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Sarpalius Says No, And His Former Aide Says Yes To Congressional Bid

Ex-Congressman Uses Gov't Experience To Operate Business Consulting Firm

Former Congressman Bill Sarpalius has announced that he will not seek election to the 13th Congressional District.

Sarpalius cited pending business opportunities as reasons not to pursue his former congressional seat, which he lost to Clarendon native Mac Thornberry in the 1994 elections.

"It has been an honor to serve the people of the 13th Congressional District and the 31st State Senatorial District for more than 14 years," Sarpalius said. "I have no regrets and will be eternally grateful to my constituents who gave me the opportunity to serve as an elected official. Maybe someday in the future that op-

portunity will come my way again," Sarpalius said.

Sarpalius is now occupied as president of Congressman to Congressman Consulting which assists businesses nationally and internationally as they try to navigate through the American and international political systems.

"I enjoy the opportunity to use my experience to assist businesses with ideas and techniques which help them break through many bureaucratic processes. I have been blessed to have served Texas and the United States. Now I look forward to being an entrepreneur and living the American dream," Sarpalius said.

Alejandro To Run Against Thornberry For District 13 Seat

A candidate from the Democratic Party has emerged to face Republican Mac Thornberry in this year's general election.

Aaron Alejandro, Wichita Falls businessman and former aide to Bill Sarpalius, recently announced his candidacy for United States Congress.

"It is with a great love for this country, state, and district that I proudly announce with the support of my friends, family, and, most importantly, my dear wife Jennifer and son Chandler, my candidacy for the 13th Congressional District of Texas," Alejandro said.

Alejandro said that representing the people will be an important issue in the upcoming election. "I believe that a Congressman's first duty is to represent the people who sent him to Washington," Alejandro said.

"There will be critical issues that affect the people of the 13th District which Mr. Thornberry cannot avoid. Irresponsible cuts in Medicare, Medicaid, veteran benefits, student loan

GTE Customers Must Dial Seven Digits For Local Calls On Jan. 22

Hedley's Extended Local Calling Program Can Telephone Clarendon, Wellington, and Memphis For Low Monthly Rate

Beginning on Jan. 22, GTE customers in Clarendon will have to dial all seven digits when making local calls within the Clarendon service area according to a press release issued today.

The change in dialing procedure is a part of a move by GTE to extend local calling for customers in Hedley.

Effective Jan. 22, 1996, residents in Hedley can call numbers in McLean, Memphis, Wellington, Clarendon, and Hedley as local calls.

Clarendon customers will be able to dial Hedley as a local number, but calls from Clarendon to Memphis, Wellington, and McLean will still accrue long distance charges.

The implementation of this service may require modification to some telecommunications equipment such as fax machines, speed calling, PABXs, key systems, automatic dialers and other equipment that may restrict or automatically dial long-distance numbers.

Prior to the start of Extended Local Calling, each call between the areas was billed separately as a long-distance call, and customers would see a long-distance charge per call on their monthly bills," said GTE's Larry King, Area Manager - Customer Operations, Plains District. "Now these calls are equivalent to local calls," explained Mr. King.

This action is a result of balloting which took place in the Hedley telephone service area under the rules of Senate Bill 632 and the Public Util-

ity Commission Rule 23.49 (c). Under those guidelines, certain communities were allowed to petition for extended toll-free local calling to nearby communities.

Customers are not required to take any action to take advantage of the new service offering. Once extended calling is operational, it will no longer be necessary for customers to dial "1+" before the number when placing calls between these communities.

A per-line increase in the total monthly bill of \$3.50 for residential customers and \$7 for business customers will be assessed to customers in Hedley for the added service. The charges will be listed as "Expanded Local Calling" in the tax portion of the telephone bill. More information will be provided to affected customers in their monthly telephone bill as the service becomes operational.

Residential customers with questions about the ELC service should call toll-free 1-800-762-1706, and business customers should call 1-800-483-5400.

