Tex Worrell To Play Here For Legion Dance May 1st

Tex Worrell, nationally known string band leader of stage, screen and radio, will play for a dance to be sponsored by the local American Legion Post on the night of Wednesday, May 1st. Mr. Worrell and his band is enroute to Dallas from Riverside, California where it has been under contract playing on station KPRO.

Mr. Worrell plays first violin himself and conducts a ten piece band that plays any type of music from hill-billy to the classics. His seventeen year old son, popularly called Little Tex, is known as the King of the steel guitar. The band features Tommy Tomlin as its vocalist. Mr. Worrell met with the local Legion Post at its last meeting and guaranteed music to suit everyone's liking and plenty of it. All his musicians sing as a group or alone as well in addition to his featured vocalists.

The dance will be held in the Clarendon Opera House where there is a good dance floor and plenty of room. The admission price will be the same as for the Pre-Easter dance held two weeks ago, even though the orchestra is costing the Post more money. \$2.50 per couple or stag is the price of admission. AUSTIN, April 24—Low bids totalling \$1,246,147 were announced today by the State Highway Department on 20 highway construction and maintenance projects in 37 Texas counties.

Spray Fruit Trees To Kill Worms

To protect the fruit crop this year from worms county agent H. M. Breedlove recommends a spray of one pound of arsenate of lead to four pounds of hydrated lime to fifty gallons of water. This spray should be used about every three weeks until about six weeks before harvest. If you live in town you can spray the trees with water and then dust this mixture on the trees, putting the mixture in a cheese cloth sack and dusting from the up wind side. The mixture will settle on the trees. If the above is used as a spray or dust, it will insure good fruit for the market or for home use.

This is very important to all farm and ranch owners in Donley County as well as the laborers, and cooperation from both parties will help the labor shortage in the wheat harvest to a great extent.

A part of the community center project you have been hearing about and supporting for some time is to become a reality within the near future according to the vote cast by local Lions at their regular meeting Tuesday noon.

The Club voted to give the go-ahead sign to the committee in charge to draw up specifications and contract for the community center swimming pool which is to be placed on the west side of the High School building where the old gymnasium was started some years ago, but never finished.

The pool is to be 76 feet and 2 inches by 50 feet, ranging in depth from 3½ feet to 9.6 feet at the deepest point. The structure is to include two dressing rooms, a storage and control room and a concessionaire's room. It will also have a concrete walk all around the pool with a deck along the south side where the dressing rooms are located.

Chas. Lowry, chairman of the committee, stated that it had been estimated that the structure would cost not over \$6,200 and that at which time the contract is let, it could be completed within 60 days or less time. Mr. Lowry also stated that Walker Lane was drawing up the specifications at this time and that the contract would probably be let within a few days and construction started right away.

It was brought up that if the construction was started soon, then it would be finished in plenty of time for swimming through the hottest months this summer.

It is the plans of the club, to acquire the services of a caretaker and life guard who is qualified to do a good job. If necessary, the guard will be sent to school where he can receive instruction and his certificate in order to give everyone this protection while they are in the pool.

If everything progresses as per schedule, we will be able to give a more complete account of the entire set-up in next weeks paper, added Mr. Lowry.

The race against hunger and starvation in Europe "will be won or lost in your kitchen—and in your heart," Chester Davis, chairman of President Truman's new Famine Emergency Committee declared last week in a message to the American public.

From reports of officials, civilians and returning servicemen come pictures—and not pretty ones either—of men, women and children, involuntary victims of a devastating war who now face slow death by starvation.

In war-ravaged Poland alone there are 5,000,000 children who must have more food and more appropriate food at once. Breadstuffs and potatoes in stock and enroute from overseas, theoretically will last only until May 7 on the reduced rations, and those are based on an average of seven ounces of bread per day per person.

Here at home our efforts must be directed at conservation, and the program must be very largely voluntary.

