Shannon Cooper had the Grand Champion heifer.

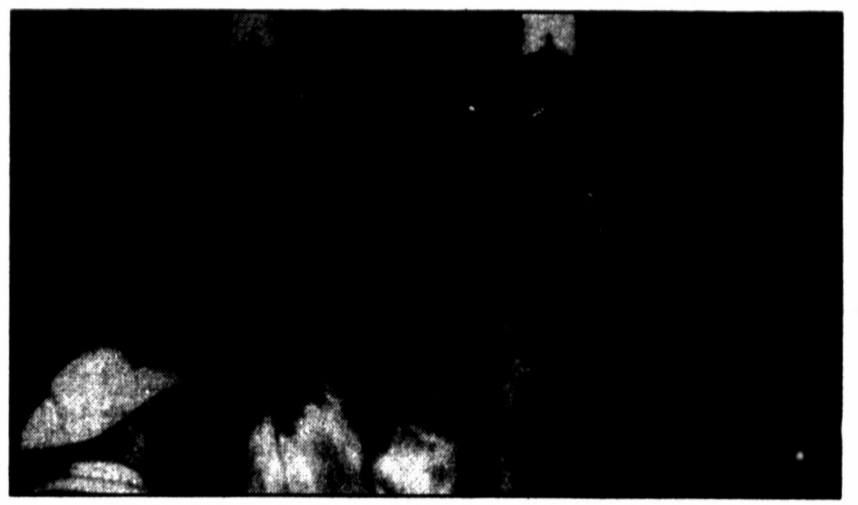

## Bronchos Open District Play With Wins Over Memphis and Canadian

The Clarendon Bronchos opened up important District 2-2A play with wins over Memphis and Canadian for an unblemished 2-0 record and sole possession of first place at press time.

Their overall record improved to 15-4 with the two wins.

The Bronchos dominated Canadian's Wildcats from the outset Friday speeding to a 15-4 first quarter lead behind Roy Williams 6 points.

"Our defense didn't allow (Canadian) to score many points," head coach Jimmy Avery said. "(Canadian) was very frustrated. They couldn't run their offense. They couldn't get off a shot."

Clemmie Smith, who grabbed 10 rebounds put in four field goals and a free throw in the second quarter for an 18-point effort and a 33-17 halftime lead at home.

"Clemmie did a good job rebounding. It wasn't a great night on the boards for us, but the main reason we struggled during the game was because of our low shooting percentage and Canadian shot a lot of free throws in the game."

Five Bronchos scored in the third quarter for another 15 points.

Chris Brown, who had 4 rebounds, 3 blocks and 2 steals, tossed in two buckets in the third quarter.

Clarendon's defense, which caused 15 steals held Canadian to 11 points in the third period.

The Bronchos pulled off of the Wildcats in the fourth quarter and scored only 6 points.

Canadian had one of its most productive quarters scoring 13 points.

Scoring for the Bronchos were Williams, 15 points, 4 rebounds; Smith, 14 points, 4 blocks; Lorenzo Moore, 12 points, 6 rebounds; Kareem Abdullah, 7 points, 5 assists and 3 steals; Chris Brown, 4 points; Drew Jeffers, 1 point; and Dean Stanzione,

1 point, 4 steals and 5 assists.

Mark Barefield grabbed 2 rebounds and had a steal and a block.

"It was our worst shooting night of the year," Avery said. "We only shot 35 percent and that's a lot of credit to Canadian. They play good defense, but our athleticism took over. We got more shots off than they did."

"I told the kids at the beginning of the year that if you shoot bad you can still win. If you play good defense, you can win a lot of ball games. We won that game because of pure hustle. It wasn't a very pretty game."

A 23-point second quarter pushed Clarendon to a 41-24 halftime lead and control of their contest with Memphis Jan. 9 in Clarendon.

Clarendon led 18-15 at the end of the first quarter. Williams, who was high-point with 24, scored a field goal, a three-pointer and four free throws in the opening period.

"Memphis was doing a good job handling our pressure," Avery said. "After the first quarter, we turned up the pressure and their guards couldn't handle it. They turned the ball over quite a bit."

The Bronchos increased their halftime lead to 41-24 as Williams scored four baskets and Moore put in two buckets of his own and two free throws.

