## Ike For President Rally Set For Saturday Nite

A number of Donley County "Ike for President" supporters, have announced that a Ike for President rally will be held Saturday evening at the Dist. Court room at 8 p. m. Everyone interested in any degree is urged to attend the meeting as plans along this line for Donley county will be planned at that time, one of the supporters stated. Below we give you a release from the state headquarters which outlines the program more clearly as the movement is still in the starting stage.

AUSTIN—March 24 (Special)—Planned to coordinate the sentiment throughout Texas for Dwight Eisenhower for president, "Draft Ike, A Democratic Party Movement" has set up shop in donated office space, using loaned furniture, manned by volunteer workers, at 915 1/2 Congress Avenue, Austin. Telephone is 7-3415.

Began last week by "GI's for Ike," "Draft Ike" hopes to secure a large turnout of Democrats at the May 1 precinct conventions over the State who will adopt resolutions favoring drafting the retired Army Chief of Staff for the Democratic nomination and elect county convention delegates pledged to the Draft Ike idea.

"The time has passed for us to sit idly by and watch inter-party warfare kill the Democratic Party and to see the country weakened through the scramble of politicians seeking the presidency," said Carl Morris of Clarendon, who along with Tom Long of Austin and Robert Doss of Whitewright instigated the movement.

Morris emphasized that the movement has no connection with the so-called Southern Revolt, the Wallace-for-President group, or any other political group. "This is a people's movement, pure and simple. We have one and only one objective: to see General Ike's name placed in nomination by the Texas delegation to the national convention," he said.

"There is only one way to secure this nomination. It's by the active efforts of every Democratic voter who is interested in restoring the party to a strong position. We must be on guard against so-called Democrats who will support Wallace and so-called Democrats who are working underhandedly to secure the election of a Republican president and Congress," he said.

Greatest boost to the Eisenhower-for-President movement came last week when Mrs. R. A. Thompson of Goliah, vice chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee, came out strongly for an Eisenhower-instigated delegation to the National Convention.

### ALL DOGS MUST HAVE TAGS AND BE VACCINATED

It was announced this week by R. T. Brown that he and Ben Buck would start their annual rounds, tagging and vaccinating dogs, April 1st.

All dogs within the city must be tagged and vaccinated during the first few days of April and all dogs not taken care of after this time will be destroyed, Mr. Brown stated.

"We will begin with this work on April 1st, and we want to urge all dog owners to have their dogs ready and the money ready when we come by as it will save you time, extra expense and possible loss of your dog," he added.

The price of the tags is \$1.00 for males and \$2.00 for females. The vaccination fee is \$2.00 per dog.

## Donley County Vocational Schools' Cabinet Making And Carpenter Classes To Start April 6th

Classes in Cabinet Making and Carpentering for Veterans of World War II will start in Clarendon and Hedley, April 6th, according to J. R. Gillham, Coordinator of the Donley County Vocational School. The courses will be set up for two full years and will operate twenty-five hours each week, with a five hour class five days each week. These two courses bring the total number of classes in the Donley County Vocational School to eight.

The vocational school gives each veteran a chance to learn a trade and at the same time earn full subsistence from the Veterans Administration. This subsistence amounts to \$75 for single men, \$105 for men with one de-

pendent, and \$120 for men with two or more dependents. An instructor with a minimum of twelve to fifteen years practical experience and with a minimum of a high school education will be employed to handle the course at each of the two sites of the courses.

Any veteran desiring to enroll in this or other courses offered should contact the Vocational School Office at the Clarendon City Hall. Courses will be offered in any desirable trade or industry when a minimum of 15 men desire the same course. Veterans desiring courses not offered at this time should contact the school office to determine the possibility of securing the course desired.

### TRACTOR BOGS DOWN IN MULBERRY

The rain the last of the week supplied the means of a problem near Brice when the caterpillar tractor of C. L. D. Gillespie, driven by a Mr. Courtright became imbedded in quicksand.

It was near midnight Thursday night when the caterpillar failed to make it through the water and sand. By daylight, little of the machine shown above the sand with the creek practically dry above the sand.

A large crowd came to the rescue and winches were brought from Memphis to furnish power to lift the "cat" from its berth. All means failed. The next step was to secure the services of Bob Head of Clarendon and his large winch machine. Bob had the "cat" out of the sand safely Friday night.

A contract for a bridge across Mulberry is to be let next month. For the present, a temporary culvert and dirt bank has been the means of crossing the sand since the bridge was destroyed several months ago.

### JAMES ALLEN WEBB DROWNS IN EAGLE MOUNTAIN LAKE

FORT WORTH, March 22.—A 22-year-old pre-medical student drowned in Eagle Mountain Lake last night after his girl companion tried vainly to row a motorboat to his aid.

James Allen Webb, son of a Fort Worth physician, stayed afloat for 10 minutes after he was thrown from the boat by a wave. He sank into 30 feet of water only minutes before help arrived.

Miss Jimmie Jo Bradley, 19, of Weatherford, told authorities that Webb, clad in overalls, stayed on the surface by treading water. He had shouted "Hurry, hurry" while she struggled with the four-passenger boat.

A rescue launch dispatched when persons on shore heard Miss Bradley's cries for help reached the spot a few minutes after he disappeared in the water.

Young Webb's parents, Dr. and Mrs. William Webb, were former Clarendon residents. Mrs. Webb was known here as Olive Martin and was born and raised here. Dr. Webb attended the Clarendon College here.

The agents studied several beef cattle feeding experiments, conservation of water and soil, mesquite eradication and the various kinds of chemicals for weed control and fly control on livestock.

This meeting was one of the kind that are attended by county agents quite often to give them first hand information from the experiment stations so that it can be used in the county by the county agents.

Mr. J. A. Scofield, district agent, was in charge of the meeting.

## Time To Start Horn Fly Control

The time to start horn fly control on livestock is just around the corner and many ranchers and farmers have stated that they intend to carry out a good program of horn fly control this summer.

H. M. Breedlove, county agent, is urging that all persons who intend to use the power spray that he has in his office to contact him so that he can start a list of those intending to use this sprayer and arrange a spraying list for this summer.

Better than eighteen thousand head of livestock was sprayed with DDT last year and the results were very good. Ranchers have reported increase in gains on cattle and dairymen report increased production in milk.

Breedlove says that this program of horn fly control on livestock is one of the cheapest methods known to help put pounds on cattle and to increase milk production for the dairymen. It is also a fact that three pounds of wettable powder to fifty gallons of water gives protection from horn flies for a period of four weeks or more. As a result of the horn fly control program in Donley County, there are fifteen power sprayers in the county at this time.