We have a large supply of food, and we Americans continue to be well-fed regardless of what happens in the rest of the world—a fact which should provoke gratitude to providence instead of mere self-complacency. We should be moved by the tugs on our heart strings and not by the black market jerks on our purse if we are going to achieve effective results in feeding the foodless millions who are "weary of dying."

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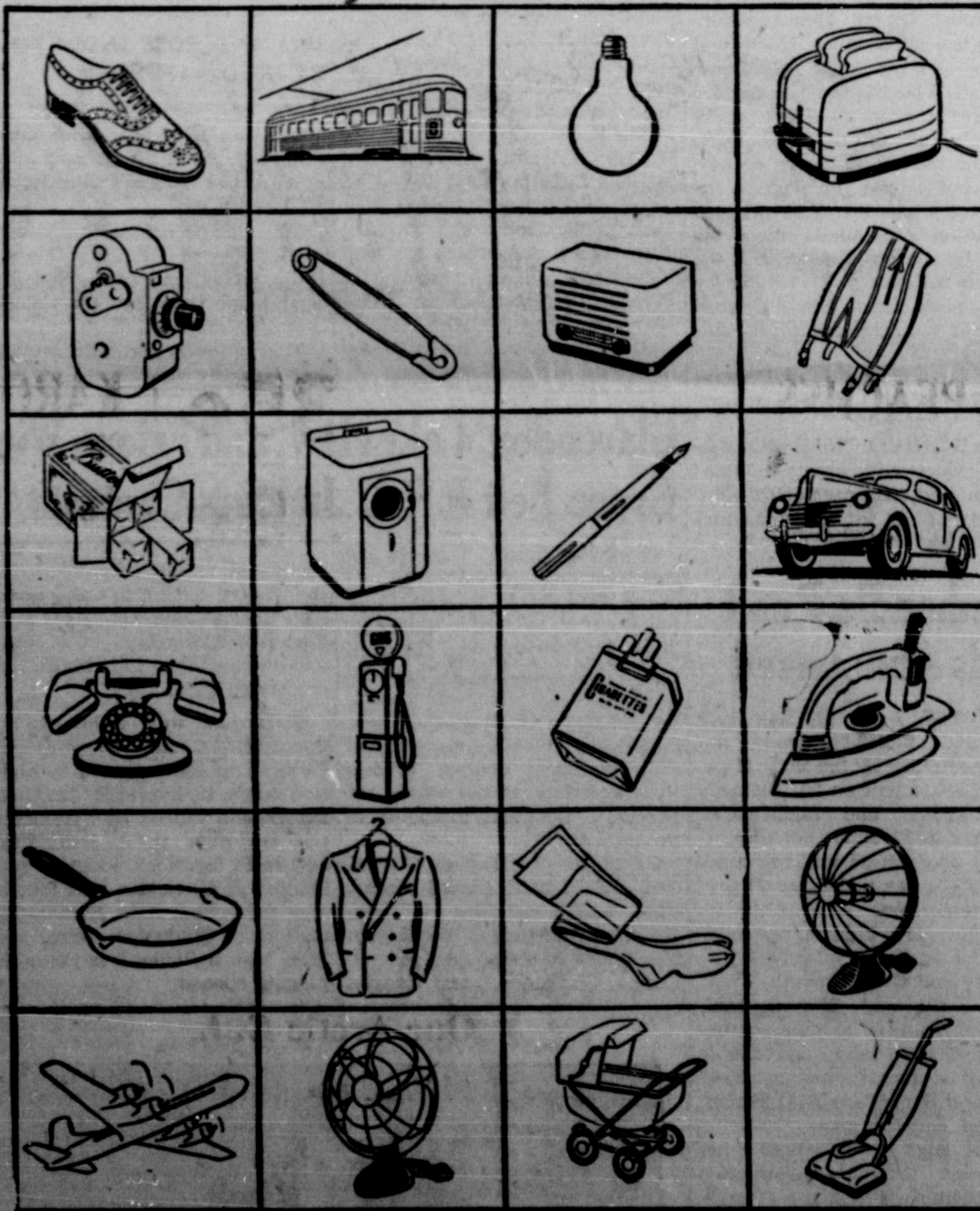

