FARMERS WAGE WAR ON SMALL HOPPERS

During the past week farmers have been getting grasshopper poison to wage a war on the small hoppers. County agent H. M. Breedlove says that farmers report good kills in most cases and in some other cases kills are very light. Breedlove points out that the poison should be put out about daylight in the morning for the best results and should be scattered at the rate of about fifteen pounds per acre.

The poison plant at Clarendon is now open and farmers wanting grasshopper poison should call by the office of the county agent. The plant furnishes one part of bran to three parts of ground bundles, sawdust or other fine mix that the farmer wishes to use and also all of the poison is furnished by the plant. A charge of twenty-five cents per mixed sack is charged to pay the foreman of the plant.

Breedlove stated that he had tried to get sawdust from east Texas but the cost is so high that it is cheaper if each person wanting the poison bring some old ground bundles with him. Syrup is not necessary with the poison as the hoppers are after the moisture in the poison and can not smell the syrup. However the syrup will help to hold the moisture longer on the poison. Syrup is an added expense and kills are just as good without it.

A near tragedy happened to the Gene Estlack family as they were returning to Austin Friday after a visit of several days with relatives and friends in Clarendon.

They were eager to use the cooler part of the day and left the J. C. Estlack home soon after 4 a. m. Friday. All went well and fast time was being made until the family had reached a point about six miles north of Abilene.

It was at this point that David, aged less than three years, was playing with the car door handle. The door came open and the youngster tumbled to the highway. He readily showed serious injury and the frantic parents rushed to an Abilene hospital where an X-Ray disclosed a broken vertebra in his neck besides lacerations and bruises.

The child remained there in the care of physicians until Sunday evening before continuing to Austin. The surgeons placed the youngster in a plaster cast extending from his head to his hips since his spinal column was also injured. Following the removal of the cast after some weeks, the surgeons stated that a brace would then be necessary for an indefinite period.

4-H CLUB MEMBERS TO RECEIVE REGISTERED HAMPSHIRE GILTS

Eight registered Hampshire gilts and one male will be issued to 4-H Club members some time this week, county agent H. M. Breedlove announced this morning.

The hogs will be purchased from the E. S. Ballew herd, one of the best registered Hampshire herds in this section of the nation. The pigs are being bought by the Sears Roebuck Company and issued to 4-H Club members under the supervision of the county agent. Each boy will raise his gilt and have her bred to the male being used for the 4-H Club hogs. When the gilts farrow then each boy who received a gilt will be required to give the county agent one pig to give another boy. The list of boys receiving pigs will be published next week. The 4-H club male hog will also be available for service in the community as well as to members of the 4-H Clubs.

Breedlove says that this is a good method to get good foundation breeding stock started over the county. The Sears gilts and male will be shown in Clarendon this fall at the fall fair.

By the time the 2nd of July rolls around, a well shaped and well planned program will be ready for the people of this area and surrounding areas to enjoy. More phases of the program are being added each week as the celebration date draws nearer.

Flip Breedlove has announced that there will be two parades instead of one as first planned. The first will take place at 6 p. m. the evening of the 2nd before the first Rodeo performance. The next parade will be held at 1 p. m. on the 3rd instead of at 11 a. m. as first planned.

The location for the serving of the barbecue dinner has been changed to the city park and they will start serving it at 11 a. m. and the barbecue dinner will be free to all who have a ticket for the afternoon rodeo performance, and it will be of the very best as John Snider of Amarillo will do the barbecuing and preparing of all the food.

Another addition to the celebration will be the election of a Rodeo queen. Rayburn Smith has been appointed in charge of this phase of the program. Any business firm or individual may enter a girl who has access to a horse and will be available to ride in the parade. The queen will be elected by popular vote and each vote costs one penny and there will be jars or boxes all over town for each contestant.

The queen will be presented at the rodeo performance of the night of July 2nd and will receive a pair of shop made boots from the Roping club. If you have some young lady to enter, contact Mr. Smith at the Donley County National Farm Loan office in the Mulkey Theatre building.

Another committee was named this week. It is the enforcement committee comprised of Guy Wright, Bert Smith and Tunny Kent. They have the job of seeing that everyone in town wears some type of cowboy garb between June 22nd and the date of the celebration. The booster groups leaving here June 22nd and 24th will start the celebration spirit off and it is hoped that it will not slacken until after the celebration is over.

Wow! It looks like a hard two weeks ahead after the 22nd arrives, according to the toughies who have been appointed to the Enforcement Committee in connection with the annual celebration dress-up campaign.

Sheriff Guy Wright, Ernest (Tunty) Kent and Bert Smith have been appointed to head the committee to see that everyone connected with any type of business or the celebration in any way and practically everyone else, is wearing some type of cowboy celebration garb, every day until the date of the celebration which starts July 2nd.

The day to start wearing some clothes of this type is June 22nd, the day that the first booster group will leave Clarendon to let the outsiders know they are going to have a real whing ding here the 2nd and 3rd.