Moore had the hot hand in the third quarter, connecting on three field goals as the Bronchos scored 21 points and held Memphis to their lowest quarter - 7. Clarendon entered the final quarter with a hefty 62-31 lead.

"Memphis committed a lot of turnovers, and we forced a lot of them through steals," Avery said. "Our defense played really well."

Smith put in two baskets and two free throws in the final quarter, and Theo Oliver connected on a trey and a field goal for a 20-point effort.

Clarendon's defense, which is the Bronchos' strong point, held Memphis to 12 points.

Scoring for the Bronchos were Williams, 24; Moore, 16; Smith, 10; Jeffers, 9; Stanzione, 5; Abdullah, 5; Oliver, 5; Barefield, 4; and Brown, 4.

Wellington travels to Clarendon Friday for an 8 p.m. match-up with the Bronchos. "Wellington has been playing really well," Avery said. "They have a lot of talent, and they'll be tough to beat."

The Bronchos meet Highland Park in Hornet territory Tuesday for an 8 p.m. match-up.

"Highland Park is coming off an emotional 60-58 win over Panhandle last Friday," Avery said. "They'll be up for us."

## Installation Payments May Ease Burden Of Paying Taxes

Taxpayers who are over 65 years old may make installment payments on some of their taxes. Besides being at least 65 years of age, the individuals must be paying on property that the person owns and occupies as a residence homestead. The taxes are to be paid in four equal installments, the first being due before February 1. The other payments are due before April 1, before June 1 and before August 1.

Another payment plan available pertains to making escrow payments

in order to pay taxes in advance. For example, a taxpayer may enter into a payment contract this month and make nine equal monthly payments toward the 1996 taxes. The advantage in using this method is that the taxes are paid by the time the statement is mailed in October.

# Lady Bronchos Open District Strong

Clarendon grabbed a share of the District 2-2A lead at press time after emotional wins over Memphis and Canadian in the opening round of district play.

Their overall record improves to 14-6 for the season.

"I thought we needed to have wins to have a shot at getting in the play-off picture," head coach Steve Schmidt said. "Next week (this week) we play the two teams (Panhandle, Wellington) that everybody favors in our district."

"We needed to capitalize on our games this first half because we have three home games. We can still do well next half, but it's more in our favor to do well this half."

Clarendon romped to a 21-15 first quarter lead as five Lady Bronchos added to the scorefest.

Nettie Wilson, who had a season-high 19 points scored 6 in the opening period; and Melisse Campbell added 6 points of her own. Lindsey Eads came off the bench and dished in two baskets as Kasi Ashcraft added a basket and Corey Knorpp connected on her first of two treys.

Stephanie Floyd added four points in the second quarter for a 10-point effort, and the Lady Bronchos led 31-24 at halftime.

"We were really hot early in the first quarter and led by as much as 9, but they kept coming back. They kept staying close," Schmidt said of district rival Canadian.

"It wasn't a surprise to us. We knew we wouldn't run away with it, but we knew if we kept playing our game, we felt like we could outlast them. There were quite a few times they'd get within 5 or 6 points."

Canadian kept pace with Clarendon in the third period as both squads scored 15 points apiece. Wilson added 7 more points, and Ashcraft put in 6 more.

Most of those came off of assists from Knorpp and Campbell. The junior Knorpp had 8 important assists for

the game, and Campbell had 6 contributions to the scoring effort.

"We mainly fed it into (Nettie), and she was hot," Schmidt said. "This was her turnaround game. Hopefully she can keep it up."

Clarendon outscored Canadian 23-11 in the final period to run away with the victory. Knorpp had a trey, a field goal, and a free throw; and Wilson continued her inside assault racking up 6 points.

Scoring for the Lady Bronchos were Wilson, 19; Knorpp, 12; Ashcraft, 12; Campbell, 10; Floyd, 7; Eads, 6; and Kim Alexander, 2.

Memphis made Clarendon scratch and claw throughout most of the game Jan. 9 in Clarendon, but the Lady Bronchos outlasted the Lady Cyclones, blowing them out in the fourth quarter to the tune of 62-43.

Knorpp hit two treys and a field goal in the opening period to pace the Lady Bronchos as they led 14-10.

