Carl B. Morris Announces Candidacy For State Representative, 122nd Legislative District

Mr. Carl B. Morris of Clarendon, Texas announced Saturday, January 31st, his candidacy for State Representative of the 122nd Legislative District. Mr. Morris stated that he believes he is in every way qualified to capably perform the duties of the office and to serve the people of this district in a truly representative fashion.

He is 25 years old, married, and the father of one child. He saw 37 months service in the U. S. Navy during World War II, obtaining his discharge in April of 1946. Since that time he has wheat farmed in the summer and attended the University of Texas in the winter.

Before entering the service he attended Clarendon High School where he was active in Farm Club work. He was a well known competitor in the Poultry, Swine and Baby Beef Shows in Texas, and was a National Competitor in Judging Events. After graduation from High School in 1940 he attended Clarendon Jr. College and Texas A&M. At present Mr. Morris is a mid-law student, that being the term applied to those students in their second year of law at the University of Texas.

Mr. Morris stated that he has long been a student of legislative problems and procedure, particularly those problems affecting the farmer and people who deal with the farmers. He feels that there is great need in our state legislature for that kind of representation. He also said he hoped to make a career of serving the people through representative offices, and that if elected he expected to build a record that would entitle him to seek re-election for the same or higher post as representative of the people of this district.

At the same time he invited everyone to investigate his record and satisfy themselves as to his qualifications and capabilities.

FUZZY SPELL NETS .25 INCH UP TO 7 A. M.

The cloudy, drizzly spell which has been with us for several days failed to put out much moisture until late Wednesday night and up to 7 a. m. this morning there had been .25 inch of moisture recorded by the official weather station at the airport. According to W. M. Patman, Special Agent, the Census report shows that 7249 bales of cotton were ginned in Donley County from the crop of 1947 prior to January 16, 1948 as compared with 6651 bales for the crop of 1946.

WHAT IS YOUR T. L. Q. ?

Your traffic law quotient, that is, do you know the laws that help protect you from an automobile accident? To familiarize the public with traffic laws and the necessity for obeying them, the Texas Department of Public Safety is cooperating in a nationwide "Learn and Obey Traffic Laws" program during February.

"In almost every accident, one or more drivers were violating some traffic law," said Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director. "Better voluntary observance of traffic laws would save a lot of lives. One of the most common causes of accident is driving in the wrong lane, according to W. J. Elliott, Chief of the Texas Highway Patrol Division. He pointed out that National Safety Council statistics show driving on the wrong side of the road to be the second most frequent violation reported in traffic mishaps. Keep right and you'll be left-to-drive another day, he said, and listed these rules:

1. Drive to the right of the centerline. On three-lane roads, never drive in the far left lane, and on four-lane roads, never drive to the left of the center.
2. Drive to the left on a two-lane road, in the center lane on a three-lane road, or in the lane next to the center on a four-lane road only to overtake and pass a slower moving vehicle, and then only when you are sure that everything is clear.
3. On multiple lane roads, drive in one lane. Don't change from one lane to another without looking back and on both sides. Be sure a car is not overtaking you at the side and to the rear—a blind spot in many automobiles.
4. In some cases it is legal to overtake and pass on the right, but this is not a universal rule. Even where it is legal, it should be done with care because many drivers are not expecting it. Overtaking and passing on the right may be made when:
 - a. The driver in front is making a left turn.
 - b. On "one-way" streets
 - c. On a pavement wide enough for two or more lanes of moving traffic in each direction.

The new Uniform Act regulating traffic requires that all movements must be made "in safety." All drivers are therefore required by law to be alert at all times.

OVER HUNDRED FARMERS ATTEND PRUNING DEMONSTRATIONS

Monday, February 2nd was a big day for orchard demonstrations in Donley County. H. M. Breedlove, county agent, held one demonstration on pruning and borer control of orchards on the W. P. Doherty farm north of Hedley. Seventy farmers and veterans attended this school. Trees were pruned to show proper methods of pruning and the use of Ethylene Dichloride emulsion was demonstrated in the control of borers. This demonstration was held at ten o'clock in the morning.

At two o'clock in the afternoon, thirty-five farmers gathered at the Ollie Hommel farm, south of Alarred to hear Mr. Rosborough and Mr. Paul Greig discuss orchard management and insect control in orchards. Mr. Hommel has an orchard of some fifteen hundred trees and the two demonstrations gave out information to a total of one hundred and five farmers. Varieties of fruit trees and planting and care was the main topics as well as pruning of the old orchard.