Lady Bronchos Roll Over Shamrock and Tulia, Improve Record To 12-6

Clarendon's Lady Bronchos swept two games against Class 3A Tulia and Class 1A Shamrock last week improving their record to 12-6.

The Lady Bronchos led throughout much of the game but ended up squeaking by Tulia's Lady Hornets, 34-33, Jan. 2, in Tulia.

Korey Knorpp fired off of a trey and a field goal while Stephanie Floyd chipped in a bucket, and Kasi Ashcraft connected on one of two free throws for an 8-4 first quarter lead.

Sophomore Melisse Campbell scored two three-pointers and a field goal for the Lady Bronchos' only points of the second quarter.

Tulia put in 8 of their own, and Clarendon headed into the locker room with a 16-12 halftime advantage.

"They overtook us in the second quarter, and the last few minutes we came on strong and got the lead going in at halftime," head coach Steve Schmidt said. "I thought we played really smart and had a lot of patience because they have a zone defense that really spreads you out."

"You have to take your time to get the open shots, and our girls did a good job of it."

I felt like we outplayed them in the first half, and if we continued to play smart, we were going to come out on top."

Four Lady Bronchos scored in the third quarter for a 9-point effort and held Tulia to 7.

Knorpp got the hot hand in the final quarter, putting in a three-pointer and two baskets. Kim Alexander added a bucket for a 9-point fourth quarter.

Tulia responded with a 14-point fourth quarter and had a chance to win it but the shot went astray.

"They put some pressure on, were running out of time, and knew we had to get the ball somehow, and there was a lot of contact and they got some breaks. We just had to regain some composure."

Schmidt, who was an assistant at Tulia prior to taking the head job at Clarendon this year, said it was strange coaching against his old players.

"It's still a friendly place to go, but it was weird coaching against my old girls. I didn't have a hard time wanting to win. There were a lot of people that I got to see and told me 'good luck,' and that really made us feel good."

Scoring for the Lady Bronchos were Knorpp, 14; Campbell, 10; Floyd, 4; Nettie Wilson, 3; Alexander, 2; and Ashcraft, 1.

Ashcraft scored 11 field goals and converted all seven of her free throws for a career-high 29 points as Clarendon raced past Shamrock, 59-37, Friday in the Clarendon gym.

The Lady Bronchos made an early dent in Shamrock after the first quarter, leading 13-8. Nine of those points were from Ashcraft.

"We just kept going to her," Schmidt said. "They were keeping their biggest post on Nettie (Wilson), so we kept going to Kasi (Ashcraft). She was just really hot, and we kept going to her."

"She also had 18 rebounds. It was a great game for her."

Clarendon increased its lead to 28-16 by halftime and 42-25 entering the final quarter.

Ashcraft scored three baskets in the third quarter and four in the third before converting six free throws in

Sitting in the wooden church pew, my four-year-old daughter, Stacie Leigh, sandwiched between myself and her equally adorable mother, I couldn't imagine being happier.

We were living on a 16-acre spread of Bermuda grass in the Northeast Texas community of Overton, a sleepy hamlet about half the size of Clarendon. Ours was an old country chapel with less than 20 active members - like being part of a close-knit family.

If you ever missed a Sunday, you could expect a telephone call before 2 p.m. with the genuinely concerned voice on the other end of the line checking to see who was sick. It was that kind of town.

On this January day, an unseasonably warm one in the Pineywoods, our minister preached on renewal, a timely topic given the penchant of some to make New Year's resolutions.

About midway through the sermon, Stacie began choking. Claudia and I had a bad habit of feeding Lifesavers to Stacie during church - a bribe for an hour's worth of relative stillness. As I looked over at her, it became instantly apparent that a Lifesaver was hung up in her throat.

I patted her on the back a couple of times, then a couple times more. Not wanting to disturb the preacher's sermon anymore than we had already, I gathered Stacie up and carried her to the foyer of the church. There, I banged on her back even harder - no response, continued choking.

At that juncture, I was beginning to panic a bit. Back then I didn't know how to administer the Heimlich maneuver - had never even heard of it. So, I did something that must have looked awfully stupid and probably was. I turned her upside down and shook her violently by the heels, hoping to dislodge the stubborn candy.

