Donley-Hall County Highway Ordered

AUSTIN, Jan. 23—Initial bids were opened and tabulated today in what is expected to be the largest post war letting of Texas Highway construction projects. Included in the low bids that were opened by counties was the completion of the road between Clarendon and Brice which will begin at the end of the present pavement extending south of town to intersect with the pavement extending out from Memphis. The official statement is given below:

Donley and Hall—State Highway 18, 9.04 miles grading, structures, flexible base and double asphalt surface treatment (4.6 miles Donley County) and grading and structures (4.44 miles Hall County). Stone and Falls, Ada, Okla., contractors, \$160,449.13.

County Show Board Elects Officers for '47

The Donley county show board met in the office of county agent H. M. Breedlove and elected officers for the year of 1947. Carroll Lewis of Lelia Lake was elected president of the board; H. M. Breedlove was elected general manager and secretary; Bill Weatherly, treasurer; superintendents of the different shows under the board as follows: Fat stock show in February, D. E. Leathers, assisted by E. S. Ballew; Dairy shows, John Gillham and fall fair and horse show, Joe McMurtry. Committees were appointed to make arrangements for the premium money for the shows through out the year.

The first show of the year will be the Donley county fat stock show held in Clarendon on the twenty-eighth of February. Eighteen club calves, 45 hogs and 15 sheep will make up this show for 4-H club boys and FFA members.

The board will meet in the county agent's office on Saturday the eighth to complete the premium list for the February show and finish plans for the three shows for the year. Anyone wishing to attend any meetings of the show board are invited to attend at any time the board is in session.

Judges for all the shows thru the year will be from the Extension service of the A&M College. The board discussed judges at the meeting this week and authorized the secretary to make arrangements at once for the judges for all shows.

Veterans Meeting Tonite at Hedley

A meeting of all veterans of World War II who are actively engaged in farming or who are employed by firms selling goods or services has been called for tonight at 7:30 p. m. at the Legion Hall at Hedley. Local and State officials of the Vocational school program for veterans will be at the meeting and explain the terms of the program.

One unit of the agricultural division of the program is already in operation in the county, and indications are that two new units in agriculture and at least one in distributive education will be started in the near future.

Each of the schools require an attendance of 42 hours per month on the part of the veteran and he receives a subsistence pay of \$65 per month if single and \$90 if married.

Wreck Victims Remain Critical

Two of seven persons injured in an automobile collision near Hedley Tuesday remain in a critical condition at the local hospital. Most seriously hurt was 5-year-old Carol Jewett of Memphis and his mother Mrs. Robert L. Jewett. Mr. Jewett is reported some improved this morning and Donald Ray Berry of Amarillo is still under observation. All the other victims have been released.

The accident occurred shortly after noon Tuesday. The Jewett family was riding in a Model A Ford which was said to have been rammed by the Amarillo car when it started to make a left turn on Highway 287 just this side of the Luttrell orchard near Hedley. There were three of the Jewett family in the Ford and four persons in the Mercury driven by A. W. Frost of Amarillo, according to patrolmen.

Other members of the Amarillo car were Wilma Byrene Glenn, Donald Ray Berry of Amarillo, and Forest A. Richardson, a hitch-hiker of Electra.

The car driven by Jewett was completely demolished with only a part of the frame remaining intact, and the Mercury was considered a complete loss.

Womack ambulances from Clarendon, Hedley and Memphis took the injured to the hospital.

There will be two tags this year instead of the one that has been customary during the war years. They are black with white lettering and the county number this year starts with AA 6900.

Motorists may buy their tags during February but they can not be put on until the first of March and must be on the vehicle by April 1st to avoid a fine if used on the public roads.

Stolen Car Is Recovered After Three Months

A car stolen here three months ago was recovered recently in Oklahoma City when the FBI was called in to help break up an interstate car theft ring that was operating over the Southwest.

The car taken here was the property of Winston Wood and was taken from his mother's home near the southwest corner of the courthouse square. Local officers put forth every effort to effect a rescue of the car and the arrest of the offenders, but could get nowhere with all leads apparently missing. This was also true of the Amarillo officers and other law enforcement agencies for the time being.

Only recently the car thefts mounted to almost forty, or thirty eight, to be exact. Most of them from northwest Texas. It was then the FBI was called on the job.

Headquarters was finally located in Oklahoma City. Two men and two women were taken in charge, and are said to have boasted of their skill as car thieves. They changed the motor numbers and often the paint to avoid detection. The Wood car had a new motor number. It was the secret number on the frame that identified the car.

With a number of federal charges against the thieves in Oklahoma, it is not likely that the thief will ever be punished for the local job.

It was necessary to purchase two new tires, but other than that, Wood's car was in good condition.

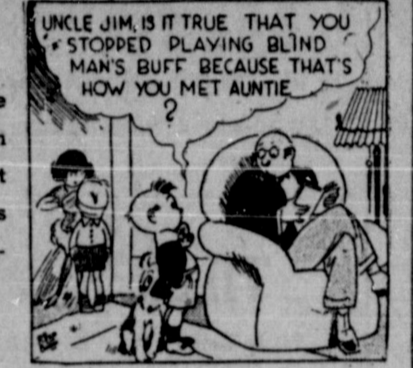

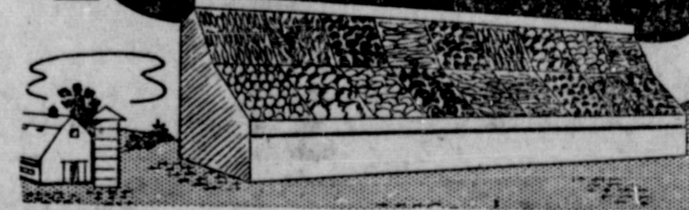

Veterans' News

Steps to cut the time taken for disposal of surplus airports to interested municipalities have been outlined by WAA. Time-saving steps include the abolition of the surplus airport disposal committee, a 14-day date line for the army to review CAA reports on the airport to be declared and receipt by WAA of personal and real property inventories on the airport before disposal proceedings are begun. Actual disposal operations for airports will be decentralized from Washington to the field agencies of WAA as another major step in speeding disposals. A target date of April 30 has been set for offering the available airports on WAA records. Airports declared to WAA in the future will be liquidated in 90 days.

Bids will be received by WAA for the purchase of 300 surplus aircraft, including 217 Vultee basis trainers, 39 twin-engine Cessna, 22 Stinson single engine AT-198 and 22 planes of nine other types which have been approved for certification by the CAA and may be licensed when they have been repaired or modified to meet CAA regulations. Thirty twin-engine Cessnas are at Hicks Field, Fort Worth, but the largest group offered is located at the WAA sales-storage depot, Victory Field, Vernon, Texas. Bids for these planes must be sent to the WAA, Box 6030, Dallas.

A bargain sale of paints, varnishes and shellac is being held by the WAA. Purchasers are limited to holders of HH priority certificates, buying for use in the veterans' housing program. The items are in lots ranging from one to 3,290 gallons mostly in small lots. They include pure gum shellac, enamels and varicolored paints. All merchandise is located at the WAA warehouse, 123 E. Exchange, Ft. Worth. Further information may be had at the WAA office, T&P Bldg., Fort Worth.