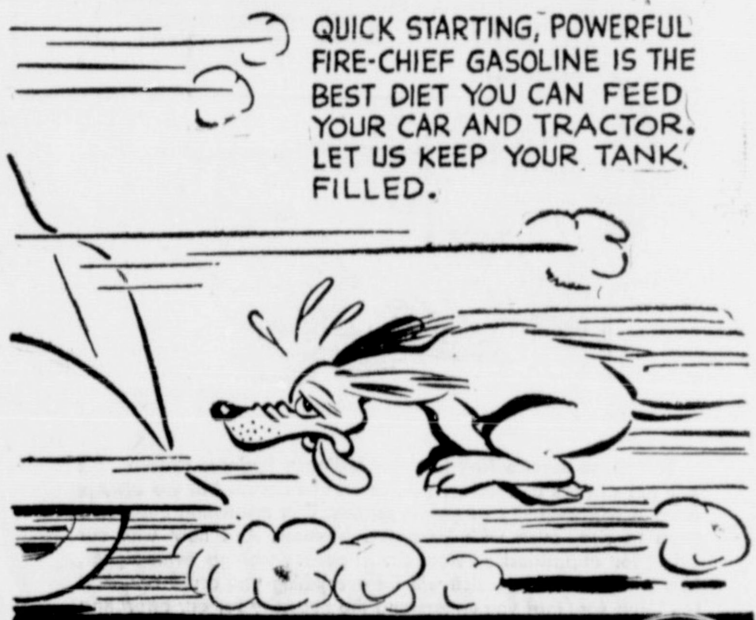

LIBRARY NOTES

By Mrs. C. A. Burton

Since the war is over, agencies which furnished prisoners of war with books are now active in sending books to displaced persons in many areas. The books supplied the Austrian camps are in Russian, Serbian, Polish, and German languages, according to the assistant secretary of the International Federation of Library Associations who has recently returned from a trip to Austria.

The British Red Cross is starting courses with these books among 115,000 displaced persons in the British zone of Austria.

All of the four thousand Russian libraries wrecked by the Germans will be restored by the end of 1946. However, it will take much longer than that to bring the book stock of the libraries to prewar level, for the seventeen million volumes. Three thousand of the four thousand libraries completely destroyed have been reopened.

Edgar Lee Masters, author of the "Spoon River Anthology" has been awarded the first formal \$5,000 fellowship of the Academy of American Poets. The selection was made by a board of twelve judges, including Archibald MacLeish, Robinson Jeffers, Robert M. Hutchins, Chancellor of the University of Chicago, and Dr. Frank P. Graham, president of the University of North Carolina. Lyle Saxon, Louisiana's foremost man of letters, died a few

days ago of pneumonia. He was only 54 years old and had written many books of his state including "Father Mississippi" and "Fabulous New Orleans." He had been one of the speakers at the Dallas Book Fair.

A new biography, "Charles Dickens," by Dame Una Pope-Hennessy promises to be very much appreciated by the many people who still enjoy Dickens. This statement explains his lasting popularity. What Dickens did was to transmute his feeling for the happy, the loving, the poor, the dying, the suffering into people and books. His characters are unforgettable.

Clarence Day's "Life With Father" was so great a screen success that now "Life With Mother" is to be screened. Marc Connelly's play, "The Green Pastures," was presented by the "Theater Guild of the Air" on Sunday night.

The 1937 Pulitzer Prize play, "You Can't Take It With You," by Moss Hart and George S. Kaufman is being revived for a tour by Interstate Players in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana.

Lin Taiyi is the daughter of the Chinese philosopher, Lin Yutang, and bids fair to become as well known as her literary father. She already has two books to her credit, the last of which is "The Golden Coin."