No luck. As my daughter continued to choke, panic was now rampant. By that time, Claudia had rushed to the foyer, and I blurted out, "Let's get to the hospital."

Yes, Overton had a little hospital, such that it was. It stood about three-quarters of a mile from the church. We bolted off in a total frenzy, running to the car with Stacie in my arms.

About half way to the hospital, I looked over at my tiny daughter, cradled in her mother's arms, and it seemed Stacie's eyes were rolling back in her head. I slammed on the brakes, screeching the car to the curb, and stammered to Claudia, "I don't think we're going to make it."

I was no doctor; I didn't know how much trouble Stacie was really in. All I knew was that I was horrified my storybook world was collapsing around me in a flash.

Thinking back on it, what happened next still amazes me. I took Stacie in my arms and tilted her head back, then began cramming my big hand - once capable of palming a basketball - down her little throat. I stretched and crammed, seemingly forcing my entire hand into her mouth, finally touching what was left of the Lifesaver with the very edge of a fingernail.

Straining even more, feeling like I was going to tear my daughter's mouth apart at the sides, I remember crying, "Dear God, please help me!" Somehow I got hold of the candy and raked it out of her throat.

She began to cry and catch her breath as I repeatedly prayed, "Thank you, Lord. Thank you, Lord."

In that nightmarish moment, when there was no way that I could have forced my meaty mit into a four-year-old's smallish mouth, yet it happened, I made a promise - a New Year's resolution of the highest accord. In my frenzied state, I had pledged to God that if he would only save my daughter, I would be good; I would turn over a permanent new leaf. Heck, I would have turned over a whole cabbage patch at the time.

And I did do better. For a while. As time passed, the memory of that day faded like a pair of cheap jeans, and I ultimately returned to my sinful self. Rather than doing unto others as I would have them do unto me, I simply did unto others.

I once again became the center of my world. My patience for the shortcomings of others ebbed as my expectations that they would forgive mine heightened.

It was business as usual. While I reneged on my part of the bargain, the Lord kept his, Stacie growing into a beautiful young woman and enjoying countless blessings.

After that, I pretty much stopped making New Year's resolutions. There was really no place to go, I guess, after defaulting on that deal. Still, the Big Guy left me with the memory of that frightful day, perhaps not as vivid as it once was, but enough to give me pause whenever I ponder it.

All this is not to say that New Year's resolutions are without merit. On the contrary, I'm certain stronger people make lasting lifestyle changes in January, from losing weight to saving money. But, for me, meaningful change has carried a pricetag too high. I've mostly shopped in the Wal-Mart of life.

Truth is an unyielding little pest, an absolute without rival. At the root of resolution is resolve. And as Shakespeare might say, ah, there's the rub.

Barnes, Sims Work To Build 'The Bridge'

Larry Barnes, Executive Director of The Bridge - Children's Advocacy Center, and District Attorney Randall C. Sims have reached an agreement that will have very beneficial effects for the child victims of sexual and physical assault in 100th Judicial District.

The Bridge provides professional interview services for child victims of sexual and physical abuse conducted by experts specifically trained to conduct such interviews. Using their service prevents the already traumatized child victim from being further traumatized by repeated interviews. Secondly, they provide the assistance of a multi-agency review team which reduces the amount of time needed for investigation of these offenses. The use of these two programs has been shown to increase the rate of convictions for these types of offenses.

Currently, law enforcement and victims in the 100th Judicial District have to travel to Amarillo or Pampa to take advantage of the services offered by The Bridge. Today plans were finalized to make those services available at Childress, Wellington, Memphis, Clarendon, and Panhandle.