"They have some good athletes, and they have a good point guard," Schmidt said in recapping the game. "They really just let her dribble until she could create something, and she drove in and got some lay-ups. She's a pretty good playmaker."

With Campbell on the bench in foul trouble, Knorpp hit another three-pointer and a pair of free throws in the second quarter as Eads came off the bench and hit a trey.

Ashcraft threw in two baskets for a 12-point second quarter, but the Lady Cyclones outscored Clarendon, putting in 17 points and headed into halftime with a slim 27-26 lead.

Clarendon regained the momentum in the third quarter as Cindy Hearn hit from behind the arc and put in a field goal as the Lady Bronchos scored 15 and held Memphis to 9.

"They pressured us pretty good defensively, but we just wanted to play hard and felt like we could outlast them and felt like eventually they would fall apart," Schmidt said. "We weren't able to pressure them much

early because we were in foul trouble, but we really put it on them in the end."

They began pulling away in the fourth quarter outscoring Memphis, 21-7.

Scoring for the Lady Bronchos were Knorpp, 17; Ashcraft, 15; Wilson, 9; Eads, 7; Hearn, 5; Floyd, 4; Campbell, 4; and Alexander, 1.

Next up for the Lady Bronchos is always-strong Wellington who Clarendon beat by 7 points in the final game of the Shamrock Invitational Tournament Dec. 2 in Shamrock.

Elliott hit a trey, D.J. Edwards scored a basket, and Archuleta hit a pair of free throws in the final quarter. Memphis had its most productive quarter, putting away 13 points to make the game close.

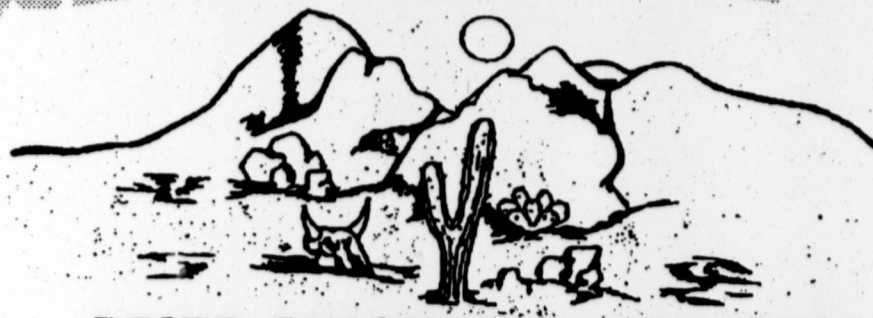

## Check It Out!

Poetry lovers, have you discovered the large selection of poetry at Burton Memorial Library? Even though I enjoy poetry, it is seldom my first choice when seeking a new reading interest. After realizing my neglect of letting you know what is available in this area, I did some poetical exploring of library shelves last week.

There aren't many who enjoy every kind of poetry, but you'll have no trouble locating your favorite, whether it's serious, humorous, romantic, colloquial, dramatic, modern, or from past centuries. I easily recognized 18th and 19th century "masters" studied in my high school and college English Literature classes when I came across the names, Tennyson, Keats, Milton, Browning, Byron, Poe, Burns, Kipling, Chaucer, Wordsworth, O Henry, Morley, Emerson, Longfellow, and others, too numerous to mention in one article. Chances are that these names are also recognizable to your junior high, high school, or college student. English Literature classes continue to introduce them, for their fabulous works are classics which will never become extinct, and are as fresh as the day they were written. The introductions in almost all of these books contain a brief description of the lives and philosophies of the individual poets, enlightening to you, and most beneficial for students who have the need for such information in school-required reports. Also, with UIL nearing, Burton Memorial Library's large variety offers assistance as students make their choices for poetry and speaking competitions.

While browsing through the poets, two books which particularly caught my eye were *Familiar Quotations* and *And I Quote* which would be interesting and worthwhile as home library additions.

