Farm Program Elections Are Announced

Election of Agricultural Conservation community committees and delegates to the county convention for the election of a county committee will be held in Donley County during the next few weeks, Mr. Simmons, chairman of the county Agricultural Conservation Committee, announces.

The plans now are to hold all the elections on Saturday, December 13, in each of the eight communities in the county. More detailed information will be printed later.

Any person who is participating in the 1947 Agricultural Conservation Program, or who had a contract with the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, is eligible to vote. This includes owners, operators, tenants, or sharecroppers. Lists of eligible voters are being prepared and will be used to check votes cast in the elections.

Delegates to the county convention, elected in the community election, will meet with delegates from the other communities in the county and elect a county committee.

"This grass roots administration of the farm program is one of the cornerstones of the program," says Mr. Simmons. "It can be made stronger if every eligible farmer will vote in the coming elections and take an interest otherwise in developing the program. This year, with so many problems facing farmers, it is doubly important that able men are elected to administer the farm program."

COTTON GINNING REPORT

According to W. M. Patman, Special Agent, the Census report shows that 2431 bales of cotton were ginned in Donley County from the crop of 1947 prior to Nov. 1st as compared with 2809 bales for the crop of 1946.

Brooks Chesshir Killed In Auto Accident

Word was received here Wednesday night by L. L. Wallace of the death of Brooks Chesshir, prominent local business man for several years, near Lampasas, Texas about 4:30 p. m. Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Wallace received the word from the undertaker at Lampasas and he stated that Mr. Chesshir's car collided head on with another auto and that a woman in the latter car was killed also.

Mr. Chesshir was accompanied by an employee of the Clay Funeral Home of Shamrock and it was understood that he did not receive serious injury. The two men had been deer hunting and were apparently on their way home as the informant stated that there were three deer in the trailer Mr. Chesshir was pulling. Every year he has always planned his deer hunts and for one reason or other has usually had hard luck in getting his deer. This time, it seems he got his deer but his own luck ran out and Clarendon lost a very good citizen.

Mr. Chesshir moved to Clarendon some 10 years ago from Amarillo and purchased the Conoco Agency here. He sold his interests in that business some three years ago and entered the Monument and Burial Vault business, being employed by L. L. Wallace.

Mr. Chesshir has no relatives near Clarendon and a list of survivors could not be learned at this time or any facts concerning funeral arrangements.

Slow Falling Rain Drenches Area

Slow general rains which fell the latter part of last week and again the first of this week - - - and still continuing, have broken one of the longest droughts the area has experienced in recent years and gave rise to hopes that this section would again next year yield a bumper wheat crop.

Moisture as near as we can figure it for the entire spell has amounted to around 1.50 inches. The weather station has been moved again to the airport and the phone out there has not been connected as of this morning so we couldn't get an accurate report on the moisture yesterday or last night.

All cotton pulling has stopped for the past week, and while it is believed that none of the cotton will be knocked out, ginners said this week that the lint from now on will be cut from one to two grades.

The biggest eye for the moisture is from the wheat grower and this is exactly what he needed - - and too, it sure will go a long way toward preventing those dust storms again.

REV. SARTAIN ELECTED TO BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF WAYLAND COLLEGE

The Southern Baptists State Convention which met last week in Amarillo, appointed Rev. L. A. Sartain, Clarendon Baptist pastor, to the Board of Directors of Wayland Baptist College at Plainview. This is a distinct honor, and one which this young preacher richly merits for his outstanding interest in Christian education and his whole hearted support of Southern Baptist ideals.

M. M. McCULLY NAMED VOLUNTEER VRR COMMITTEEMAN

Mr. M. M. McCully, Donley County Veterans Service Officer, has been named a volunteer Veterans Reemployment Rights Committeeman for Donley County by the Veterans Reemployment Rights Division of the U. S. Department of Labor.

Mr. McCully, the newly named VRR committeeman, will act as a volunteer arbitrator between veterans seeking reemployment and their former employers. The 80th Congress extended the reemployment rights provision of the Selective Service Act after the Act expired March 31 of last year. By law a veteran who re-applies for his old job within 90 days after he leaves the armed services may regain it and may not be discharged from the position without cause for the period of one year.

