The Little Golden Books have been so much loved by our small people—but have not been available for a long while. But we were able to get four of them this past week—all were checked out and are making four small people happy this week. They are "Little

Golden Book of Birds," "Little Golden Book of Toys," "My First Book," and "Tootles."

The London Daily Express has bought the serialization rights to Ralph Ingersoll's "Top Secret" in which Britain's top military leaders are criticized.

Archibald MacLeish has sold his home in Washington and is returning to his farm in Massachusetts to devote all his time to writing. "Storm," the great novel

by Charles Stewart, is being adapted for radio on the Cavalcade of America.

"The Postman Always Rings Twice" by James Cain has been filmed, and "The Arch of Triumph" by Erich M. Remarque is being filmed.

Bill Mauldin of "Up Front" fame is reported by the daily press as wearing the first suit he has ever owned—purchased early in the war. Bill Mauldin and Private Hargrove seem destined to remain the best-known privates of the war.

Ernest Hemingway, recently divorced from Martha Gellhorn, was married for the fourth time in March—to Mary Welsh, newspaper and magazine writer. Hemingway is working on a new novel.

John Hersey, author of the book which many of you have read, "A Bell for Adano," is being sued for libel by Lieut. Col. Frank E. Toscani, who claims to be the prototype of Major Jopolo in the story. He is suing for \$250,000.

The ninety-two-page illustrated manuscript of Lewis Carroll's "Alice's Adventures Underground," the basis of the "Alice's Adventures in Wonderland" was sold for \$50,000 in New York in April. The British Museum felt badly that it should be in American museum, but their bid was not quite equal to the American. The manuscript containing the

Lewis Carroll drawings was in the possession of Alice Liddell, the heroine of the story, and was in her possession 65 years. This manuscript has been shown at various times to the public by the Philadelphia Free Library, the New York Public Library, and Columbia University.

Reading Clubs have become very popular during the past few years and now Children's Book Clubs are becoming quite popular. The plans vary, but most of them are based on age distinctions.

AIR NEWS

To Fly Cross Country

1. Plan your course well before starting.
- A. Get your magnetic or compass course for each leg of the trip.
- B. Check the distance of each leg, estimate the time it will take so you will know where to stop for gas. Don't run the tank too low as you may pick up unexpected head winds.
- C. Check the terrain to decide what altitude you should fly. (Winds at different altitudes should be considered.)
- D. If this is a long trip, BE SURE TO CHECK THE WEATHER.
2. Follow your map every inch of the way. Be sure to watch every bend in rivers and all R.R. tracks.
3. Check your ground speed every 20 to 30 miles in a small plane.

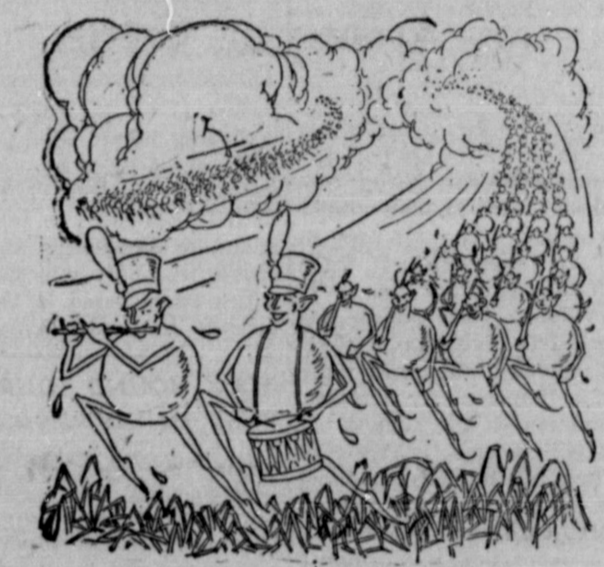