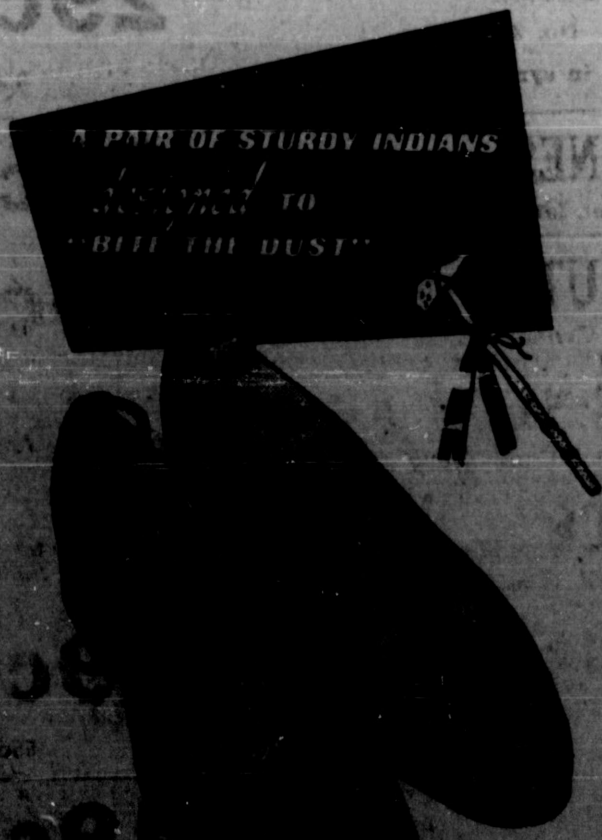

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Tri-State Tattler

GUYMON, Okla. (WNS)—The "No-Man's Land" of Oklahoma is preparing a program of superlatives for May 2 when modern, civilized community events are forgotten and this city is converted into an era of the historical past.

This metamorphosis is the annual "Pioneer Day of No-Man's Land," a historical pageant sponsored by the Guymon Chamber of Commerce.

It is held in commemoration of the passage of the Organic Act by Congress on May 2, 1890, which made "No-Man's Land" a part of the Oklahoma Territory instead of a "lost" strip of land claimed only by outlaws who sought it as a place of refuge from the law.

Until that time this strip, now the Panhandle of Oklahoma, had been a neglected step-child. It had been under Spanish, French, Mexican and Texas rule.

When the Lone Star State threw off the Mexican yoke and petitioned for admission to the United States, this strip became the "Territory of the Cimarron," better known as "No-Man's Land."

The reason for its severance from Texas was this: when Texas asked for admission to the Union, the Free and Slave states were involved in a bitter controversy. No territory north of the Mason-Dixon Line could be admitted to the Union as slave territory. So the present Oklahoma Panhandle became a region without a flag, since it was the part of Texas that lay north of the important line.

One glance down Guymon's main street on Pioneer Day is enough to scare a tenderfoot Easterner back into the East. For the town looks pretty wild and woolly, especially woolly, what with mean-looking hombres decked out in whiskers, mustaches and six-guns strolling along the streets.

The celebration really begins weeks before May 2. The men throw away their razors and begin growing chin whiskers. Priz-

Texas Is to Get Largest Share of Airport Funds

Texas will get the largest share of federal airport aid under program legislation now awaiting a senate vote.

The following is the amounts that have been appropriated for improvements of airports over

a seven year period. \$500,000,000 airport plan measure.

\$25,000,000 has been set aside for administration of this seven year program. \$118,000,000 will be apportioned by CAA for those projects deemed necessary to the program without regard to location. The remaining \$356,250,000 will go to the states according to a formula which takes into account their comparative sizes and population.

Texas will receive \$24,478,073 or 6.871 percent, and is classed in rank as No. 1.
