Texas Historical Association Offering \$345 In Prizes

AUSTIN—Good current Texas books, and \$345 in prizes are being offered by the Texas State Historical Association for the best papers on Texas history by any Junior Historian, Dr. H. Bailey Carroll, acting director at the University of Texas, has announced.

The Rockefeller Foundation is offering \$345 in prizes for the papers and in addition, a part of each award will be Texas books.

The prize money will be divided as follows: \$100, first prize; \$75, second prize; \$50, third prize; \$25, fourth prize; \$20, fifth prize; \$15, sixth prize and \$10 each for six honorable mention prizes.

In addition, \$25 will be given by the Association for the best paper on the Texas Gulf Coast area, and another \$25 will be given by the Texas Folklore Society for the best paper dealing with observation of animals on natural objects in Texas.

The contest will close April 1, 1946. Any person under 21 who is a member of a Junior Historian chapter, or who has paid a 50 cent fee to become a member-at-large is eligible to enter the contest.

Donley County Busy Terracing

Farmers of Donley County realize the importance of terracing says county agent H. M. Breedlove because the value of terracing has been proven throughout the county. The county agent stated that during the months of December, January and to the present date in February that terrace lines had been run on 35 different farms throughout the county for a total of 123 miles of terraces. This work is still underway and before the planting season is here it is estimated that this figure will almost be doubled. There are five terracing machines in the county working for the farmers constructing their terraces and also some of the farmers are building their own terraces. Farmers building terraces to qualify for government payment under the AAA program must first get a prior approval by the county committee before the construction of the terraces.

Terracing of farms where it is needed and strip cropping on the contour has been worth many dollars to the farmers of this county and is one of the best methods for the preservation of soil and moisture. Farmers are looking ahead into the future years to see that their farms keep their fertility and these approved farming methods have certainly been one of their first jobs.

The county agent stated that he is working every day that the weather permits running the terrace lines and hopes to get caught up in several weeks. Farmers wanting lines run on their farms should contact the county agent and get names on the list and their lines will be run as soon as he can possibly get to them. The terraces already constructed since December will qualify farmers for \$9,717.00 for the conservation of their soil.

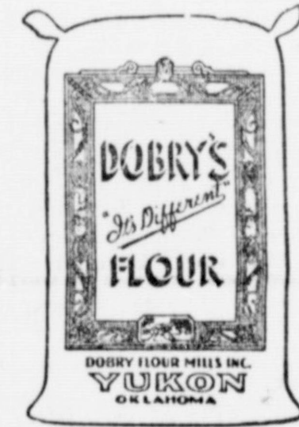

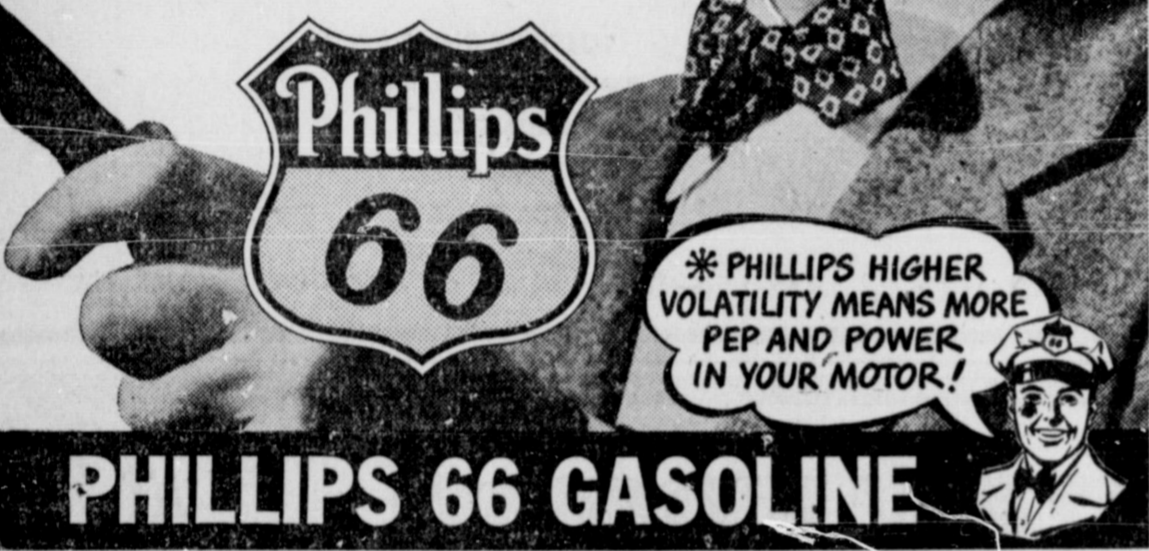
