Penalty To Fit Man

Speaking before the annual convention of the American Prison Association in Houston this week, Arthur D. Wood, chairman of the United States Board of Parole, suggested punishment to fit the criminal rather than punishment to fit the crime. And it may be that he voiced the solution to our criminal problem that has grown more and more serious during the past few years.

We are sorry that newspaper accounts did not give more particulars of Mr. Wood's plan, so that we could understand how laws might be drawn so as to be elastic enough to place a lighter penalty upon a crime committed by the first offender or the prospective good citizen, and yet deal properly with the hardened criminal. But we endorse the idea, never-the-less, and think Mr. Wood is on the right track.

As a matter of fact, our laws at the present time have been so modified and amended that we have, after a fashion, laws with punishments to fit the criminal rather than the crime. Suspended sentences are available for minor offenders yet not for criminals committing the same crimes. The parole and pardon is designated to lessen the penalty for the man who gives promise of finding himself again in the outside world.

And yet these safeguards, or rather modifications, have not had the proper effect. Rather than lessening crime, we have been lenient and watched crime increase. Possibly the increase was due not to the laws but to other circumstances. Possibly to abuses of the laws which had for their objective restoration to citizenship of the criminal.

The old order of exacting an eye for an eye isn't perfect; it isn't working the way it should. Maybe devising punishment to fit the criminal is the solution after all.

Wisconsin primaries bring forth again talk of a third party in American politics, which has witnessed the two-party system since the birth of the Republic. Startling results in other state primaries also have given incentive to talk of the breaking down of the two major parties and the establishment of a third.

And yet, should the two major parties fail to hold their lines intact through the 1934 and 1936 elections, we won't see a third party of any strength. Rather, there will be a realignment of political organizations, with possibly the establishment of two new major parties to take the place of those now in existence.

Should such a realignment come, it will have the support of logic and reason. In the old days a political party stood for definite things, and every candidate who ran on its ticket gave them his allegiance. Under the present system, neither party has a program that a majority of its members honestly support; neither can consistently obtain the allegiance that is essential to party discipline.

In the Republican party, for example, are such diametrically opposed men as Senator Reed of Pennsylvania and Senator Norris of Nebraska. It would be hard to think of a single issue on which they agree, yet each carries the same party label. In the Democratic party are conservative Senator Glass of Virginia, and extremely liberal Senator Bone of Washington—while the head of the party, President Roosevelt, maintains a middle ground between these opposing attitudes.

In the last presidential election, Senators Johnson, Norris, LaFollette and Borah refused to support the head of the Republican party, President Hoover, for re-election; and in the recent California primaries Senator Johnson, a Republican, sought and received the nomination of both Republican and Democratic parties. And, to make it more confusing, Upton Sinclair, lifelong Socialist, but running as a Democrat, rode easily into the gubernatorial nomination over all "regular" Democratic candidates, among them George Creel.

Should new party alignments come, it will not be in the form of a third party, but rather in two new parties, one representing the conservatives, the other the liberals and radicals. There will be no new political party in 1936, when President Roosevelt will seek re-election, but by 1940 may tell a different story.

Tom Hunter and his supporters, remarks the Fort Worth Press, fast are earning the reputation as the world's worst losers. The Press was speaking at the time of the efforts of the Texas senate to embarrass Attorney General James V. Alfred, nominee for Governor, by passing a resolution calling upon him to enforce the gambling laws in the state.

But since that time, other developments have tended to increase this feeling of poor sportsmanship on the part of the losers. A suit was filed by Joe Burkett and others in San Antonio endeavoring to keep Mr. Alfred's name off the ballot as the Democratic nominee because of excessive campaign expenditures.

Very likely too much money was spent during the recent campaign—both in behalf of Mr. Alfred and Mr. Hunter. But we feel sure that both candidates held strictly within the law and that money spent in their behalf was done so largely by over-enthusiastic supporters.

We heard much of harmony last week, and for a time it looked like harmony at last would prevail in Texas politics—yet every effort is being made to embarrass the nominee.

