



Attorney General Allred's expected entry into the governor's race came about last week, and his announcement carried just the vigorous, convincing words that were to have been expected from a man of his type.

In the present line-up at the post for the big free-forall in 1934 it looks very much like Jimmy Allred is the man of the hour. Admittedly it is just a bit early to get a true perspective of the political field, and other develop-ments and entries could change the general trend, but for the present Jimmy Allred looks like the favored one for governor's honors next summer.

The intrepid attorney general has proven one of the most colorful and dynamic figures to enter the political arena in Texas since the days of Dan Moody, and like that gentleman, is very likely to show his heels to the whole field in the July and August derbies of 1934,

BAILEY OPENS FIRE ON CONNALLY

Young Joe Bailey has opened fire on Senator Tom Connally in the initial period of his candidacy for the senate against the present incumbent.

Young Joe is going to find himself up against a seasoned campaigner and having elected to use the wet side of the liquor argument as his mainstay, will have to bear the burden of that controversy in Texas-and it is due to be some burden.

DONLEY'S COTTON YIELD LARGER

To date the number of bales of cotton produced in Donley County for 1933 almost tips the 16,000 mark. This is convincing proof of the fine acreage yields Donley produces and gives the pessimists who predicted that 12,000 to 13,000 bales was the limit for the year, a hard backset.

Cotton has been the backbone of improved financial conditions in Donley this year, and brings 1934 into view with the best prospects of any year since 1929.

LET'S BREAK A TRADITION

THE TEXAS SPIRIT

The spirit that was back of the few intrepid Texas soldiers at San Jacinto, whose heroic struggles changed the map of the Nation anl opened a vast empire to the development of Anglo-Saxon civilization, is the same spirit that has characterized the progress of Texas throughout the century.

Little did it matter to Sam Houston's men that they were in direst proverty, poorly clothed, without a day's provision ahead, unequipped with arms and ammunition to face their enemies and without assurance of any personal rewards. They were ready to fight, to suffer, to die, for the principles in which they believed and for the common good of all.

The heroism that characterized Texans at Goliad, at the Alamo, at San Jacinto, and on other Texas battlefields, was manifested in the equally courageous sacrifices of the pioneers who bravely faced the hardships necessary to the building of the high ideals of statecraft, education, and religion upon which Texas progress has been founded.

Truly Texas can look back upon a hundred years of marvelous achievement and make due acknowledgement to those pioneers to whom the State is indebted for all that its people now enjoy. If Texans are worthy descendants of a renowned ancestry, or appreciative recipients of a glorious heritage, they will not hesitate to render the homage that is due the founders of their great State.

By their votes the people of the State have asked that the events of 1836 be appropriately commemorated and have placed the responsibility for such action upon the Legislature. Unless the spirit of 1836 is dead, unless unless its faith falters, Texas will unite in showing to the world, in a resplendent celebration, its reverence for its founders, its pride in its progress, and its reasons for confidence in its future.

AUTO POWER BY RADIO

Another prediction which may sound fantastic was made some time ago, to the effect that we shall in a few years have automobiles that will run without fuel the motive power being supplied from a central station by radio.

The idea is advanced, not by a crank or visionary, but a no less authority than G. M. Williams, president of the Marion company, who declares that such a plan is receiving serious consideration by leading automotive engineers. According to this plan, each

car would have a certain receivdon't have mothers and daddys. ing wave-length, and by throwing the switch a generator of corresponding wave-length in the central station would supply the power. Many cars might have the same wave-length, so long as the total load could be carried by




