official matters" of the "municipality." He announced in stentorian voice that he would set the four corners with a pistol while riding a bucking bronco. The novelty of the plan was instantly perceived and the suggestion of the "locoed" cowboy eagerly accepted.

With a group of cowboys, ranchers, settlers and plainmen gathered near the present square, the cowboy staggered to a vicious appearing mount and was away at breakneck speed hardly before his feet had negotiated with the stirrups. Of all the bucking that has ever been performed on the "roof garden of Texas" that bronc is said to have done it.

The cowboy "square" designer was just in the ace of being swept from the poopdeck of his animated mount when his revolver spit out a raucous staccato speeding a bullet into the earth. Colonel Smyth saw the dust fly and ran to the point and stuck a stob in the spot. The mount freed of its rider, began an encircling movement, closely pursued by the square designing cowboy. When the steed made his most acute angle the puncher spit another bullet into the ground. He continued to do this until two more bullets perforated the earth. Into each of these Colonel Smyth drove a stob.

The four corners were startlingly true as to the four corners of a square. Colonel Smyth, on behalf of the group of the astonished spectators, announced that the square had been designated. Today the beautiful square contains many trees. In its center sits an imposing temple of justice. But there is considerable more quietude about the handsome square today than there was on the eventful day when the cowboy's reclusiveness in the face of being thrown from his steed made possible the present site of the business center of Plainview.—Plainview News.

They were the eyes of an unflinching courage and an unflinching faith rising out of a sincere dependence upon the Master of the Universe. 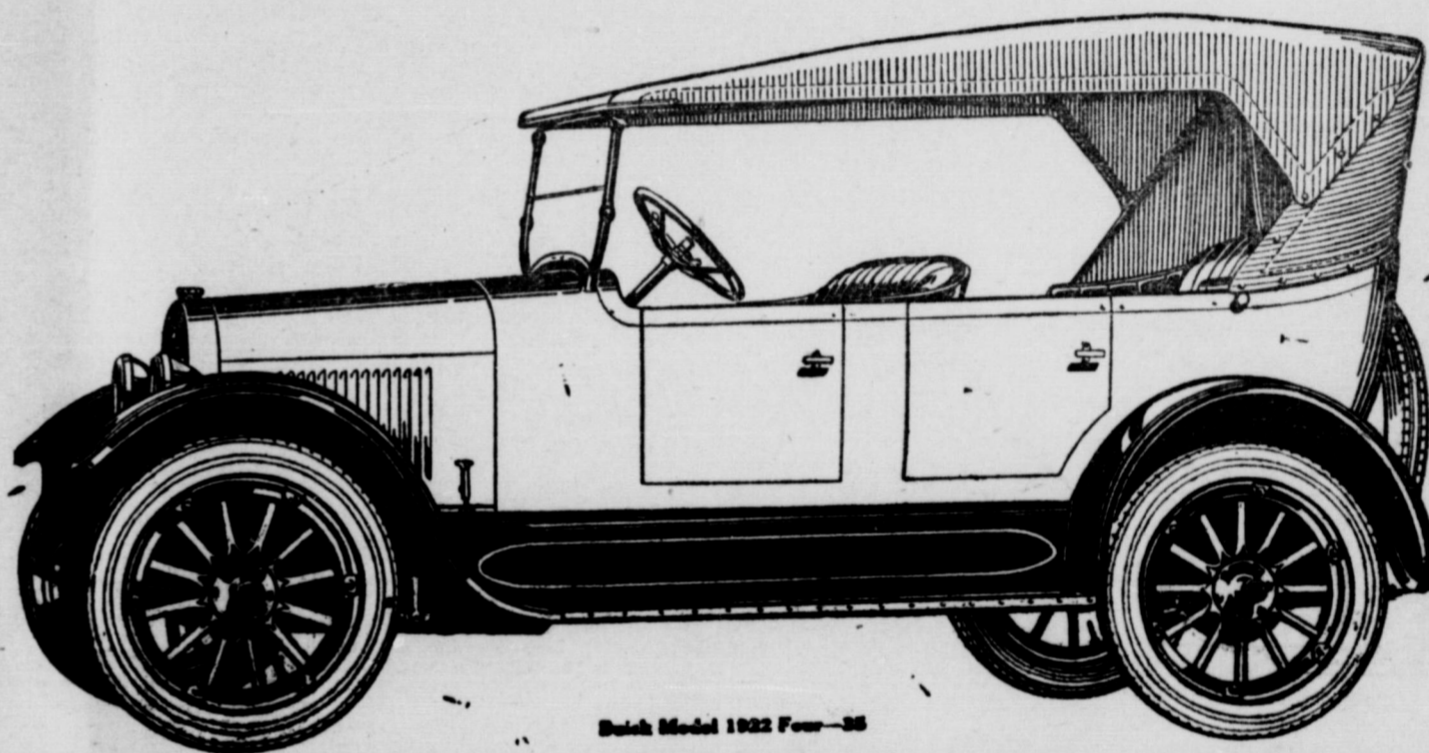

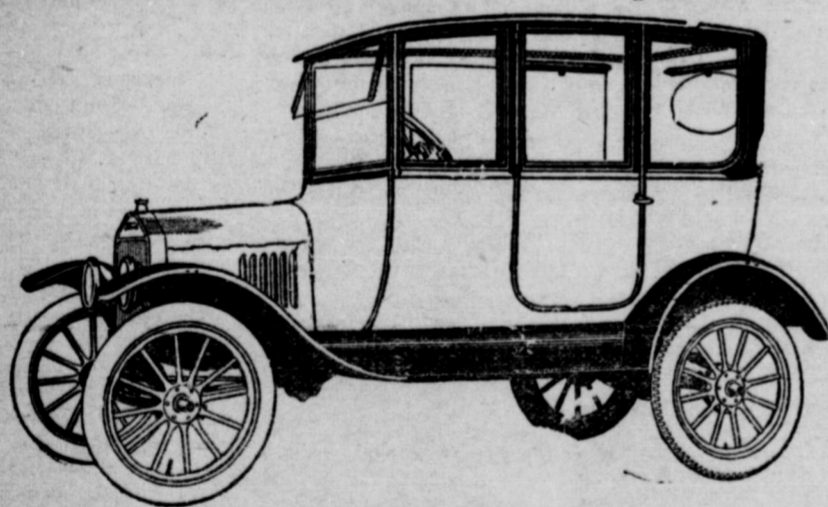