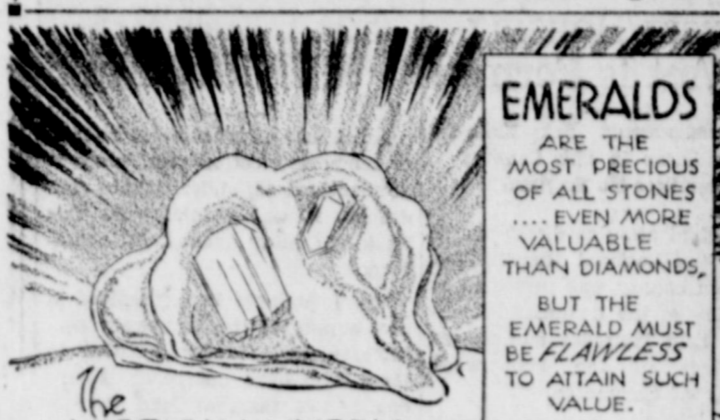

Fifty Famous Frontiersmen By Elmo Scott Watson

"The Father of Oklahoma"

CONSIDER the paradox of Capt. David L. Payne. He was the "father of Oklahoma," yet he was a native of Indiana; he was given his first name because of an event which took place in far-away Texas; he died and is buried in Kansas, which state has steadfastly resisted attempts to remove his body to Oklahoma; and the latter state has given him no official recognition beyond naming one of its original counties after him.

Born in Fairmont, Ind., December 29, 1836, his mother, who was a first cousin of Davy Crockett, named him David in honor of the frontier relative who had died gloriously at the fall of the Alamo a few months before. At the age of twenty-one Payne moved to Kansas and took up a claim near Atchison. He served in the Civil war in the Fourth Kansas regiment until 1863 when he was discharged. Then he became a member of the state legislature and postmaster at Fort Leavenworth.

In 1867 he was elected captain of a Kansas cavalry troop formed to fight the Indians and campaigned actively in the western part of the state. During the next two years he served with Gen. George A. Custer and his Seventh cavalry and, as the boon companion of the famous California Joe and actor in many a hair-breadth escape from death, won great renown as the "Scout of the Cimarron."

The year 1870 found him back in politics again, as a member of the state legislature of Kansas, as an unsuccessful candidate for the state senate in 1872 and finally as doorkeeper of the house of representatives in Washington where he remained until 1879. During his service as a scout for Custer, Payne had seen for himself the richness of the land in Oklahoma and in Washington he made the discovery, as he believed, that the lands in the western part of Indian territory, which had been ceded by the Creek Indians to the government for occupation by the other Civilized Tribes and by freedmen, in reality belonged to the public lands of the United States.

So Payne became the first "C/Oklahoma boomer" and the leader of no less than six of the eight expeditions of homeseekers, all of which tried to settle there and were expelled from the disputed territory by federal troops. Payne died suddenly in Wellington, Kan., November 27, 1884—"poisoned" by his enemies," so his friends declared—five years too soon to enjoy the realization of his dream.

THINGS ONE REMEMBERS By R. M. Hofer

Politicians who offer the wildest schemes promising to lift the people by their boot straps above every problem that besets them, are generally men who maintain little or no business of their own and who pay a minimum of taxes.

A mediocre public official—a servant of the people if you please—when clothed with temporary government authority, too often assumes the roll of master of the people.

When one scans the qualifications and ability of many public servants, one trembles to think what would happen to the industries and employment of the nation if their success rested in the hands of such managers. And yet men who never had the management or spending of four bits in nickles of their own, when elected or appointed to public office, have a free hand in spending millions and billions of taxpayers' money for every kind of scheme under the sun.

The official tax spenders are not liable for waste, inexperience or bad judgment. Their worst penalty is defeat for political office. The public pays the bill.

If private business were run by the same inexperienced management there would be no taxable assets to maintain government and finance political experiments.

The farther government gets away from the functions of governing and into competing business with its private citizens, the greater becomes the danger of undermining constitutional safeguards drawn to prevent entrenched officialism, and the more active must the people become in protecting their individual liberties through a careful weeding process in choosing their public servants.

No manager of an industry or housewife would knowingly keep a wasteful employe. No property owner or voter should knowingly keep a wasteful public servant.

WILLIAMS FARMERS ADOPT RESOLUTION ON COTTON CONTROL

Members of the Williams Agricultural Association have adopted a resolution calling for the amendment of the Bankhead Act so as to permit farmers to plant 33 1-3 per cent of their tillable land to cotton, and making planting of larger areas prohibitive, through the imposing of a confiscatory tax on excessive planting.