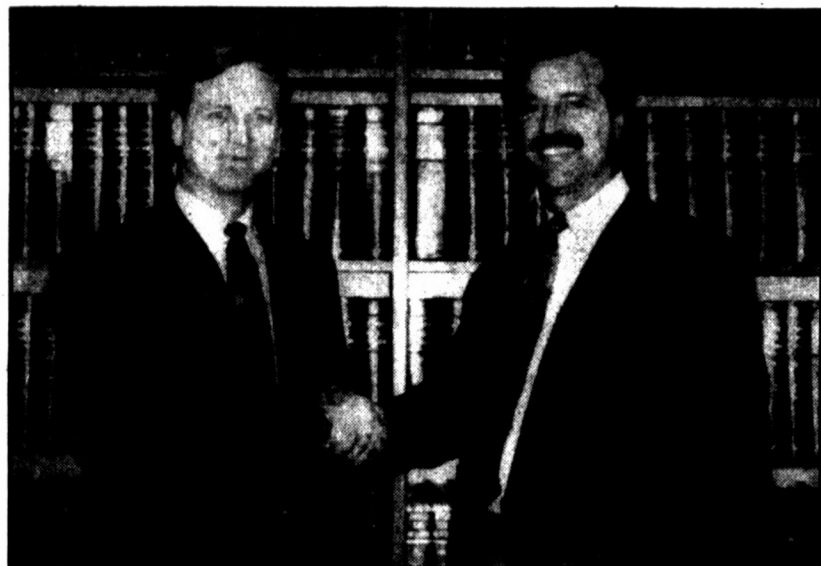

There were twenty-two participating merchants/businesses for this year's campaign. The number is expected to grow for next year.

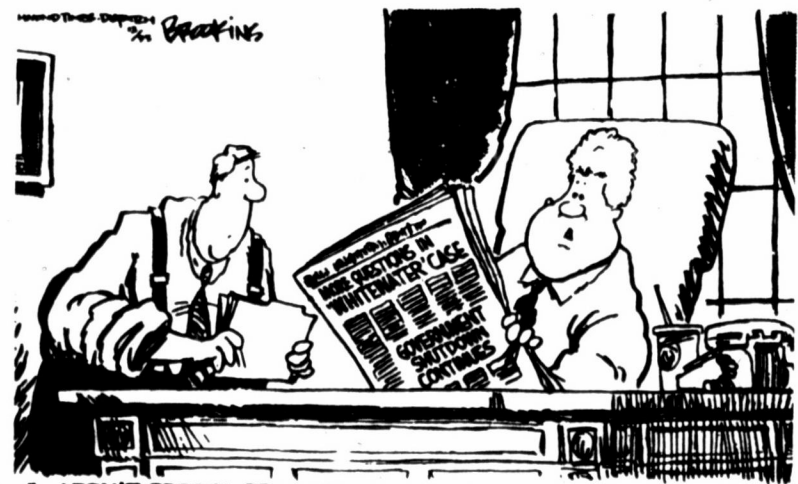

US Government Reminds Public That Firearms Are Prohibited In Federal Buildings

The US General Services Administration, the agency which operates Federal facilities, and enforces violation of law on such properties, issued a reminder today that firearms and weapons are still prohibited on Federal property.

The agency indicated that Federal laws which prohibit carrying fire-

arms on US Government property supersede the Texas law which begins January 1, 1996, that will allow qualifying Texas to carry concealed firearms. Individuals who are found in violation of the existing Federal law (title 18, United States Code, Section 930) are subject to arrest and/or citation by the Federal Protective Service.

She was preceded in death by a sister, Lawanda Sue McAnear, in 1939 and by her father, James Albert McAnear in 1993.

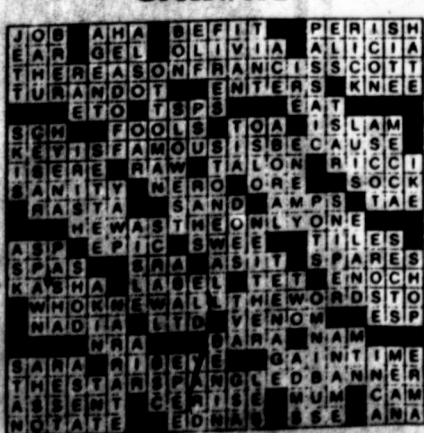

Happy New Year

Hello everybody. Peering into my crystal ball, the images of 1996 are a little hazy, but the future holds great promise for those of us who love the outdoor world.