Under the volunteer organization being set up by the VRRD, the Texas Employment Commission's office in Amarillo, Texas, located at 323 W. 7th Avenue, will serve as an information center for the veterans. Veterans with reemployment problems will be referred to Mr. McCully. If he cannot settle the issue locally, the case is turned over to the regional office of the VRRD in Dallas. A final step, if the VRRD fails to get the employers and veterans together, is action through federal courts by U. S. district attorneys.

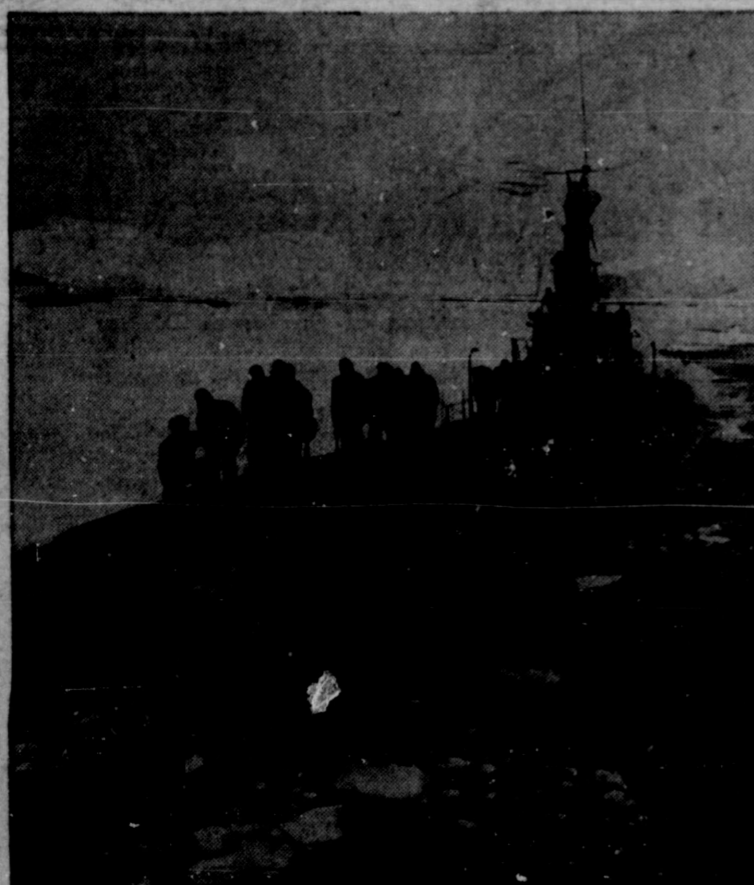
This contribution was certainly a good deed on the part of the people who gave, and we hope this food collected here, combined with all others, will go a long way toward preventing another war.

Can The Culls

There's no sense in feeding hard-to-get grain to hens that won't give eggs in return—and any poultryman will tell you that a rooster in an egg-production flock is worth less than nothing.

H. M. Breedlove, County Agent, says that the best place to find cull hens and roosters is on the pantry shelf. He says they can be canned as boned or diced chicken or sandwich meat. If you have

several to put up, try putting all the wings in one can—for dumpings—and all the gizzards in another, and all the livers in another. You'll probably have several cans of broth for soup, too.

If you're fortunate enough to be canning more than you need for your family, look into the matter of selling them. This is a good time to sell culls before Thanksgiving and Christmas. Cull now and feed only the good hens.

Texas Press Association Sees Dawn of A New Era

December 1 will mark the dawn of a new era for the Texas Press Association in the opinion of Paul Fulks, president of the Texas association and publisher of the Wolfe City Sun.

On that date the daily and weekly newspapers of Texas join hands to open their own central office with a full-time staff of experienced press association workers in charge.

Texas Press Association directors have contracted with Vernon T. Sanford, for 13 years secretary-manager of the Oklahoma Press Association, to manage the Texas association. Officials of the Texas organization are now endeavoring to locate office headquarters in Dallas.

Said Fulks, "Our central office will issue information bulletins to the newspapers, serve as an employment bureau for newspaper workers, look after the legislative interests of the publications, represent our newspapers in the sale of political and state advertising, and arrange our convention programs."

