Museum Unit To Be Completed At Canyon

With a \$50,000 minimum goal set for 30 Panhandle counties, directors of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society decided Saturday to undertake the immediate completion of existing construction on their museum. The Canyon institution will need at least this sum to finish the floors, walls and ceilings of the second unit and to buy most needed furnishings, the directors estimated at their meeting held in the Amarillo Hotel.

Tentatively outlining plans for field work which would raise their requirements, county and district workers received assignments and some suggestions as to means to be used were discussed.

President Harold Bugbee of Clarendon called for a report on the portion of the project just completed. Dr. L. F. Sheffy, West Texas State College, revealed funds on hand would be just sufficient to cover outstanding obligations, leaving any future work to be financed.

According to Dr. Sheffy's report on response by counties to their assigned \$1,000 each, records show that Donley County has collected \$500 of her quota to date. "People of the Panhandle realize the value of the museum as a drawing card to tourists from all over the country and as a visual educational source for their children," asserted Mr. Bugbee. "I think we can count on them to meet our appeal and to enable us to complete Unit 2 as it should be completed."

Joint Services For Accident Victims

Joint funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock in Ft. Worth for Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Minton, Jr., of Ft. Worth, who died of injuries received near Goodnight, Thursday night when their auto collided with a truck loaded with wheat.

Minton died Sunday at Fort Worth. His wife died enroute to a Clarendon hospital, soon after the accident.

Funeral services for Roy A. Ryan, 30, also injured fatally in the same accident were conducted at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon. Mrs. Ryan was taken to a Fort Worth hospital over the weekend and her condition was reported as improving.

The two couples were enroute to Las Vegas for a vacation when the accident occurred.

The crash occurred about 8 o'clock Thursday night 3 miles east of Goodnight on Highway 287, about 40 miles east of Amarillo.

Mr. Minton is the son of the owner of the Bluebonnet Packing Company. Mr. Ryan was a livestock broker.

Funeral Services Held Today For Mrs. Althea Ellis

Funeral services for Mrs. Althea Juanita Ellis, who died Tuesday in an Amarillo hospital from wounds received Sunday afternoon when a .22-caliber rifle was accidentally discharged, were held this afternoon at 3 o'clock in the Methodist Church here. Rev. Hayne, local pastor, officiated, and interment was made in Citizens Cemetery under the direction of Murphy-Spicer-Buntin Funeral Home.

Mrs. Ellis, 33 years old, resided with her husband and family at the Bivins Station booster plant of the Canadian River Gas Company, just north of the Canadian River on US Highway 87.

According to Sheriff Bill Adams of Potter County, the accident occurred while Mrs. Ellis and her husband, O. L. Ellis, a welder for the gas company, had taken their three small children on a plum-picking picnic near the Canadian River.

Reports made to Sheriff Adams shortly after the accident indicated that the small boy of the family, 5-year-old Don Ellis, had crawled on the back seat of the Ellis car, where the rifle was stored. It was presumed that the child either knocked the rifle over, causing it to fire, or that he was playing with the rifle as Mrs. Ellis sat on the running board of the car. The bullet entered her back, pierced her intestines and lodged in her leg, according to attending physicians at St. Anthony's Hospital, where she was rushed for an emergency operation.

Besides the husband, survivors include the three children, Don, Jean and Patsy and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Jones of Clarendon.

I made a trip to the City the other day, and I had some business in one of the large office buildings; I can get lost quicker in a tall building than in anybody's river bottom. Anyway, the elevator had just started up, and I was in a hurry, so I started up the steps hoping that I wouldn't get lost. At the second floor a nice looking man met me and wanted to know if he could help me locate someone, and he sure could, and he sure did. It made you feel all warm and welcome inside. I know that I thanked him, but I didn't offer him a tip, and I have been ashamed about it ever since. Anyway, whether he is paid by the owners of the building, or by tips from less forgetful people, it made me feel good to be treated so well.

