## Dashing Rains, High Winds Sweep Area

A dashing rain, preceded by high winds and a good sandstorm, swept across Donley County Saturday evening, leaving a measure of 1.61 inches at the airport, according to the weather station's report.

The cloud gathered in the southwestern portion of the county and moved in a northeasterly direction. Clarendon and Lelia

### THURSDAY

More pounding rains, accompanied by high winds, lightning, thunder and hail, fell over the county yesterday and last night (Wednesday). According to the weather station at the local airport, 1.45 inches rain fell at that station. It varied somewhat in different sectors of the county, but that seems to be a fair average. High winds, which reached a speed of 44 miles per hour at the airport, did considerable damage to trees, shrubbery, and destroyed a few small buildings.

Reports from the Martin community state that three or four chicken houses were blown away in that district, resulting in minor damage to one automobile owned by W. C. Tims, who lives about three miles due west of Clarendon. The car was struck by heavy boards blown from his chicken house. After canvassing the neighborhood to determine damage, and believing that he, himself, had escaped it, Charlie Hearn returned to his home only to soon discover that his chicken house had almost completely disappeared.

Hedley received only about a half-inch, but more was reported to have fallen outside the town, indicating that the rain was general in that area.

Crops were hailed out in the Sunnyview community, but the hail seemed to limit itself to a small area. The weather station reported a little hail, but an insufficient amount to do damage.

Damage done in Clarendon was limited to broken tree limbs, washed streets, damage to a few light buildings, and torn roofs.

Lake received a good rainfall, but Hedley was missed by the core of the storm.

Crop prospects look fairly good in general over the county with the exception of the southwestern part. The Martin community received very little of the Saturday night rain, as did Ashtola and Goodnight. These communities are still badly in need of rain, while the eastern and southern portions have not yet recovered from the flood rains and sandstorms that have delayed planting and washed and blown out crops during the past two months.

### Most Local School Districts Doing Their Share In Paying Cost Of Their Schools

AUSTIN, July 21—Local financial support of Texas' public schools has kept pace with the greatly increased state aid during the last decade.

A comprehensive state-wide study has just been released by the Texas State Teachers Association in cooperation with the State Department of Education. It discloses that through increased property valuation or hikes in taxes most local school districts are doing their share in paying the cost of their schools.

During the 1946-47 school year, the latest for which complete figures are available, the study disclosed that the state paid 53 per cent of the cost of education and the local districts 47 per cent. These approximate figures hold true for each of the last ten years despite the fact the constitution of Texas provides that the state shall pay for two-thirds of the costs of the schools.

Most schools have nine-month terms. The constitution sets out that "the state shall maintain and support schools for not less than six months."

Expenditures for public schools have increased from a total of \$76,706,149 in 1935-36 to \$137,609,088 during 1946-47. The local support in 1935-36 was 51 per cent to 49 for the state. The average salary of teachers in the mid thirties was approximately \$1100.

Shortly after the depression years Texans became conscious of the deficiencies in their school system and set about to give it more financial aid, the report noted.

As the legislature hiked appropriations for the schools, the local districts also increased their levies and property valuations.

During the 1941-42 school year local districts bore 51 per cent of the cost of education. They collected taxes amounting to \$47,375,861. The state supplied \$44,610,190.

Both state and local support jumped in 1946-47. The legislature in 1945 increased the maximum tax rate that may be voted by common and independent school districts to \$1.50.

The result was that the districts took advantage of it. Local tax support in 1946-47 totaled \$64,116,512. The state supplied \$73,392,576.

The larger districts, especially, increased their levies. During the last school year more than 50 per cent of all children of scholastic age in independent school districts resided in districts which now levy a tax rate above \$1.00.

### Dr. Connally, Former Mayor of Waco, Dies

WACO, July 17—Dr. Herschel Frank Connally, 70, former mayor of Waco and executive secretary of the State Board of Medical Examiners, died at his home here late Friday due to a heart attack.

Governor Moody appointed Dr. Connally to the State Board of Medical Examiners in 1927. He was mayor of Waco in 1923. Only recently he was feted with a banquet honoring his 25th year of perfect attendance to the Rotary Club. He was a brother of Tom F. Connally of Clarendon.

After the Fourth of July, we had "rush wee," at the Library as our citizens were ready for "arm chair" entertainment. Books have been in such demand that our shelves of recent editions were bare.

The Van Kennedys gave the Library five volumes of Texas History reference books recently. They are "A History of Texas

From Wilderness to Common Wealth" by Louis J. Wortham. The attractive bindings will be an asset in logs, and the material will be of value in our theme work.

The New York Times states that our Congress Library is the most artistic in the world, and third to largest. It is palace size, cost \$8,000,000 and is Italian Renaissance style. Each week a copy of the bulletin comes to the Library, and naturally creates an appreciation of our National Library and its value to our nation. It is marvelous to discover the

various contacts with all nations and their literature, records, and documents. Very likely most people of Washington are too rushed to enjoy the benefits of this valuable compilation of knowledge.