Thanks to an increasing number of anglers who practice catch and release, fishing on our local reservoirs continues to improve.

My first prediction is that the fishing at Lake Meredith should be even better in 1996. The lake level remains high, over 85 feet according to the television weathermen. Whenever the lake is higher than about 78 feet, both the largemouth and smallmouth bass benefit from an abundance of prime spawning grounds. An extra thousand acres of flooded brush, trees, gravel beds, and cattails should translate into a bumper crop of both gamefish and their food supply.

The other piece of good news concerning Lake Meredith is that the flooded moss beds have spread into nearly every canyon and cove in the lake. Higher water levels and these moss beds are the key elements for better bass fishing at Meredith. During the past five years, the moss has spread from a few isolated pockets in Blue West Canyon into huge beds that now run out to the twenty foot depth.

Of course, the walleye fishing in 1996 should remain good. Apparently these toothy denizens of the deep are able to enjoy good spawning on the rocks at the dam regardless of the level of the lake. Prime time for catching limits of tasty walleye will start in the middle of April and continue until early June. After that time walleye retreat back to the deep water and the average angler rarely enjoys much success.

Anglers who favor Lake White River (near Crosbyton), Lake MacKenzie (near Silverton), and Lake Greenbelt should hope that some early spring showers will fall on the drainage basins of these lakes.

Texas Parks and Wildlife quietly dumped some 3,000,000 walleye in Lake Greenbelt last year. Now if Mother Nature will provide some moisture, anglers should enjoy another terrific year of fishing at this beautiful oasis on the Texas prairie. For anglers who want to catch barn-door crappie in 1996, try fishing the flooded trees at twenty feet near a bend in the old river channel. These main lake spots are hard to find, but if you love crappie it is worth the extra effort.

Cable television fishing! Both TNN and ESPN now offer a six-hour block of outdoor programming that is guaranteed to get you in the mood for spring fishing.

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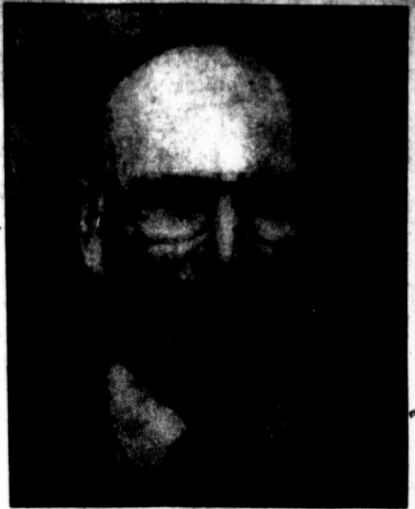

"They beat us by 10 at the end of the game," Mondragon said. "We had to foul them at the end, and they hit the free throws and hit a three-pointer."

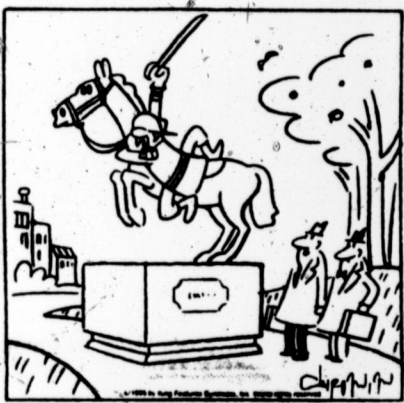
"We scored 55 in the second half against Brookhaven. I don't think we ever had the lead, but we came within two at one point."

Dust: the good, the bad and the ugly

The air we breathe contains tiny particles that come from many different sources - active volcanoes, automobile exhaust, fires, plant pollen, mold spores, and salt from the oceans.

Good dust

Dust from disintegrating comets
Some ancient soil has been found to contain amino acids that apparently came from outer space. Since amino acids are crucial to life, these chemicals may have been "seeds" for life on Earth

Where does dust come from?