All along the road these days, in the cotton country, people are hoeing out the weeds; the women and the children are all helping. It reminds me of why I came to the wheat belt. If there is anything in the world as long as a weedy row of cotton I don't know what it is. It takes a lot of "spunk" and a lot of "grit" to be a good cotton farmer. I believe I like wheat farming a lot better, but there are times during the rush of harvest that you catch your self thinking that you would trade places with anybody.

I read Mama an article out of the paper, about a woman that had done a lot of work during the harvest, (of course I just skipped along and read her what I thought was the best part). She had her picture in the paper and all. When I showed her the picture, she came right back with an answer, "Huh", she says, "look at her hair, all done up nice. If she had followed me during harvest, she wouldn't have had time to fix up her hair and pose for that picture." I didn't say anymore, and I wished that I had said less.

Our Congressman has appealed to the Farmers to send in their ideas on a long time permanent farm program. We ought to write him what we think, for who should know more about what we need than we do ourselves.

Dalhart To Have Flyers Breakfast Friday, July 25th At Dalhart

DALHART—Every flyer in the world is invited to attend the Flyers Breakfast in Dalhart Friday, July 25, according to President Raymond Holmlund of the Propeller Club which is sponsoring the event.

"We don't expect them all to come," he said, "but we do expect over 200, which will be a record gathering of civilian aviators in the Northwest Texas Panhandle."

The breakfast is planned as one of the highlights of the 11th Annual XIT Reunion in Dalhart July 24-26. Special awards will be given for the oldest and youngest flyers and the one coming the greatest distance.

The breakfast, chuck wagon style, will open about 7:00 and continue as long as necessary. Flyers will be served as they arrive. The affair will be at the main Dalhart Air Base which by that time will be in the hands of the City for operation as a municipal airport.

Swift Ingram, head of Ingram's Flying Service, will direct the Aircraft Traffic committee, and will look after tying down and safeguarding of planes. State Patrolman A. W. (John) Hammock, Propeller club vice-president, is chairman of the Transportation committee which will see that visiting flyers have a way to get between the base and nearby Dalhart any time they want it.

Crops Damaged In Two Areas

Striking here about 7:30 Thursday evening, a thunderstorm brought in wind of high velocity, filling the air with dust and sand. Immediately following the dust storm came a downpour of rain and hail. Bolts of lightning shot earthward and across the sky adding uncertainty as to what the outcome of the storm would be. Some two hundred telephones were disrupted during the storm, making communication very disagreeable in some parts of town. The telephone boys immediately went to work and seem to have the situation well in hand at the present time, although several phones are not as yet up to par.

The Chamberlain community reports several fields wiped out and considerable damage inflicted on others. Crops in the Goldston area across the river took a hard beating in some places, several farmers reporting total losses. The rain over the county was somewhat spotted. Here in Clarendon the moisture was measured as around two inches, while in other sections the rainfall was reported to have been heavier. Several farmers have reported to the Leader that only a trace came their way. As a whole the rain was needed in this area, although it was damaging to small crops where washing was done.

According to the official weather station at the local F. W. & D. depot, the rainfall last Thursday night here was 1.9 inches. It might be of interest to know just how the temperature behaved during the week. The record at the depot shows the high to have been 97 and the low 57.

County Agent Returns From Range School

County agent H. M. Breedlove has returned from the range school held by the Texas A&M College Extension Service. The school started at the Sonora Experiment station where 26 county agents from every district in Texas assembled for the course. Nine days were spent at the Experiment station in studying demonstrations and types of grasses. The group visited ranches in the areas of San Angelo, Fort Stockton, Alpine, Marfa and Fort Davis.

Breedlove reports a very good school and that a lot of valuable information was received on this trip. Range management is becoming important and also the re-seeding of old fields and pastures.

This school was the beginning of similar schools to be held each year over the state so that county agents can get the latest information on problems relating to agriculture to take back to the people of their respective counties.

The agents attending this school were fed from a chuck wagon which accompanied the group and they spent the nights on the range wherever they happened to be studying at that time.

The instructors for the school were Dr. Young of the range management school of the Texas A&M College and Dr. Speery, botanist for the college. Others helping with the school were Mr. Leo Merrill of the Sonora Experiment station and Dr. Boughton also of the Experiment station.

