### Transfers For County Pupils Due August 1st

Parents are urged to ascertain that their children are transferred to the schools which they are supposed to attend next fall in case they have moved or if the necessary grades are not taught in their home district, county Supt. Ruth Richerson said this week.

Applications for transfer of students must be filed with the county supt. before August 1, Miss Richerson emphasized.

If the school is classified by the County School Board as a seven-grade school, all children in the 8th grade and above must be transferred to the receiving high school, she explained.

A most important point for parents to remember, the county superintendent said, is that parents must pay transportation and tuition on children who attend a school outside the home district when the required grades are taught in the home school.

### Fred A. Buntin Services Set For Friday Morning

Funeral services for Fred A. Buntin have been set for 10 a. m. Friday morning at the Methodist Church with Rev. H. W. Hanks officiating, assisted by Rev. E. D. Landreth.

Mr. Buntin, age 55, passed away at the Adair hospital here at 4:10 Wednesday afternoon following a quite lengthy illness. He had been in ill health for a number of years and retired from active business in Feb., 1945.

P. A. Buntin, father of Fred, came to Clarendon in 1899 and was the first funeral director in this part of Texas. Following the first World War, Fred entered the business with his father in 1919 and remained with the business until last year. At one time he operated several Funeral Homes in this part of the country with his main interest being here in Clarendon where his friends were numbered by hundreds. Mr. Buntin was of the old school where doing good for his fellow man counted most. He was one of the best loved and respected men in this area.

Mr. Buntin was a member of the Methodist Church, American Legion, Shriner 32nd Degree Mason and was a charter member of the Khiva Temple at Amarillo. Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Eunice Buntin; one daughter, Miss Phebe Ann Buntin and one sister, Mrs. W. P. McConnell of Ft. Worth.

With the exception of John F. Blocker Jr., the pallbearers will be former employees of Mr. Buntin: Jimmie Lumpkin, Jerry LaGrone, Kenneth Lyle, Sam Davis, Verni Garland and Johnnie Blocker Jr.

Burial will be in Citizens Cemetery with funeral arrangements under the direction of Murphy - Spicer - Buntin Funeral Home.

### DDT Shows Good Results On Cattle

Joe McMurtry, rancher in Donley County reports that the 150 steers sprayed with DDT on his ranch the 8th of June are still free from horn flies but will have to be sprayed again this weekend. The results of the demonstration were so convincing that Mr. McMurtry is purchasing a spray so that he can spray all of his cattle.

One gallon of twenty-five percent DDT mixed with fifty gallons of water is used for the spray. This will control horn flies and lice on the livestock. H. M. Breedlove, county agent who assisted with the demonstration held on the McMurtry ranch says that approximately 150 head of cattle can be sprayed in one hour with good luck. One spraying of the cattle will last from twenty to thirty days and usually it takes three sprayings during the summer to get the best results.

Any one wishing to see the next spraying of the cattle can call by the county agents office and he will give them the exact date of the spraying as this will depend on how soon the spray will be delivered to Mr. McMurtry.

### SGT. W. E. GRIMSLEY ON WAY HOME

Mrs. Ward Grimsley received a telegram from Seoul, Korea, July 5th, stating that her husband, Sgt. William E. Grimsley had shipped for the states on the Marine Devil.

Sgt. Grimsley was located in southern Korea with the 85th Signal Service Division, later being moved to northern Korea where he was a radio repairman and operator at a Japanese broadcasting station for nation-wide news.

### Case of Rabies Reported Here

Dr. J. G. Stewart, city health officer, is asking that all pets, namely dogs, should be confined for at least the next two weeks, due to a case of Rabies being found here. They should be confined and also kept away from other animals as the disease will show up within two weeks, he added.

The head of a dog owned by Judge R. Y. King was sent to the Laboratory and it was found that it had Rabies. This was done after the dog had bitten Mrs. Frank White Jr. and Jimmie Dick Lowry. Both are under treatment at this time with no ill effects showing up.

Since that time, several pets in that section of town have died from unknown causes and it is possible that they had acute cases of Rabies.

Dr. Stewart is making the above request for the safety of our citizenship and should your dog get sick or die from unknown causes, it's head should be sent off to the nearest Laboratory and be analyzed.

Prices here in Clarendon are holding pretty close to the prices established by P.A. or in cases lower with the exception of a few scarce commodities that have been raised by the wholesale houses and naturally are being passed on to the consumer.