Better dig down in the closet and see what you can find as it will be left up to this committee as to what kind of punishment to dish out - - - and knowing them as well as most of us do, it will be much easier to come to town wearing a bandana or something else as noticeable.

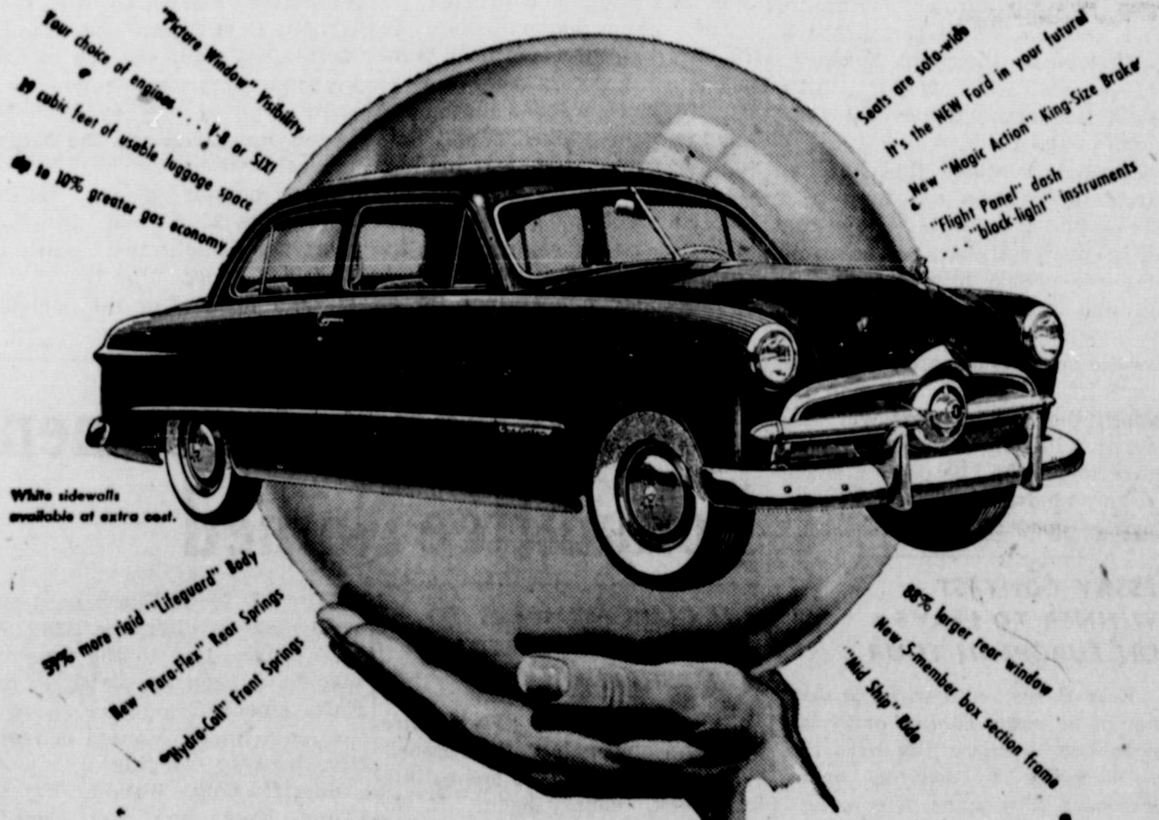

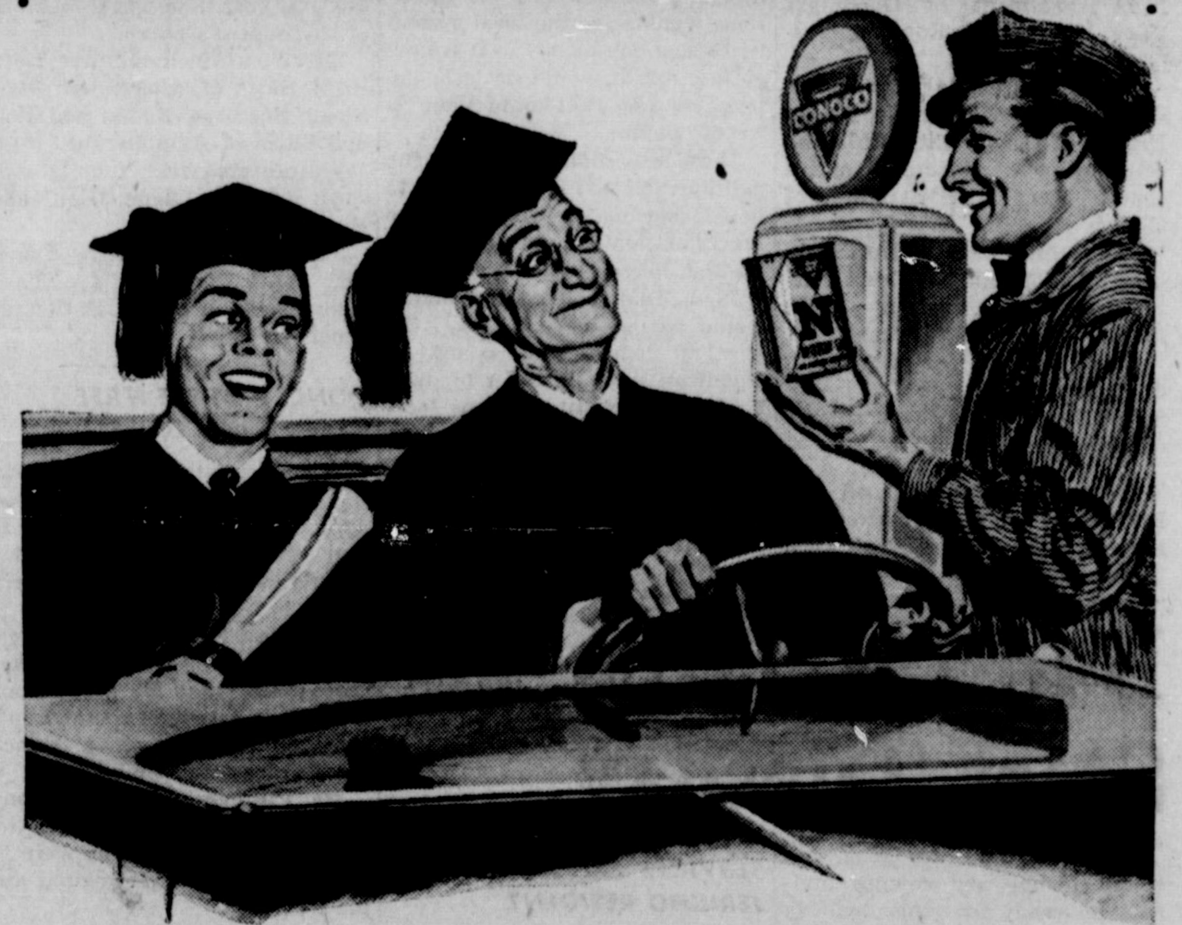

The party then will be complete with seven happy, winning essay writers, two very proud escorts, and 8-year old Marion McCluney, ten representative Texans determined to enjoy all of the glories of Colorado's Rocky Mountains early in the tourist season when everything is at its best.

The trip will take them first to Denver for a day and night stopover Monday, June 14th. A luncheon party has been arranged for them and Denver newsmen at the Denver Athletic Club, where they will be entertained by the railroad's officials. A sightseeing trip of the Denver Mountain Parks will occupy Monday afternoon. Headquarters in Denver will be at the Brown