Most ordinary dust consists of minerals picked up by the wind as it blows across plowed fields, rocky hills, mud flats and bare earth. Friction from the wind can grind the particles smaller.

Destructive dust

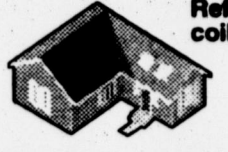

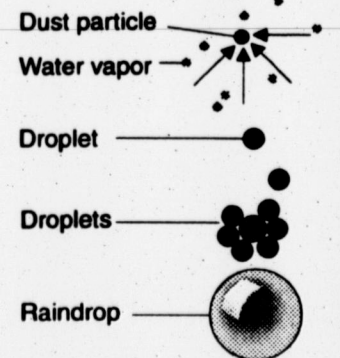
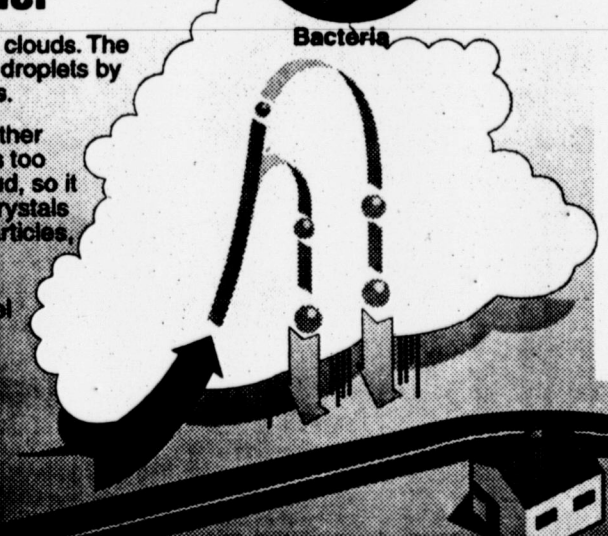

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Bronchos Trample Shamrock Irish, JV Bronchos Take Consolation Crown In White Deer Tourney, Tackle Bucks, 46-32

Three Bronchos scored in double figures Friday as Clarendon's varsity basketball team rolled over Shamrock, 62-34, in the Clarendon gym.

Clarendon also dropped a Jan. 2 contest with Tulia, 81-60, in Tulia.

Their record is 13-4 at press time heading into the important District 2-2A race.

Clarendon took a commanding 20-7 first quarter lead in their battle with the Fighting Irish as Clemmie Smith nailed three field goals and a free throw.

Kareem Abdullah, Roy Williams, and Lorenzo Moore each hit a trey in the opening period.

"I thought we got off to a really good start in the Shamrock game," head coach Jimmy Avery said. "We played great defense, and that really set the tone for the entire game."

"Clemmie did a great job shutting (Willie) Angton down. Angton is an extremely talented ball player, and he only scored 4 points against Clemmie. A lot of people may have not realized how much Clemmie's effort helped get us off to a strong start."

The Bronchos added 12 points in the second quarter and allowed only 3 points from Shamrock as they entered halftime with a 32-10 lead.

Williams added three field goals, and Moore added two and two free throws for a 19-point third quarter. Shamrock put in 9 points in the third quarter.

"Lorenzo played outstanding. He got so many rebounds, was able to move the ball down the court, and gave out so many assists. That is the sign of an unselfish ballplayer."

Williams connected on two field goals, and Smith added another and two from the charity stripe for an 11-point effort in the final period.

Shamrock had its most productive quarter - 15 points.

Scoring for the Bronchos were Smith, 19; Williams, 15; Moore, 14; Abdullah, 6; Drew Jeffers, 4; Dean Stanzione, 3; and Mark Barefield, 1.

"I was really excited after the Shamrock game. We showed what we are capable of doing, and I think it got us ready for some tough district games."

Clarendon hosts Canadian Friday at 8 p.m. Former Springlake-Earth Coach Jay Penquite, whose team beat the Bronchos in the 1995 area contest, is now coaching the Canadian Wildcats.

"I expect them to be up for our game," Avery said. "Canadian is always very competitive and always puts up a tough fight."

