To The Honorable Luther Gribble, Judge of Said Court:
Comes now the grand jury, duly empaneled for the March Term, 1947, of the District Court of Donley County, Texas, and

presents this its report of the work done by it to this date:
We have been in session two days; have examined many witnesses and have voted bills of indictments in all cases which we deemed the evidence sufficient to sustain a conviction. We return herewith in open court four in

dictments, all felonies.
We have investigated the matter of the promiscuous breaking of street lights in the city of Clarendon and find this practice has reached serious proportions. In some instances it appears to us that this has been done without thought of the seriousness involved, and in other instances it has been done deliberately and without regard to the law which prohibits such practices. We feel it our duty to warn those who have been guilty of such offenses to cease, and we call upon all citizens, particularly the parents to cooperate with the officials of the City and County in stopping this practice. We owe this obligation not only for the protection of public property, but equally as well to any of our youth who may have been guilty of such practice.
We have finished our labors so far as known to us and ask that we be recessed, subject to the call of the court.

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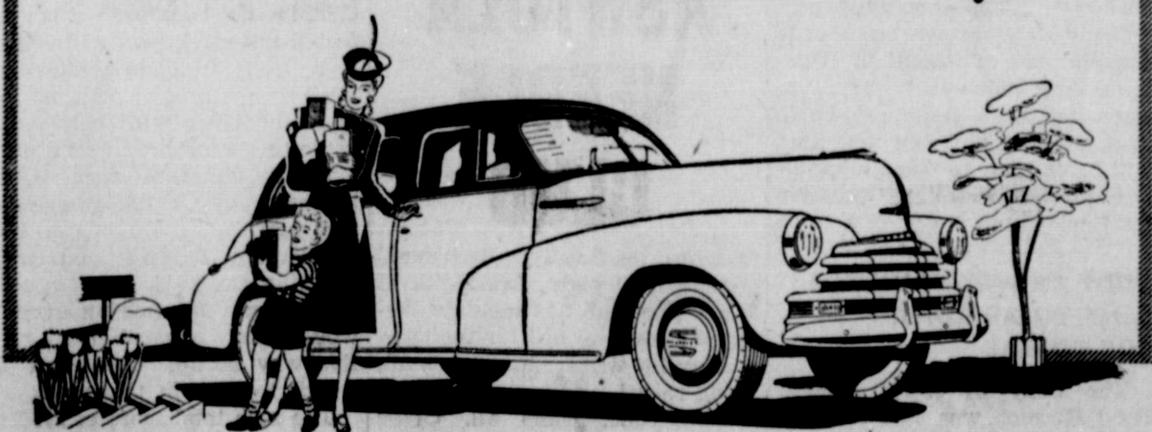

LIBRARY NOTES

The library is getting some more much-needed space. An unused, enclosed small room has been added and the shelving has almost been completed—will be before you read this. It will add wonderfully to our efficiency. Three Boy Scouts came and helped move books on Saturday. The presses of the country are

turning out a much greater volume of books than for some years and the types of books are changing. During the war years, war books were a "must." Every librarian bought all she could afford. Now these remain on the shelves and the reading public clamors for a different type. Historical novels of past centuries have been very popular.

Nevil Shute, the English officer whose books have been so popular, has a new one of an entirely different character. It is called

"The Chequer Board," and is to be distributed to the Negro Book Club in May, the Guild having made an exception to its usual custom because of the nature of the book. Nevil Shute acknowledges that he expected the book to be popular in England where he was much impressed by the popularity of the American negro during the war, but he was not sure of its reception in this country. In May Nevil Shute expects to visit this country.

Ben Ames Williams is using "House Divided" as the title of his new book about the Civil War which is already in the hands of the printer.

Thomas Heggens' new novel, "Mister Roberts," immediately became a best seller though he had not been considered promising material by his newspaper friends up to that time.

Betty Mac Donald is winning greater acclaim even than with the "Egg and I" with her new children's book "Mrs. Piggie-Wiggle," evolved from stories she told her own two children when they were little. COUNTY AGENT OFFERS REMEDY FOR WITHERING OF FLOWER LEAVES

Here's a diagnosis for flower gardeners.

When the tips of flower leaves wither, curl up and die, and buds fail to open normally, it's a good bet that the trouble is being caused by thrips, which are small, slender-bodied insects which feed on many varieties of flowers, according to County Agent H. M. Breedlove.

Thrips vary in color from yellowish to dark brown and often almost black, and are less than one-tenth of an inch in length. Control measures consist of dusting with a five percent DDT dust. It is also wise, says Breedlove, to keep old buds or blossoms removed from plants, to keep thrips from developing.



RED SPIDER IS MENACE TO FLOWER GARDENERS AND SHRUB GROWERS

A threat to flower gardeners and ornamental shrub growers is the red spider, a tiny reddish mite just larger than a chigger.

County Agent H. M. Breedlove says that the red spider puts pale yellowish or reddish brown spots on plant leaves, which result in an unhealthy condition.

Breedlove says that the spider can be controlled by dusting the plants thoroughly with fine-ground dusting sulphur, applied when the mites are first noticed. Usually, two dustings, seven days apart, are sufficient.

Weekly SURPLUS NEWS WAA

Direct on the spot aid to victims of the Texas City explosion disaster was tendered through the Grand Prairie Zone five office of War Assets Administration with instructions to open the Houston WAA warehouse to any needs of the sufferers. General C. B. Rucker also instructed WAA officials at Houston to make demands on any of the regional organizations within Zone Five. First aid equipment was sent to Texas City within hours after the first marine explosions.

One of the largest sales at site at Dal-6 WAA warehouse at Grand Prairie will be held beginning May 2nd. Hand tools and industrial equipment will be offered. Commercial buyers as well as priority groups will be entitled to purchase.

All personal property owned by the government at Camp Howze, Gainesville, was recently sold when over 200 bidders from Northeast Texas and Southern Oklahoma purchased 64 lots of miscellaneous materials. WAA's real property division will hold sale of realty at the site in the future.

Establishment of a 2,000-bed tuberculosis sanatorium at Camp Fannin, near Tyler, Texas, by the State Board of Control for Texas is contemplated in an application for buildings and ground made to War Assets Administration at Grand Prairie, Texas by the State Board. A bill has been passed by the Texas legislature authorizing this application.

Ex-GI clothing, including shirts, sweaters, hats, jackets and underclothes, will be sold thru a sealed bid sale which will close May 6, it has been announced by the Grand Prairie office of WAA. Customer Service Center at the Grand Prairie office will furnish information concerning this sale.

The fight on foot and mouth disease among cattle is being joined by the Grand Prairie regional office of War Assets Administration. Government surplus property, including chemicals, automotive equipment and coverall clothing, were recently checked out for sale to the Bureau of Animal Industry of the U. S. Department of Agriculture to be entered in the fight on the dread malady in the Mexican state of Vera Cruz. Included were 10 trailer tanks, 20 tank trucks, 10 semi-trailers with tractors to pull them, 20 two and a half ton cargo trucks, and 30 panel trucks with sprayer units attached.

Five Texas and two Oklahoma cities have purchased the major portion of the water distribution system at Camp Howze, Gainesville. Principal item was 163,550 linear feet of water pipe. Cities awarded the equipment were Vernon, Hutchins, Pampa, Denison and Gainesville, Texas, and Tulsa and Muskogee Oklahoma.

Thirty-five thousand gallons of paint were recently sold to a paint processing company by the Grand Prairie WAA regional office. The paint had formerly been frozen by the Public Housing Authority and was then released to WAA for public sale.