It is the opinion of most every merchant that in holding their prices down, they have hopes of going ahead without any ill effects of dropping the OPA and that, that office not being re-established again. Some items that have been raised in price are items effected by the dropping of government subsidies and simply had to go up in accordance with market prices. At any rate, your local merchants are doing everything they can to hold their prices down and will do so any way as long as their present stocks last.

### Streak of Rain Crosses Center Of County

A heavy cloud moved across the middle of the county late yesterday afternoon starting a heavy downpour in the Goldston community which was estimated at from 3 to 5 inches with some hail and moved southeast across the Windy Valley section leaving an estimated 1 1/2 inches of moisture with streaks of hail. The west side of the county was slighted and we received only a light rain here in town. The Hedley vicinity reported from 1/4 to 1 inch. The heaviest rain fell in a streak with very little moisture falling west of the J. R. Porter place near Goldston.

Anyway, what moisture was received cooled us off for a little while. The mercury had been hitting around the 100 degree mark for several days now.

The Clarendon Canning Center located at Clarendon Junior High School will open Tuesday, July 16, under the direction of Mrs. J. C. Christal. Mrs. Christal has had several years of experience in this work and will act as supervisor of the plant which will operate on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays until school opens in September. The center is sponsored by the State Board of Vocational Education through the local vocational agriculture department.

The center will offer a well equipped canning room, with a large number of pressure cookers, meat and vegetable grinders, tomato juicers, and other valuable and scarce equipment free of charge to those desiring to take advantage of this service.

LIBRARY NOTES

Recent a bill called The Public Library Service Demonstration Bill was introduced in the House of Representatives by Emily Taft Douglas, and in her speech she stated that more than six hundred counties in the country—roughly one out of five—are without a library. An equal number have only small libraries which serve no rural people. She went on to say that "books have become a necessity in an unstable world, and we cannot afford to

deny large numbers of our people the chance for this basic means of education. In a sense a library is a yeast for all the worth-while life of a community. Its services are supplementary and illumine every civic and cultural project. It is not competitive with other agencies, but enriches the work of each. Macmillan's Centenary Award for non-fiction has been given to Spencer Logan for his book "A Negro's Faith in America" which has just been published. It is said it should become an enduring clarification of the complexities of the racial problem in America. Mr. Logan is a veteran who en-