Markers To Be Set On Second Street Soon

Members of the street marking committee of the Lions Club will in several hours this week visiting those living on second street and report that they received enough money to start work on the markers for this street alone and that the markers would be stenciled and placed before they start work on any of the other streets.

The committee stated that they wanted to show everyone how the markers appeared and how bad they were needed before going ahead with their solicitation and believed then that no one would hesitate to do their part in helping mark every street in Clarendon.

They are asking that everyone be ready to do their part when called upon and in the meantime, within the next week or so, be sure to drive down second street and look the markers over.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

We hear a good bit of talk about dictatorship and democratic governments. Here's an object lesson in how democracy works.

Along in December, a schoolboy and the members of his Civics class at Lefors wrote their Congressman, asking if he could have the Freedom Train sent to their section of the country. The Congressman at that time was not aware of just what route the Freedom Train was to follow since the Federal Government has no jurisdiction or control of the Train. On the contrary, it was being financed and directed by subscriptions made by private individuals and organizations.

The Congressman reasoned that if the schoolboys and girls in Lefors were interested in seeing the priceless documents carried by the Freedom Train, then thousands of other Texas Panhandle schoolchildren would also be interested. He immediately contacted the American Heritage Foundation and found to his dismay that the schedule had been made up months before and was advised definitely that it would be impossible to make any changes at all. Renewed pleas were made to the American Heritage Foundation by the Congressman but the answer was still a definite and positive "No"—the schedule could not be changed. In the meantime, more requests from schoolchildren, civic and patriotic organizations in the Panhandle reached the Congressman. Supported by these additional requests the Congressman continued his efforts. He began making other contacts—arguing, arguing, and insisting as far as he could that the schedule be changed. Fortunately, the Congressman had other contacts whose aid he enlisted, and finally after a world of red tape, phone calls, telegrams, and personal visits, the officials decided the one change would be made and these schoolboys and schoolgirls and men and women of the Panhandle of Texas would have an opportunity to see these original documents of American history and government. The Congressman would like to see the Train visit every town in the country, especially in his Congressional District. However, the sponsors say this will be impossible and they are trying to place it in the biggest population centers in the most convenient and central locations. Accordingly, the Freedom Train bearing these documents—for example, George Washington's personal copy of the Constitution with corrections in his own handwriting (1787), Abraham Lincoln's pen notes for his Gettysburg Address (1865), and Thomas Jefferson's draft of the Declaration of Independence (1776)—which are so priceless that they are guarded day and night by armed Marine guards, will be on view in Amarillo on May 16 from ten o'clock in the morning until ten o'clock that night.

WONDER WHAT WOULD HAPPEN IN RUSSIA had a schoolboy written a member of the Russian Government such a request. It is mighty good to live in a democracy where so small a voice as a schoolboy's can help make the wheels of democracy turn. And it gave me a warm glow of satisfaction. I hope everyone will see these documents and secure renewed inspiration to protect this government against the ever-present and evil forces of un-Americanism.

Two Hereford Youths Die In Plane Crash

The crash of a private airplane just south of Giles near Highway 287 Tuesday afternoon claimed the lives of two young men, identified as Quentin R. Williams and W. B. Whitaker, Jr., both of Hereford.

There were no known eye witnesses to the crash. The bodies were discovered by two Amarillo men about 1 p. m. as the plane crashed not much more than a hundred feet from the highway completely demolishing the plane and killing the occupants instantly.

The crash was attributed to a very low ceiling of clouds and fog. It was believed that the flyers were diving the plane under one of the low hanging clouds when they plunged into the side of a hill. They were flying a Cessna 140, two-place, single-engine civilian craft.

The bodies were taken from the scene of the crash to the Womack Funeral Home in Memphis and then later removed to Hereford for funeral arrangements.

Poll Tax Receipts Exceed Expectancy

At press time last Thursday it looked like the total number of poll tax receipts would fall a long ways under the usual number of around 1,700 but after the tax office finished their rush sessions Friday and Saturday there was a final count of 1906 receipts issued.

This number along with the approximate number of exemptions will probably give the county a voting power in the neighborhood of around 2,200. Many people made last minute inspections of their tax receipts and found that they didn't have their poll tax receipts included and joined the line of usual last minute purchasers.

At any rate, we know we have enough paid poll taxes to afford a good representative vote in all elections and at the present it looks like practically everyone will be exercising their individual rights this year.

