"A Tree Grows in Brooklyn" by Betty Smith, which was a best seller everywhere five years ago is coming out in a special illustrated edition, and this first book off the press will be the 2,949,309 copy to be printed. Miss Smith, who recently joined the faculty of Chapel Hill's drama department will soon bring out her second novel, "Tomorrow Will Be Better," on which she has been working since 1943. It too, has a Brooklyn setting, but is not a sequel.

Somerset Maugham's first novel since "Then and Now," will be an early 1948 publication. "It is called "Catrina"—a historical tale about Spain during the Inquisition.

Sinclair Lewis will spend the rest of this year traveling in the Middle West to gather material for a new novel—since "King's blood Royal" has proved a best seller for so long.

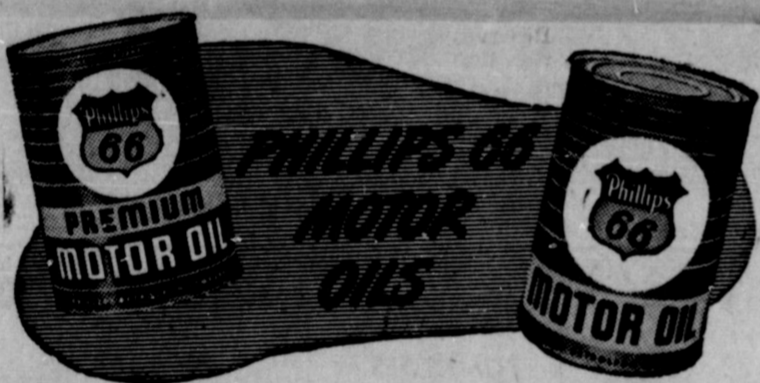