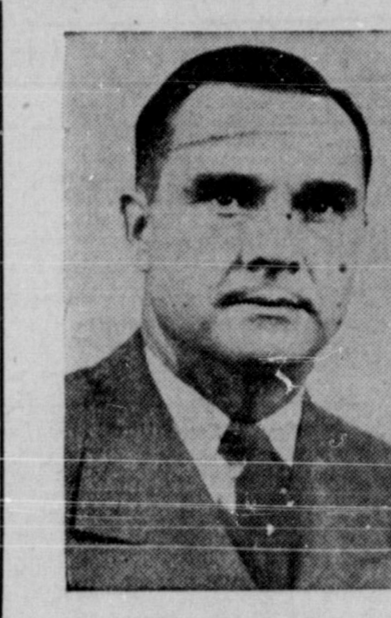

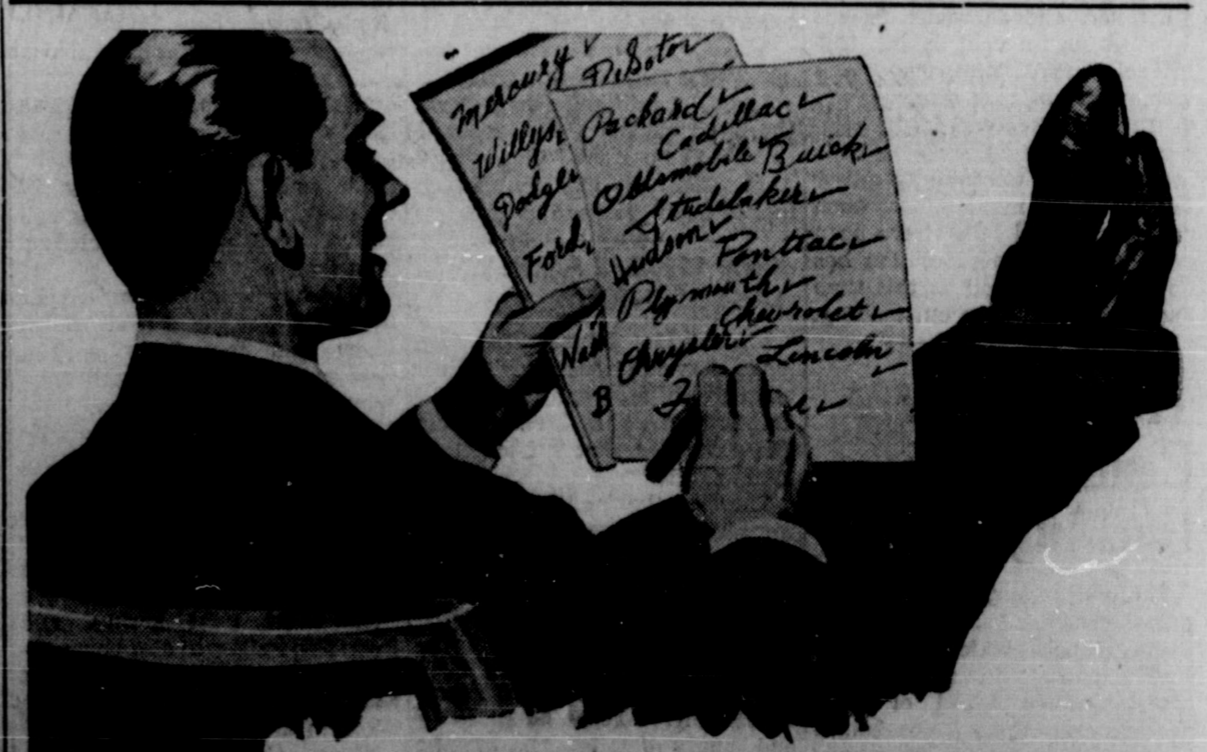

By July 1, when transfer of records will be accomplished, the recently authorized Lubbock regional office will service the 26 Panhandle counties formerly under the jurisdiction of the St. Louis branch office, 6 counties which had been served by the Denver branch, and 49 counties which already were part of the Dallas branch area and were transferred to the Lubbock region on June 1.

Ten major divisions make up the Lubbock regional office, temporarily located at the Lubbock Army Air Field. They are adjudication, vocational rehabilitation and education, contact, medical, supply, communications and records, finance, legal, loan guarantee and personnel. In addition to the manager and assistant

manager, the organization is supported by a coordination and planning division and public relations division.

The adjudication division is responsible for the adjudication of all claims for compensation and pension filed by veterans, their dependents and beneficiaries, and the determination of eligibility to hospitalization.

Basic responsibilities for the vocational rehabilitation and education division are to provide suitable training to restore the employability of service-disabled veterans and to make available educational benefits to able-bodied veterans.

The contact division is the link between the Veterans administration and the veteran. Regional contact service functions through contact representatives conveniently located in key cities of the area to assist and advise veterans, their dependents and beneficiaries of their rights and benefits.

The primary functions of the medical division are to furnish medical care for veterans with service-connected disabilities and to examine all claimants for pension, disability, insurance, and other related factors. It furnishes outpatient treatment and drugs and medicines for those with service-connected disabilities who can be cared for outside a hospital.

The supply division is responsible for the procurement of all supplies and activities in connection with preparation of contracts, leases, and requisitions.

Communications and records division maintains complete files for veterans who have applied to the VA for assistance of any nature. Also, mail and telegrams addressed to and originating from the regional office are received and routed by this division.

The finance division is responsible for all matters relating to moneys with which the regional

office is concerned, such as making and accounting for payments, benefits and otherwise.

Guardianship of incompetent veterans or other beneficiaries and of minor beneficiaries of the VA is the concern of the legal division of the regional office, in connection with veterans' problems involving laws and regulations administered by the VA.

The loan guarantee division is responsible for activities related to the administration of the loan guaranty provision in the G. I. Bill of Rights.

Charged with the requirement and supervision of efficient personnel to staff the regional office, the personnel division determines eligibility of all applicants and refers them to the division chiefs for final selection.

"The VA shall do its utmost to render prompt and efficient service to all veterans of this region, but they must help us to help them by establishing contact through their local contact office or representative. Any information or action pertaining to veterans' rights and benefits can be obtained through these representatives," said Sisson.

## Plenty of Produce Available To Meet County Food Needs

Donley County residents will offset short supplies of meat, wheat, fats and oils by consuming nearly 4,065,000 pounds of the nation's bumper fresh fruit and vegetable crop to maintain high nutritional standards this year, it was predicted today by a leading food distributor.

