Poppy-Making Program for 1946 In Full Production

With materials for more than 13,000,000 memorial poppies already distributed to hospitals and convalescent workshops throughout the country, the American Legion Auxiliary's poppy-making program for 1946 is now in full production, Mrs. Flem Caraway, Memorial Poppy Chairman of Clarendon Auxiliary Unit, has reported.

Total production of poppies this year is expected to exceed the 22,000,000 made by disabled veterans for the Auxiliary last year. Work will continue through the winter and spring months, giving employment to thousands of veterans of both wars who are unable to do other work. Last year 8,428 disabled veterans were employed, with earnings of \$241,176.28.

The memorial flowers will be distributed by unpaid volunteers from the Auxiliary on Poppy Day, May 25th, to be worn in honor of the dead of both wars. Contributions received for the poppies will be used in the work of The American Legion and Auxiliary for the welfare of disabled veterans, their families and the families of the dead.

Poppies which Clarendon Unit of the Auxiliary will distribute here next May are being made by disabled veterans at Legion, Texas. The Unit has ordered 1500 of the flowers, said Mrs. Caraway, believing that with a large percentage of the service men home, everyone will want to wear a poppy in remembrance of those never to return.

LIEUT. COMMANDER J. H. BOURLAND, OFFICIALLY DEAD

From N. Y. Herald Tribune, Feb. 2, 1946—Lieut. Commander Joseph Hunt Bourland, commander of the submarine Runner, which has been listed as lost since May, 1943, is now officially considered dead, according to a message from the Navy Department received yesterday by his wife, the former Gertrude Peppard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. R. Peppard, of 390 West End Ave.

Commander Bourland was born at Clarendon, Texas, January 31, 1911. He attended Texas A&M College before entering the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, where he was made regimental commander in 1933. He received there the sword for ranking highest in mathematics and was graduated fourth in his class.

He married in 1937 in Shanghai when he was a lieutenant (j. g.) attached to a submarine division. Surviving, besides his wife, are two children, David Lawrence, five, and Joanne Ray, three.

Commander Bourland was a son of Mack Bourland who lives near Quail, Texas.

MAY MAIL ELEVEN-POUND PACKAGES TO SAILORS

Packages addressed to Navy men overseas may now weigh 11 pounds instead of the former 5, Postmaster J. C. Estlack stated today.

Maximum weight for army parcels was relaxed several weeks ago, Mr. Estlack explained. But in respect to both branches of service, the new rate does not alter the frequency of mailing—one package each week.

The boxes or packages are limited to 42 inches in length, and 72 inches in length and girth combined.

March of Dimes Campaign Proves Successful

According to the latest reports from the local March of Dimes Committee, Donley County has cleared \$310.10. The coin collectors at the City Water Office will be left there until after the tenth of the month, by request, and this should add several dollars to the fund. Half of the total amount will remain in Donley County to combat any cases of polio in the county; the other half will be sent to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to be used to help pay for research work.

Hedley took a very active part in this year's fund-raising campaign and turned in a total of \$49.93. The Pastime Theatre led in the amount collected by means of the little coin collectors; total amount collected at the Pastime was \$12.65. Lee's Cafe had the second largest collection, \$7.72. Sanford's Grocery was third with \$5.40.

Balance in the local treasury at the beginning of the 1946 campaign was \$205.90. This year's collections are the largest ever to be raised in Donley County and will increase our local fund to over \$360.00.

Poll Tax Receipts At Normal High

According to the Tax-Assessors office, the 1946 Poll Tax receipts issued before midnight January 31st totaled 1,728. This number is near the average high of around 1800 but in reality exceeds the average year in that all the return veterans and over agers get a free vote which will bring the total voting power in the county to near the 2,500 mark. The latter figure is only an estimate as no accurate count can be made.

A first edition of T. E. Lawrence's "Seven Pillars of Wisdom" sold at auction recently in London for \$1,680.

"Before the Sun Goes Down" by Elizabeth W. Howard won the Doubleday-Doran prize of \$20,000 and also the M.G.M. award of \$125,000.

The George Washington Carver award went to "Mrs. Palmer's Honey" by Fannie Cook.

The fifteen best sellers in fiction as given in a tally made by the Retail Bookseller, a monthly

trade magazine of unquestioned authority, mentioned six which we have on our shelves as follows: "The Robe", Lloyd C. Douglas; "The Green Years," A. J. Cronin; "A Lion Is in the Streets," A. L. Langley; "Leave Her to Heaven," Ben Ames Williams; "Earth and High Heaven," Gwetholyn Graham; "Green Dolphin Street," Elizabeth Goudge; Ernie Pyle's "Brave Men," and "This Is Your War" were both best sellers in non-fiction, and are still very popular with our readers.

The Library of Congress recent-

ly had on display the autograph copy of the hymn "America" made in 1888 by Dr. Samuel F. Smith. The exhibit marked the fiftieth anniversary of the death of the author.

Miss Coppelin, assistant Librarian of the Helsingborg City Library in Sweden, is in this country observing library methods under an Industrial Fellowship of the American - Scandinavian Foundation.

The Enoch Pratt Free Library of Baltimore recently celebrated its sixtieth anniversary.

Recently the Library of Congress had on display the earliest extant map of the world, printed in China in 1612. This map gave to the Chinese their first ocular description of a round world, with the two hemispheres and the five continents in their relative positions and demonstrated how places and countries could be located by latitude and longitude.

Deputy Collectors Will Be Here Feb. 18 At Donley County State Bank

"In spite of all the changes in the income tax laws, March 15 is still the deadline for filing final income tax returns.