The resolution was proposed by the committee on resolutions of the association, composed of W. R. Chambers, J. M. Moore, J. R. Dill and W. H. Haynes. It follows closely the plan advocated by Mr. Chambers in an address opening the Rising Star fair last week.

Mayor Designates Fire Prevention Week, October 7-13

Mayor W. H. Thompson has issued an official proclamation setting aside the week of October 7 to 13 as Fire Prevention Week in Brownwood.

His proclamation follows: "Fire Prevention Week is again at hand. The object of the occasion is to remind the public of the seriousness of the large fire loss of this country, both as to life and property..."

"On those days I ask our civil and commercial organizations, our school officials and teachers, and our citizenship as a whole, to join with the chief of our fire department and our city fire marshal in arranging meetings and exercises for a study of ways and means of preventing fires..."

"During Fire Prevention Week, I urge that a thorough inspection of the entire city be conducted for the purpose of locating and removing fire hazards, and that the work thus inaugurated be hereafter expanded into a Fire Prevention Year."

Bath House At Hot Wells Destroyed By Fire Tuesday Night

The 40 by 100 foot bathhouse at Hot Wells was destroyed by fire about midnight Tuesday with an estimated loss of about \$4,000.

Origin of the fire has not been ascertained but firemen believe that it started from a short in the electrical wiring. All of the equipment in the bath house, including a number of bath tubs and electrical cabinets, were lost in the fire.

The resort is owned by a local stock company. Stockholders said today a meeting would be called soon to discuss plans for rebuilding the destroyed bath house.

Material To Repair Flood Gate To Be Shipped Soon

Material for repairing the flood-gate and gate tower and conduits at Lake Brownwood, which is being made up at the factory of Phillips and Davies, manufacturers of the gate, at Kenton, Ohio, will arrive in Brownwood September 25...

Everything will be in readiness to start repairs on the damaged gate, conduits and tower immediately when the material arrives.

Two expert gate installation engineers will be sent here by the manufacturers and these men will be in complete charge of all repairs.

Water Rights Of Brownwood Area Protected In Bill

Water rights of Brownwood County Water Improvement District No. 1 are completely protected in a new draft of the Colorado Authority Bill, Judge C. L. McCartney, attorney for the water district, stated Saturday after receiving a copy of the new bill.

Judge McCartney appeared before the Senate and House subcommittee, which redrafted the Colorado Authority bill, and voiced many objections to the original bill. Due to the objections raised by the Brownwood representatives, the objectionable features of the original bill have been eliminated in the redrafted bill.

"The new bill is a vast improvement on the bill as first introduced," Judge McCartney said today. "The most material features to which I objected have either been eliminated or materially changed. Some of the amendments I suggested have been adopted. The bill in its present form was intended to give us all the protection we asked for or deserve and I am of the opinion it does so."

For the past fifteen years it has been almost impossible, oil men say, to secure enough acreage in any one favorable territory to justify the spending of from \$25,000 to \$50,000 required to drill a deep test.

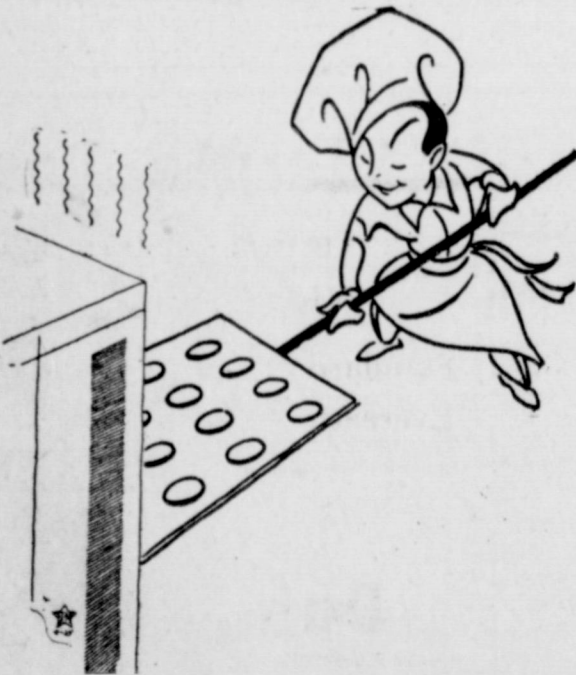