Palace Hotel.

On Tuesday morning the 15th, departure will be made for Rocky Mountain National Park. Tuesday afternoon and night will be spent at Chalet Ranch in Estes Village. Wednesday morning will take the party over Trail Ridge Road to Grand Lake for an afternoon and night layover.

The afternoon Zephyr ride thru Southern Colorado will take the party past the famous CF&I steel mills in Pueblo, the Sangre de Cristo Range near Trinidad, Mt. Capulin, an extinct volcano near Folsom, N. M., and thru Clayton, N. M., one of the few remaining truly western towns. Arrival home will be on Tuesday, June 22nd, after a 2,200 mile tour of one of America's most wonderful vacation regions.

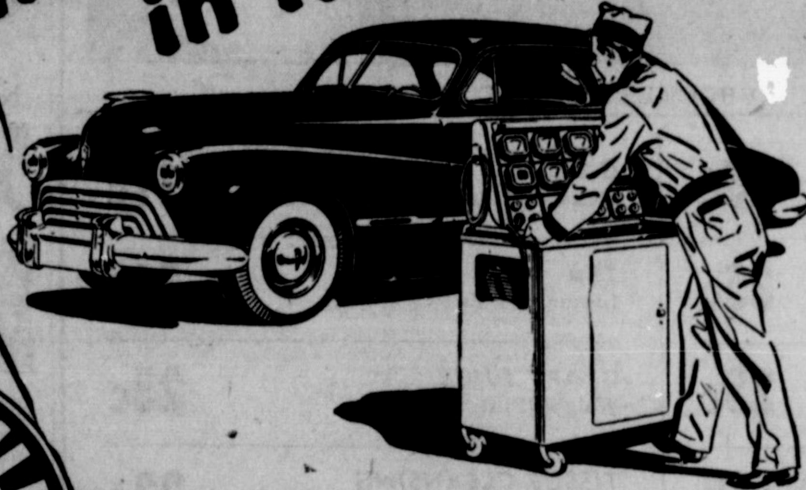

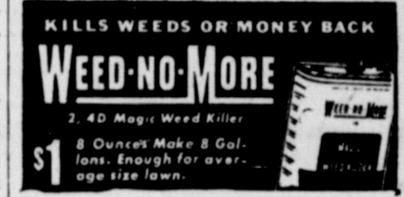