"Fresh fruits and vegetables will adequately supplement the limited supplies of many foods now available," said Harvey Baum, head of produce-buying operations. "Increased use of perishable produce will permit shipment of other foods to those hunger-ridden nations now subsisting on daily diets ranging from 1,000 to 1,500 calories as compared with an average of 3,300 calories for this country."

Part of the fresh fruits and vegetables consumed by Donley residents comes from this county's 877 farms and neighboring growers. Large amounts of perishables are received from other sections to meet the county's year-round needs. The development of more efficient distribution methods, Baum said, has helped double fresh fruit and vegetable consumption in the past

25 years and makes possible a greater selection of foods necessary for a well-rounded diet and a higher standard of living.

Basing his estimates on preliminary indications of food production and consumption for 1946, Baum said that each person in the country will eat an average of 1,695 pounds of food this year. This represents a 10 per cent increase over the 1935-1939 average, with fresh fruits and vegetables accounting for nearly one third of the food to be consumed, he added.

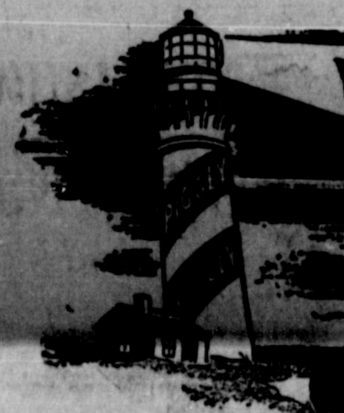

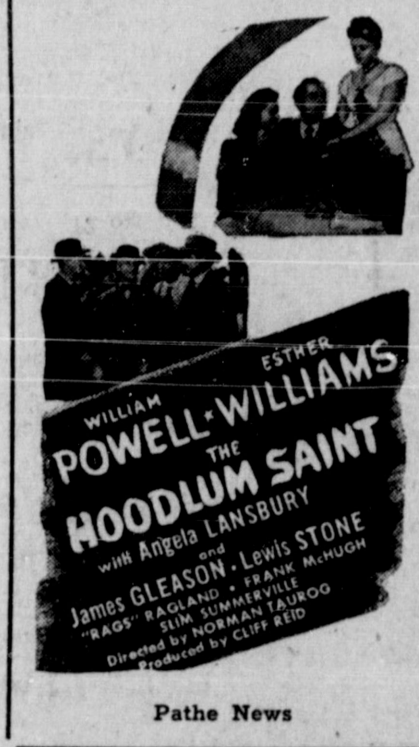

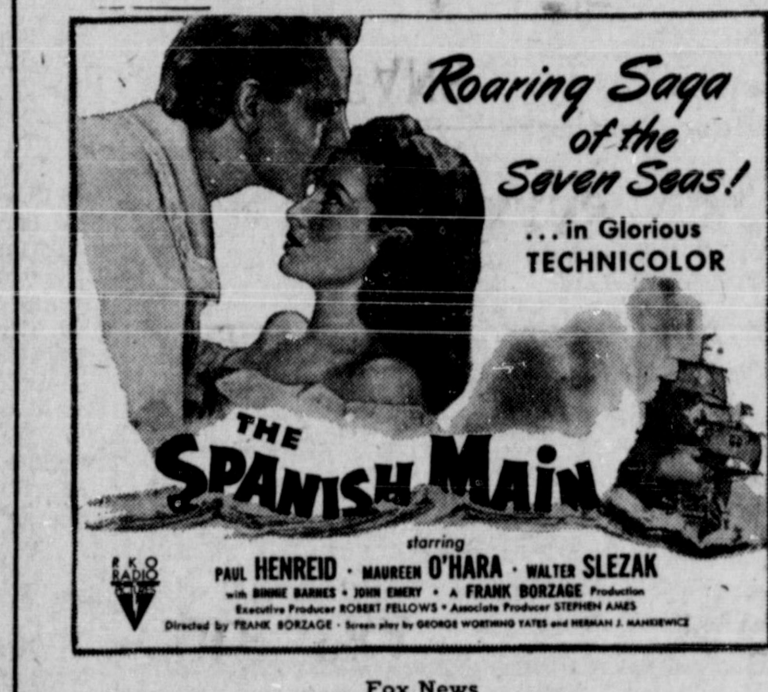