The TPA president also stated that "our plans call for activities not alone in the interest of the press of Texas, but for the state in general. Details of a promotion program for Texas will be announced as soon as the central office can complete arrangements with other interested groups and individuals who want to see the great state of Texas grow greater and greater."

Sanford has been with the Okla-

homa organization since August 1, 1934. Prior to then he was manager of the Nebraska Press Association.

He is a native Oklahoman. His newspaper training was received in the Sooner State over a period of 15 years, on the Chickasha Daily Express, Norman Transcript, Anadarko Daily News, and the semi-weekly Cleveland County Democrat. News. He has been a carrier boy, printer's devil, assistant pressman, reporter, classified advertising manager, display advertising manager, and part-owner.

Sanford is a past-president of the Advertising Club of Oklahoma City; the Oklahoma City Chapter of the Southwestern Association of Industrial Editors; and of Newspaper Association Managers. He served for two years as chairman of National Newspaper Week and editor of the NAM Bulletin. He is a member of the board of directors of the Better Business Bureau of Oklahoma City and an honorary member of the board of directors of the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce. He is also a member of the Oklahoma City Camera Club, the Midwest Circulation Managers' Assn., the International Council of Industrial Editors, and the Newspaper Advertising Executives Assn.

He belongs to the Legion of Honor of the Order of DeMolay, the Masonic Lodge, and the Methodist Church.

The new Texas manager is a graduate of the University of Oklahoma, with an AB in Journalism; and holds a Master of Arts degree from the University of Missouri. He was awarded a Fellowship by the University of Missouri and was presented with the first Merit Award given to graduates of the University of Oklahoma's school of journalism for accomplishments in their chosen profession.

Family Physician, Your Medical Counselor

According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, there are too many persons who approach the choice of a family physician casually. Viewing the doctor much as a fireman, whose ser-

VICES are required only in an emergency, such families wait until an illness strikes, and then get hold of the first doctor who can respond to the call. While such an attitude still reasonably assures one of satisfactory medical services, it can handicap the physician somewhat, and in the long run does not permit the supervision and close personal contact which can exist only by having a regular family doctor.

"Knowing his patients enables

a physician to give advice on maintaining health and preventing disease, based on his intimate knowledge of the physical and mental make-up of the members of the family," Dr. Cox stated. "The casually summoned physician plainly cannot have this background or opportunity. It is well known to students of medical science that no one procedure or drug can be applied to the cure of every disease. It would indeed be fine if we could have

some panacea for all diseases, but unfortunately the healing art is not as simple as that."

"People are far from being alike," he continued. "Bodily and mental characteristics markedly differ in members of the same family. Reactions to medicines of various types, the habits of the individual, environmental influences, and personal factors vary widely. Armed with an intelligent appreciation of these facts, as applied to the members of the fam-

ily, a physician possesses the maximum opportunity to render his best advice, not only in curing disease, but as medical counselor to the family as a whole."

A major event in the 1948 presidential campaign will occur at Milwaukee, Wisconsin November 24th, when Harold E. Stassen launches his campaign for the Republican nomination with a mammoth rally in the Milwaukee Auditorium.

His speech will be broadcast over American Broadcasting Co. stations at 8:30 p. m. central time. Elaborate plans for the major performance are being made by the Wisconsin committee, and friends of Stassen throughout the country are developing Coffee Parties to bring in listeners to hear the broadcast.

This unusual step of going into Milwaukee for the opening campaign speech has been taken because Wisconsin has an early presidential primary in April which is generally regarded as very significant in the presidential drive. Mr. Stassen is, of course, speaking in many states, includ-

ing Texas, in carrying his campaign to the people.