"Everyone who had a gross income of \$500 or more in 1945 must file a return. This even includes minor children with \$500 or more gross income. In addition, many wage earners whose salaries were subject to withholding will not owe a tax for the year, but must, nevertheless, file a return in order to obtain a refund of amounts withheld by their employers from their salaries or wages.

"In order to give taxpayers of this locality first hand assistance in the preparation of their returns, the Collector of Internal Revenue at Dallas, is sending Deputy Collectors Harry T. Warner and J. A. Desmond to Donley County State Bank, Clarendon, Texas on February 18, 1946.

"All taxpayers who need assist-

ance or information in filing their income tax returns for the year 1945 are urged to go to the town nearest them on the date of the deputy collectors' visit. Between March 1 and March 15 most of the Deputies will be stationed at their various Zone Offices. If you miss seeing them on their visit to your town, you will then have to go to the nearest Zone Office for help.

"The Collector urges every taxpayer to make an effort to bring his tax problems before the Deputy Collectors named above, on the dates shown. The point is stressed that you must bring with you all of your Withholding Receipts, together with complete information as to all 1945 income, expenses and deductions. The Deputy Collectors will need this information before they can give you advice as to how to file your return."

 Chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee Tom Connally holds a position in foreign affairs second only to the Secretary of State. As cited in an article, "Texas Peacemaker" in the February CORONET, it will be his job to steer the Senate through the treaties and agreements of enduring peace.
 Because of all this, what "Tawm" Connally says carries weight. But that's not the only reason the visitor's gallery is packed when he speaks. Many people come to hear how he says it. For Big Tom is a magnificent orator of the Old School. But although he gives the appearance of an old time Shakespearean showman, Tom's booming voice is pure Texas-American. It says what Tom thinks in the vernacular of a shrewd but simple country boy.
 For Thomas Terry Connally is a country boy CORONET tells us—born and bred in McLennan County, where his ready tongue and thin legs earned him the nicknames of "Talking Tom" and "Double Barrel-Shotgun." His father often said: "Tom, I never had much education. If I'da had your chance, I'da run for Congress."
 So, in 1916 Connally ran for Congress - - and he's been in Washington ever since. But he brought a bit of Texas with him to the Capitol, where the senator and his wife are famous for their Sunday breakfasts of sausage, pink grapefruit, peach preserves, and smoked ham—all from Texas.
 After World War I Connally was an advocate of the League and the World Court. Washingtonians remember that when Senator Nye charged President Wilson with duping the country into war, Connally challenged Nye to a fist fight.
 The years haven't diminished that spirit, and the galleries soon will be crowded again to hear Big Tom orate for a new world organization to keep the peace. It's not every man—nor every country, concludes CORONET - - that gets such a second chance.

Naval Reserve To Be Organized In Early July
 NEW ORLEANS—As many as 22 battalions and 82 divisions of the Navy's Ready Reserve and Standby Reserve are expected to be organized in the Eighth Naval District in the near future, Capt. Arthur A. Ageton, USN, District Director of Naval Reserve, disclosed recently.
 Capt. Ageton, who commanded the famous LST Flotilla Three in the Pacific, recently was assigned the task of reorganizing the Naval Reserve in the Eighth Naval District, comprising the states of Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas, Tennessee, Mississippi, Texas, Alabama and western Florida.
 "In the near future, the Navy will be looking for live-wire young Naval Reserve Officers, who obtained experience on active duty during this war, to head up the various battalions and divisions, and complete the organization of the Ready Reserve throughout the district," he said.
 "Later, additional officers will be selected. Recruiting of enlisted men for the Naval Reserve will commence about the first of July."

 A graduate of the U. S. Naval Academy in 1923, Capt. Ageton spent two years in the China Theater before the war.

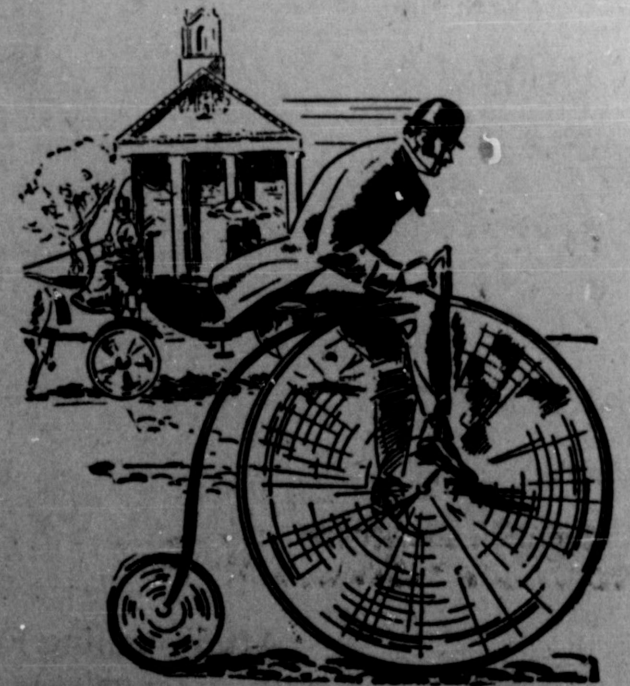

If the people of this district are kind enough to elect me District Attorney I pledge full cooperation with the Courts, Peace Officers and Grand Juries in all matters of law enforcement, and to devote my time and best efforts towards making you a good district attorney; and to vigorously, but fairly, prosecute all criminal cases coming under the jurisdiction of the office.

I hope to meet all of the people of the district, if possible, before the primary election. Your assistance in my behalf will be greatly appreciated.