The Bronchos travel to Panhandle Tuesday for an 8 p.m. start with the Panthers, who beat the Bronchos three times last season.

"That (Panhandle) gym will be packed," Avery said. "Crowd support at that game will be more important than any other game this year."

"They have two great shooters (Jason Minter and Chad Bertrand) who can put in the three-pointer. We will have to play really well to get past Panhandle."

Clarendon suffered a disappointing 81-60 loss at the hands of Tulia after the New Year despite Smith's 22 points.

Tulia roared to a 23-16 first quarter lead that they never relinquished. Smith put in three field goals and two free throws, and Stanzione sank two buckets in the opening period.

Smith had 7 points in the second quarter, and Moore put in 4 for a 17-point second quarter. Tulia led 37-33 at halftime.

Clarendon got treys from Abdullah and Moore in the third for a 12-point third period, but Tulia erupted for 19 points and led 56-45 heading into the final quarter.

Two treys from Abdullah and 5 points from Smith were the biggest help the Bronchos got as they rang up 15 points as a team in the fourth quarter.

Tulia played their best quarter yet, banking in 25 points.

"We did not play very well as a team," Avery said of the loss. "We did not play as hard as we could for 32 minutes."

Scoring for the Bronchos were Smith, 22; Moore, 13; Abdullah, 9; Barefield, 5; Stanzione, 4; Williams, 4; Chris Brown, 2; and Jeffers, 2.

After dropping a game in the opening round of the White Deer Junior Varsity Tournament, Clarendon's Bronchos ticked off two victories, capturing the consolation crown.

Their record improved to 6-9 heading into district action.

Highland Park played Clarendon a close contest Thursday but came away with the win, 47-43.

Brent Gaines and Jason Archuleta put in 4 points apiece as they trailed 11-8 in the first quarter.

Gaines added two baskets, and Archuleta put in another bucket and two free throws in the second quarter. Point guard Scotty Elliott put in a trey, and Nathan Sears added a basket for their most productive quarter.

Highland Park led 24-21 at halftime and pushed the lead to 38-33 at the end of the third quarter.

Gaines added two baskets while Archuleta, Elliott, and Blake Bass scored one a piece in the final quarter.

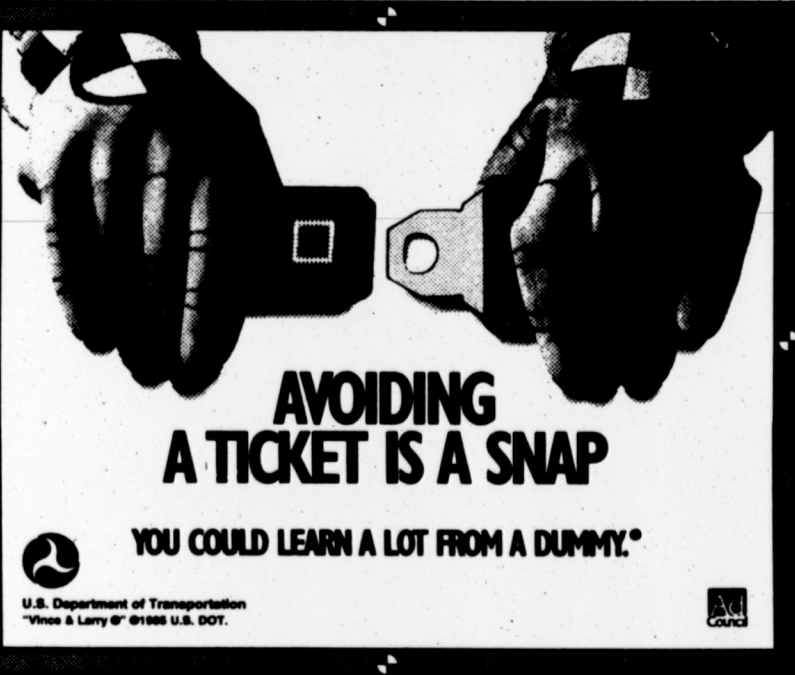