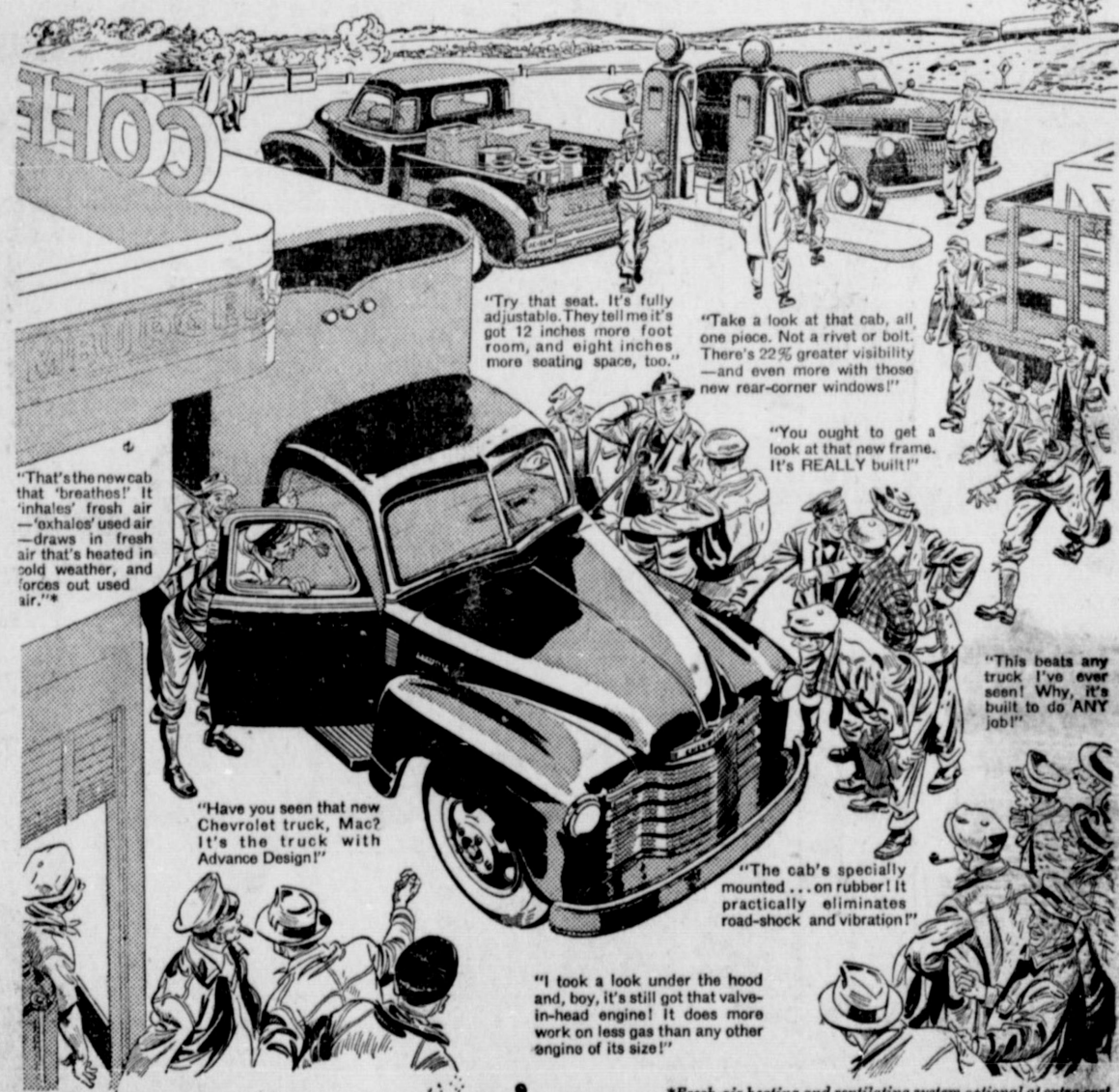

Marcia Davenport who has become so popular, is living in Prague, working on her next book.





Veterans' News

The Veterans Administration has announced a new plan for VA inspection of houses financed by GI loans while the houses are still under construction.

VA will make a pre-construction appraisal of "reasonable value" based upon complete plans and specifications. A minimum of three inspections are required as

work advances to assure adherence to the agreed standards. The plan is optionally available to builders, lenders and sponsors of such projects.

Builders and financing agencies thus may receive a definite commitment as to "reasonable value" in advance of construction, provided the homes are completed according to specifications.

The commitment will remain valid for a specified period—usually predicated on the probable time necessary to complete construction.

Heretofore, a definite VA commitment on the maximum price for which a house could be sold

to a veteran upon completion was available only where an individual veteran asked for a construction loan.

With the new plan, VA for the first time is assuming directly the function of assuring proper construction—from plans to completion—of houses built for sale to veterans with GI loan financing.