There are quite a few new publications that will be ready for our Co-City Library soon. At present there are several new biographies, and other non fiction editions that are enjoyable and informational reading on the shelves. "Women Doctors to Day" by Sallie Knapp gives a brief biography of twelve women doctor specialists in their field of medicine. Another unusual volume is "The Caves of Texas" which is profusely illustrated, and is the result of intense research made by the National Speleological Society with offices at Washington. The Joe Goldstons dedicated this to the memory of Tom Goodner. It will appeal to the theme writing students as well as those interested in Natural Science.

So many of our books are almost too worn to issue and have to be temporarily "hospitalized" each time they are returned.

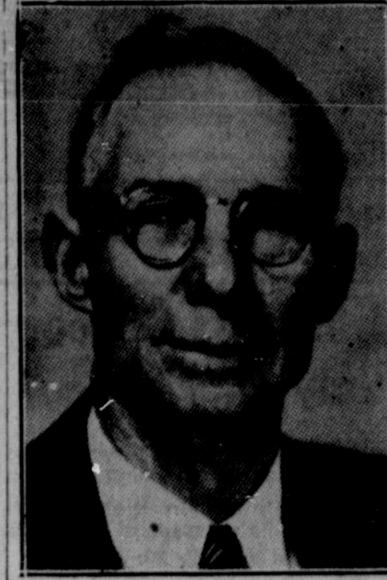

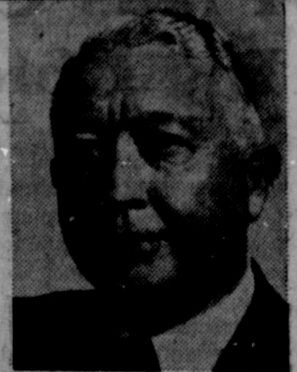


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WHY LABOR BOSSES ENDORSE THE OPPONENT OF... JUDGE JOHN A. RAWLINS

Hart, opponent of Judge Rawlins, was one of the attorneys for the labor unions in their unsuccessful and ill-advised attempt to enjoin the State Officials from enforcing the Texas law regulating labor unions, which was passed with the view of protecting public interest.

The Appellate Court, in upholding the law forbidding the unions from collecting work permit fees from non-union employees, reorganized the policy expressed by the Legislature in the preamble to the Act: "The right to work is the right to live."

Judge John Rawlins is under no obligation to either labor or capital. He is now completing 20 years of service as a State Trial Judge. He is a family man, a World War veteran, and a church worker. He has the endorsement of the Dallas Bar Association and is interested only in administering the law fairly and impartially in the interest of the public at large. He is a graduate of Texas University and Texas Christian University.

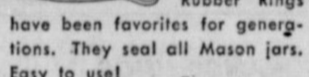

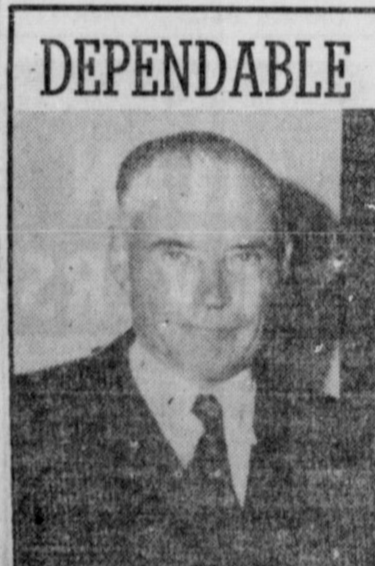

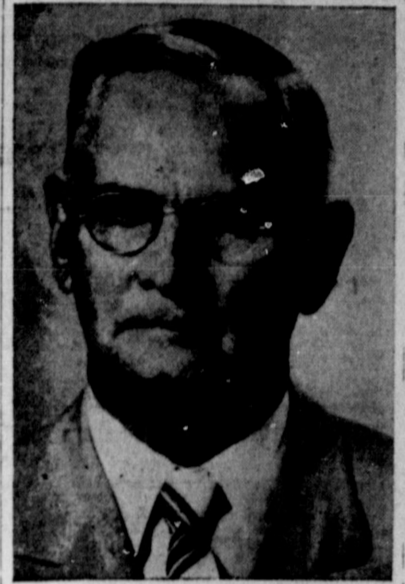

**Veterans' News**

Thousands of World War II veterans may lose the opportunity to reinstate National Service Life Insurance worth many millions of dollars unless they act before August 1, the Veterans Administration says.

After July 31, veterans whose NSLI term policies have been lapsed more than three months must take physical examinations to qualify as insurable risks. Before August 1, veterans have only to sign a comparative health statement.

Eligible veterans may reinstate any amount of term insurance up to \$10,000 in multiples of \$500 regardless of the length of time it has been lapsed under present liberal regulations if they apply before August 1.

They need only fill out a simple application form, in which they certify that their health is as good as when the policy lapsed, and pay premiums for two months.

Authority of the Veterans Administration to provide automobiles or other conveyances for veterans of World War II who in service lost, or lost the use of, one or both legs at or above the ankle, has been extended until June 30, 1949.

The law granting vehicles to

such disabled veterans had been scheduled to expire June 30, 1948. The extension and an appropriation of \$1,500,000 for the program were contained in the Second Deficiency Appropriation Act for 1948.

A veteran who qualifies is entitled to an automobile or other conveyance costing not more than \$1,600, including such special equipment or appliance as may be necessary to enable him to operate the vehicle safely.
