





BROKEN BEAM CONTROLS SOAP DISPENSER

Soap dispenser buttons can contaminate the hands of surgeons; light beans can't.

With a new electronic soap dispenser, developed and designed jointly by G. E. and the E. J. Scarry Company of Denver, Colorado, the only thing that touches the surgeon's hands is a light beam. When his hands break the light beam, a light-sensitive photoelectric relay causes a current to flow which, when amplified, electrically operates the soap dis penser mechanism.

The dispenser er small, rectangular, cabinet, and has a recess cut in from the top, large enough to accommodate a person's hands and wrists. Across this recess the light beam is directed. When this beam is broken, the dispenser operates and one measure of soap, approximately one teaspoonful, is ejected from the spout.

This soap dispenser is a small example of how control mechanisms furnish the brains for anything from a tiny mechanical device to a huge motor. In this case the hands cut a light beam; when this happens the photoelectric relay energizes a solenoid; the solenoid in turn operates the pump which squirts the soap into the

waiting hands. Applied to steel mills, which require motors of 1000 hp or higher, it is the control which permits the rolling of ingots or plates to a predetermined thickness down to an accuracy of a thousandth of an inch.