Chicken Barbecue At Lelia Lake August 1st

Mr. Holly Wood, president of the Donley County Farm Bureau Federation announced this week that a county-wide chicken barbecue would be held at the Lelia Lake school house on Friday, August 1st.

This barbecue is for everyone regardless of whether they are members of the association or not. The barbecue will be served at five o'clock in the afternoon.

All persons wishing to attend the barbecue will bring one-half chicken per person. All chickens must be in by Thursday the 31st of July and will be left at the Co-op frozen locker of Clarendon and the Odell Holland grocery of Lelia Lake and the Moreman grocery of Hedley. These businesses will receive the chickens at any time now that you wish to bring them and will be put on ice until time for the barbecue.

Mr. Wood is urging that everyone attend this barbecue and have a big county-wide celebration.

Mr. Joe Hatton, district representative of the Farm Bureau federation will be one of the speakers of the evening and it is hoped that Uncle Jay of Amarillo can attend the barbecue. A complete program will be arranged after the barbecue and it is planned to end the program by 7:30 in the evening.

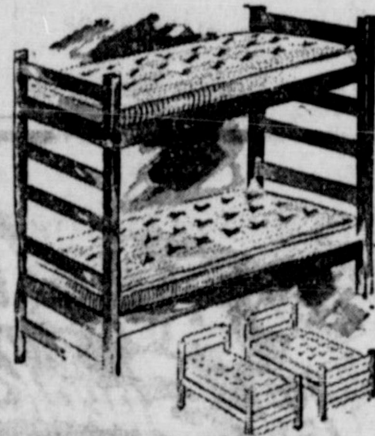

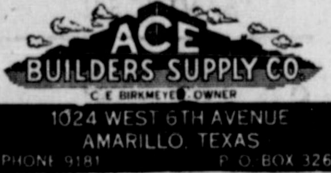

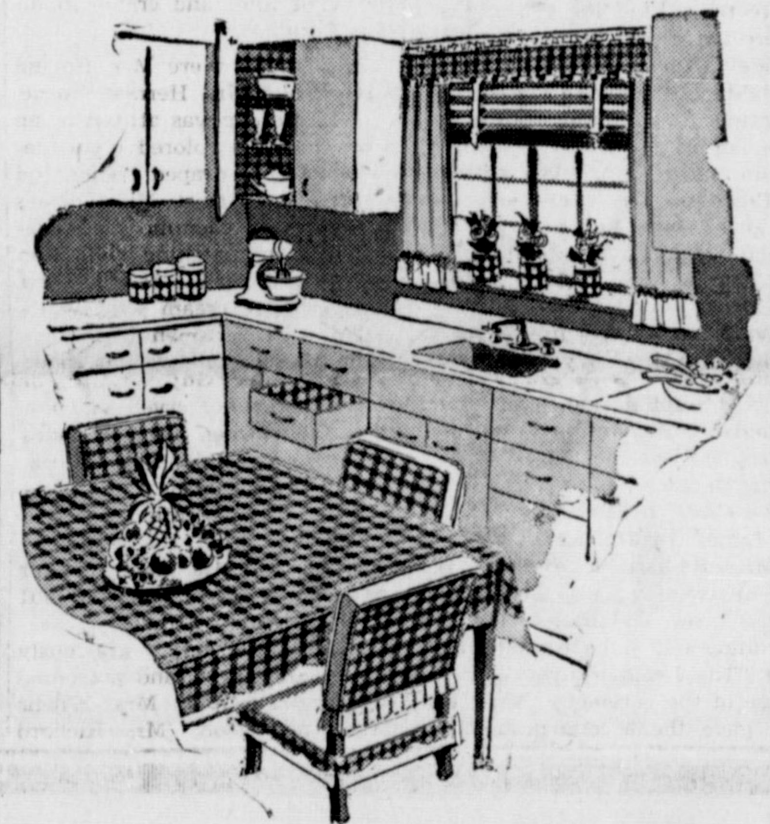