In *Familiar Quotations*, John Bartlett has combined "a collection of passages, phrases, and proverbs traced to their sources in ancient and modern literature." Not only are the quotations from poets, but from all walks of life. Will Rogers, Charles Lindbergh, Ogden Nash, Zane Gray, Winston Churchill, and Franklin Delano Roosevelt are only a few. Some of the phrases, dating back as early as the 1700s have practically become household words. Anonymous and Bible quotations are included among the 1067 pages followed by a 459 page detailed index. *And I Quote* is a valuable resource book for the contemporary speechmaker. Authors Ashton Applewhite, William R. Evans III, and Andrew Frothingham have organized it conveniently for public speakers to quickly locate clever and wise comments to increase audience interest in their speeches. The quotations from figures in entertainment, sports, political, and cultural fields are suitable for any occasion, and might possibly make the point which speakers need to convey their messages. You don't have to be a public speaker to enjoy this highly entertaining book. There's just nothing quite like that wonderfully unique Texas poetry, is there? You'll find it in the Texas section.

## Ag News

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced procedures for a referendum on a proposed sheep and wool promotion, research, education and information order. The referendum will be conducted February 6, 1996.

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, an agency in the marketing and regulatory programs mission area, has oversight responsibility for federal research and promotion programs. AMS administrator Lon Hatamiya said all producers, feeders and importers who certify they were engaged in the production, feeding or importation of sheep or sheep products (except importers of raw wool only) between January 1 and December 31, 1994, are eligible to vote.

Voters may register and vote in person or request absentee ballots at the Donley County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Office. Absentee ballots must be requested from the county Extension office serving the county of voter residence, for individuals, or the county where the business headquarters is located, for corporations. Absentee ballot requests, filed in person or by mail, may be made between January 16 and January 26, 1996. Absentee ballots must be received in extension offices by close of business February 2.

The Farm Service Agency, formerly the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, will count ballots, determine eligibility of voters, and tabulate results.

For the order to go into effect, the proposal must be approved either by a simple majority of voters or by voters who account for two-thirds of the sheep and wool production represented in the referendum.

If approved, the program would be funded by mandatory assessments. Domestic producers and feeders would be assessed 1 cent per pound on sales of live sheep and 2 cents per pound on sales of greasy wool. Importers would be assessed 1 cent per pound or the equivalent on imported degreased wool and wool products.

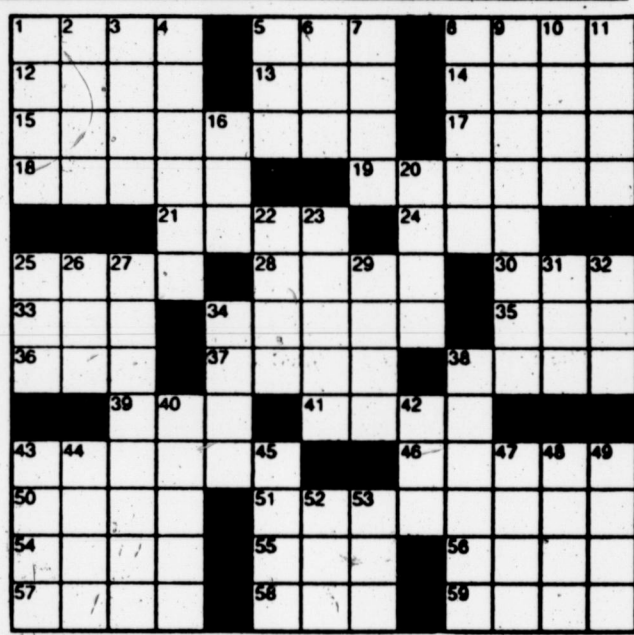



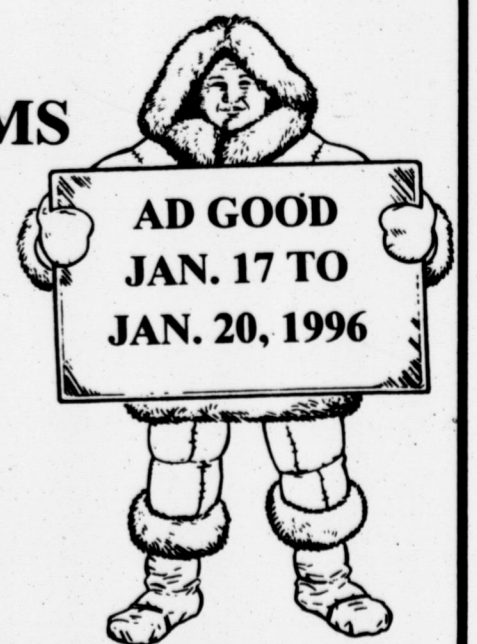