VA inspections will not be required in connection with work supervised by the Federal Housing Administration.

The job training program provided for World War II veterans by the GI Bill has passed its peak under present laws and conditions, the Veterans Administration believes.

The peak apparently was reached last January when 632,000 veterans were training on-the-job. Steady decreases since then cut the total to 564,000 by September 30, 1947.

VA said principal factors in the decline were the ceilings on income plus subsistence allowance and the two-year limits on all job-training (other than apprenticeship training).

Veterans training on-the-job in the Dallas Branch Area as of September 30 included: Texas, 41,000; Louisiana, 9,000; and Mississippi, 11,500.

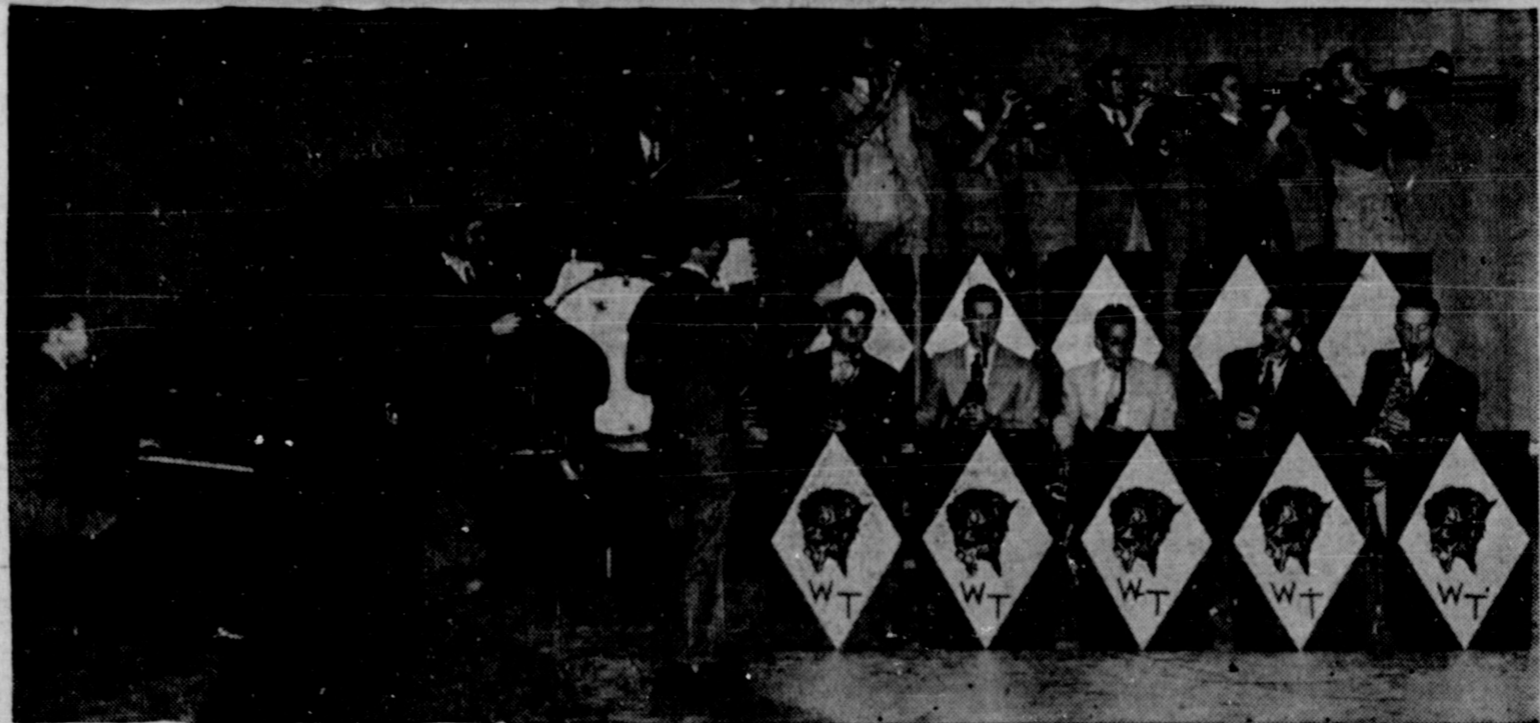