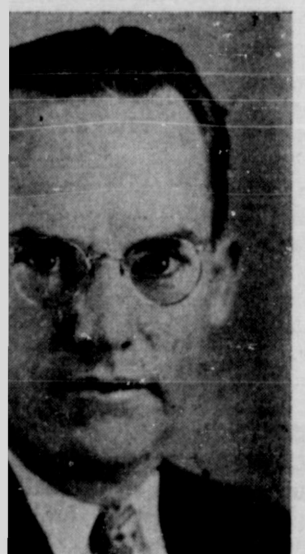

* CITY-COUNTY * LIBRARY NOTES *

Libraries are becoming more and more important in community life. A total of 2637 librarians registered at the American Library Association in San Francisco in July. Every state in the U. S. was represented, as well as twenty-six foreign countries. But with all this, the A.L.A. Bulletin tells us that shortage of professional personnel is very serious. 4900 professional librarians are needed today to fill existing vacancies. Normal annual replacements alone require 1750 library school graduates a year, while fewer than 1500 are produced.

The American Library Association declares that a public library must now have an income of not less than 50 percent more than in 1940 if it is to give to its community a library service equal in quantity and quality to that given in the pre-war period.

The Ebony Magazine awards for the book that has done the most to promote inter racial understanding in 1947 has been made to "Kingsblood Royal" by Sinclair Lewis. It will be on our shelves soon. Sinclair Lewis' "Case Timberland" is still a best seller—and is being prepared for the screen. Actors for the parts have been chosen. Mr. Lewis is not disclosing any details about

his next novel for which he spent the early part of last fall in the middle west collecting background material.

Another popular story which has been on our shelves for some time is being prepared for the screen is Laura Z. Hobson's "Gentleman's Agreement." This too, is a preachment against intolerance, and seldom has it been equaled. Gregory Peck takes the leading part. I could give you a resume of the story, but I won't. Read it.

From the Literary Guild's offices comes the report that "Paris Mitchell of King's Row" is to be the winner of big money. Planned as a sequel to "King's Row", the book was started by Henry Bellaman shortly before his death 4 years ago, and has been completed by his wife from his outlines.

The latest word from Katherine Winsor of "Forever Amber" fame is that she is working on her second novel, which will have a contemporary setting. As a result of many inquiries, our readers have discovered that "Forever Amber" is not on our shelves.

Both your old librarian, who dreams library constantly, and your new librarian, Mrs. Prewitt, who is doing such a good job for you, are agreed on the type of books to put on your shelves. "Raintree County" is the latest literary sensation having won the \$150,000 Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer contest. It is also the January Book-of-the-Month Club selection. The author is Ross Lock-

ridge, Jr. of Bloomington, Ind. On an assistant professor's salary he lived in a three-room apartment, raised four children, taught classes all day, and for six years worked on the book which now has brought him the \$150,000.

Young Pilgrims in modern dress, clutching copies of "The Canterbury Tales", recently hiked the sixty miles from London to Canterbury, following the route once taken by Caucer's company. They were commemorating the anniversary of the landing of Saint Augustine, first Archbishop of Canterbury, on the shores of pagan Kent.

The Freedom Train exhibit will have as an added attraction a perfect copy of "The Bay Psalm Book. This 307 year-old-volume is one of the three perfect copies in

existence. Dr. A. S. W. Rosenbach paid \$151,000 for it in an auction lately.

The John D. Rockefeller, Jr. fund has restored Washington Irving in the Sleepy Hollow legend. They have made Rip Van Winkle live again. A guest of the opening ceremony conducted by St. Nicholas Society which Irving founded in 1855 was Washington Irving III, great-great-grand-nephew of the writer.

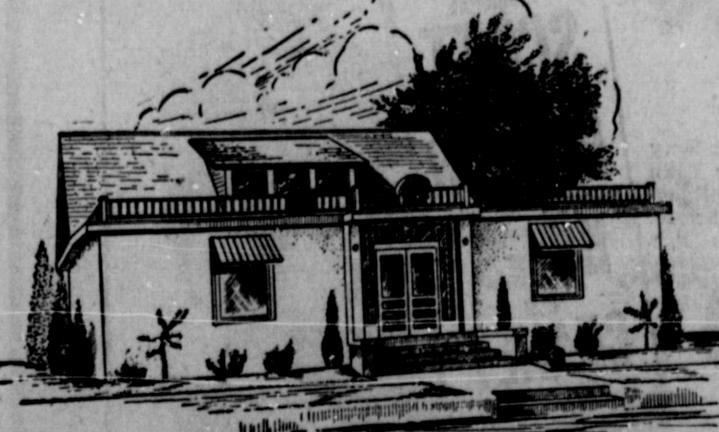
